Station KWCH –DT is a CBS Network affiliate in its service area. In carrying out its responsibilities as a public trustee, the station deals with and is responsive to the principal issues arising in its community on a continuing basis. A variety of specials, public service announcements, public affairs programs and broadcasts on matter of concern to our community are supplemented, in some cases, with in-community projects. Our most significant programming, which has dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, is set forth below.

There are three primary satellites of KWCH-DT which simulcast most of the programming. KBSD-DT, KBSH-DT, and KBSL-DT do insert local segments and are listed in the Supplemental Issues and Programming report for each station.

Specific Treatment of Community Issues

News stories carried in any of five daily newscasts, Monday through Friday, and on three per day newscasts on Saturday, and on two per day newscasts on Sunday, ranging in length of 45 seconds or more, address community issues.

COMMUNITY ISSUES

Crime - Channel 12 reports regularly on criminal activity throughout the entire Channel 12 viewing area as well as the rest of the country and the world. Here we are listing just a few of the stories that were included in our newscast this quarter.

Community - Events impacting the quality of life, including community caring and involvement.

Economy - The economy is of major importance to Kansas residents. Continuing growth keeps our employment rate high; new contract acquisitions by the local aircraft manufacturers, old businesses leaving town, new businesses coming in, proposed tax increases/decreases, and major weather concerns for residences and businesses. All of these factors impact the community, and are of ongoing interest and concern for our viewing audience.

Education - Channel 12 has updated its method of covering educational issues in its viewing area, with the assignment of one reporter to focus solely on education.

Environment - Environment issues and concerns are of interest to the Channel 12 viewing area and are aired regularly in our newscasts to keep our viewers as informed as possible of the latest in Environmental technology, treatments, advisories, etc.

Health & Safety - The well-being of Channel 12 viewers is always our top concern and the Channel 12 News Team is on top of every issue from traffic hazards to severe weather warnings, school closings, fire safety, disaster preparedness and emergency situations. And, with severe weather season, storm spotter training meetings are held several times a week in locations throughout the Channel 12 viewing area all over the state.

Politics - Channel 12 makes sure to convey to viewers the issues and decisions by city, county and state government can affect them.

Promotions also got involved working with the local city councils to make sure anchors had the day named after them. The anchors really got involved in turning an extensive amount of content in their hometowns, AND we sent a news crew out weeks beforehand to turn an extended-length feature of the region.

CRIME

7/1/2014 6pm

We're following a developing story from north central Kansas. A death investigation near the town of Bridgeport in Saline County. Officers were called to a home in that area around 3:30 this afternoon. Investigators have not released many details on what happened including the cause of death, or whether or not that death is suspicious. We're following the developments and will bring you new details as we learn them.

7/3/2014 6am

In the crime watch, a Garden City man pleads guilty to murder. William Shank will be sentenced in September. In February of last year, Shank killed his ex-girlfriend Teri Morris and set fire to her home in Colby.

7/4/2014 5pm

One man is dead following an officer-involved shooting in southeast Wichita. It happened around 1:30 this afternoon in the 78-hundred block of east Clay Street as officer responded to check on a man who may have been suicidal. Devon Fasbinder is live at the scene with the latest from police. The shooting happened around 1:30 this afternoon here on east Clay Street and officers are still in the area continuing their investigation. Deputy Chief Nelson Mosley says the call came at 1:09 from family. When two officers arrived they found the suspect charging out the front door with a weapon. One officer tried tasing the man but it was unsuccessful. He then went for his handgun and shot the man. The man was pronounced dead at Wesley Medical center at 2pm. Police say there is information pointing to some sort of mental illness. At this point we know police are still investigating the incident. They are interviewing possible witnesses and the officers involved. Those two officers will be put on paid administrative leave, which is standard procedure in an officer involved shooting. Those two officers will now be put on paid administrative leave.

7/5/2014 10pm

One Wichita woman was arrested after police say she chased after people with fireworks. It happened last night in the 11-hundred block of north Broadway. Where police say the 39-year-old woman lit fireworks and sprayed three victims with sparks. She was arrested and booked into the Sedgwick county jail. Nobody was seriously hurt.

7/6/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, an overnight shooting in northeast Wichita sends a man to the hospital. Officers responded to a home in the 15-hundred block on north Pinecrest early this morning when a caller reported hearing gunshots and people moving around outside the house. A 20 year old man had a gunshot wound to the thigh. Police found several bullet casings in the street and bullet holes in the house next door. So far no arrests have been made in the case. This is the third shooting over the holiday weekend.

7/7/2014 6pm

The family of a McPherson teacher hurt in a collision with a drunk driver explains how their lives have changed in just the last hour. A judge sentenced Jeffrey Davis to 34 months in prison for aggravated battery. He pleaded no contest to crossing the center line, and hitting Mya Stockman head-on in December. Stockman made the trip to court today as she continues her rehabilitation more than 6 months later. New at 6, Samantha Anderson was there for her family's emotional testimony. Mya Stockman was actually at the sentencing in Salina. And so were about one hundred people filling the gallery. Some dressed in blue and yellow, showing support with Mya shirts. They listened as Stockman's family remembered what life was like before the crash. As they talked of Mya's struggles after the crash and what they say was taken away, Kleenex's became a common sight in the crowded court room. They asked that Davis pay for what happened and say they will continue to move forward as a family. Jeffrey Davis just spoke in court before the sentence was handed down. He told the family he is very, very sorry and asked for forgiveness. Hear his statements and more reaction from family. New tonight at 9 and 10.

7/8/2014

5pm

Wichita police arrest a man accused of raping a jogger in a city park in broad day light. Officers say the sexual assault happened on June 13th around 3 in the afternoon at Eastview Park. And days later they found 44-year-old Benton Baskin in the same area. Hannah Davis has been talking with police about this crime. Hannah you found out the break in this case happened because a neighbor in the area followed a hunch? That's right. Eastview Park is a popular spot for joggers and families with small kids and days after the attack someone the area saw a man who they say wasn't acting right. That person listened to their gut and called police. And because they did, police say they have a rapist in custody. Police arrested this man Monday afternoon. They say 44-year-old Benton Baskin attacked a jogger in Eastview Park on June 13th. Officers say he pulled a knife then took a 31-year-old woman to an area with bushes where he sexually assaulted her in broad daylight. For 10 days there were no leads. Then a neighbor called 911 to report a suspicious person near the same park. Police say forensic evidence strengthened their case against Baskin allowing them to make the arrest Monday afternoon. Tuesday morning the park was full with joggers and families enjoying the relatively cool summer day, but many are doing that differently after the attack. Park goers say the brazen nature of the attack is the most unsettling part. But knowing a suspect is in jail brings some small relief. Police say crimes this brazen rarely happen. That's why they've been sending extra police to this park since the attack happened. As for the neighbor who called in the tip...police say it was one of many leads until forensic tests came back and then they quickly made their arrest. Police say anyone jogging alone should always be aware of their surroundings. They suggest working out with a friend or carrying pepper spray if you are outside alone.

7/9/2014

12pm

In the crime watch, a man who drove his truck through a security gate at Mid-continent airport is sentenced to more than a year of probation. 26-year-old Mark Rehme was sentenced to 18 months' probation instead of 13 months of jail time. Rehme was stopped

by airport security in January after ramming his pickup truck into a security fence near the Cessna property. Investigators say he drove to Wichita from Oklahoma.

7/10/2014 5am

In the crime watch, watch out for this man. The Sedgwick County sheriff's office made a mistake and let Chad Engel out of jail Tuesday afternoon. He had been booked on traffic charges and an outstanding warrant out of McPherson County. A detention deputy thought Engel was being released when he was actually in the process of being transferred to McPherson. The sheriff's office says it was a simple mistake with "serious consequences." Anyone who sees Engel or has any information on where he is should call 911.

