Station KWCH –DT is a CBS Network affiliate in its service area. In carrying out its responsibilities as a public trustee, the station deals with and is responsive to the principal issues arising in its community on a continuing basis. A variety of specials, public service announcements, public affairs programs and broadcasts on matter of concern to our community are supplemented, in some cases, with in-community projects. Our most significant programming, which has dealt with current community issues during the preceding three-month period, is set forth below.

There are three primary satellites of KWCH-DT which simulcast most of the programming. KBSD-DT, KBSH-DT, and KBSL-DT do insert local segments and are listed in the Supplemental Issues and Programming report for each station.

Specific Treatment of Community Issues

News stories carried in any of five daily newscasts, Monday through Friday, and on three per day newscasts on Saturday, and on two per day newscasts on Sunday, ranging in length of 45 seconds or more, address community issues.

COMMUNITY ISSUES

Crime - Channel 12 reports regularly on criminal activity throughout the entire Channel 12 viewing area as well as the rest of the country and the world. Here we are listing just a few of the stories that were included in our newscast this quarter.

Community - Events impacting the quality of life, including community caring and involvement.

Economy - The economy is of major importance to Kansas residents. Continuing growth keeps our employment rate high; new contract acquisitions by the local aircraft manufacturers, old businesses leaving town, new businesses coming in, proposed tax increases/decreases, and major weather concerns for residences and businesses. All of these factors impact the community, and are of ongoing interest and concern for our viewing audience.

Education - Channel 12 has updated its method of covering educational issues in its viewing area, with the assignment of one reporter to focus solely on education.

Environment - Environment issues and concerns are of interest to the Channel 12 viewing area and are aired regularly in our newscasts to keep our viewers as informed as possible of the latest in Environmental technology, treatments, advisories, etc.

Health & Safety - The well-being of Channel 12 viewers is always our top concern and the Channel 12 News Team is on top of every issue from traffic hazards to severe weather warnings, school closings, fire safety, disaster preparedness and emergency situations. And, with severe weather season, storm spotter training meetings are held several times a week in locations throughout the Channel 12 viewing area all over the state.

Politics - Channel 12 makes sure to convey to viewers the issues and decisions by city, county and state government can affect them.

CRIME

4/4/2014 4:30am

In the crime watch, Wichita police say a woman is attacked and seriously injured last night. Authorities say the woman believed to be in her 80's was beaten multiple times in the 26-hundred block of south west street. She was taken to the hospital. One person was arrested.

4/5/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, a Wichita man is hospitalized after he says he was stabbed by group of people. It happened early this morning on the 28-hundred block of south Ida near Washington and Wassel. That victim told police he was attacked by six or seven people. Officers arrested two 18 year olds - both face aggravated battery charges.

4/6/2014 10pm

A customer walks into the middle of an armed robbery at a west Wichita gas station. Investigators say the suspect held up the presto near west maple and Tracy just before 6 last night. the customer walked in and was forced to get on the ground. The suspect ran away with cash. If you have any information about the case call police.

4/7/2014 6pm

A Kansas air guardsman... Stationed at McConnell air force base is accused of sexual activity with a minor. Senior master sergeant Paul Grimm is in a Texas jail on a federal charge of having sex with a minor after taking her across state lines. According to the federal complaint he was arrested march 29th getting off a cruise ship with a 15-year-old girl. The girl told f-b-i agents Grimm was a family friend... And the two had sex on the cruise. Grimm denied the claims. He's been in the air force for 14 years... And currently works as a facilities manager at McConnell. A preliminary hearing is set for next week in the case.

4/8/2014 5pm

In the crime watch, Wichita police investigate a possible attempted abduction. A ten-year-old girl says she was near Harry and Mosley Monday evening when a man in a car pulled up next to her. She told police the man told her mother wanted him to take her home and then put a cigarette lighter in her hands. She ran away and hid in a church area, before going home. Police are looking for a green Ford Fusion with "Lamborghini style doors." the girl says the man is in his 20's and had the word love tattooed on his forehead.

4/9/2014 12pm

New this noon, Kansas City police are asking for the public's help to locate a wanted fugitive. Tarey Johnson is wanted on two felony warrants for involuntary manslaughter stemming from a fatal accident in 20-13. Johnson does have ties to the Wichita area. If you know where he is... You are asked to contact police at 816-474-tips.

4/11/2014 5am

Several agencies are investigating an officer-involved shooting with this man. David Zehring died after leading police on a chase through west Wichita. Investigators say then he confronted officers with a knife. Officers tased Zehring twice but say he would not stop. That's when investigators say officers had no choice, but to take action against him. Chief Norman Williams says all the officers involved were threatened.

4/13/2014 10pm

Also in the crime watch. a stray bullet lands in the kitchen of a west Wichita home. The homeowner told police... they heard the clinking noise around one this morning... And found the bullet on the kitchen floor. It came through the roof. Nobody was hurt. The home is in the 22-hundred block of south Anna. But nobody in the area heard gunshots... So police say the bullet may have come from more than a mile away.

4/14/2014 5pm

People in Wichita's Jewish community speak out... After three people are killed in what's now being called a hate crime in overland park. The shooting comes just before the start of Passover. And local groups have heightened security in reaction. We'll hear from them in a moment. First... We're learning more about the victims, the youngest, a 14-year-old eagle scout. Dean Reynolds begins with family reaction and the latest on the charges the suspect could face.

4/15/2014 12pm

State prosecutors file charges against a man accused in a deadly shooting spree at two Jewish community sites in overland park Sunday. Michael Schwanke has the new developments from the newsroom. Kara, the charges announced this morning are *state level charges... Filed in Johnson county. The Johnson County district attorney says Frazier Glenn cross has been charged with capital murder for the deaths of a 14-year-old boy and his grandfather outside a Jewish community center in overland park Sunday. Cross has also been charged with first-degree murder for shooting a woman visiting her mother at a nearby retirement complex. Cross is a known white supremacist... And federal prosecutors say they are pursuing their *own federal hate-crimes against cross. His court appearance is set for 1:30 this afternoon... We hope to stream it live at k-w-c-h dot com. The community continues to remember the three victims today. The youngest victim of the shooting, Reat Underwood, was just a freshman at blue valley high school in the Kansas City area. Today his classmates... And students at other schools are wearing white in memory of him.

4/16/2014 6am

More than a hundred guns are on the street-- stolen from a Salina gun shop. Salina police say the guns were taken sometime last weekend. Investigators also say the thieves disabled the alarm system at Cleve's Marine & sporting goods. The bad guys got away with more than a hundred handguns and 20 semi-automatic rifles. They also took a dozen knives and five-thousand dollars worth of ammunition. Salina police say they are working to get all the serial numbers of the missing guns so they can be entered in a national database.

4/18/2014 4:30am

An arrest has been made in connection to the Heartbleed computer virus we first told you about last week. Police in Canada charged a 19-year-old man with stealing taxpayer information using the computer bug. The Canada revenue agency shut down its website last week after learning about its vulnerability. About 900 people had their data stolen in the attack. The Heartbleed bug could have infected millions of websites. Security experts are recommending you change your passwords to major websites like Google, Facebook, and yahoo which have already fixed the problem.

4/19/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, an overnight shooting in Wichita sends one man to the hospital. Wichita police say a 23-year-old man claims to have been shot in the hand and leg around four this morning. It happened near Meridian and Caroline. The victim says the suspects were two men, but had no other description. He was taken to Via Christi at Saint Francis Hospital. His injuries are not considered life threatening.

4/20/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, a high-speed chase ends with a rollover crash on the Sedgwick-Sumner county line. Wichita police were called to the scene of a domestic violence disturbance in the 500 block of south Ellis at 11 this morning. The suspect drove off... And wouldn't stop when police tried pulling him over. The Kansas highway patrol and Sedgwick County deputies took over the pursuit outside of Wichita. The driver ended up losing control of his pick up northeast of Clearwater, rolling into a ditch. The 22-year-old was arrested.. Charges are still pending... Police found weapons and contraband in his car.

4/22/2014 5pm

Franklin County prosecutors will seek the death penalty against this man. Kyle flack is accused of fatally shooting four people at a rural Ottawa farm. Attorneys entered a not guilty plea on his behalf this morning. Investigators say he shot and killed four people, including an 18-month old girl last spring. All four were killed with a shotgun.

4/23/2014 6am

In the crime watch, we have a better look for you of a suspected robber. Check out this video...you can see a masked man walk into the convenience store near Pawnee and Laura on Monday. Police say he demanded money... But when the clerk inside fought back -the man fires his gun in the store. No one was hurt, but a bullet hit a soda machine. If you have any information you're asked to call police.

4/24/2014 5am

In the crime watch, a recent string of break-in burglaries in Bel Aire has police warning residents. Last week there were two cases where burglars kicked in doors in broad daylight. One happened in the 56-hundred block of Odessa and another in the 43-hundred block of Jamesville. Police say two suspects kicked in the front door between 9 and 10 in the morning, ran to the bedrooms and stole jewelry while no one was home. Earlier this month we told you about some similar incidents happening in west Wichita. Bel Aire police are working with Wichita police because they believe the burglaries are connected. Police think the thieves are targeting houses that don't have cars in the driveway. If you've seen anything suspicious you're asked to call police.

4/25/2014 4:30am

In the crime watch, a jury finds a Wichita man guilty in a deadly stabbing in College Hill. Kyle Carter was convicted of first degree murder. He'll be sentenced in June. In September, Carter and a co-defendant told police they saw the victim. Carl cooper breaking into their friend's car. Prosecutors say the two men then chased cooper down and stabbed him several times. The other man charged in the case... Trenton Custer is set to go to trial in July.

4/26/2014 10pm

Police are also searching for suspects involved in an east Wichita burglary. It happened just before three this morning at the dollar general in the 19-hundred block of east 13th street. Police say surveillance video shows four suspects - all wearing hoodies - stealing grocery items. No arrests have been made.

4/27/2014 10pm

McPherson College was on lockdown for hours today while police dealt with a barricaded person at a home just a block away. Police say a 47-year-old female was taken into custody. She's now undergoing a medical evaluation. Students were asked to stay inside the school during the incident. We spoke with one student who watched from a second floor window... As it all went down. Deroo says during any kind of emergency, the school is quick to keep students informed.

4/29/2014 5pm

A Wichita senior citizen comes face to face with three robbers who force their way into her apartment and hold her hostage for money. The story could easily have ended right there. But as

Brian Heap shows us, one thoughtful police officer wouldn't let it. The story begins in this west Wichita neighborhood near 9th & Sheridan. Our victim -- we'll call her "pat" has lived in the area more than 40 years and never heard of a robbery. She told me the story Tuesday but was too scared to do it on camera. Last Friday night around 10, pat says she had a knock at the door. She didn't hesitate to answer because she thought it was a neighbor." instead, three thugs forced their way into her apartment. They held the 70 year-old woman down and demanded money. Sixty dollars cash. That's all pat had in her purse. She gave it to the robbers and they left. Within a couple of hours police found and arrested three people. They also recovered pat's \$60. It was all her spending money for the rest of the month. But she couldn't have it back because it was now evidence in a crime. That's when a police officer assigned to patrol west stepped up. He doesn't want any recognition, doesn't want us to use his name. But we spoke with his supervisor and we know he personally tried to give pat 60 dollars. And when she refused to take it, he left it in her apartment anyway. Pat says she was overwhelmed by the act of generosity and thinks it's great there are police officers in Wichita who care that much. She calls this officer the neighborhood's new super hero. Brian heap, eyewitness news.

4/30/2014 12pm

Police say it's the kind of case that's very difficult to handle. A one-year-old killed... Unintentionally shot by his four-year-old brother... Who found a loaded handgun in a nightstand? New this noon we're learning exactly how this happened. Pilar Pedraza joins us live with the newest details. Police say they can't remember the last time they dealt with an accidental shooting like this where the victim and the shooter were both so young. They say three children were playing in a bedroom when the four year old reached into a drawer that held a loaded gun. Police say it happened yesterday afternoon in a home on the 1300 block of north Pennsylvania. The three children were in the bedroom with two adults in the living room. The oldest child... A four year old boy... Opened a drawer in the nightstand and reached in. He never pulled the semi-automatic handgun out but did pull the trigger. Police say the bullet went through the side of the nightstand and hit the one year old in the chest. Police say the boy's father and uncle called 9-1-1... But the father was so incoherent he couldn't direct the ambulance to his house. They ended up rushing the child to the hospital in a private car where he died. Police say there could be charges in this case... But won't say what... That's up to the district attorney. Investigators expect to hand the case over to the d-a within the week.

