Section II: Responsive Programs

A. Odor issues at the Smiths Creek Landfill

St. Clair County Commissioners are asking for the public's patience as they work on a permanent solution to the foul odor coming from the Smiths Creek Landfill. Commission Chairman Jeff Bohm says the county has spent over a half million dollars to address the issue and that measures taken to limit the odor at the Smiths Creek Landfill are working according to plan. Last year, the landfill's bio reactor system began producing more methane gas than it could use to create electricity. Commission chairman Jeff Bohm says a temporary flare is now up and running and is burning off the excess gas. Bohm adds there has been ongoing air and water monitoring at the landfill and so far there's been no indication of a threat to public health.

St. Clair County commissioners have extended a rental agreement for a temporary landfill flair to help deal with the odor complaints around the Smiths Creek Landfill. The new agreement lasts through May or until a newly purchased permanent flare can be installed at the site. County Commission Chairman Jeff Bohm says the source of that additional gas has been pinpointed to a waste stream received by the

landfill from the now closed Domtar Paper Mill. He says discussions with DTE Energy are ongoing as to what should be done with the additional gas moving forward.

B. Funding for St. Clair County parks

Over \$700,000 is headed to a new county park near Algonac. The new North Channel County Park has been named the recipient of three matching grants from three state agencies totaling \$720,000 dollars. The funds will be used for everything from building a parking lot to a canoe and kayak launch. Parks Director Dennis Delor says the footprint for the park has already expanded, with the county purchasing a neighboring property that was razed and will make room for additional amenities. Delor's comments were echoed by 7th District Commissioner Dave Vandenbossche, who called it a "win-win" not just for his district, but for the entire county. The North Channel Park is located on Pointe Tremble Road on the border of Algonac and Clay Township.

St. Clair County voters will be asked whether or not to approve millages for roads and parks on the August primary ballot. Commissioners Thursday March 7th considered language for a road millage renewal and a new additional parks millage for operations and maintenance. The new parks millage would be at the rate of .494 mills for four years, which is in addition to the existing millage of the same rate that was renewed by voters in 2022.

C. Port Huron Schools sinking fund

Voters in May will be asked whether or not to approve a new millage in the Port Huron Area School District. During January's meeting of the Board of Education, members okayed language for a sinking tax fund. Superintendent Theo Kerhoulas says the 2.62-mil sinking fund would be used specifically for things such as building repairs and maintenance. It cannot be used for teacher or administrator salaries. Kerhoulas adds that if the sinking fund is approved May 7th, Port Huron Schools' property tax rate will still be below the average rate in St. Clair County.

D. Upcoming city council elections

Port Huron's mayor as well as three city council members are up for election this November. Although candidates still have plenty of time to decide whether or not to seek re-election, Mayor Pauline Repp was asked if she's given any thought to another two year term. Mayor Repp says she's leaning towards running for re-election but has not fully made up her mind. The candidate filing deadline for mayor and city council is in July.

Port Huron Mayor Pauline Repp says she will be seeking another 2-year term for mayor. In an announcement shared with local media last night, Repp says she wishes to "see through to fruition" a variety of projects her and council have been working on over the years. Repp has been mayor of Port Huron for 14 years, serving seven consecutive two year terms. Before that, she served as Port Huron City Clerk. Her term, as well as terms for councilmembers Sherry Archibald, Terri Lamb, and Bob Mosurak all expire in November of this year. The filing deadline to run for Mayor and City Council in Port Huron is Tuesday, July 23rd.