7/11/2014 4:30am

You may want to double check your dressing room the next time you're at a store. Salina police say someone took a photo of a woman while she was changing in a dressing room. The woman was trying on clothes at the Salvation Army thrift store. She told police she heard a click then looked up and saw someone holding a camera above the dressing room. She says she left the dressing room and noticed a man leaving the store.

7/12/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, A Wakeeney man *will stand trial for murder after police say he fed a pregnant woman an abortion pill. A judge has decided Scott Bollig will stand trial on first-degree murder and aggravated battery. Police say Bollig crushed an abortion pill and mixing it into pancakes, fed them to a woman who was eight weeks pregnant. She later had a miscarriage. Bollig will enter a plea on September 9th.

7/13/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, a chase ends with a crash at a west Wichita intersection. The Sedgwick county sheriff's office says the chase began around 2-30 this morning. An SUV drove off from a traffic stop... Blew through the intersection at Maple and West and crashed into another car. No-one was seriously hurt during the crash... A piece of the SUV flew off hitting a gas station pump nearby. The driver of the SUV is booked into the Sedgwick county jail on multiple charges. No word on why he took off from the traffic stop.

7/14/2014 6pm

In the crime watch, a man faces charges after an eyewitness sees a little girl fall from a moving car and the driver takes off. This happened around 2-30 this morning near Apache and governor in east Wichita. The three-year-old girl went to the hospital with a broken arm and scrapes on her body. Police arrested the driver. Justin Hubbard was booked on aggravated child endangerment and "hit and run" charges. Officers aren't saying if or how the child and driver are related. Officers say there were two other kids in the car. All three children are now in protective custody.

7/16/2014 5pm

Derby police shoot one dog, while responding to the report of a vicious animal. Pilar Pedraza explains why police say they had to shoot. Police actually captured two dogs during the incident after shooting and injuring one of them. When officers arrived in the neighborhood, they say they found a husky and a pit bull lying on top of what appeared to be a dead cat. The homeowner told police the dogs had mauled her cat, and another neighbor said the dogs had growled and barked at her. Officers say while animal control tried to catch the husky with a pole, the pit bull circled around, growling and barking. That's when police say an officer fired one shot at the pit bull, and both dogs ran away. Almost a day later, police say they found the dogs and took the hurt one to a veterinarian for treatment. Both dogs are now at the Wichita Animals shelter where these photos were taken this morning. Police released this statement about the incident, saying "because of the aggressive nature of the pit bill reported to and witnessed by the police officer, the officer believed the pit bull was going to attack... So he shot it to protect human life." Police say they've found the owners of the dogs. They say although pit bulls are not illegal in Derby, charges could be filed under the city's vicious dog law.

7/17/2014 6am

New video this morning of a casino boat rescue off the Georgia coast. You can see a coast guard helicopter hovering and a few people being pulled to safety. The boat ran aground Tuesday night and became stranded. About a hundred passengers and crew members were stuck for 16 hours. All are safe and say they're glad to be back on dry land.

7/18/2014 10pm

The Kansas Supreme Court overturns the death sentence of a man convicted of capital murder. 10 years ago Sidney Gleason was convicted of capital murder in the deaths of a Great Bend woman and her boyfriend. Today the court ruled - the presiding judge gave improper instructions to the jury considering whether Gleason should be sentenced to death. The court ordered a new sentencing hearing in Barton County District court for Gleason.

7/19/2014 9am

A young Kansas girl is shot and killed as police chase after her alleged kidnapper. It began in Atchinson where the girl was reportedly abducted and ended with a shootout in Leavenworth last night. Police say the suspect led them on a chase from Kansas to Missouri and back again, before crashing into a construction barricade. That's when police say the man shot the child before turning the gun on officers. He fired at least six shots before he was shot by police. The girl was pronounced dead at the scene. The suspect was taken to the hospital and arrested. Witnesses told our news partner k-c-t-v the suspect may have been the child's father however police have not been able to confirm that at this time.

7/20/2014 10pm

Do you recognize this man? Police say he robbed an Emporia convenience store this morning. It happened around 1-30 at the *Short Stop Convenience* store on Merchant street. Police say the man threatened the clerk with a gun. He got away with cash. If you

have any information about the robbery or know who this suspect is... Contact Emporia police.

7/21/2014 12pm

There will be a hearing today involving this man. Terry Loewen is the man accused of plotting to blow up Mid-continent airport last December. The hearing is set for 1-30 this afternoon. He originally pleaded not guilty to charges including attempting to use a weapon of mass destruction. He allegedly tried to bring a van filled with explosives onto the tarmac at Mid-continent.

7/22/2014 5pm

Prosecutors file charges against two people for leaving a baby alone in a car. 24-year-old Geronimo Gonzales and 21-year-old Deidre Lopez are charged with child endangerment. Garden City police say they left their five-month-old baby in a car at a Dillon's store. Employees removed the child after about 15 minutes. Police say the temperature outside was around 90 degrees at the time.

7/23/2014 6pm

The first degree murder case in the death of a man at a Wichita radio station will move to trial. Antwon Banks is accused of killing Daniel Flores in February. Lauren Seabrook was the only reporter in the courtroom today ... she brings us details you'll see only on eyewitness news.

7/24/2014 10pm

Jonathan and Reginald Carr say they didn't get a fair trial and they should have been tried separately. Tomorrow, we'll learn what the Kansas Supreme Court thinks. Justices heard the Carr brothers' appeal in December- They were convicted and sentenced to death for the murders of 5 people in Wichita in December 2000. Lawyers for each brother argued their client didn't get a fair trial because they spent as much time defending against their brother's accusations as against the states. They also questioned who was seated on the jury.

7/25/2014 5pm

We're following two big stories... The state supreme court... Overturns the death sentences for the Carr brothers...but that doesn't mean they're getting out of prison...How the case will move forward, in a moment.

7/26/2014 6pm

Just hours after the death sentences of Jonathan and Reginald Carr are overturned. A new development in the case of *another Kansas inmate whose death sentence was reversed. The judge in the capital murder case of Phillip Cheat-ham has recused himself. After the defendant filed a complaint accusing the judge of disregarding his rights. Cheat-ham was convicted of capital murder in 2005 and sentenced to death. Last year, the Kansas Supreme Court overturned the conviction and sentence because of *ineffective counsel*. The judge stepped down Friday at the start of what was expected to be a lengthy motions hearing. His decision means all of the motions upon which he already had ruled... will

have to be heard again by a different judge. And the scheduled January 5th trial date will be pushed back.

7/27/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, police are investigating after a woman is stabbed in downtown Wichita overnight.

It happened just after midnight near 10th and Broadway downtown. The woman says she was on her way to visit a friend when another woman attacked her. The victim walked to a bar close by, where she noticed she had been stabbed in the stomach. She was taken to the hospital and is expected to be o-k.

No arrests have been made.

7/28/2014 6pm

We just learned today... Seth Jackson hired a pair of local defense attorney's over the weekend to represent him in the case. New at six... Emily Griffin spoke with them on the phone... About how they're planning to handle the allegations.

7/29/2014 12pm

A foster father accused of leaving a 10-month-old girl in a hot car... Won't make his first appearance in court today... District attorney's office says he will most likely make his first appearance tomorrow. Wichita police arrested Seth Jackson last week on suspicion of aggravated child endangerment. Police say Kadillak Poe Jones died Thursday after she was left in a hot car for more than two hours. Just yesterday we talked with Jackson's mother...she says her son would do anything for a child in need and he'll never get over his daughter's death. She says the day Kadillak died, another foster child had to go to the bathroom. So Jackson hurried with the child into the home leaving the 10-month-old behind. It wasn't until later he remembered the girl.

7/30/2014 10pm

It's a charge that surprised some. Seth Jackson is charge with first degree murder in the death of a young girl he was fostering. Police say that Jackson left 10 month old Kadillak Poe-Jones in the back seat of his car last Thursday. So what makes this a first degree murder case? Jade Degood spoke to district attorney Marc Bennett for that answer in our continuing coverage.