5/3/2014 10pm

A man goes on a car theft spree in Saline County, then runs from police. And he still hasn't been found. The man stole three vehicles and attempted to steal two others. He fled Saline County in a grey Chevy Silverado with a fuel tank in the back. He stole it from a crew plowing a field south of Assaria. McPherson county deputies and Kansas highway patrol pursued the stolen vehicle in McPherson County. But he was able to get away. The vehicle was last seen in Harvey County... But authorities believe the man could possibly be in Wichita now. Police do not know the man's identity or what led to the multi-car theft spree.

5/5/2014 5pm

In the crime watch, a standoff in Salina is now over. Emergency crews closed streets in the area this morning after people inside a home refused to come out. Jim Grawe is in Salina with the latest details. Two people are in custody after a four-hour standoff in Salina. Police surrounded a home near 13th and grand, in northwest Salina, around noon Monday. Eyewitness news was on scene where police had their guns drawn, asking those inside to 'come out the front door with their arms in the air.' nearby roads were closed while authorities negotiated with the suspects inside. No one was hurt. It is unknown what led up to the standoff.

5/12/2014 6pm

In the crime watch, a former Winfield teacher. Accused of having a sexual relationship with a student has pleaded guilty to "amended charges." 24-year-old Ashley Eck was arrested last May. She was originally charged with one count of unlawful sexual relations with a student. Today...

She pleaded guilty to one count of contributing to a child's misconduct. She was sentenced to one year probation. She also has to surrender her teaching license. Eck has already resigned from the Winfield school district.

5/13/2014 5pm

Big changes are coming to old town in Wichita. The city wants to give police more power to fight crime in the area... And make sure people feel safe when they're there. This morning... The Wichita city council voted unanimously to designate old town an "entertainment district". The move will help target specific crimes in the area. Anne Meyer is live in old town to explain who will see the changes the most. Anne? Most people who come to old town may not notice the changes - but problem patrons probably will. That's because fines for crimes like fighting or breaking into a car will go up - and some habitual offenders could be kicked out for life. Plus this change gives police officers more power to deal with issues at closing time. Officer Larry Carlson has seen it all - during his seven years working the streets in old town, crowds like this - is what the new ordinance is intended to control. Patrons won't be allowed to loiter outside of the clubs anymore - especially during the closing hours of 11 to three a.m. Plus anyone caught committing a crime here - will now pay higher fines. Officer Carlson says this is just the latest in a series of changes to make it safer in old town. Trees have been trimmed, to help improve lighting in the area. Plus multiple cameras are up and running to give officers a bird's eye view of any problem spots. So expect to see even more improvements coming in old town in the months and year ahead. Another change you may see down here at closing time - this ordinance lets police shut off some streets, to better control traffic when people are leaving old town. Officers had to get special permission from the city to do that before.

5/14/2014 12pm

A woman... Shot in the head while walking down the street with her husband in southeast Wichita. We're learning new information about the deadly shooting that led to an all-night swat standoff. Emily griffin has been at the scene all morning she joins us now live with the latest from police... Who say, they still have no suspects. While police do not have any active suspects in the case, one person was detained this morning for questioning but has not been arrested. I've been speaking with family members and neighbors all morning about what happened here on the 35-hundred block of Roseberry... And all tell me, this Plainview neighborhood hasn't been a safe one for a long time. Police were first called out to the 35-hundred block of east Roseberry around 11:45 Tuesday night... Where they found a 24 year old woman shot in the head. Police say her husband, who she was walking with at the time, is not a suspect. The woman died at the scene. After finding evidence at a nearby home, police made contact with someone they believed had information about the shooting. The swat team cleared the house and was unable to locate any suspects, but one person was taken in for questioning. Police say several shots were fired, and more than one gun was used. Family members i spoke with believe the shooting was gang related. And others who live in the area called the Plainview neighborhood a "dangerous" one. This woman said she's afraid to let her son go outside. The victim and her husband actually live in a house just around the corner from here, where the shooting was. The family, and their neighbor, tell me there have been shots fired at *that* house more than once. Now, investigators will continue to investigate this scene. They spent the morning scanning the area and looking for any eyewitnesses in the neighborhood. Of course we'll continue to follow this developing story. You can expect the latest online and be sure to check back with at 4, 5, 6 and 10.

5/15/2014 5am

In the crime watch, arrests still have not been made in a deadly shooting in the Plainview neighborhood. This was breaking news we first brought you yesterday morning. We now know... 24-year-old Nichole Saldana was walking with her husband late Tuesday night when someone started shooting. Saldana was shot in the head and died. Police say Saldana's husband is a documented gang member. However, they have not said if either were intended targets.

5/17/2014 10pm

In the crime watch, authorities have arrested several teenagers in connection with a string of burglaries in Garden City. 10 people are arrested in connection with the thefts of 36-thousand dollars' worth of electronics, jewelry and cash. Police say about 10-thousand dollars' worth of stolen goods have been recovered, along with four vehicles police suspect were used in the burglaries.

5/18/2014 10pm

We continue to follow breaking news in Butler County. Where a man with a gun has barricaded himself inside a mobile home. Nearby homes at the pine ridge mobile home park south of Towanda have been evacuated. Anne Meyer is there live right now. Anne what can you tell us? `One man inside - no one else. Sheriff does believe he is armed. Talked to a neighbor - a few doors down, she says it started at about 530 or 6 tonight. She saw the man's wife and children get out safely - she knows the family, and says he's a good guy - but she also knows.

5/19/2014 6pm

New now, the highway patrol identifies a possible car in a deadly hit and run. The crash killed a pedestrian earlier this month in Cloud County. Investigators believe the car is either an Oldsmobile intrigue, Buick century or Buick regal. If you have any information, call the highway patrol.

5/21/2014 5am

In the crime watch this morning, the Harvey County sheriff's department wants to know who damaged and stole road signs. Each one of these red dots on the map.... Is a where the vandalism has occurred. The signs were removed or damaged some time Tuesday night. Eight of them were stop signs. Damage is estimated at around 600-dollars and the signs have been replaced. If you have any information you're asked to call Harvey County crime stoppers at 284-24-hundred.

5/22/2014 6am

Police were talking to the woman when they say Carrillo came out of the home the gun and started shooting. One officer returned fire and hit Carrillo in his right cheek and right upper shoulder. He was taken to a Salina hospital and is expected to survive.

5/24/2014 10pm

In this evening's crime watch, a burglar breaks into a Wichita music store and gets away with several instruments. Police tell us it happened just before six this morning at Starky Music Center. No arrests have been made. So anyone with any information on this incident is asked to call crimestoppers. That number is 267-2111.

The state fined the home more than 155-thousand dollars for failure to meet regulations. The investigation focused on the possible abuse and neglect of at least one resident. Another hearing for Nyanswego is set for July.

5/28/2014 12pm

Police tell us the entire incident began as an argument between three residents of the wind ridge apartments and a fourth person who visited here often. That argument spilled out into the street... And that's when it turned physical. Police say it's possible the tension between the victims was building for days. Then Tuesday night... The fight escalated and three people were shot and a fourth person stabbed in the street near wind ridge apartments. This started last night during a traffic stop just south of Dexter...along u-s 166. During that stop = a deputy shot the driver. That deputy was also injured, but we don't know the extent of those injuries or how the injuries happened. Again friends and family have identified the driver as 22-year old Tayler rock. They all want to know more about what happened. Rock does have a criminal past. Most of the arrests i found were for warrants issued when he didn't show up in court. Again, we should know more tomorrow ... The sheriff's office plans to hold a news conference...at 1:30. You can watch it live streaming on kwch-dot-com

6/2/2014 6pm

As Jim Grawe tells us....what she has to say, may surprise you. Donna Buchanan of Salina grieves over the loss of her son...Jonathan Whitehead. The 33-year-old was shot and killed by Washington state troopers on a Seattle freeway Monday. Witnesses say Whitehead had parked his pickup sideways in traffic and jumped out. He then set the truck on fire and spray-painted a big green circle on the bridge deck. Officers confronted Whitehead. They say he pulled out a knife. Witnesses back up what police say. Buchenau says her son had moved to Seattle three years ago and worked as a carpenter. She attributes her son's bizarre actions to withdrawal from methadone...which she says he'd been prescribed to kick a drug addiction. Buchenau says she'd talked to her son before about a green circle. Buchenau concedes it's difficult to understand what was going through her son's mind. As for the officers who shot and killed him-- another of Buchenau's sons is a police officer in the Seattle area. Whitehead appears to have no criminal history.

6/21/2014 10pm

An inmate who walked out of Winfield correctional facility this morning will now face new charges. 29-year-old Jimmy Reed went missing from the minimum security facility this morning. He was caught late this afternoon. And the Kansas department of corrections says he will be charged with aggravated escape from custody. He had been serving time for a probation violation.

6/22/2014 10pm

A deadly domestic dispute in Arkansas City...and neighbors it's not the first time there's been trouble at the home. Police say 44-year old Leonard Daniels died at the hospital after being stabbed in the back. Officers arrested this man - 23-year old Cameron Budd. He faces a charge of involuntary manslaughter. Anne Meyer tells us what may have lead to the deadly confrontation. Late last month, officers arrested Leonard Daniels when he barricaded himself in the home after a fight with his estranged wife. The court told Daniels to stay away from the home. But at four this morning, police say he broke in, fired several shots and got in a fight with his wife. During that fight, Cameron Budd stabbed Daniels in the back - i talked to the man who called police. Stephen Sanders didn't want his face on camera - but he did want to tell us what happened in his neighborhood Sunday morning. Justin and Christy Merry live next door with their young son. They didn't hear the gun shots Sunday morning. But say they've had to call police to the home before, when the woman fought with her estranged husband. Police say the woman and her 12 year old daughter got out without injury - and called 9-1-1. That's when officers found Leonard Daniels lying in the street. The Merrys feel Cameron Budd did the right thing. According to Leonard Daniel's criminal record - he got out of prison in February, for a theft charge. I know he was arrested for the standoff May 21st - and was supposed to be sentenced in July. But i couldn't find out when he was released from the ark city jail. That's a question we'll be asking police as this investigation continues. Cameron Budd turned himself into police this morning. He was grazed by a bullet - but not seriously injured. Budd will likely make his first appearance in court later this week.

6/23/2014 6pm

In the crime watch, a Salina man pleaded "no contest" today to first-degree murder in the death of his three-month-old son. After entering his plea... A Saline county judge found. Nicholas Corbin guilty of first-degree murder. He'll be sentenced in September. Corbin faces life in prison with no chance of parole for 25 years. The child's mother, Desirah Overturf, will also be sentenced in

September. She pleaded "no contest" to first degree murder charges last week. Officers were called to the couple's home in December for an unresponsive child. Three-month-old Jordan Corbin was pronounced dead at the scene. The cause of his death has not been released.

State troopers say they're still looking into whether or not the smoke was a factor in the crash. I just got off the phone with Liz Meeks from Hays...who told me she was on i-70 at the time and the smoke was so thick she couldn't see the front of her car. The cause of the fire is also still under investigation. Storm team 12 saw some of the smoke on radar this afternoon. Meteorologist Merrill Teller shows us from the storm center.

4/22/2014 5pm

Be prepared for severe weather by downloading the storm team 12 weather app. With it, you can follow the latest radar, see the latest forecast, and even watch live streaming video. the app is available for free for android and apple devices.

4/23/2014 5am

It's an arbor and Earth day celebration with some special meaning in maize. Many gathered last night to help plant this tree at maize city park. It's in honor of Corporal Eric Palmer who was killed in the line of duty while serving in Iraq in 2007. Palmer was a graduate of maize high school. His family was on hand as the city honored his life and service. The maize high school band also performed at today's celebration.

4/24/2014 5am

This week's does it work product comes from a viewer's suggestion. The product claims it can take-on a tricky kitchen problem-- tough jars. There are several techniques many people try. But "open ease" says you only need *this to open jars. Melissa finds out. Does it work? Like any cook, every now and then Cindy Houston gets into a jam with some jars. Determined to do it on her own--and to help some older family members with hand issues--Cindy asked us to test the "Hamilton beach open ease automatic jar opener." we bought one online for almost 33-dollars (\$32.60). That does include shipping. It comes ready to go with two double-a batteries. Cindy starts with a grape jelly jar. After looking over the instructions, we realized the inner arms need to be fully opened before starting. Next, our largest jar. The pickle jar was no problem for the "open ease." but it removes the lid from the spaghetti sauce jar and the salsa jar too. Now to our smallest jar full of garlic. The makers of "open ease" say it can open lids from an inch to four inches in diameter. Cindy takes off the "open ease" to reveal another opened lid. But there was one issue Cindy had a problem with during our testing. Yep. It just shuts-off automatically. Will that make her decision about the "open ease" a difficult one? The makers say you should not use this on plastic lids. You should only use it on glass jars with screw-top lids.