A few new names have been added to the list of hopefuls running for elected office in Port Huron this November. Current City Councilwoman, Anita Ashford has thrown her hat in the ring as a Mayoral candidate, taking on Pauline Repp who has held the position since 2009. Ashford has two more years left on her council term, so if she is unsuccessful in her bid for Mayor, she will remain on City Council. Vying for the three available seats on City Council, as of yesterday, are Barbara Payton, Julian Ruck, and Richard Carwile, with Sherry Archibald and Teri Lamb seeking reelection. Absent from that list so far is councilman Bob Mosurak whose term is up this year. Councilman Jeff Pemberton this week announced he's seeking the District 2 County Board of Commissioners seat Jorja Baldwin is leaving behind to run for state rep. In the event that Pemberton or Ashford win their elections, since their spot on council isn't up until 2026, they could go to the next highest vote-getters in the previous City Council election. If no one is found using that method, eligible city voters could then submit a letter of interest for council to consider. If not elected, Pemberton and Ashford would continue on council until their terms end in 2026.

Election Day in Michigan is Tuesday, February, 27th but early, in-person voting is now underway. Fort Gratiot Township Clerk, Bob Buechler, says you can come into his office during normal business hours to cast your ballot in person. You can also request an absentee ballot that will be mailed to you and you can visit one of the township's three polling places on election day. Buechler reminds voters that the presidential primary on Tuesday will be different from other elections in that there are separate ballots to choose from for both Republicans and Democrats and that choosing one or the other does not register you with that party's affiliation.

With Michigan's presidential primary in the rear view mirror, the national attention now shifts to 16 other states who will be holding their primaries this coming Tuesday - dubbed "super Tuesday". Although former South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley has yet to win a Republican primary, over a quarter of republicans in Michigan still decided to cast a ballot for her this week. Detroit Free Press politics editor Emily Lawler says Haley brought in about 27% of the vote. On the Democratic side, about 13% of Michigan democrats decided to choose to be "uncommitted" rather than to vote for President Biden in Tuesday's primary.

Calling all thumb area entrepreneurs - the Economic Development Alliance of St. Clair County wants to help you. Dan Casey, CEO of the EDA, says they've recently been awarded a \$2.5 million grant that will establish the Eastern Michigan Small Business Network. G. Upcoming road construction projects

A double dose of construction is slated for the Port Huron area. The Michigan Department of Transportation is planning to rebuild Huron Avenue from the Military Street Bridge to Glenwood in 2026. That's in addition to the Blue Water Bridge Plaza Expansion project that's been decades in the works, with the first phases to begin this year. Port Huron City Manager James Freed says he's concerned about the impact the pair of projects will have to local businesses. He has since established a roundtable group consisting of residents and stakeholders to put forth suggestions to city council and MDOT. Freed suggests the amount of traffic crossing the Blue Water Bridge has been on the decline for years and with the planned opening of the Gordie Howe International Bridge in the Fall of next year, Freed wonders if a Blue Water Bridge expansion will be needed at all.

After decades of planning, the first phase of the Blue Water Bridge Expansion Project is set to begin this year. Some evidence of the project can already be seen right now as crews remove trees and relocate utilities in the area of Pine Grove and 10th Avenue. MDOT Senior Project Manager, Carrie Warren says a reconfiguration of the 10th and Pine Grove intersection is likely to take place this summer. Along with the intersection, other work includes work to the Scott Avenue neighborhood, erecting a sound barrier and relocating the I-94 exit ramp.

Port Huron City Council has approved a \$124,000 bid to repair the Lake State Railway crossing at Pine Grove Avenue and Whipple Street. City Manager James Freed says the funds will ultimately come from the Michigan Department of Transportation's local grade crossing program. Construction must be completed by the end of May. The city also expects to rebuild the crossing at 10th Avenue under a similar type of program.

Another summer of Blue Water Bridge construction is on the way. The Michigan Department of Transportation is set to close the Eastbound, or Canadian-bound, bridge starting on May 29th in order to complete maintenance that was started last year. During construction, traffic will be diverted onto the US-bound bridge, with the center lane becoming available for all directions after the midway point, and outside lanes operating in both directions. Drivers can expect similar restrictions to those that were in place last year, with wide loads limited to less than ten feet across, and the removal of dedicated lanes for busses and commuter passholders. MDOT predicts the project will be completed sometime in October.