7/31/2014 6am

A boyfriend facing charges in the death of a 3-year-old who police say accidentally shot himself. Mario Benjamin was arrested Tuesday evening. Police say he owned the gun that the child used. It's illegal because he's a convicted felon. Investigators say Jamez Hunt climbed up using a chair and found the loaded gun above the fridge. That's when the gun went off and hit him in the chest. The boy's mother called 911, and he was taken to the hospital where he later died. Officials say this reinforces the importance of keeping guns in a safe place. The mother was not charged, since police believe she was unaware the gun was in the home.

8/1/2014 12pm

A teenager is dead - investigators say she was stabbed to death early this morning...we're following the latest on a story that was breaking news this morning...right now investigators are still at a home near Salina... Gathering evidence... And trying to figure out what happened...this noon - the victim has been identified as 13-year-old Galazia Niehaus. The sheriff says she died of multiple stab wounds... Lauren Seabrook joins us live with this still developing story...

8/2/2014 10pm

Seth Jackson is now out of jail. He's the man accused of leaving his 10-month-old foster daughter in a hot car leading to her death. Jackson bonded out this afternoon. His bond was modified at a hearing yesterday. Jackson is charged with the death of Kaddilak Poe-Jones...yesterday the district attorney alleged Seth Jackson was high the day he left Kadillak in the hot car. Devon Fasbinder talked with a criminal defense attorney today and explains how the alleged marijuana use could play a role in the more severe charges.

8/3/2014 10pm

In the crime watch tonight... Fast food robbers leave two employees in the freezer. Police say two men entered this sonic just after employees opened this morning around 7. They pointed a gun at one of them and told her to open the safe. They grabbed some money, put the two employees in the freezer then took off. Police say no description of the robbers is available.

8/5/2014 430am

In the crime watch... a Saline county teen could be charged with first degree murder when she appears in court today. 13-year-old Galazia Niehaus was found dead in her family home last Friday. Her 14-year-old sister Sierra is accused of stabbing her. The Saline county attorney says its office has received a referral from the sheriff's office requesting Sierra be charged with first degree murder. She will have her first appearance in court at 11 this morning.

8/6/2014 12pm

An early morning stabbing leaves one person in critical condition. It happened around 2-45 in the 8400 block of west Kellogg. Police say the man's wife stabbed him in the chest at a hotel. He was taken to the hospital in critical condition.

8/7/2014 5pm

Four people are in the hospital tonight - after gunfire in northeast Wichita. It happened around four this morning near 25th and Grove. Lauren Seabrook joins us live from Calvary Towers where police say the shootout took place.

8/8/2014 530am

Continuing coverage on a shooting we first told you about on eyewitness news this morning Thursday. Police now say they have identified the suspect in the shooting. It happened at the Calvary Towers apartment complex in the 26-hundred block of north Grove in north-east Wichita. 4 men were hurt in the shooting. 1 of them has life-threatening injuries. No

arrests have been made in the case. Police say, they are expected to have more details in the shooting later this morning.

8/9/2014 10pm

Police are still searching for suspects involved in an overnight shooting in northeast Wichita. It happened in the 13-hundred block of North Terrace... where police say someone fired a shot gun at multiple houses and a vehicle. Fortunately, no one was injured. One man whose home was hit says his daughter and niece were playing in the living room when the shots were fired. Police believe it was a drive-by shooting. Anyone with information on this crime should call police.

8/10/2014 10pm

Three people robbed a pizza delivery driver in northeast Wichita early Sunday morning. It happened at 12:05 a.m. in the 1600 block of N Glendale. Wichita police say the driver walked the pizza up to a home where he was approached by one person, then surrounded by two others. The three began to hit the delivery man until he fell down. They took his money and the pizza. The three - a woman and two men - then ran away with about \$50.

8/12/2014 6am

New this morning...the nation's highest military court agrees to review the evidence used to convict a Kansas airman who exposed multiple sex partners to H-I-V at parties in Wichita. The attorney for David Gutierrez says his case could potentially remap HIV testing and prosecution in the U-S military. The Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces is expected to hear arguments later this year. Gutierrez was a sergeant at McConnell Air Force Base when he was sentenced in 2011 to eight years in prison and stripped of his rank for aggravated assault.

8/13/2014 430am

Protests continue...waking people up overnight...in Ferguson, Missouri. A suspect was shot by police overnight near the area. They're said to be in critical condition this morning. Protesters continue seeking justice for a teen killed by police Saturday. The reverend Al Sharpton joined Michael Brown's parents in a community forum last night. Police have decided not to release the name of the officer who killed Brown. They say they're doing it for the officer's safety.

8/14/2014 6pm

One man is in police custody and another is in the hospital after a shooting in south Wichita. We have video of the shooting you'll only see on eyewitness news. Scott Evans joins us live from the scene on Seneca with a look at the video.

8/15/2014 12pm

We're also learning new information about another officer involved shooting that happened in Newton last night. The Harvey County Sheriff T Walton confirms the man who was shot by an officer is dead. Devon Fasbinder is live at the scene with more on why police say the officer shot the man.

8/19/2014 5am

Peaceful protests turn into another night of tense confrontations in Ferguson. Protesters remained on the road even though police were firing tear gas and flash grenades at them. Officers in riot gear formed a line and then moved in on demonstrators. Tensions in the community have been on the rise since an unarmed teen was shot to death by a police officer. Several were arrested but a Missouri highway patrol captain says those disrupting the community last night weren't even from there. An independent autopsy revealed Brown was shot six times. But a forensic expert who worked on the autopsy says that it's still inconclusive. The justice department will perform a third autopsy on Brown's body.

8/20/2014 12pm

That's news at noon...we're now learning more about the officer involved shooting that left one man dead in Haysville yesterday. Police say Chad Leichardt was shot and killed by an officer responding to a domestic disturbance call Tuesday. It happened at this apartment complex in the 400 block of Sarah Lane. Upon arrival officers say they found Leichardt armed with a knife arguing with a woman. 3 officers were inside the apartment at the time of the shooting. Only one shot was fired. Leichardt was pronounced dead at the scene.

8/21/2014 10pm

Police say a drug house robbery led to a shooting over the weekend. They say a 25-year-old woman was shot in a home near Rock and Zimmerly. Investigators say 3 men came to the door of the house, and forced their way in with a gun. The woman is now in stable condition but still critical. Police are looking for the suspects.

8/28/2014 5am

It's a crime trend that's costing communities hundreds of thousands of dollars each year while thieves often make off with just a few bucks worth of goods. This morning Sedgwick County's district attorney is asking for help with the metal theft problem in the area. Hannah Davis joins us live with some information on how you can help.

Police say, the shootings happened in 3 different locations in what started as a home invasion. 1 person was shot in the first home... 2 in the second and 2 more in the third. 3 people died... The 2 others are said to be battling for their lives. Police don't believe the suspect knew the victims.

Former officers with the Bel Aire Police Department are under investigation for possible illegal weapons sales. The Sedgwick County Sheriff's office is involved... Scott Evans spoke with the sheriff and the Bel Aire police chief about what's going on.

9/6/2014 9am

Nearly 10-thousand marijuana plants are seized in Jefferson County. Officials say, the plants were taken from a corps of engineers' property near Perry Lake. The plants were being watered from a nearby home. Drug paraphernalia were also taken from the home. One man was arrested. He is out on bond this morning.

9/7/2014 10pm

Now to another developing story we're following...this one in southeast Wichita. Police say a woman was shot in the leg near Harry and Bleckley around 9:30. She was taken to the hospital for treatment, and says she was shot by two men. No arrests have been made.