4/26/2014 10pm

A Kansas police officer goes above and beyond to help kids with cancer. Derby police officer Trisha Willis shaved her head today to raise money for children's cancer research. Willis says her friend's little boy was diagnosed with cancer, and lost his battle with the disease last month. She had promised if the community raised enough money, she would shave her head. And as you can see, she kept her promise, raising 56-hundred dollars in the process. The event was put on by the saint Baldrick's foundation, which is a nationwide charity that helps fund cancer research.

The wind is making travel along i-70 difficult. This semi was tipped over by high winds near the Colorado state line. Electronic signs were used in the area to warn drivers to watch out for dust.

5/1/2014 5am

It's a big day for Wichita's Catholic Church. Monsignor Carl Kemme (kimmy) will be ordained as the eleventh bishop of the catholic diocese of Wichita. He's taking the place of the now archbishop Michael Jackels. Bishop elect Kemme comes to us from Springfield, Illinois. He has never lived outside that diocese. He was an administrator of the diocese when it was between bishops. Bishop elect Kemme's ordination begins at two oh clock this afternoon. Eyewitness news will be there throughout the day to bring you coverage, you can even watch the service live. Just tune into the k-s-c-w this afternoon. The shot struck the one-year-old in the chest. No charges have been filed.

5/3/2014 10pm

A major construction project is moving right along in west Wichita. K-dot crews are working to place 12 heavy steel beams over interstate 235. The bridge they are creating will connect 13th street to I-235. The highway is closed from Zoo Boulevard to central until sometime tomorrow when crews finish until the project wraps up. If you're heading Northbound... you will turn onto central, then west, then Zoo then back onto the interstate. Southbound follows the same route, just the reverse.

5/4/2014 5am

As we showed you at the top of the show high temperatures combined with dry conditions means increased fire danger. Fires kept crews busy all day in Augusta. Expect old town to make headlines this week. The city council is looking to change it into an entertainment district - to help keep the area safe. Bar owners are doing their part too... With help from new technology that keeps better tabs on problem patrons. One old town club is using it - and more could sign on too. Anne Meyer shows us how it works new at 10. It's another busy night at the pumphouse in old town. Crews expect several hundred people will walk through the door before the weekend is through and each one will have their i-d scanned through a new system called bar shield. The system hooks onto an i-pad touch and uses information from the barcode on the back of your driver's license or i-d - to create a file for each person who enters the bar. It can even add a picture - through the phone's camera. But if i got into a fight or walked out without paying - the bar can enter that information into my file, which may prevent me from getting in next time. Now the pumphouse plans to show it off to other bars in old town - and hopes they'll sign on so --that information can be shared. Even though data is shared, brink says the system protects your personal information - by only scanning the first six digits of an i=d. I talked to bar-goers that night, some thought the scanning system slowed down the process of getting in, but many liked the idea of keeping problem patrons out. I also talked to bar owners, i know one plans to get the same system - another wasn't sure. They'll decide once they see the system in action later this month. Anne Meyer eyewitness news. Each system costs a few hundred dollars to start up - and then each bar also pays a monthly fee for the service.

5/12/2014 5am

Severe weather means e-mails and angry phone calls for our newsroom. Last night was no exception--as tornado warnings sounded during prime time programming. Interrupting that programming is the last thing we want to do. But sometimes, we have no choice. Michael Schwanke explains how and when we make the decision to break-in. So you're watching one of your favorite shows and then this... frustrating...especially if the weather isn't in your area...we know. Let me start with a couple examples of the feedback we receive e-mails like this that say... here's another. And one final example. They weren't all negative...we got some thank you's too...and i even received an apology call from a woman who told me she felt horrible about yelling at me on the phone. We don't like to break in...some of us watch those same shows and don't want to miss them either--and we sure don't want to upset our viewers. We try not to break in over programming...but last night is an example of when we don't have a choice. There were multiple times when we had confirmed tornadoes...not just radar indicated...but trained weather spotters confirming rotation or tornadoes on the ground threatening populated areas. We had to cover the end of the mentalist last night...which we really try not to do....but remember Greensburg...that tornado also came in at night. We took a lot of angry calls and e-mails that night...but it was because of our warnings that lives were saved. As a broadcast station...it is our duty to inform the public of safety threats...even if it means covering up programming--we apologize and know it's frustrating sometimes. As for the mentalist...c-b-s won't let us replay

it...but you can catch it on-line at c-b-s.com. The finale is next week...let's hope the severe weather stays away!

5/13/2014 5am

So where exactly is the area we're talking about? Take a look at this map. The city council designated this area as the entertainment district. It stretches from Douglas to central, and from St Francis to Wabash. The ordinance also requires a minimum 5-hundred dollar fine for 12 crimes. That includes assault, disorderly conduct, drug offenses, and loitering. There are some exceptions to the loitering law, such as standing in line to enter a bar, or smoking in a designated smoking area. You can see the first lady in the capital city today. Michelle Obama is traveling to Topeka...meeting with students at an event for the city's high school graduates. Her trip sparked criticism. She'd planned to speak at a combined graduation ceremony. But parents worried the arena wouldn't be big enough to accommodate everyone. Her trip comes one day before the 60th anniversary of brown versus board.

5/17/2014 10pm

Hundreds gather to remember our fallen heroes with the dedication of a new memorial. The operation freedom memorial is now at veteran's memorial park in Wichita. It is a tribute to the men and women who died while serving our country in the war against terrorism. The black granite walls have the names of 94 Kansans who died in Desert Storm, Khobar Towers, in the Pentagon on 9/11, Iraq and Afghanistan. Operation freedom memorial is dedicated in honor and remembrance of all veterans and those currently serving.

5/18/2014 10pm

She was the only survivor in a deadly crash that killed three of her friends, and their designated driver on St. Patrick's day weekend. Police believe their designated driver had a medical emergency behind the wheel. Jenell Henderson is now recovering in a rehab facility... Friends say she's making progress every day. Today her friends held a fundraiser to help pay for Janell Henderson's medical bills. in addition to the fundraising events, friends have also set up a go-fund-me account for Janell. 5/19/2014 6pm

A flight bound for Wichita doesn't make it because of smoke in the cabin. Cindy Klose is in the newsroom with more on this developing story. Around 1-30 this afternoon... Allegiant flight 142 was getting ready to take-off from the phoenix-mesa gateway airport. That's when the airline says there was the report of smoke in the cabin. Allegiant says crew members evacuated passengers on to the taxiway. This picture comes from a passenger from Salina on that plane.

162 passengers were on board along with six crew members. Six people reported minor injuries and were treated by paramedics. Folks were taken back to the terminal for a new flight. The plane is an md-80. The airline says it's investigating the cause of the smoke. Passengers were refunded their airfare and received vouchers toward a future flight.

5/20/2014 5pm

Also in Salina, a one-year-old boy is taken to the hospital after possibly ingesting sleeping pills. The child's father says the pills a prescribed to a 9-year-old sibling. Police say the cap on the pill bottle was not secure... And the child was found with the pill bottle and a pill in his hand. Investigators don't know if the child actually *ingested* any of the pills... But he was taken to a hospital as a precaution.

5/21/2014 5am

A summer program starts a week from today. It keeps Wichita's school children from going hungry through the summer. It is open to all children 18 and younger. to a hospital in critical condition. Investigators are still trying to figure out what caused the accident.

5/28/2014 12pm

The severe weather meant a change of plans for Riverfest goers. In fact, many vendors are closing up shop early tonight. Here's a live look from the event... The rain is just pouring down. The Joan Jett concert that would have been going on now started a few hours early. And hot air balloon rides were cancelled. The event is no stranger to the Kansas weather. That's why organizers prepare for such events each year, keeping in close contact with meteorologists and law enforcement. The tornado shelter used for the large number of people is in century two, and was used in 2010 when there was a tornado warning in the area. City officials say. A standing-room only crowd packed the meeting. Last year the Salina city commission approved an anti-discrimination ordinance that included the l-g-b-t community. But voters struck down the protections.

6/3/2014 5pm

There are also questions about Bergdahl's actions in Afghanistan and what led to his capture in the first place. Roger Cornish joins us from the newsroom with more. Some are out and out calling the sergeant a deserter. A former sergeant says Bergdahl simply took off his gear, put down his weapon and walked away in the middle of the night. We sat down today with Cody full who was one of Bergdahl's roommates in Afghanistan. He told us Bergdahl made it clear he disagreed with what the u-s military was doing there. He also talked about making it to India or China by walking through the mountains of Afghanistan. Krueger is the mother of the 3-year-old girl who died after spending days in the hospital. We are only identifying her as "Emma." she died just half an hour after a candlelight vigil last night. Dozens gathered outside Wesley medical center last night to take a moment of silence for the little girl. The crowd was filled with family and friends, but also complete strangers who wanted to be there for Emma. Since Monday - family members have only been able to see her once. They can't stand to think of the battle she's been fighting. They hope by seeing her sweet face ... Others will speak up when something doesn't seem right. 6/6/2014 4:30am

If you're working to go through the immigration process here in Kansas beware. In this morning's "don't fall for it" we're warning you about an i-r-s scam targeting immigrants. The Sedgwick county district attorney's office says scammers are targeting residents that have been naturalized....asking for tax money...if they refuse, they are threatened with deportation. If you receive these type of calls, the i-r-s recommends to report it immediately. The only way the i-r-s or immigration will contact you would be through the mail.

6/7/2014 10pm

It's a big event, 14-hundred athletes show up to compete. But while the weekend was supposed to be centered around the athletes of the special Olympics summer games. Thieves used it at an opportunity. Hannah Davis was at today's games... And spoke to one of the victims. Brayden Hugunin's mom says the entire family looks forward to the trip from Burlington to Wichita for the summer games. They all decorated Brayden's handi-cap accessible van to show everyone their pride. But Brayden's mom think's those decorations are what attracted the thieves. Brayden Hugunin spends most of his life in this wheel chair. But for a moment Friday... His father lifted him up and Brayden got to be the star. Organizers at the Kansas Special Olympics see it too. They named Brayden this year's most inspirational athlete. An honor that included "the lighting of the torch. More than 50 friends and family members made the drive from Burlington to Wichita for these games. That pride is printed all over the family's van. But Brayden's mom says these scribbles of support attracted thieves Friday night outside their hotel. Inside the purse was money they'd raised to pay for Brayden's trip. Brayden's mom says they'll find a way to make do. And it's nothing a little plastic and tape can't fix. Brayden's family won't let this crime ruin his special moment. Brayden's mom says another family with the Special Olympics had their car broken into too. Both families filed reports with the police. Police urge drivers to never leave valuables in vehicles. It becomes an easy target for thieves.

6/8/2014 10pm

Now the latest on a deadly plane crash in Barton County. The victims are 49-year old roger (brining) Brining of great bend. And 24-year old Daniel Bishop of Ogden, Utah. Anne Meyer went to the crash site today - and spoke with people who knew them. To those who knew him well, roger brining was known as an aviation junky. Chrissy Genova couldn't hold back her tears, as she remembered stories about her friend, roger. Investigators say brining was flying the plane Sunday morning when it crashed. His daughter's boyfriend... Daniel bishop... Was also on board - troopers say both men died on impact. A few minutes later that same witness saw the plane go down and called 9-1-1. While friends wait for answers, they know how big of a loss this will be to great bend. Anne Meyer - an f-a-a investigator from Wichita got to the crash site Sunday

afternoon, no word yet on when results of that investigation will be released. In great bend, am eyewitness news. This is at least the third deadly plane crash in Barton County in the past year.

6/9/2014 5pm

Investigators are gathering more information about a deadly plane crash near great bend. 49-year-old roger brining and 24-year-old Daniel Bishop were killed when their experimental Schreiber p-70 crashed into the ground. Eyewitnesses saw the plane flying low to the ground for some time before the crash. No word yet on when the investigation will be complete.

6/10/2014 5am

A crash in Trego County leaves two people dead. Police say 17-year-old john smith and 12-year-old Alexis Woolsoncroft were pronounced dead at the scene. Another passenger survived. Smith was driving east on i-70 around 3:30 Monday afternoon when he lost control and crossed the median. He crashed into a semi and another car. At least two other people were hurt in the accident. Police say the drivers and passengers in all vehicles had their seat belt on at the time of the crash.

6/11/2014 6am

It's a story we've been following for a couple of weeks. Saline county commissioners uphold their decision to reject grant money for intra-uterine devices and birth control implants. The grant was for 6-thousand dollars. The decision comes against the advice of the county's health department director. He believes the family planning grant could help low-income women. Opponents questioned the morality and safety of the devices.

6/12/2014 5am

Bees surround k-u's natural history museum. The museum says... 15-thousand bees outgrew their hive. Experts say it's a natural process where the colony splits and re-locates. The phoenix catholic diocese says... Reverend joseph terra remains in critical condition. The diocese says despite terra's injuries... He still gave last rites to Wilson.

