I am sickened by your response regarding Bonneville International's decision to terminate Grant Napear from Sports 1140 KHTK. I don't write letters like this usually, but the sheer hypocrisy in claiming that Mr. Napear's response that "ALL LIVES MATTER...EVERY SINGLE ONE!!!" by your words "do not reflect the views or values of Bonneville International Corporation," is disturbing.

Bonneville International is owned by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The Church's very own Proclamation states that "ALL HUMAN BEINGS—male and female—are created in the image of God. Each is a beloved spirit son or daughter of heavenly parents, and, as such, each has a divine nature and destiny." Your decision is the true thing that is despicable in this situation because it's hypocritical. It doesn't represent the values you claim that you have as a company.

I'm calling on you to make the right choice, and immediately reverse your decision to terminate Grant Napear.