We are expected to learn tomorrow if a Cowley County Sheriff's deputy was justified in shooting and killing a 22-year old man earlier this year. The county attorney will release his report tomorrow. Taylor Rock was shot several times during a traffic stop in May. The Cowley County Sheriff says, during the stop, Rock tried driving away, dragging the deputy through a ditch and running him over. Rock died at a hospital. The deputy was treated for injuries to his lower legs.

9/20/2014 9am

This morning we're following a developing story in east Wichita...where one person has been seriously hurt in a shooting near the W-S-U campus. Around 4 this morning police were called to Fairmount park at 16th street and gentry for reports of shots fired -- that's between Hillside and Oliver just a few blocks south of the university. Dispatchers tell us someone called 9-1-1 to report three men had tried to break into a car and pointed a gun at the caller. When officers arrived on the scene they found one person with a gunshot wound to the abdomen. That victim was transported to Wesley hospital in serious condition. One suspect was taken into custody but the investigation into the incident is still ongoing at this point. Police are expected to release more information at press conference at noon today. We will have a crew there to bring you the latest on the investigation.

9/21/2014 10pm

That was the scene in old town one year ago today. Seven people were hit during the gunfire, one man died in the street. But Kolby Hopkins' killer was never arrested. And tonight police need your help to close this case. Anne Meyer was the first reporter on the scene after the shooting happened. She sat down with the deputy chief, to find out where the investigation stands one year later. It's an interview you will only see on eyewitness news.

9/22/2014 5pm

The investigation continues the possible kidnapping of a Topeka girl. Officers arrested two people on aggravated kidnapping and child endangerment charges late Saturday night. The girl was reported missing earlier in the day. A woman saw her wandering by herself and recognized her from news reports. The 8-year-old told that woman strangers broke into her home, and tied her up. Then she somehow got herself untied and went looking for help. Police took her to the hospital, and she's expected to be okay.

9/24/2014 10pm

Garden City police arrested a 46-year-old man accused of criminal sodomy and aggravated indecent liberties with a child. Officers say there are two possible victims who were both under the age of 13 when the incident occurred. Last month officers began an investigation into possible sexual assaults that were reported to have happened between 2000 and 2008. Police say they are not releasing any other information about the case at this time.

9/25/2014 8am

The F-B-I is stepping up their efforts to prevent mass shootings. This comes after an F-B-I study found mass shootings have been taking place more frequently-- with nearly one incident a month from 2000 to 2013. The study which was just released Wednesday, found 486 people had been killed and 557 wounded in 160 separate incidents. Those figures don't include the deaths or injuries of the shooters. The bureau says the goal of the study is to provide information to help law enforcement prevent, prepare for, respond to and recover from such incidents.

9/26/2014 6am

We hope to learn more this morning about a car chase that resulted in a gas leak and a fire. It happened Thursday night near 37-Th street north and Meridian. Police say they tried to stop a vehicle for a traffic violation when the driver took off. The driver hit a median, caused a gas leak and caught the car fire. Firefighters were called to put the flames out. One person was taken to the hospital. A second person in the car got away.

9/27/2014 8am

Continuing the crime watch... Dodge City police have obtained an arrest warrant for this man. The arrest warrant accuses Victor Gutierrez junior of first degree murder. On Monday Natasha Pruitt was found dead inside of this Dodge City home. Gutierrez was arrested later that night in Reno County. He is being held there on unrelated charges.

Open carry is now allowed state-wide. It's one of many laws that took effect Tuesday. Kansas lawmakers say the idea is to make gun laws more uniform across the state. Cities now no longer have a say when it comes to open carry. Michael Schwanke looks into what the law means and what you can expect to see -- including different signs--when you go out in public. Chris Gott is used to getting looks. Gott is co-founder of Wichita open carry--a group nearly 300 strong--that supports the right to open carry firearms. Many towns and cities...including Wichita already allowed this type of carry...now the law is state-wide. Why? Representative Jim Howell authored and supported the bill. And open spaces like this park open carry is allowed...but just like concealed carry laws...private businesses still have a choice. Here's how it works...you're used to seeing these signs...meant for concealed carry holders. These will now apply to both concealed and open carry. You will also see two other signs...this one that prohibits concealed carry but allows open...and this one...that allows concealed...but prohibits open carry. If you see no signs...it means both are allowed. And law or not...Gott knows not everyone will accept this look. There is something else new with this bill. It actually strengthens the law when it comes to carrying a gun while under the influence of drugs or alcohol anyone with a loaded gun can now be charged with a crime if they are drinking or using drugs.

7/3/2014 6am

It's a follow up to a story we first told you about in May. There could soon be more commissioners in Saline County. A group wants better representation in the county. They have been sending a petition around, and now say there are enough signatures to bring it up at a meeting. The group wants to have 5 commissioners instead of the current 3. They will present their petitions with 28-hundred signatures to the commission next Tuesday. Voters would then have to approve it.

7/4/2014 5pm

Just before 2 this afternoon, crews responded to a fire at Lakeview mobile homes. The couple who lives there were not home at the time and crews were able to put the fire out quickly. Fire investigators don't have a cause but say the fire caused around 20 thousand dollars in total damages.

The Kansas water office says if nothing changes, the Ogallala aquifer will be 70 percent depleted and Kansas reservoirs will be 40 percent filled with sediment over the next 50 years. The water plan tour will be in Wichita tomorrow morning at 11-30. At the Sedgwick County extension center on west 21st street north. Go to KWCH dot com for a link to the water plan.

7/7/2014 6pm

"Kansas Star Casino" will be the *only* game close to Wichita at least for a while. Plans for a tribal casino in park city were dealt a blow today with the rejection of a federal land trust application. New at six... Factfinder 12 investigator Brian Heap tells us... It has taken more than eight years for Park City and the "Wyandotte Nation" to get the news they "didn't" want to hear. Park City's dream of turning these 10.5 acres of land into a thriving casino is dashed. In a 10 page letter to the chief of the Oklahoma based Wyandotte nation, an assistant secretary of Indian affairs says the application was rejected because of a technicality with the source of the money used to buy the land. The state of Kansas successfully argued the Wyandotte nation commingled its settlement fund with other money, leaving the feds "unable to conclude that the nation used 602 funds exclusively to purchase the Park City Parcel." "The state of Kansas fought hard against the project arguing a casino in Sedgwick was a violation of state law. But park city thinks the state is really just looking out for its own interest and keeping away competition for Kansas star." Park City administrator Jack Whitson says it's a plan that would bring 1500 good paying jobs and boost the tax base for all of Sedgwick County. He thinks the state is saying one thing about economic development and doing the opposite. The case is headed back to federal court...as the grass and weeds continue to grow. In Park City, Brian Heap, eyewitness news. Kansas attorney general Derek Schmidt said the department of the interior reached "the correct legal conclusion" and he promised to keep defending the state law. We called Wyandotte chief Billy friend, but he did not return our message. If you'd like to read more about the decision, we have posted the government's letter to chief friend at KWCH-dot-com.

7/8/2014 5pm

Crews in Montana are pulling Boeing fuselages out of a river. A train carrying the Wichita-made plane parts derailed last week, sending multiple planes into the water. Wichita native Tom Attwater is now a water raft guide in Montana. He sent us these photos. Attwater was one of the first on scene after the accident. Six fuselages fell off the train. 3 slid into the water. Crews hope to have them removed by the end of the day.

7/9/2014 12pm

7/10/2014 5am

Are you looking for ways to stay cool outside this summer? You might want to keep this week's does it work product within reach. We're testing "ice cold towels." Not only do they promise to keep you cool for hours... But the makers claim you don't need to put them in the fridge either. Instead of cutting back her miles in the hot summer months, Angi Webster is running more than she has ever run before. Working-out in the heat can get uncomfortable. Angi has used cooling towels before, but we wanted her to try "ice cold towels." we bought a two-pack online for \$54.90. That does not include shipping. The instructions say all we need is water. We used warm water we had nearby. Next, Angi rings it out. We asked Angi to try the "ice cold towel" out for a bit. She was able to tie it around her neck thanks to its design. But we wanted to know if the "ice cold towel" was cool in the literal sense. After we left, Angi took the towel on a three-mile run. She says it stayed cool the entire time. A Haven woman is dead after a three vehicle crash south of Hutchinson. Investigators say the driver of the car 85-year-old Ollie Richey was riding in ran a stop sign. The car was hit by an s-u-v... And then hit another pick-up. Richey was taken to the hospital where she later died. The driver of that car and the driver of the S-U-V were also hurt.

