A gift of this magnitude will have a multi-generational impact on VU,, our students, their families, and the community we serve." The gift will be divided into a \$3.5 million permanent scholarship endowment for students studying music and performing in the band or other music ensembles and a \$1 million endowment for students pursuing the one-year certificate to become a licensed practical nurse.</p>