The money would come from other areas of school district aid... Such as transportation and teacher pensions. House debate could begin by Thursday. Lawmakers hope to resolve the problem before the start of a three week recess on Friday.

4/5/2014 5am

After hours of debate, a deal has still not been finalized. Lawmakers are being watched by hundreds of teachers as they negotiate a plan to add 141 million dollars to public schools. Hannah Davis spoke with Wichita lawmakers in both chambers to find out more. She joins us in the newsroom with the latest. Anne, I spoke with lawmakers... But i also talked to teachers. And whatever the legislature decides... It will directly affect the men and women who teach Kansas' student. And that's exactly why hundreds of teachers... Went to Topeka today... To make sure their concerns were heard before a vote. Teachers from across the state filled the capitol Saturday to show lawmakers where they stand. Lawmakers worked most of the day - debating the best way to fund schools - and meet the funding requirements, laid out in a recent Kansas Supreme Court decision. The legislature plans to add up to 141 million dollars to school funding. But Mousley says they're also taking this opportunity to draft policy changes at teachers' expense. Mousley is referring to a part of the senate's plan that would do away with due process rights for teachers. That was a big reason why teachers wanted to fill the statehouse Saturday - as lawmakers worked to find a compromise. Those teachers are definitely making their presence known tonight. Lawmakers have taken several recess breaks... And some teachers are tweeting that it's a move to make them leave. But teachers are vowing to stay until the final vote. Anne... We'll keep an eye on what happens and have the very latest tomorrow morning at 7 on our sister station kscw.

4/6/2014 5am

Breaking news from the Kansas state house tonight as the Kansas house has just passed a school finance bill. The bill...already voted on by the senate takes away teacher tenure or due process. The vote took place minutes ago. Anne Meyer spoke with both teachers and lawmakers. She's live at the state house tonight. Anne...? Mike, that new bill is being debated in the house at this hour. It does not include property tax relief for on-line and private schools. But it would take away due process for teachers. That's been the big issue up here - and it's why teachers plan to stay outside the house chamber until a vote is made. Red shirts filled the statehouse Sunday, as a sign of solidarity. Many of these teachers were in town for a conference, but they stayed to make sure lawmakers heard their voices - even through days of debate. She and others are worried about due process - it gives teachers a hearing before they can be fired, and they want to keep those rights in place. But supporters of the policy change say it's necessary to rid school districts of bad teachers. Listening to lawmakers, teachers here are preparing for the worse. Most I've talked to are predicting a close vote. Some moderate republicans already sided with democrats on this issue - and teachers are hoping that will happen

again. Others heard the Koch brothers were here earlier to sway lawmakers - but i did not see them myself. People are asking about is governor Brownback, he has not made an appearance since the debate began. It has been a busy few days for state lawmakers trying to get in votes before the end of the session. We've been tracking all the major pieces of legislation passed. The main thing the bill was supposed to do... Was increase funding to local districts... Especially the poorer districts... As required by a Kansas Supreme Court ruling. Pilar Pedraza spoke with Wichita school leaders today... And learned while they're getting some extra money... They still don't know just how much. School leaders across the state were following this weekend's action at the statehouse closely... Most had representatives in Topeka keeping track of all the changes. Once the bill passed.. When figuring the local tax rate. This will decrease how much local property owners pay for schools... But it doesn't change the *total schools actually get. Now the latest on the school funding debate, lawyers for parents and school districts at the heart of the battle say they have concerns about the plan approved by lawmakers this weekend. Robb says his office is still looking at the overall plan to see if it will meet the court order. The bill is now awaiting Governor Sam Brownback's signature. Wednesday was the warmest day of the year so far for many Kansans. Wichita topped-out at 82 degrees making it the first time the town's seen 80 or more since October 11, 2013. Early Thursday, a few clouds passed through our area but everyone stayed dry. Temps stayed mild overnight and only fell into the upper- 40s and low to mid-50s

Thursday will be a tad cooler with winds shifting back to the north. Afternoon highs will climb into the 70s for most of our state and it won't be as windy. Look for increasing clouds Thursday night and a chance for spotty showers or sprinkles across northern Kansas. Our Friday will be fine before a weekend storm system arrives bringing chances for showers and storms Saturday night and Sunday. Severe weather is not expected Sunday but the weekend system will drag much colder temps into Kansas early next week.

4/11/2014 5am

Meteorologist Mark Larson says the wind will die down Friday across most of Kansas and temps will be mild. Get set to get wet this weekend. A weak, fast moving weather system rolled out of Nebraska while we were sleeping and spread clouds across Kansas. A few spotty sprinkles even passed through the northeast corner of our state as temps fell into the 40s. Look for decreasing clouds Friday and afternoon highs in the 70s with light southeast winds. A stronger storm system will plow across Kansas this weekend. Expect increasing clouds Saturday with afternoon highs soaring into the 80s nearly statewide. Scattered showers and storms could develop Saturday night but are more likely Sunday when a cold front slashes into Kansas from the north. Some small hail will be possible with a few stronger storms Sunday but severe weather is not expected. The weekend weather-maker will drag much colder temps into Kansas Monday when highs only top out in the 50s with gusty northerly winds.

4/12/2014 10pm

4/13/2014 10pm

Lows will dip down into the mid 20s west with low 30s in south central Kansas. The wind will be gusty from the north. Monday starts out with a chance for light snow before the skies begin to clear some in the afternoon. Highs will be in the 40s with north winds gusty until late afternoon when they will start diminishing. Another hard freeze is likely into Tuesday morning with temperatures starting out in the 20s. It will warm back up into the 60s Tuesday afternoon. The next chance for rain in Kansas will be Thursday.

Some record low temperatures were set this morning. Winds are increasing today and will get even stronger tonight and tomorrow.

4/17/2014 5am

Meteorologist Mark Larson says we can expect a gray Thursday with more clouds than sun most of the day, a few scattered showers and much cooler temps. Early Thursday, spotty showers

made their way into parts of western and central Kansas and under a cloudy sky, temps fell into the 30s and 40s much lighter northeast winds. Thursday will be much cooler than normal with widely scattered showers, especially over the southern half of our state. Afternoon highs will only be in the low to mid-50s. Look for a sunny, dry and warmer day Friday with highs climbing back into the upper-60s and 70s. Storms will move into central Kansas in the late evening hours with the threat becoming mainly strong winds. Some showers may linger Thursday morning in the east with mostly sunny conditions doing likewise during the day. Storm chances will increase again Saturday night into Sunday with severe storms being possible once again. Scattered showers and cooler conditions will be found on Monday and Tuesday.

4/23/2014 6am

Meteorologist Mark Larson says Wednesday will be stormy for some but windy and warm for everyone. Early Wednesday, a few showers drifted out of north-central Kansas and into Nebraska as temps across Kansas fell into the 50s under a clear to partly cloudy sky. Where they're getting gusts so strong its closing down school. This is what it looks like out west in Stanton County. One of the driest starts to the year coupled with several days of 60 mile an hour plus gusts created this. You can see just how bad visibility is in some areas. And that's why school officials cancelled class.. They didn't want student driving when it's tough to see the road ahead. Now in Wichita a little bit of rain helped get rid of the dust... But the winds are still blowing hard... And people are tired of it. Strong gusts are also taking down trees. You can see this one in north Wichita couldn't stand the gusts.

4/30/2014 12pm

Clean-up continues in southeast Kansas... From an e-f-2 tornado that hit Baxter Springs. Volunteers have been helping get rid of debris. Meantime, the Cherokee County health department says it's providing tetanus shots to prevent infection. It says it already provided more than 70 shots. 5/1/2014 5am

Meteorologist Mark Larson says our wicked winds will be backing off Thursday and Friday and it will actually feel pretty "calm" compared to the blown-away conditions we've endured lately. Temps tumbled hard early Thursday, falling into the 30s statewide. A few sub-freezing readings were even found across the southwest corner of Kansas where a warning had been issued. After the chilly start Thursday, we'll see a fairly mild finish with afternoon highs in the low to mid-60s under a partly to mostly cloudy sky. How about those wicked winds? They'll be gusting to 25-30 mph instead of 40-50 and 60, so not too bad, relatively speaking. Look for more sunshine and warmer temperatures as we close out the work week followed by a surge of early summer-like heat this weekend through most of next week.>

5/2/2014 4:30am

Meteorologist Mark Larson says an area of high pressure will pass through our area Friday finally bringing lighter winds and more sunshine to Kansas. Early Friday, a few lingering showers and storms faded as they raced eastward. Temps were rather chilly behind Thursday's cold front, tumbling into the 40s across most of the state to start the day. We can expect lighter winds and mostly sunny skies Friday as high pressure moves through our area. Afternoon highs will top-out in the low to mid 70s and it won't be quite so humid. Saturday looks dry day for most of us however, a few storms could pop-up over southeastern Kansas later in the afternoon. Saturday will be warmer too as temps will climb back into the low to mid-80s. In there's even a sliver of south central Kansas in the worst category exceptional drought. Storm team 12 says this spring storm should help the top soil... But it didn't deliver enough rain to significantly impact the record dry conditions.

5/12/2014 5am

If oil production stops on just one Kansas rig... It will impact dozens of people. And some drilling companies say... A bird is to blame for putting them into a holding pattern. New federal regulations, listing the lesser prairie chicken as a "threatened" species went into effect today. Factfinder 12 has been looking into how the rules protecting their habitats impact Kansas. New at six... Investigator Lauren Seabrook shows us.... The change has already put some people out of work. Crys from wildlife activists have been heard and these birds are now protected by the federal government. That fear has oil drilling at many rigs across southwest Kansas on hold. Tim sanders with tomcat drilling says work on a rig typically goes 24 hours a day, seven days a week in Kansas ... And employs hundreds of people. But if that drilling continues in an endangered area companies face penalties ranging from 25 to 50-thousand dollars and jail time. Sanders says about 15 people work on a drill. He says if you consider each worker is married with about two kids . Then multiply that by about 50 rigs in the endangered area ... That's 3-thousand people affected. In response to the new federal law - Kansas passed a state law that allows the a-g or a county prosecutor to file lawsuits against the conservation efforts. Sanders says that'll help ... But his company's first priority is to be compliant. We wanted to know how long the process could take to get a permit for drilling ... Since that's how long employees would be out of work. Fact finder 12 found out... Companies must apply through the "Kansas corporation commission" and file a completion report when the drilling is finished. We asked how much the permit costs and how long it takes to get. But the k-c-c was unable to give us that information today. Once we find out... We will update the details of the process on our website, k-w-c-w-dot-com.

5/13/2014 5pm

Partly cloudy and quite chilly again tonight. Dry and cool weather will continue through the work week and then warm up over the weekend. No significant rain is in the forecast into the beginning of next week.

5/14/2014 12pm

There were more frosty spots across western Kansas early Wednesday but it looks like it was the last time morning temps will dip so low for a while. Temperatures fell into the lower 30s over the west and into upper-30s to around 40 elsewhere Wednesday morning. Wind speeds were less under 15 mph under a mostly clear to partly cloudy sky. Clouds will thicken-up Wednesday afternoon with a few spotty sprinkles/showers possible around northwest Kansas. Highs will only climb into the 60s again with north/northwest winds under 20 mph. Strongest south winds will be in south central Kansas with gusts over 35 mph likely. Dry weather continues through Wednesday before scattered storms return to the picture by Thursday and Friday. Even those who don't think Kansas has reached dangerous levels yet... Say we should all be careful with our water consumption which is why residents in the monarch landing neighborhood contacted us. Upset about what the homeowners' association is doing to keep these ponds from drying out on the phone. The associations' president told me they've pumped water into the two largest ponds once. And in a written statement, said the h-o-a considered a number of things including... "the appearance and property values of the neighborhood, using water resources during the drought, the health of the ponds, " but in the end said the water levels reached "a critically low state" and adding water was "necessary to protect the pond environment and the fish." in an April email to residents.. The h-o-a warned the pumping could impact other neighborhood well levels, even drying them out. That has residents upset. We checked with the Kansas department of agriculture, which regulates water usage in the state. Agents told us the h-o-a has to have a term permit to use well water to fill the ponds and that if other, domestic well owners are impacted... They can file a complaint with the division of water resources which would then investigate. Currently, less than half of Kansas is considered to be in extreme or exceptional drought. The Kansas division of water resources says you should make every effort to conserve water. For more details on water regulations and how to make complaint about water wells.. Go to k-w-c-h dot com after the show.

5/22/2014 6am

The storm also forced a southwest airlines flight to divert to Wichita. The plane landed at mid-continent Wednesday evening. It left early this morning for Denver. It was one of 38 flights diverted Wednesday. We did reach out to one of the passengers waiting for that flight. Kevin cooper tweeted us this photo as he was waiting at mid-continent airport.