7/16/2014 5pm

We're following breaking news from north Wichita where emergency crews are cleaning up ink spilled on a highway. This is a live look from K-96 and hillside. Dispatchers say the blue ink fell off a delivery truck. Hazmat crews are working to clean it up. There are no reports of injuries.

7/17/2014 6am

Our "Kansas proud" hometown tour continues today. We've taken you to Geneseo, Newton. And today, Michael Schwanke takes us to his hometown of Colby. It's one of the few places in Kansas you will see palm trees. Watch for Michael's reports today on eyewitness news starting at four.

7/18/2014 10pm

This is a petition at the pet grooming company Purdy Pet. It is leading the charge to save two dogs. One of the dogs was shot following a vicious animal report earlier this week. Derby police say the dogs mauled a cat and also became aggressive. A hearing is set for July 31st to decide if the dogs should be put down. This petition is an effort to prevent that from happening. Organizers believe the dogs are not vicious. The owner of the pets says he's grateful for what the shop is doing. 19-hundred people have signed an online petition. Police issued a statement earlier this week saying they believed the pit bull was going to attack so they shot it to protect human life.

7/19/2014 9am

A proposed bond to upgrade a Saline county jail will now go before voters in November. County commissioners voted two to one to put the issue on the ballot. The 46- point-5 million dollar bond would fund a jail renovation, and combine the facility with court services and the county attorney's office.... creating a "justice complex." The proposal also calls for a three-million-dollar parking garage about a block away.

7/21/2014 12pm

The Kansas attorney general's office received more than 14-thousand concealed carry license applications in the 20-14 fiscal year. That's the second highest year since the program started in 2006. More than 25-thousand applications were received during the 20-13 fiscal year. Currently more than 83-thousand Kansans have active concealed carry permits.

7/22/2014 5pm

With the college football kickoff about a month away, the big 12 is showing off its teams. The top coaches are in Dallas for the conference's media day. Dani Welniak caught up with K-state coach Bill Snyder today.

That breaking news from west Wichita.... Sears is closing its doors in Town West Square mall. Melissa Scheffler joins us from the breaking news desk with when they'll close. This news just came into our newsroom. A Sears spokesperson has confirmed the Sears store and the Sears auto center at Town West will close in early December. The store and the auto center have 103 employees. The statement says those employees will receive severance pay. They can also apply for open jobs at area sears or K-MART stores. The statement also says the store will begin its liquidation sale September 26th. It says... The store closures are an effort to reduce expenses, adjust the company's asset base, and speed-up its business model change. In May, a financial analyst interviewed by C-N-N said he expected sears to close 500 of its nearly two-thousand stores in a few years. We'll have more on this story coming up tonight at six.

9/18/2014 6am

Towne West square is looking for a new store to attract shoppers. Sears announced yesterday it was closing its store and auto center. The stores will close in December. That leaves a whole for the mall to fill - considering stores like Sears bring customers to the mall. The two locations employ about 100 people. Some of those employees will be able to transfer to other sears and k-mart stores. Some will also qualify for severance pay.

9/24/2014 10pm

An online auction of sex toys that was seized by Kansas could boost the state's revenue. A state revenue department spokesperson tells eyewitness news that the agency seized the items in July from five adult stores operated by United Outlets L-L-C. They were seized for withholding taxes of more than 160-thousand dollars. The assets were released back to the owner of the business so that he could auction the property to raise money to pay off the tax debt.

9/25/2014 8am

Thousands of sex toys will be auctioned off by a Kansas contractor to help repay the state for tax losses. The Topeka capital journal reports agents with the state department of revenue seized the inventory of five adult stores back in July. The businesses in Wichita, Topeka, Junction City and Kansas city are operated by United Outlets L-L-C under the name "Bang." Thousands of adult d-v-ds, novelty items, lingerie and other products will be sold to the highest bidder. State officials say the owner entered into a contract to sell the merchandise at public auction in order to pay for nearly 164-thousand dollars in unpaid taxes. Koranda said the state is *not* involved in the auction, or proceeds of the auction. The online auction ends Tuesday.

9/29/2014 12pm

Education leaders say they're already hearing from people interested in new teaching license regulations. Professionals can now teach without having an education degree. The Kansas department of education says about 100 people have asked about the change. But only two have met the criteria. The state's largest teachers union says loosening the requirements weakens the teaching profession.

7/14/2014 6pm

After a year's worth of studies and surveys... The maize school district may make a decision tonight on whether to change how it decides which students go to which schools. Pilar Pedraza is live at the district offices where they're getting ready for tonight's meeting. Unlike most districts in Kansas, Maize does not assign students to schools based on where they live. Instead, they're enrolled on a preference basis... When they start, when they move to a middle school and again when they move to high school. But not every student always gets to attend the school of their choice.. And that's upset some parents. While the school board grants most appeals to school placement... Parents last year said that wasn't enough... And demanded changes to the system. A community - district task force has been studying the issue.. And offered the school board three options... The status quo, traditional boundaries or some sort of feeder system. Earlier this spring.. The district did a phone survey of parents.. Asking them which option they preferred. The district released the results of that survey just before the Fourth of July holiday. This is the first meeting of the board of education since then... And the board could make a decision but it will be thinking about more than just placement... It will also take building usage into consideration. Any decisions made here tonight won't effect this school year because those placements have already been made. It could take a couple of years to implement any changes. The meeting starts here in less than an hour. We'll have the results for you coming up on eyewitness news tonight. Again tonight's meeting begins at 7 o'clock. It's at the maize district office building on academy drive.

The announcement comes after growing criticism from some students that K-U failed to address sexual violence on campus.

9/12/2014 6pm

9/18/2014 6am

New this morning... would you feel safer knowing your kid's school was using military equipment? At least one Kansas school is. Auburn Washburn in Topeka is one of several schools nation-wide taking advantage of free military surplus gear. The school's superintendent says, it learned of the pentagon surplus program through a staff member whose spouse works at the Kansas Bureau of Investigations. Officials are not saying what they got. But according to a report by the Topeka Capitol Journal.. the district received an assault rifle. The equipment is meant for situations where someone outside a school would want to hurt somebody.

9/23/2014 5am

For the first time, the state is responding to a lawsuit we've been telling you about for months.... And it's asking for it to be dismissed. The suit is from the Kansas national education association and challenges a school funding bill.

The bill gives money to schools but has amendments some teachers aren't happy with. Attorney general Derek Schmidt wants the court to dismiss it, saying the suit doesn't have standing. He says the bill doesn't violate the state constitution and hasn't directly harmed Knea. The bill was signed in April and Knea says it had no problem with the school funding the bill included.... But the amendments that affect due process and say districts wouldn't have to hold hearings to fire teachers. K-n-e-a fought back saying the bill violates the state constitution because it includes more than one topic. The state's response isn't changing k-n-e-a's stance. K-n-e-a says it didn't hear about the motion to dismiss the suit from the a-g's office. It says it found out through the media and is surprised its counsel wasn't contacted directly.

9/25/2014 8am

When it comes to treating teens for the eating-disorder, anorexia, family based therapies are twice as effective as individual therapy. That's according to researchers at Stanford University. Their study, which looked at 164 teens, found that parents could learn to help their anorexic children get to a healthy weight, and eat normally again.

Fall enrollment numbers are also out for the state colleges and universities. The largest increase is at Wichita state where enrollment is up more than three percent compared to last year at this time.

