Issues: The guests said that it's important for persons 65 and older to

be vaccinated against influenza. Reggentine says that 60% of flu-related hospitalizations are of persons over 65 and 90% of persons who die from the flu are 65 and older. There is also an issue with how chronic conditions common among seniors impact their ability to recover from the flu. Dr. Hunter said that people 65 and up are more likely to catch the flu if they are exposed and they are likely to suffer more. These persons are more likely to have comorbidities which impact ability to recover. He advises seniors to contact their physicians to learn about vaccination options but get the vaccine one way

or another.