5/24/2014 10pm

Strong or severe storms will pass through far western and southern sections of Kansas Friday night into early Saturday morning. Large hail, gusty winds and locally heavy rain will all be threats. Severe storms are not expected on Monday. Rain chances will end early Tuesday with dry weather likely heading into the afternoon. Temperatures will warm back up to near 80.

6/9/2014 5pm

You're going to start seeing more of these popping up across Kansas. Tesla Motors is adding charging stations ALONG I-70 for its electric cars. The company will open a station in the parking lot of the new Applebee's in Hays on Friday. It's the first tesla station in Kansas. The automaker plans to open 4 charging stations along I-70 in Kansas by the end of the year. It takes about 20 minutes for the car to receive half a charge.

6/10/2014 12pm

Wichita city council unanimously voted this morning to continue a rebate program for using water-efficient appliances. Rain sensors and dual-flush converters are now included. And the program will apply to anyone who pays a water bill, not just homeowners. Rebates would be 100-dollars per item. Each customer would be limited to five rebates. The budget for the program is 450-thousand dollars.

6/11/2014 6am

Mostly clear skies and cool temps to start the day. Gusty winds and warmer temps this afternoon. Storm will crank-up tonight out west then plow eastward through Thursday Morning. Flooding rains and gusty winds will be threats.

6/12/2014 5am

That rain and wind probably woke you up this morning. You may even heard some thunder claps. The storm brought strong winds and minor street flooding. Lets go straight to mark who's been tracking this storm since early this morning.

6/13/2014 4:30am

Meteorologist Mark Larson says our Friday weather looks just fine and temperatures will be warming up this weekend along with another round of rain and storms. Early Friday temps fell into the 50s with light winds and clear skies, a delightful, fresh air morning. Friday we'll see some high clouds drift into our area during the afternoon with an increasing south wind. High temperatures will climb back into the low to mid-80s but the humidity should be a bit lower than it's been lately.

A stray shower or storm could pop-up along the Colorado state line Friday night but most of us will stay dry. Saturday will be windy and warmer with highs in the upper-80s and lower-90s. Strong storms are likely Saturday night across northern Kansas where some will be packing large hail and damaging winds. Right now we expect most of the rough weather to be north of I-70. Sunday will bring more scattered storms state-wide and there will be a slight risk for more severe weather south and east of the Kansas Turnpike.

This photo from my aunt, Sandy Barnhart. There's also reports of some grain bins damaged in northwest Kansas as well as more than 2-thousand people without power. There are a lot of reports of hail tonight. A viewer sent us this photo of some softball sized hail from Goodland Kansas. You can send us your storm shots as well through Facebook or our kwch app.

6/15/2014 10pm

What a difference a day makes, severe storms overnight, but today, clear skies provided perfect weather for father's day activities in much of the state. Merrill can we expect it to stay that way as we begin the work week?

6/16/2014 6pm

Hail damage from this weekend's severe storms is keeping auto-shops busy in western Kansas. "Dinkel collision and repair" in Goodland says... It has had a steady stream of customers since opening this morning. Workers have seen windshields and back windows knocked-out... Or cracked by the hail... in addition to the body dents they normally see after this kind of storm. We've been getting your pictures of the hail from Saturday's severe storms. 6/17/2014 5pm

As that tornado was moving through Hesston a second tornado formed just to the north of town. The first storm weakened while the second storm intensified. Their paths met northeast of Hesston and the first tornado could be seen moving around the second storm before the two combined into one. Today, the threat for severe weather lies over much of the northern U.S.

6/18/2014 12pm

The sun is shining now out in hays...but a storm threat will move into the state this afternoon and this evening. Rodney Price is in the storm center with your storm team 12 forecast.

6/19/2014 5am

Partly to mostly cloudy skies, muggy and mild this a.m. Wind are still gusty across the east with lighter breezes for the west. It's warm and muggy again too. Expect another breezy, warm, humid day with scattered strong or severe storms for central and eastern Kansas after about 3 p.m. Highs will not be as hot Thursday - low to mid to upper 80s to near 90 statewide.

6/20/2014 4:30am

We have some morning clouds, even a few spotty showers. No huge impact from either expected for your Air Capital Classic forecast. Pack the sunscreen and keep hydrated!

6/21/2014 10pm

We're tracking thunderstorms on hd super Doppler. Storms have had a history of quarter size hail and are moving east. This area in western Kansas is under a slight risk of severe weather. Hail and some wind are the main concerns. Here's a look at current temperatures. Hd future track shows showers and storms tonight which should weaken later tonight. More storms should develop tomorrow afternoon. Here's tonight's forecast. Here's a look at Sunday's forecast. And now your 7-day forecast.

6/23/2014 6pm

Scattered storms are showing up in parts of Kansas. More chances for storms coming over the next few days.

6/24/2014 12pm

A few thunderstorms are moving across north central and northwest Kansas. Locally heavy rainfall may cause some brief street flooding in areas between Colby and Hays. Isolated severe storms will be possible this evening along the Colorado line.

6/27/2014 4:30am

Recent rain is helping corn farmers here in Kansas. A new drought map shows more parts of south central Kansas improving from extreme to severe drought. The rain couldn't have come at a better time for the corn crop. A Ness County farmer says he's stopped running his irrigation systems and doesn't expect to have to pump water for another couple of weeks. Wheat farmers aren't as fortunate. We spoke to one out of Ness City who tells us that the rain was too late for him. He only expects a quarter of the wheat harvest he had last year.

6/28/2014 10pm

The storms have mainly moved out of our area, but we could see some more before too long. Meteorologist Rodney Price is tracking our next chance for rain.

6/29/2014 10pm

Here's more of the western Kansas flooding Ross mentioned. You can see high water over highway 83 just south of Oakley this morning. That's in Logan County. Just east in Winona... High water made this road impassable today. Ashley sent us this video. If you come across water like this on the road, turn around. It only takes about 6 inches of water to stall out an average car and leave you stranded.

6/30/2014 4:30am

First drought...now downpour. The latest rain is putting a halt on farmers cutting wheat. An agronomist who studies crops tells eyewitness news the worst wheat is in Anthony and the best so far is in Haven and Hutchinson. But no matter what the crop looks like... Many farmers are at a standstill because of all the recent rain. We talked to a farmer today who says the rain has turned his fields into a swamp. Curt Hoobler has been farming wheat for 35 years. But this year is different. Hoobler grows two thousand acres of wheat. He's got about ten percent of that left to cut. To salvage the rest, Hoobler is hoping the rain will take a break. Recent rain has caused a slow down for harvesters in many parts of the state. Wet wheat stalks means a combine struggles to cut. Wet soil means farm machinery could sink. And wet fields wash away chemicals meaning weeds. While this rain is hurting his wheat harvest, Hoobler says it will really help his other crops. He says his corn and soybeans might even make up for the bad wheat. Hoobler says the upcoming holiday is actually somewhat of a deadline for farmers. He says wheat farmers in the Mulvane area try to have cutting finished every year by the fourth of July. Hoobler agrees with other farmers across the state who have told us the weather has decreased the value and quality of wheat this year.

4/2/2014 6am

April is child abuse prevention month. Children held a rally Tuesday in Topeka. Governor Sam Brownback was there helping kids plant pinwheels as a way to acknowledge the children who have been abused. Reports of suspected abuse in Kansas have doubled in the last decade.

4/3/2014 5am

The Kansas department of transportation plans to close more lanes of eye-one-35 today. It's still assessing a damaged bridge in Harvey county. The bridge was damaged after being hit by a large truck Tuesday night. For now... All lanes of eye-one-35 leading to the 24th street bridge are open. Expect it to change later this morning.

4/4/2014 4:30am

A Hutchinson man was taken to the hospital after being struck by a van while crossing the street late last night. Hutchinson police say the driver of the van was passing through the intersection at 2nd and Main Street under a green light when he collided with the 24 year old in the intersection crosswalk. The man was taken to the hutch hospital. Then flow to Wichita for possible head injuries. No arrests have been made.

4/9/2014 12pm

We're following breaking news from south Wichita. A man is in serious condition after he falls from a window at an apartment complex near Pawnee and Seneca. Dispatchers say they don't know how the 28-year-old fell... But say he received multiple cuts. We have a crew at the scene trying to gather more details. Watch for updates tonight at four, five and six.

4/10/2014 6am

An accident or a crime? We find out soon if any charges will be filed in a deadly house fire in Pratt. Twin boys were killed last December when their home was destroyed by fire. Jayden and Jayce Ibarra were 23 months old. At first, the fire was ruled an accident, but the Pratt county police department opened its own investigation. Eyewitness news spoke with the Pratt county attorney Wednesday. He says he'll "decide soon" whether to file charges.

4/11/2014 5am

Residents in west Wichita learn more about a toxic chemical found in their water. Many people are worried about how it affects their health this morning. Lauren Seabrook joins tells us about some of their concerns. Questions about the health effects from contaminated water ... Some residents have been drinking for years ... Maybe even decades. The Kansas department of health and environment is providing residents with three 5-gallon water bottles a week - for now. They say the contaminated water is safe to use for watering lawns or washing cars ... But that's about it. Some residents already know their water can't be used ... While others are waiting to hear their results. Meanwhile ... Many are worried about how this will affect property values. K-d-h-e will investigate whether the former "four seasons dry cleaner" that caused the contamination was doing everything they could to prevent it. K-d-h-e expects the entire corrective process to cost the agency a few million dollars but doesn't anticipate residents taking on any of those expenses.

4/12/2014 10pm

There was another fire... this one at the La Crosse high school gym. The school's superintendent tells us a spotlight being used for prom caught some of the decoration on fire. The decoration fell and set parts of the gym floor on fire. The fire department was called in and was able to contain the blaze. No one was in the school at the time. The superintendent says the La Crosse high

school building is off limits until further notice ... And prom has been moved to a nearby community building.

4/17/2014 5am

A school district is insisting there's no public health risk after a student dies from complication of bacterial meningitis. The Louisburg district confirmed the death earlier this week. Bacterial meningitis typically occurs in household or dormitory settings. A health expert says the department of health and environment has not recommended taking preventative action in regard to the death.

4/18/2014 4:30am

This morning we want to warn you about a scam that targeting grandparents for money. The scam begins with a phone call from a person claiming to be grandchild. It always ends with a plea for money. This man who won't reveal his name, used to be on the other end of the line. The 31-year-old is awaiting sentencing in California for his role in the "grandparent scam" part of the elaborate scheme was run out of Canada...he would call senior citizens in the u-s impersonating a grandchild in distress...begging for cash. Its estimated senior citizens are robbed out of roughly three billion dollars a year in financial scams. The scams are often run from different countries and the con artists usually buy lists with their victims personal information...including age and income.

4/19/2014 10pm

Two people are dead after a collision in Ellis County last night. The Kansas highway patrol says a pickup truck blew through a stop sign at the intersection of u-s 183 and feedlot road. It was hit on the driver's side by another pickup, killing the driver of the first vehicle and a passenger in the second. Authorities identified the driver who was killed as 40-year-old Jesse (fan-un-steel) pfannenstiel of woodston. And the passenger as 26-year-old Justin Kennedy of Greensburg. Two other people were taken to hays medical center.

4/20/2014 10pm

A few lingering rain showers will continue into the overnight hours and early Monday morning. The chance for rain should end in far western Kansas by early Monday too. Lows will be mild overnight, with most areas staying in the 50s. Winds will be light from the south. Monday should be dry in the west where sunshine will be abundant, but there is still a chance for lingering showers central and east. Highs will reach the mid 70s for most of the state. North winds will be gusty through early afternoon, then begin diminishing closer to evening. Tuesday will be sunny and warmer before a strong storm system approaches from the west, bringing a chance for thunderstorms to the area Wednesday evening. Some of them could be severe. Stay tuned.

4/23/2014 6am

Folks in Barton County are remembering a county commissioner this morning. Don Cates died Tuesday in a plane crash in Pawnee County. He was flying northwest of Garfield when the plane hit a power line. The Kansas highway patrol says...the plane then nose-dived into a ditch. Friends tell us Cates loved flying. He also was a decorated military hero...with service in Vietnam. Cates was a former commercial pilot and was elected as a Barton County commissioner four years ago.

4/25/2014 4:30am

A Factfinder 12- don't fall for it this morning. For residents of Garden City. The Garden City electrical department has heard from concerned citizens- who report getting phone calls from people claiming to be from the electrical department. The caller says their meter isn't working and it will cost 6-hundred dollars to replace it. The caller i-d shows the calls came from the city electrical department main number. This is a scam. The garden city electrical department isn't calling and asking for payments. Police are investigating the phone calls.