Crews are rebuilding more than 60 poles...and re-stringing lines along a stretch of highway fifty. Power is still out to about a dozen Westar customers in the area. The utility expects it to be restored Tuesday.

8/29/2014 12pm

Investigators are not releasing any details... including cause of death or whether the death is suspicious.

7/3/2014 6am

As we said the fireworks complaint line in Sedgwick County starts tonight (Thursday) at six-30. It runs through Sunday and stays open until three the morning. If you have a complaint about fireworks you should call the non-emergency line at 290-1011. The reason the non-emergency line began was because of a deadly motorcycle wreck on July fourth three years ago where witnesses couldn't get through to 9-1-1 because all the lines were busy.

7/4/2014 5pm

If you're staying home and shooting off your own fireworks, remember Wichita doesn't allow fireworks that go higher than 6 feet in the air. If you have any concerns about them being shot off in your neighborhood...the Sedgwick county non-emergency line for fireworks will be open. The number is 290 -1011. The line stays open from 6-30 at night until three in the morning. Call that number with any fireworks complaints. Only call 911 if it's a firework emergency or if someone has been hurt.

7/5/2014 10pm

Fireworks are also to blame for a house fire in Hutchinson. It happened at 51 Random Road early this morning. There were five people inside the home but all of them made it out safely. The fire caused roughly 90 thousand dollars in damages. Investigators say it was caused by improper disposal of fireworks.

7/8/2014 5pm

It's been a burden for Wichita-area kidney transplant patients. But soon they won't have to travel hours away for surgery care. A Kansas City hospital has plans to open a satellite kidney transplant clinic in Wichita. Brian heap shows us it will help a medical need in the community. For 18 year-old chuck peters, kidney problems are all he's ever known. He's suffered from an aggressive kidney disease since birth. He was able to lead a pretty normal life and play all his favorite sports until about four years ago. Since October, chuck and his family have been waiting for news about a new kidney. Because Via Christi no longer does transplants they've had to make expensive time consuming trips to Oklahoma for pre-treatment care. That's partly why the family started the chuck's army fundraising effort. This new clinic will fill the need left behind by Via Christi once it stopped performing kidney transplants in Wichita. So it will help families in term of pre and post-surgery care. But they will still need to travel for the surgery itself. St. Luke's says right now in Wichita there are more than a thousand patients on dialysis -- many of whom may be evaluated for transplants. Brian Heap, eyewitness news. The new St.

Luke's kidney satellite clinic will open in August. It's located near 10th and Topeka, right next to Via Christi.

7/9/2014 12pm

New at noon, a second teen has died of injuries from a Finney county home explosion last month. The garden city fire chief says 14-year-old Riley Unruh died yesterday. He had been in critical condition at a Wichita hospital since the explosion in Plymell. His brother Spencer was killed in the explosion. Their mother Kelly is still in critical condition. Their father was outside the home during the blast and was not hurt. The state fire marshal's office says the explosion was caused by a concentration of natural gas. A donation fund has been setup for the family at the western state bank in Garden City.

7/10/2014 5am

A Wichita woman braves a house fire to save her children. The fire broke out at a duplex in the 18-hundred block of west Dora just before eight yesterday morning. Fire officials tell us the mother woke up to the smell of smoke and was able to break a window to get her two children to safety. Firefighters were able to put out the flames quickly and no one was seriously hurt.

7/11/2014 4:30am

A health watch alert this morning, two people have measles right here in Sedgwick County. One of them is just a baby, who's too young to be vaccinated; the other is an adult who doesn't have the vaccine. The health department says the two cases are linked to an outbreak in Kansas City. The C-D-C says the highly contagious, even deadly disease was eliminated from the U.S. in 2000. But, it still gets brought back to the U.S. from other countries, and with a growing number of parents choosing not to vaccinate their kids, .. The disease is back. Symptoms of the measles include fever, runny nose, cough, a rash and white spots with bluish centers inside the mouth.

7/12/2014 10pm

Two men are hurt after a mud-run competition today. The Cowley County Fire Department says one man was life-flighted for treatment, the other taken by ambulance to an area hospital. The extent of the two men's injuries is unknown.

7/15/2014 5pm

Healthcare workers struggle to keep up with measles cases in Sedgwick County. We told you *first on Friday about the connection to a Wichita restaurant. And in the last 20 minutes we have confirmed one of the cases is a Wichita state student taking summer classes. The university says the student does not live on campus, but is enrolled this summer. The student had not received a vaccine. The total number of cases in Sedgwick County this week has doubled from four to eight. And they expect those numbers to keep growing. Hannah Davis spoke to the director of the Sedgwick county health department this afternoon. Hannah, we understand she's concerned. They're very concerned. Last night the Sedgwick county health department started what's called "the incident command system"... It means they are working this 24 hours a day. While 8 cases in a county the size of Sedgwick may not sound like a lot. Look at it this way. The nation averages 60

cases a year. And the Sedgwick County number of 8 is expected to grow. Adrienne Byrne Lutz says the last week has been a blur. As the interim director at the Sedgwick County health department it's her job to track growing measles cases in the county. And for Lutz's team a measles diagnosis is just the beginning. Last week health officials tracked the source of 4 measles cases to an infected worker at this restaurant in Wichita. Lutz says getting to the source was a labor intensive process but well worth it because of the public health risk. Lutz says that means everyone over the age of 1 should get vaccinated. Because the disease is so highly contagious, anyone who may have symptoms needs to be careful where they go.

7/17/2014 6am

The number of measles cases across the country is at its highest number in 20 years with nearly 600 reported cases...including 11 here in Kansas. Eight are in Sedgwick County.

7/18/2014 10pm

The Sedgwick County Health Department is holding a vaccination clinic tomorrow because of the growing number of measles cases. It will be at their building on west Central. You can go there from ten to two. No out of pocket fees will be charged, but Medicare, Medicaid, and private insurance will be billed if available. The main focus will be on children between 12 to 15 months old.

7/19/2014 9am

This morning f-a-a investigators are working to determine what caused an agriculture plane to crash in Ellis County. 23-year pilot, Garrett Moore, was killed in the crash. Kansas highway patrol that plane went down in a rural area north-east of the town of Ellis. The crash happened Thursday night but officials didn't find the plane until 10 the next morning. Officials say Moore was in his crop dusting plane when it crashed. It had taken off just 15 minutes before from Beloit. The F-A-A out of Wichita has taken-over the investigation.

7/21/2014 12pm

Two men were sent to the hospital in critical condition last night after a 3-story fall from a balcony. It happened at an apartment complex near Pawnee and Broadway just after 11 last night. Police say one man was sitting on the balcony's railing...when his friend tried to get up there. He stepped on a chair for a boost...and the leg of the chair broke. He grabbed the other man in an effort to catch himself...and they both fell to the ground. Police say they should be ok.

7/22/2014 5pm

There are now 11 total measles cases in Sedgwick County, three more than this time last week. Health workers say the rise could have been worse...they've been tracking the highly infectious disease for nearly three weeks... First heard about the cases here... When we told you about four cases connected to a restaurant in Wichita. Hannah Davis talked to the director of the Sedgwick county health department today about her efforts to get this under control.

7/23/2014 6pm

The Sedgwick county health department is offering a back-to-school vaccination clinic this Saturday. It's from nine to noon... at the clinic on west Central in Wichita. The M-M-R vaccine which covers measles is required for students. Vaccinations are free to uninsured children 18 and younger... proof of income is required.

7/24/2014 10pm

Two people are killed in a crash in McPherson County. This was the scene around five tonight along interstate 135. The Kansas highway patrol says a white s-u-v going northbound went to change lanes when it was hit by a full sized s-u-v. The full sized vehicle crossed the median and ran into a ditch and then caught fire. The driver and a passenger in that s-u-v died at the scene.

