## October 1 – December 31, 2019

Oct. 4 9:15-9:30am Betty Crookshanks presents information on water shortage as result of drought in our area and where people could obtain water for themselves and their livestock. Also, information on the Community Meeting held September 30 was presented on various projects being worked on by the Meadow River Valley Group. The main Rupert School building will be kept at the present time while a section has been given to the Rupert Fire Depart for expansion and building of an airlift area and the kindergarten building will be used for a Day Care Center. Work is progressing with the Day Care Center and Rainelle Medical Center is working with the Center.

Oct. 11 9:15-9:30am Betty Crookshanks presents information on Toot which is one of largest celebrations in W.Va. Downtown Lewisburg streets will be closed for the set-up of vendors and activities. Special area marked off for parking; and while all vendors can raise money for their projects, the festival was set up to fund Carnegie Hall activities. Information presented on all the various activities from Greenbrier Valley Theater down to Carnegie Hall at the other end of town. Another item discussed was a grant that was acquired by WVSOM that provided information on nutrition and healthy lifestyle, Medline-Plus, National Library of Medicine databases, blood pressure and provided actual blood pressure checks by the WVSOM students and staff at all the libraries in Greenbrier County.