4/26/2014 10pm

With severe weather possible, people in Andover are taking steps to prepare for a potential disaster. It has been 23 years to the day since an f-5 tornado tore through Andover. 17 people were killed, and much of the town saw significant damage. So today, butler county emergency teams hit the county landfill. Crews practiced rescue operations that would be required if another severe storm were to hit. Workers at the landfill built special rescue scenarios out of debris to challenge the rescuers. The organizer of this training says for many of the first responders... This is their first look at what a major disaster might look like.

4/30/2014 12pm

We have new information on two deadly crashes. The first happened this morning on i-70 in Trego County. That's where a pick-up pulling a U-Haul trailer collided with a greyhound bus. The driver of the pick-up was killed... Six people on the bus were hurt.

5/1/2014 5am

Now Kansas leaders are weighing in on the botched execution. They say there are protocols in place if something goes wrong. Kansas department of correction officials say what happened in Oklahoma was a tragedy. Jeremy Barclay says he and other leaders are taking a closer look at our death penalty process so there's no duplication of what happened in Oklahoma. Keep in mind...the Kansas coalition against the death penalty says the last execution in the state was in 1965. Two people were hanged. The Kansas department of corrections says the state is years away from executing anyone---and that's mainly because of the appeal process. Kansas is one of 33 states that has the death penalty.

5/2/2014 5am

A Wichita police captain is taking over as police chief in Bel Aire. Darrell Atteberry will begin his new job as chief may 27-th. Atteberry had been with the Wichita police department since 19-81. He replaces john daily, who retired a few months ago because of medical issues.

5/7/2014 5am

Parenting experts say... cases like this are a growing problem. all parents make mistakes, sooner or later. While some things may seem obvious to many of us, for others that's not the case. They say... in the long run, the most important thing is to keep the child safe. if the child can't call for help in an emergency... or escape the home... then leaving the child alone is *not* a safe option.

5/8/2014 5am

The district attorney will now consider filing charges against the parents of a one-year-old found in an apartment closet. It happened at the twin rivers apartment complex in west Wichita Tuesday. Police say, the mother left the 18-month-old child sleeping in the closet while she took the child's father to work. Maintenance crews working on an air conditioning unit found the child. The boy is now with his grandma.

5/9/2014 4:30am

If you have to replace your roof...you might want to follow these tips factfinder 12 has for you. Never pay for services up-front. Legit companies will deal with your insurance company... They will not ask for cash up-front. If you suspect you've been contacted by a scammer... Call police dispatch. If you hire a company, make sure that it is licensed, registered with the state of Kansas, and bonded. You can check the state's roofer registry online... There's a link at kwch-dot-com... You'll find it in the "on-air links section."

5/14/2014 12pm

Health officials are stepping up precautions to prevent the spread of mers. That's "middle east respiratory syndrome". Beginning today signs will be posted at airports across the country warning passengers about the illness. It's made hundreds of sick overseas and can be deadly. There have been two confirmed cases of people bringing it to the u-s. Mers is a respiratory illness that begins with fever and cough but can lead to shortness of breath, pneumonia and death.

5/15/2014 5am

A factfinder 12 don't fall for it. it's a scam we've told you about before. Police warn it's moved into Pratt county. Here's how the scam works...you get a call from a man claiming to be with the city. In this case it's the Pratt electrical department. The caller then tells you that you owe money and if you don't send it today your electricity will be cut off. Pratt city and Pratt county never call billing you or threatening to cut off your services. Their best advice...if you get a call from anyone you don't know or by someone claiming to be from the government demanding money just hang up.

5/16/2014 4:30am

More than 70 percent of American adults are Facebookers. It's great for keeping up with friends and family...and posting pet photos...but what about relying on severe weather information? More and more of us are...and Jim Grawe is here to show us why we shouldn't. It's where kids and pets and politics all coexist your Facebook feed is a smorgasbord of stuff. Great for finding a new desert recipe....and for a busy college student like Joe Harder...the place to get the latest news and weather information. But social media Guru Cheryl Gnad says, hold on! There's something you need to know. That's a fancy way of saying that Facebook is filtering the information you see. A lot of posts from pages you've signed up for....may never show up in your Facebook feed. She says it's because Facebook is trying to get organizations and businesses to buy ads. If a post is paid for...then you can be sure it'll show up on your feed. Otherwise...you can only expect to see one in six messages posted...even if they are warning you about severe weather. So...the national weather service in Wichita established a policy: instead, the weather service uses Facebook to provide supplemental information...or to announce an approaching threat....but not anything of an urgent or imminent nature. At the top of the list he suggests a weather app like the stormteam 12 app. There you can constantly monitor the weather....and get severe weather alerts the moment they're issued. And that's even more convenient than Facebook....because the audible alerts can warn you even when you're not looking at your phone. Twitter doesn't filter out posts...but that can make you miss things also because your feed becomes so cluttered. Twitter also has just a fraction of the users Facebook does.

5/17/2014 10pm

An update now on a story we told you about today at six. An elderly man reported missing out of derby has been found. A silver alert was issued for Floyd tiffany this afternoon. He has since been located in Oklahoma and is now safe.

5/19/2014 6pm

For the first time the c-e-o of an Andover nursing home addresses accusations of patient abuse. The investigation led to federal fines of more than 150-thousand dollars. Anne Meyer is live in Andover with the response. Roger that amount is climbing tonight - because the Victoria Falls skilled nursing center here in Andover is still being fined 1000-dollars per day until it becomes fully compliant. Even though it's not fully compliant... The facility has been allowed to take in new patients again after an agreement with the department of aging. The Andover police department began an investigation into abuse at Victoria Falls last January. But c-e-o Dennis Bush said today he did not learn specifics about that investigation until March. At that time, one employee was fired. Then in April, two other employees were suspended. But we do not know specifics of the allegations. Bush says he has worked out a plan of correction with the Kansas department of

aging and disability services and he is doing his own internal study of what happened. Dennis bush only read this statement; he refused to answer any questions about what happened or the plan of correction. I did talk to the butler county attorney today - who says a charge has been filed against one employee, for mistreatment of a dependent adult. That employee is scheduled to appear in court June 16th.

5/20/2014 5am

A 10 year old boy safe at home this evening in Wichita. Last night police issued an "endangered run-away alert" for the child...which is different from an amber alert. Fact finder 12 shows you the differences between the two alert systems...for an amber alert; a child must have been abducted. They also must have evidence or suspect that the child is in immediate harm. The endangered child or runaway alert is different. Police use this if a child has not been kidnapped but could still be in harm's way. Officers say they use this alert if the child is under 13 has disabilities or lacks the skills to stay safe on their own. Police say the alert has been an effective tool. Wichita law enforcement say this is part of an effort to be more transparent and get more children back home.

5/21/2014 5am

A new state law changes how law enforcement agencies across the state deal with seized weapons. Currently, cities and counties to determine what to do with guns they seize. Some destroy the weapons. Others sell them back to dealers. The new law allows guns to be sold. Reno county sheriff randy Henderson says his county has been trading seized weapons for years. He says, the trade-in program allows his department to upgrade its equipment. The new law goes into effect July first. However, not all weapons are allowed to be resold under the law. Those weapons are destroyed.

5/22/2014 6am

A frantic parent on the phone with 9-1-1. This mom called for help after a 12-year-old girl took her husband's s-u-v with her daughter inside. It happened Sunday morning. Police tried to get the girl to stop, but she wouldn't. On the 9-1-1 tape you can hear the mother pleading with dispatchers not to hurt her little girl. The vehicle came to a stop after hitting a parked car. The girls inside were detained and turned over to Wichita police.

5/23/2014 4:30am

You should be aware of a recent post office scam. It's a factfinder 12 don't fall for it. The post office in Marion says... It has received complaints of fake emails. Those emails claim the post office is holding onto a package.... and you need to "click a link" for more information on how to pick it up. If you do click it... a virus will download onto your computer. The post office never contacts customers by e-mail about packages it's holding. If you do receive one of these emails, don't click the link. Instead, let the u-s postal inspection service know about it. You can do that by forwarding the scam email to "spam at u-s-p-i-s dot gov."

5/28/2014 12pm

New at noon, we now know the man who drown in Milford lake Sunday was a Salina resident. Search crews are still working to recover the body. The identity of the victim has not yet been released but we do know it was a 65-year-old man. Investigators say he fell off a pontoon boat while going after a fishing pole.

5/30/2014 5am

We did reach out to officials with the bob dole v-a facility today. They didn't want to go on camera but someone with public affairs did answer some of our questions via email. We asked...do you have a waiting list for patient treatment? The reply- yes and they use the v-a approved electronic wait list. They also tell us they have not received any complaints. We also asked if they've had to deal with any investigators to which they replied...no.

5/31/2014 10pm

Police release new information on an accidental death in downtown Wichita. They say a medical condition likely played a role. They say a medical condition likely caused the man to fall while on a service elevator. He was killed after his head was caught between the floor and a wall. It happened yesterday morning in the 100 block of north rock island. Police say the victim worked for a company called *restoration & waterproofing.

6/3/2014 5pm

This problem isn't just limited to Wichita. At least 42 v-a medical centers are under investigation, but authorities aren't saying which ones. C-B-S news has confirmed hospitals in Arizona, Wyoming, Illinois, and Florida are part of the investigation. At the phoenix hospital, at least 17 hundred veterans waiting to see a doctor were never scheduled for an appointment.

6/5/2014 5am

We're learning more about a deadly accident in newton. 28-year-old crystal Stauffer died after she was hit by a car Tuesday afternoon. The driver was not hurt and stopped to call 9-11. No charges have been filed at this time but the accident does remain under investigation. Stauffer was a physical education teacher at Santa Fe middle school in newton. She and her husband Andrew just married nearly a year ago... And were both active members in their church. The school Stauffer taught at plans to honor her in their own way when classes resume in August.

6/6/2014 4:30am

New this morning, a female motorcyclist is in critical condition right now after crashing into a home in south-east Wichita. Disptachers tell us it happened just before 3 this morning in the 1200 block of south Todd near Webb road and i-35. Hannah Davis is at that scene right now. Hannah what's the latest? Emergency crews are on scene of a motorcycle crash in southeast Wichita. A Sedgwick county emergency dispatcher tells us a woman rider is in critical condition after possibly hitting a home. It's not know what led up to it. The crash happened just after 2:45 Friday morning in the 1200 block of s. Todd near Webb and i-35.

6/7/2014 10pm

Hazmat crews are finishing up at the scene of a chemical leak at a business in south-west Wichita. Nearly 7 hours after the leak was reported at farmland foods. The ammonia leak forced more than 100 workers to evacuate. One person was hospitalized with serious injuries after inhaling the chemical. Cleanup crews told us they were relying partly on winds to help dissipate the ammonia. Ammonia poisoning is a serious health risk. Depending on its severity, it can cause a variety of symptoms such as chest pains, fever and vomiting. In very severe cases, it can be deadly.

6/8/2014 10pm

Part of a Wichita meat packing plant will remain closed tomorrow. Hazmat crews were still at farmland foods today, trying to get ammonia gas out of the building. About 100 employees were evacuated from the building near Pawnee and Sheridan yesterday afternoon after a leak was reported. One employee hospitalized because of the gas has been released.

6/9/2014 5pm

New information tonight about how long veterans are waiting for care at the nation's v-a hospitals. More than 100 Kansas veterans have waited more than 90 days for their appointments with v-a hospitals and clinics. That's according to an audit released today. It found 57 thousand nationwide waiting more than three months. I talked to Congressman Tim Huelskamp today--he drove to Wichita last week demanding answers and says he still has more. Congressman Tim Huelskamp says...this is only a start. Here's what we've learned -- a new veterans affairs audit that found 110 Kansas vets waiting for appointments for 90 days or more. 104 of those at the bob

dole medical center. The audit also found...nationwide 13 percent of va schedulers reported supervisors telling them to falsify appointment dates to make waiting times appear shorter. While the report found 104 waiting more than 90 days... We reported last week an official with the dole v-a hospital told the associated press 385 patients were on an unauthorized list. Are these different lists? The bob dole v-a has answered few questions...for the media...or Kansas representatives. But Huelskamp says he has received two calls from employees inside the hospital...and wants more. I also talked to Senator Jerry Moran's office today. People in Ellis may lose access to water today. A water main broke near 12th and Washington this morning. City crews are working to fix it, but if repairs are unsuccessful, crews will have to shut down water to the town. It could be turned off for up to 4 hours.