7/25/2014 5pm

It is a scorching afternoon across the state. Most of Kansas is dry but we have an isolated storm near Tribune in Greeley County. Gusty winds are the chief concerns. Meanwhile, here's a look at current temperatures. The heat index is a little hotter. Heat advisory is in effect until 8 p.m.

7/26/2014 6pm

A Junction City man is dead after being run over by a truck. Officers were called to a disturbance this morning and found 23-year-old Cody Martin of Junction City lying in the roadway. Martin was taken to a hospital, where he was pronounced dead. The truck that hit him has not been found. The incident is under investigation.

7/28/2014 6pm

Wichita police officers take four children into protective custody from a south-east Wichita home. Officers said... The children, ages one to 12... Had visible sores and appeared to be malnourished. Two adults were at the home no one was arrested.

7/29/2014 12pm

Four people are hurt in a fire at a southeast Kansas refinery... Coffeyville's fire department tells us four people are being treated for burns... the fire started around 12-20 this morning... And took an hour to put out however, fire crews were on scene for at least two hours. We still don't know what caused the fire.... But we're told it was not an explosion... instead something went wrong inside the refinery.

7/30/2014 10pm

The latest on a story that was breaking news last night... Police say three-year-old Jahmez Hunt died after he shot himself and now we know an arrest has been made. Pilar Pedraza joins us from the newsroom with the details.

7/31/2014 6am

An update to a story we first told you about earlier this month. Voters in Salina will decide whether fluoride should be added to their water. A petition from the group...Salina

Cares -has been confirmed by the Saline county clerk. This means it will be on the November ballot. Fluoride has been in the water supply in Salina since 19-68.

Now the Liberian government, where the virus has hit hardest, will receive shipments of an experimental drug to treat the virus. It is not known how many doses will be sent. The company that makes the drug says its supply is limited. Two Americans infected with the virus were treated with the drug. Their conditions are improving.

8/13/2014 430am

In this morning's health watch...most of you had to send a bottle of hand sanitizer with your kid when they went back to school. But it might not actually help kids from getting sick. Researchers followed students in 68 elementary schools last winter. They found

A Butler County woman's family says it was an act of God that she woke up after her home caught fire early this morning. The woman told firefighters she woke up coughing to smoke and went into her front room to see a chair on fire. The first floor of the home is destroyed. The cause is still under investigation.

8/18/2014 5am

A man is rescued by fishermen after he accidentally drives his family right into Cheney Lake. Authorities were called out just after ten Saturday night. Park rangers say the driver got turned around and accidentally drove the vehicle with 4 people inside, down a boat ramp and into the water. That means the group has to collect enough signatures again, to put the question on the April ballot. But the petition's leaders say they don't like that option. Freeman believes the first petition has enough valid signatures, and he plans to contest the final count with the election commissioner because he'd rather have the issue on the November ballot.

8/19/2014 5am

Texas Governor Rick Perry is moving ahead with plans to visit 2016 primary states despite his recent indictment. Perry faces 2 felony counts of abuse of power. The indictment comes after the republican governor carried out threats to veto state funds to a local district attorney unless she resigned following a drunk driving conviction. Perry is Texas' longest serving governor. He called the allegations politically motivated. Perry is scheduled to visit New Hampshire this weekend.

8/24/2014 10pm

Supporters of medical marijuana have new momentum. Kansas democrats announced they will support bills to legalize the drug for medical purposes next session. That announcement was made last night in Wichita - during the demo-fest convention downtown. Today, Anne Meyer talked to both sides of this issue - to get their reaction.

8/25/2014 6am

Expect to hear a lot about medical marijuana in Kansas next year; state democrats plan to bring it up in the next legislative session. Democrats released their platform this weekend. They say they support the availability of marijuana for medical use and protection of patients from criminal arrest and prosecution. David Mulford has been living with chronic pain for more than 2 decades. He says, its news he's been waiting to hear. Reno County assistant district attorney Tom Stanton opposes the idea. He says he doesn't think a medical marijuana bill would have enough support from lawmakers to pass. Medical marijuana is not the top of the democrat's platform. Those are education and creating jobs in Kansas. The legislative session begins in January.

8/28/2014 5am

New numbers are in for voter turnout in this month's primary. About 20-percent of registered Kansas voters took part casting 351-thousand ballots statewide. Secretary of state Kris Kobach predicted 22 percent turnout. Turnout this year was the lowest for a Kansas primary election since 2006.