Health care leaders say it's a minute that could save a life. Those 60 seconds are the time it takes for a surgical "time out". That's the time before surgery where everyone stops to go over a pre-surgical checklist to make sure everything is right. Local health care providers in Wichita joined together Wednesday to unveil a universally accepted protocol for surgery time outs. It's a disease having a huge impact on the u-s pork industry. And hog farmers in Kansas are working to prevent the spread of it. The disease is known as the "p-e-d virus." Thousands of pigs nationwide have been infected. Earlier this month.... The u-s department of agriculture announced millions of dollars in funding to fight the disease. The organization also issued a federal order requiring the report of any new detections of the virus to state animal health officials. About 200 cases have been reported in Kansas.

6/16/2014 5am

Factfinder 12 wanted to know what local communities are doing to control the mosquito population.

As we mentioned in our story, Sedgwick County and the city of Wichita are watching mosquito traps. Once they get the results... They'll place larv-i-cide discs in storm drains as needed... Those kill larvae. In the next few weeks, Park City will start fogging to control mosquitoes.

6/18/2014 12pm

That breaking news from northeast Wichita, where firefighters are working to put out an apartment fire. Crews were called to the area near 37th and rock within the last half hour. 911 dispatchers say one person is hurt. They are being treated for smoke inhalation. We have a crew on the way, and will bring you updates as we get them.

6/20/2014 4:30am

You will soon be able to bring concealed guns into the state house. Legislative leaders refused to use authority granted to them to block holders of concealed carry permits from entering. Leaders had to act this month to block the policy. Its part of a law passed this year. Lawmakers are already allowed to carry concealed firearms.

6/21/2014 10pm

Three harper county teens are still recovering at a Wichita hospital. After a fatal accident Friday. Two other teens were killed in the crash. Devon Fasbinder talked to friends of the boys who say the towns of harper and Anthony are still in shock. Jade... Friends of the five teens involved in the crash say the boys were all well known, funny and respected by the community. In the small towns of Anthony and Harper, many shook their heads and said they couldn't believe this happened. All that remains of the accident at the intersection of 80th and 10th in harper county is some broken glass and pieces of what was two cars carrying several teens. On Friday, three boys were heading east on 80th and two others were heading north on 10th when their cars collided. That corner shows the damage. The pole has marks and scratches. The street sign shows the strength of the impact....bent and full of dirt. Lieutenant Bryan quick says the state highway patrol is trying to figure out how it happened. Two boys Ayrton Maurer and Sam cook were set to graduate next year. They died in the accident. Three others are still in a hospital in Wichita. Friends of the boys say the community is still in shock. Good kids this community says it will miss. People in harper tell me the boys who died in the accident were both very talented. Ayrton Maurer was involved in baseball at the high school and Sam Cook was a talented musician. Kansas highway patrol says it still has some questions to investigate. There wasn't a stop sign at the intersection... So officers want to know why one of the vehicles didn't yield. Also a 15 year old was driving one of the vehicles involved in the crash. He had a passenger with him who was also 15. The highway patrol says since he only had his farmer's permit... He shouldn't have had a minor in his vehicle. No tickets have been issued at this time and the crash is still under investigation.

6/27/2014 4:30am

More problems for general motors this morning. The company is now recalling 29-thousand Chevy Cruzes because air bags are built with the wrong part. This comes just one day after g-m dealers were ordered to stop selling 2013 and 2014 models. Parts of the air bag could separate in a crash and be thrown into the car....possibly hurting people inside. U-s-a today says it's also possible the air bag may not inflate. Nearly 10 million vehicles with air bags from supplier Takata have been recalled since 2008.

6/28/2014 10pm

A car... Narrowly misses a woman in northwest Wichita before crashing into her garage. This security video captured it all. It's a story we first told you about it last night. Emily griffin spoke with the homeowners and brings us their reaction. A few quiet moments on the front steps turned to near tragedy for the Robison family on Friday night. Watch this security video... Amy Robison is watering her flowers in front when she sees the incoming car just in time to jump out of the way before it goes plowing through the garage. Amazingly... No one was hurt. But damage to the home and Eric's ca is pretty extensive. The homeowners had already had a temporary wall put up to over the hole, but their garage is still full of debris including parts of the suspects' car. There were two people inside the car when it drove into the house. Police suspect they might have been going up to 60 miles an hour. Something Eric says he's seen on this corner one too many times. Lawmakers are making their final push for school funding today. Last night both branches in the state house advanced their funding proposals. And today the state house's school funding bill is scheduled to go up for full debate. The proposed measure contains an additional 141-million-dollars in aid for the next school year. The committee backed off payment reductions for teacher pensions... transportation programs, online classes, and programs for at-risk children.

4/5/2014 5am

Here's a look at some of the other measures now awaiting for governor's signature. They include A bill that would have Kansas join a so-called compact, hoping to exempt the state from federal health care laws. That move would require Congressional approval. Plus there's A bill to keep a ban on Medicaid expansion in place - otherwise it was set to expire in 2015. Lawmakers also passed a measure to get rid of a requirement on abortion providers' websites - they no longer need to call the state's information on pregnancy "accurate and objective." Voters in Kingman are deciding whether to approve a sales tax that would fund a new jail and law enforcement center. Taxes would go up one cent. Polls are open until 7 o'clock tonight.

4/9/2014 12pm

Continuing coverage of the court battle over Kansas election rules. Federal election officials appeal the judge's ruling, requiring them to help fully enforce state proof-of-citizenship laws. Last month a federal judge ordered that national voter registration forms include special instructions for people living in Kansas and Arizona. Right now... *federal* forms do *not* have details for people to show proof-of-citizenship. Only *state* voter registration forms do. The judge has not yet ruled on requests by federal election officials to put his order on hold during the appeals process.

4/11/2014 5am

A new health and human services director will be announced today. The president is expected to announce Sylvia Burwell to the top health spot. The wall street journal reports she has spent months as a budget director working on relations between the white house and republicans on taxes and spending. Burwell is set to replace Kathleen Sibelius. She's stepping down after 5 years on the job. The former Kansas governor took on heavy criticism when the affordable care act was launched. A president's senior official says Sibelius planned to step down after enrollment period was over.

4/14/2014 5pm

The education funding bill is now on the governor's desk - he got it about five hours ago. That starts a ten day clock for Brownback to take action. Anne Meyer asked what he plans to do. Brownback says he's still looking at it - so is the Wichita school board. That's why I'm outside of north high school. The board is meeting here in less than an hour = and tonight they will get a good look at what this funding bill will mean for Wichita public schools. Earlier today, governor Sam Brownback was at Wichita state - to tour the campus and talk about the recently approved state funding for higher education. But outside, he was once again met by protesters, who are upset about the k-through-12 funding bill, and specifically the state's move to take away a due process requirement, which pays for teachers to have a hearing before they can be fired. The

governor tells me he cannot line-item veto the due process portion of the bill - so it's either all or nothing decision -- one that he says he plans make before the ten day deadline is up. Back to you. Lawmakers are on break right now = they will return to Topeka again on April 30th, to finish up the session

4/15/2014 12pm

Kansas and Arizona get more time to respond, in a case over the new voter citizenship requirements. In March a judge ordered federal election officials to modify *national voter registration forms with special instructions for Kansas and Arizona residents about proof-of-citizenship requirements. Those officials asked for the ruling to be put on hold. The judge has now given states until Friday to file arguments on the ruling.

4/19/2014 10pm

First lady Michelle Obama's upcoming appearance in Topeka continues to cause outcries from students and parents. The first lady is set to deliver the commencement speech on May 17th in front of graduating seniors from Topeka's five high schools. She's speaking on the 60th anniversary of brown verses board of education ruling. Despite the district increasing the number of tickets per students, many are worried since the schools will be combined there won't be enough room for all the guests. Currently, students are being given six tickets for family and friends. That's up from the original plan to only allow four tickets per student. Organizers say they still have some last minute arrangements to make for viewing on a large screen at a different venue. One student has even started a petition to have district officials "rethink" the limit on tickets.

4/22/2014 5am

Covering Kansas, a fixture of Kansas politics for more than 30 years, is back in his home state tonight. Bob dole is in the middle of a three day tour of Kansas, and today he made a stop in Lawrence. Anne Meyer was there to hear his message to future politicians. Former senator bob dole says one of his greatest accomplishments was keeping in touch with the people of Kansas - and that's what this tour is all about. Always one to tell jokes, former Kansas senator bob dole used humor to reminisce on many of his Triumphs in politics. He also told the crowd, of his wish for the leaders of today to work together. He re-filed last week but his opponent...Doctor Milton Wolf...has filed an objection...trying to get him kicked off the ballot. Wolf sent a letter to secretary of state Kris Kobach asking that Roberts' candidate filing be rejected claiming that he's not legally a resident of Kansas. Eyewitness news spoke with Kobach about the issue. Roberts was elected to the house in 19-80 and the senate in 19-96. He owns a duplex in Dodge City that is rented out and his voting residence is a room he rents at the home of a friend. Wolf is backed by the tea party and claims that Roberts can no longer claim residency in Dodge City.

5/12/2014 5am

U-s senator pat Roberts can run for re-election. That was the decision of a state board today... That heard objections to his candidacy. Pilar Pedraza tells us.... Those objecting don't think Roberts qualifies as a Kansas resident anymore. She continues our coverage now from Topeka. Six people came to the secretary of state's office here... To explain why they don't think pat Roberts should be allowed to run for re-election. They say he's not a resident of Kansas. Their

concern... That the current u-s senator doesn't have a home in Dodge City. Where he says he lives while keeping a house in Virginia just outside d-c. They say the bedroom and bathroom he rents from a Dodge City staffer doesn't count. Roberts didn't come to Topeka for the hearing because the u-s senate was in session. His attorney spoke for him... Saying Roberts has a Kansas driver's license... Pays state, county and city taxes.... And has every intention of living in Kansas when his service is up. Once they'd heard all the objections... It took the board just a few minutes to vote to let Roberts stay on the ballot. In Topeka, Pilar Pedraza, eyewitness news. Those who raised the objections today. Say they'll continue to make this a part of the coming campaign and hope Kansas voters will agree with them.

5/13/2014 5pm

Also today, the city council voted 5-to-2 to fund plans for a new central library. The 500-thousand dollars goes towards *design of the facility, which would be near exploration place. Opponents questioned whether that cost is necessary. The overall project will cost about 30 million dollars, and be subject to additional votes.

5/15/2014 5am

It's a letter meant to show the governor's policies are working- despite cutting taxes, the state is bringing in more than enough money to pay its bills. Again, numbers from research agency show the state actually ended 2013 with 280-million dollars. That's a 29-million-dollar increase from 20-11. Not the nearly 764 million increase Brownback's letter claimed. Friends university political science professor dr. Russell Arben fox says mistakes like this are nothing unusual. In a statement from Mark Dugan... Brownback's campaign manager. Dugan says the numbers aren't wrong. But the campaign letter used incorrect dates for the amounts of money in the bank. He says, and factfinder 12 confirmed, the numbers used in the letter were actually calculated six months prior to what the letter states. Professor Arben fox says most people getting who get letters like this one are already supporters of the campaign... And aren't likely to fact check. You might recall. The governor also used that 876-dollar figure during his state of the state address. But that time, used the correct date. As we get closer to the November election we'll have you covered at kwch dot com when it comes to everything you need to know before you head to the polls.

It's official. Governor Sam Brownback is seeking a second term as governor. Brownback filed for re-election Thursday. This would be his last term as governor, for at least 4 years. Kansas law allows a governor to serve only 2 consecutive terms. Brownback will face a primary challenge from Wichita landscaping business owner Jennifer Winn.

5/17/2014 10pm

Senator Pat Roberts apparently spent less than 100 days in Kansas over two years. That's according to u-s-a today, citing senate spending records. It claims that from July 20-11 through august 20-13, the senator spent a total of 97 days in the sunflower state. This comes as his residence recently came under fire by political opponents, who claimed Roberts actually lives in Virginia and only rents a room here in Kansas. However, the *state objections board* has ruled Roberts is a legal resident of Kansas.

And republican Sam Brownback faces Wichita business owner Jennifer Winn in the governor's race, with house minority leader Paul Davis expected to be the only democrat in the race.

6/4/2014 5am

Covering the nation, the Taliban released new video showing the final moments of army sergeant Bowe Bergdahl's captivity. But questions still surround his release and the prisoner exchange that won his freedom. Craig Boswell brings us the latest details. The Taliban released this video showing the handover of army sergeant Bowe Bergdahl to U.S. Special Forces in eastern Afghanistan. Bergdahl is quickly searched for possible explosives before being lifted into the helicopter and flying to freedom. The propaganda video then shows the Taliban's farewell message to its former hostage. But the rescue and recovery of America's only prisoner-of-war in Afghanistan is being overshadowed by controversy. Without notifying congress...as required by law...the U.S. released five Taliban leaders from Guantanamo Bay in exchange for Bergdahl's freedom. The White House is sending a team to Capitol Hill to provide a classified briefing to the full Senate this afternoon. But a similar briefing for a smaller group Tuesday did little to calm outrage over the prisoner release. There's also anger from some of Bergdahl's fellow soldiers who say he walked off his post. A petition on the White House website calling for Bergdahl to be court-martialed has already received 15-thousand signatures. Craig Boswell, CBS News, Capitol Hill. Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel says it's unfair to the Bergdahl family to presume the sergeant did anything wrong when he left his unit. He says the army will review the circumstances surrounding his capture.