9/4/2014 5am

The race for the U-S senate gets smaller. Democratic candidate Chad Taylor dropped out Wednesday. He withdrew on the last day a candidate can be pulled from the Kansas ballot. Taylor withdrawing leaves incumbent Pat Roberts and independent Greg Ormann as the top two contenders in the race. The Shawnee County district attorney narrowly defeated challenger Patrick Wiesner in the democratic primary last month. Taylor issued this statement via social media thanking everyone for the support financially...spiritually and emotionally. Greg Orman's campaign also released a statement saying this was an unexpected turn of events...adding that Taylor ran an honorable campaign. Pat Robert's campaign issued this statement claiming that Taylor withdrawing is a corrupt bargain between Greg Orman and national democrats. Now an update in the U-S senate race... earlier this week, democratic candidate Chad Taylor announced he was withdrawing from the race. However, his name will remain on the ballot. Based on the judges' questions, the biggest issue seemed to be what does the law, as it's written, actually require? Chad Taylor declined to comment after the hearing leaving immediately. He has gained access to Royal Caribbean’s internal investigation and has learned about the existence of a videotape in the possession of the FBI, which was recorded just hours after Smith went missing by three of the four men to last see Smith alive: cousins Zach Rozenberg and Greg Rozenberg and their friend Rusty Kofman. The other passenger, Josh Askin, is not on the video. Attorneys for Rusty Kofman and Zach Rozenberg have declined to comment. Greg Rozenberg’s attorney says his client just made stupid comments. While initially cooperating, Askin’s attorney has now told him to take the Fifth Amendment in all questioning. All four men say they had nothing to do with Smith’s death but the men are still on the FBI’s radar in this cold case. Mike Jones believes that Josh Askin knows what happened. He continues to prod the FBI to re-open the case. In Columbia, Illinois on the morning of May 5, Coleman called his neighbor, police detective Justin Barlow, and asked him to check on his wife, Sheri, and their two young sons, Gavin and Garrett, after his own calls had gone unanswered. In months prior he had made local police aware of explicit death threats he was receiving regarding his involvement in Meyer’s ministry. Barlow entered the house that morning through an unlocked basement window and upon entry he found spray-painted messages on the walls, with the phrases “you have paid” and “punished”, and when he went upstairs he discovered the bodies of Coleman’s family strangled to death in each of their beds. An investigation began and soon after police discovered Coleman was having a serious affair with cocktail waitress Tara Lintz, a high school friend of Sheri’s. Sheri’s friends came to her defense telling police Sheri said her husband was having an affair and if anything happened to her, Chris did it. Moreover, the crime scene lab found the handwriting on the wall matched up to Coleman’s script. Two weeks after the murders police had enough evidence to charge Coleman with first-degree murder of his family. The trial for Coleman began two years later and the prosecution’s computer experts discovered the e-mail threats came from Coleman’s laptop, and one can of the spray paint used on the walls of his house was purchased at a local hardware store with a computerized signature linked to Coleman. The jury needed more evidence though, and it came from one of the jurors who noticed the date on a picture of Coleman and Lintz kissing which proved Coleman lied to them about when the affair began. After a guilty verdict, the judge sentenced Coleman to life in prison. 48 HOURS MYSTERY spoke to Coleman by phone and he denied planning to divorce Sheri to marry his mistress and said he did not know who murdered his family. He would face a court martial trial which is very different from a civilian court trial -- there is always a verdict and never a hung jury. The trial commenced and the JAG prosecution team was able to present physical evidence -- a tiny piece of glass taken off of Burke’s coat, which was similar to the shattered glass door at the crime scene. The panel decided that Sgt. Burke was guilty and that he would serve a life sentence without parole. Despite these new findings, Hidalgo County District Attorney Rene Guerra doesn’t believe the case is strong enough to take to court, though he would have prosecuted Feit in 1962 on the charges. Her boyfriend, Brian Randone, was an inspirational preacher and one-time reality show contestant. Two months after they met in Las Vegas, Tang was living in Randone’s Los Angeles home. After a night of passion, Tang was dead. On the morning of September 11, 2009, Randone summoned police because Tang wasn’t breathing. He maintained she overdosed on the drug GHB (Gamma hydroxybutyric), which they both took before going to bed. However, police didn’t buy the story. Police believed he beat Tang to death because they counted some 320 bruises, lacerations and abrasions on her body. The medical examiner who did the autopsy on Tang believes the bruising on her face and bite mark on her tongue were a result of Tang’s struggle to breathe. Randone was charged with her murder and after prosecutors saw her body, they added another charge: torture. On November 14, 2011, two years after Tang’s death, the trial began in a Pasadena courtroom. Prosecutors tried to prove Randone caused Tang’s death, but the defense painted Tang as a drug addict and said she died of an overdose. The defense called former San Diego Deputy Medical Examiner Dr. Harry Bonnell to the stand. Dr. Bonnell said homicide is impossible in this case because the PEA (pulseless electrical activity) found in Felicia’s body proves it. He went on to tell the jury there is no PEA in smothering victims and the causes of PEA are drugs or blood volume loss. Prosecution was denied the opportunity to rebut Dr. Bonnell’s testimony. The jury came up with the verdict of not guilty of torture and not guilty of murder. Jurors, who did not want their names to appear on the episode, claimed Dr. Bonnell’s testimony was crucial in declaring Randone not guilty. 48 HOURS: “Secrets of the River” - Mackenzie Cowell was a high school senior and aspiring model who was studying at a beauty school when she made a dinner date with her father, Reid, in February 2010. Mackenzie never made dinner, and Reid received a call from police saying his daughter’s car was found abandoned on a ranch, 40 miles from their home in Wenatchee, Washington. Four days later Mackenzie was found dead along the banks of the Columbia River. She had been strangled, stabbed and beaten. Investigators looked at a list of potential suspects, including her boyfriend, who failed part of a lie-detector test, though he had a solid alibi. They talked to her parents, who had gone through a bitter divorce. And police talked to her mother’s boyfriend, with whom she had tangled with in the past. Liz Reid, a police informant, came forward claiming to have seen the actual murder on videotape -- shot by the killers. However as the task force began to investigate this, a tip came in about Chris Wilson, a classmate of Mackenzie’s from the Academy of Hair Design. After police linked DNA at the crime scene to Wilson, he was charged with her murder. Wilson claimed he was innocent and his mother hired attorney John Henry Browne. Police dismissed Liz Reid’s story after she changed it several times and they did not find a video. When the task force searched the apartment that Wilson lived in during the time of the murder, they found a stain which tested positive for Mackenzie’s DNA. Prior to the trial, D.A. Gary Reisen made Wilson an offer -- plead guilty to manslaughter and serve only six-and-half years in prison -- but Wilson turned it down and the trial began. Fearing an unfair trial after the jury questionnaires came back believing Wilson was guilty, Chris Wilson accepted a new plea deal -- fourteen years in prison in exchange for agreeing to these words: “...I also did recklessly cause the death of Mackenzie Cowell by strangulation and by stabbing her with a knife”. Chris Wilson believes he was framed by law enforcement. On screen text graphic: Christopher Wilson may be eligible for release from prison in 2023. He will be 42 years old. There was no connection made to either woman, although Hurst’s husband was immediately viewed as a suspect in her disappearance -- but he too disappeared, and both cases languished for decades. In 2009, Amy Hurst’s son discovered significant evidence about the afghan, through the Doe Network, and a body in a Tampa, Florida potter’s field once thought to be Wendy Huggy’s was examined. In 2011, it was determined to be that of Amy Hurst. Investigation led to her husband, Bill Hurst, who was in Kentucky. Police were able to get Hurst into custody, and he was indicted on first degree murder charges -- he was found guilty. Detective Schoneman says she will keep trying to find Wendy Huggy. Ultimately, the focus turned to Dale Bruner as the chief suspect when information was discovered regarding his dark, violent side, and eight months later he was arrested for the murder of his wife. His parents believe he was killed because he was unwilling to go along with a plan to share cutting-edge American technology with China. He was scheduled to leave Singapore in a matter of days when he was found dead. Journalist and 48 HOURS consultant Ray Bonner, who broke the story in London’s Financial Times, says police made mistakes in the investigation, and that he is quite surprised, because Singapore is a sophisticated place. With pressure mounting, Singapore expanded a coroner’s inquest into Shane Todd’s death. In all, seventy witnesses testified over the course of ten days of testimony. The state’s coroner ruled that the cause of death was suicide by hanging. He also found nothing legally wrong with the IME - Huawei relationship, yet determined that the meeting Shane’s boss had with IME colleagues was “improper, but not witness tampering.” Shane’s family feel betrayed, and plan on taking their quest for truth to Washington, pressing for a congressional investigation and a meeting with President Obama. For eighteen months, Adam says he badgered the Dade County, Florida medical examiner’s office seeking a conclusive explanation for his wife’s death. They thought she may have had an allergic reaction to a spray tan, but in April 2009, Adam was charged with killing his wife by “mechanical asphyxiation”. The trial began in May 2012 and the prosecution led the jury to believe the couple had an unhappy marriage, and fought the morning of Lina’s death. Adam’s defense no longer blamed Lina’s death on her spray tan because there wasn’t enough evidence to support it, and instead they attacked what they believed to be a botched investigation by the police. There was bruising and abrasions found on Lina’s arms and legs and the defense said this was from Lina being moved from room to room by firefighters, and not a struggle with Adam. Moreover the defense said Lina died of natural causes and undiagnosed heart failure, more specifically acute and chronic myocarditis. Adam himself, and Lina’s mother, Frida Aizman, both testified about Lina’s prior fainting spells. Frida Aizman shared her support and love for Adam while on the stand. After eight hours, the jury reached a verdict of not guilty. Bohn’s attorney asserts he was abandoned by his mother Maureen O’Connell, a wealthy publishing executive, and he experienced profound neglect and abuse that caused a mental illness called Intermittent Explosive Disorder. Prosecutors dismissed his claims and they assert that audio recorded in an accidental phone call made while Thomas was still alive suggest Bohn knew exactly what he was doing. At trial, the Ivy League grad and Wall Street lawyer is found guilty of murder. After making a \$100 million fortune on Wall Street, Bender and his wife bought land in Costa Rica where they built a nature preserve, along with an elaborate, four-story hilltop home with no walls or windows as the centerpiece. The couple seemed to have everything; but both suffered from severe depression, became isolated, and were not entirely welcomed by the locals. They lived in fear after an abduction attempt and a break-in, and were forced to arm themselves and hire a security team. On January 8, 2010, John Bender died from a bullet wound to the back of the head. Was it murder, suicide or accident? Prosecutors say it was murder. Ann Bender says her husband was trying to kill himself and had been suicidal for some time. Other issues in the investigation include: allegations that the trustee of the Bender’s \$100 Million fortune siphoned money from the trust, and the Bender gem collection, which to the Costa Rican authorities, looked like it could have could be a smuggling operation. Nineteen months after the shooting, Ann Bender was charged with murder. At trial, Ann was found not guilty of murder; but in Costa Rica, there is no double jeopardy rule and Ann was brought up on the same charges again and this time was found guilty. 48 HOURS brought in the world-famous independent forensic team of Richard and Selma Eikelenboom, who, after examining all the evidence, say there were problems with the conclusion drawn by the prosecution.