These are words from a former prisoner of war. John Mock of Eureka served in the army back in the 1940s. He was taken captive along with hundreds of other Americans when their team moved into German territory. Mock has been following the Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl release closely. An investigation is underway to find out whether Bergdahl deserted his base camp or just wandered away. Mock says the exchange... Means many Americans.. Especially those overseas are in even more danger. Last night... We heard from a man working in Kansas who served in Afghanistan with Sgt. Bergdahl. He says... Bergdahl simply walked away in the middle of the night. You can watch that report ... On kwch.com.

That's right, I kind of think of it as the ultimate recycling. A lot of this stuff would probably end up in a landfill or things like that, but instead, it's being put to good use. That's right, so if you have a spring project, you're doing some spring cleaning going through your garage and finding lots of supplies you haven't used yet or haven't used in awhile, bring it here instead of trying to throw it out. That's right, and you get them a pretty good discounts too, including those tiles over there. Can you imagine buying that many tiles for that cheap of price? In addition to some tile that Shane and I were just looking at, Re-Store is looking for doors and windows, knobs, painting supplies, lumber. Looking at some of this tile, lots of the projects that people want to look for are needed

in bulk. The Re-Store funds go to benefit Habitat for Humanity. The basic mission for Habitat for Humanity is to help people who may not be able to afford it, build homes of their own. Since 1986, over 200 families have benefitted here in the Wichita area. But in addition to a new home, Habitat for Humanity steps in to give these families financial education classes and workshops to maintain their new beautiful home. Later that night, Kelley, believing an intruder had gained access to her home, drew her gun. She then realized the “intruder” was actually Peatross. Kelley says there was a struggle for the gun, with Peatross telling her “I’m not going to live my life without you,” and then he shot himself. He was dead at the scene. Police were initially leery of Kelley’s story and interviewed her on cell phone video immediately following the shooting. This video became important to the case when police claimed that she changed her version of what happened days later. Famed Orlando Chief Medical Examiner and reality show star Dr. Jan Garavaglia also had doubts about Kelley’s version of events. Kelley was arrested and charged with Peatross’ murder. Secrets then came to light regarding Peatross: he was still married, which was one of the reasons a previous girlfriend had left him, something Caryn Kelley was unaware of. Throughout her ordeal, Kelley always said that Peatross was responsible for his own death. In May 2013, the trial began, with prosecutors using what they said were Kelley’s different stories, along with autopsy findings to build their case. Kelly’s lawyer was able to use the cell phone video and differing forensic opinions to Kelly’s advantage, and she was found not guilty. **On-screen text graphic:** Caryn Kelly’s gun was legal in Florida. At the time of her death, she was involved with Stephen Nodine, a well-liked Alabama politician with connections in Washington D.C. Though married and the father of a young son, Nodine dated Downs for six years. Friends and family say Angel wanted him to get a divorce, but he refused to give up his double life. On the night of her death, Nodine says he dropped Downs off, and then left to go back to his wife. Within two weeks, Stephen Nodine was indicted for murder and arrested. The timing raised eyebrows, because District Attorney Judy Newcomb was up for re-election, something which Nodine’s attorney says was an opportunity to have some high-profile prosecution immediately before the election. Nodine’s problems multiplied: he was charged with a violation of the seldom-used federal statute which prohibits drug users from using guns. Much of the evidence in the case was circumstantial, including alleged stalking and beatings, and a previous suicide attempt by Downs. Even the state’s own Medical Examiner Eugene Hart could not settle on the circumstances of death. He called it inconclusive. The Georgia State Medical Examiner was called in; he deemed Downs’ death a homicide. Jurors deliberated and a mistrial was declared. Stephen Nodine was a free man for four months; he agreed to plead guilty to the federal gun charge -- possessing a gun while using drugs. After convening a new grand jury, the new District Attorney Hallie Dixon, made the decision that Nodine not be charged again with murder. The family then went over Dixon’s head and demanded a Special Prosecutor. Nodine was to be retried for murder. Surprisingly, there was a plea deal and an admission -- the prosecutors did not have proof beyond a reasonable doubt in the case. The state of Alabama dropped the murder and stalking charges. Nodine pled guilty to perjury for lying on a legal form. He also agreed to plead no contest to a charge that he harassed Angel Downs with e-mails and text messages. **On Screen Text Graphic:** Stephen Nodine is prohibited from having any contact with the family of Angel Downs. After serving his two year sentence, Nodine will be on supervised probation for three years. He says he has

Her son, Pelle Wall, believes that his father, pediatrician Dr. Johnny Wall, may have been responsible for her drowning death. Von Schwedler, a university research scientist, was found in the bathtub of her Salt Lake City, Utah, home by her then-boyfriend, Nils Abramson. When the autopsy report was released, the cause of death was stated as drowning, but the manner of her death was listed as “undetermined”, leaving open the possibility of suicide. Her son, Pelle Wall, believed it was murder and was determined to prove his father was responsible. Investigation revealed long-standing issues between Von Schwedler and Wall, many existing before their 2006 divorce -- involving affairs, allegations of abuse and lingering anger. Pelle Wall, who lived at the time with his father and siblings, was determined to get people to believe him and risked everything, including his relationship with his father and future financial security, by filing a wrongful death suit against his father. Police and prosecutors became interested and the state now believes there was probable cause for murder. The investigation determined Douglas’ marriage was in trouble, his wife Brenna was in debt, and that Thomas had once worked with Brenna. The case went cold until a tipster called police from Florida, saying that his friend and former bandmate, Jim Huden, who was also from Whidbey Island, had admitted to him that he killed Douglas and that Huden’s then-girlfriend, Betty Sue Thomas, was also involved. Huden disappeared in 2004, and it was eventually discovered that Huden’s wife, Jean Huden, had helped him to get out of the country. In the meantime, Betty Sue Thomas married Mark Allen, a multi-millionaire oilman and thoroughbred horse owner. The marriage was over in seven months with Thomas becoming a wealthy woman. By 2011, Jean Huden’s life eventually fell apart, and she began cooperating with investigators. Jim Huden was arrested in Mexico, returned to the U.S., stood trial and was found guilty of murder. Betty Sue Thomas was also arrested. Just weeks before the trial was about to begin, Thomas was offered and accepted a plea deal on a reduced charge of rendering criminal assistance. She still claims she is innocent, but she wouldn’t have gotten a fair trial. **On-Screen Text Graphic:** Under the terms of her plea deal, even if additional evidence is uncovered, Peggy Sue Thomas cannot be charged with murder. Peggy Sue Thomas is eligible for parole on August 12, 2016. Jim and Jean Huden are still legally married. They have not spoken in years. Williams was shot dead in his suburban Dallas home, but how it happened is up for debate because, when Michele called police, she said an intruder had shot her husband. Investigation revealed that Williams had been shot with his own gun and that the weapon, as well as the wrench used to hit Michele, were wiped clean of fingerprints. There were allegations of affairs and Michele says Greg was into the bondage/domination scene. As the investigation continued, Michele changed her story to say that Greg killed himself and she cleaned up the scene of his death in order to protect her young daughter from the truth. Family tensions were also evident: Williams' first wife said he was a complicated man who could be verbally abusive; Michele's estranged sons from previous relationships said she was not faithful and moved from man to man throughout their lives. Police believed that Michele was the killer. Due to lack of evidence, the District Attorney offered her a plea deal -- plead guilty to tampering with evidence and "deadly conduct", but just before the deal was completed, something happened to keep Michele out of jail: she was pregnant with twins, and the father was her son Lee's former best friend. Sentencing was delayed and she remained out of jail. Then tragedy struck, she lost the babies and the judge ordered her back to prison. Many family members believe that Michele was never really pregnant. Then, while being interviewed by 48 HOURS, Michele changed her story again - contradicting herself. The judge threw out the plea deal and ordered her to stand trial for murder. **On screen text graphic:** Michele Williams is scheduled to stand trial for murder this September. In 1988, David Jackson disappeared, but the case grew cold. In 2003, the case was re-opened with Detective Donna Velazquez in charge. By chance, Police Explorer recruit John Wolfe saw a poster and shocked police by stating that the man pictured was his father. Wolfe told investigators that he felt his mother, Barbara Britton, was holding back information about the crime and agreed to work with the police. Their investigation revealed: (1) the couple had married young, divorced and shared custody of their child; (2) Barbara married Michael Wolfe and relocated to Arizona; (3) Jackson fought and won visitation rights; (4) Jackson's father-in-law Harry Britton hated him. Detective Velazquez was convinced that Jackson was murdered and that his ex-wife had something to do with it -- and if she was involved, so was Michael Wolfe. Wolfe was arrested. During the interrogation he said that Barbara's father had wanted Jackson dead and had turned to him for advice about killing him. Both of Wolfe's ex-wives, Nancy Graham and Carole Larson, corroborated this information. Britton could not be arrested because all the information collected was considered hearsay. At trial, Michael Wolfe was convicted of murder. He then promised prosecutors evidence that would put Barbara Britton away. He told a story of how she and her father were deeply involved in the planning of the murder and that he had agreed to kill David Jackson to keep peace in the family. A few months later, Britton left him and filed for child support. Twenty-two years after Jackson's disappearance, Barbara Britton was arrested for murder. To avoid prison, she ultimately accepted a plea bargain to a reduced charge because the District Attorney recognized that they would probably not be able to obtain a first-degree murder conviction. **On screen text graphic:** Despite the plea deal John Wolfe continues to

support his mother, Barbara. He is estranged from his grandmother, Judy. John still hopes to be a police officer. He currently works as a security guard at a Florida shopping mall. Thomas was found dead in the bathtub of the Astoria, Queens apartment she shared with Jason Bohn. Thomas and Bohn had a whirlwind romance and she moved to New York to be with him. Everything seemed to be falling in place for the financial analyst, and while there was talk of marriage, the relationship had become physically and emotionally abusive. Police had been called. Bohn had been arrested for assault. Now, Bohn was arrested and charged with murder. Bohn’s defense is that an explosive moment of anger that resulted in Thomas’ death was directly connected to his bad childhood. Bohn’s attorney asserts he was abandoned by his mother Maureen O’Connell, a wealthy publishing executive, and he experienced profound neglect and abuse that caused a mental illness called Intermittent Explosive Disorder. Prosecutors dismissed his claims and they assert that audio recorded in an accidental phone call made while Thomas was still alive suggest Bohn knew exactly what he was doing. At trial, the Ivy League grad and Wall Street lawyer is found guilty of murder. **On screen text graphic:** Danielle’s mother plans to sue the police department for not responding to her daughter’s 911 call. Initially, police suspected Gerald Gallego, but he was in jail at the time of the murders. In 1989, police arrested Gallego’s half-brother David Hunt, his wife, Sue-Ellen and Richard Thompson and Doug Lainer, calling them The Hunt Group, and charging them creating a copycat murder to call into question Gallego’s guilt in other crimes. But, DNA would prove their innocence and the charges were dropped; still questions remained. In 2002, using advanced DNA technology, not available at the time of the murders, police were able to match samples stored in a FBI database to Richard Hirschfield, a convicted rapist, who was released from prison in 1980. Police interviewed Hirschfield’s brother, Joe -- who committed suicide the day after the interview. Based on information in his suicide note, police assume that Joe helped his brother. Richard Hirschfield was charged in the case. In 2012, 10 years after the DNA hit, and almost 32 years after the murders, the capital murder trial commences. Time has taken its toll: now 63-years-old and confined to wheelchair, Hirschfield is nothing like the menacing figure he once was. David Hunt, suffering from cancer, hopes to live to hear his name cleared, and the families hope to put an end to their suffering. The jury deliberates and the verdict is guilty. Hirschfield is sentenced to death. **On-screen text graphic:** Richard Hirschfield is appealing his conviction. David Hunt did not live to see his name cleared. The Albuquerque, New Mexico couple were shot dead in their home. Police immediately suspected their daughter, Renee, was involved. Family members also believed she knew more than she was telling and she was after the \$1 million insurance policy. The investigation stalled. In 2006, mortgage loan processor Ron Santiago turned himself in to the Secret Service for a crime unrelated to the murders. Investigation led to a connection between Santiago and the Ohlemachers. A search of his home led to shell casings that matched those found at the Ohlemacher crime scene. Eight years of legal wrangling followed. Before the trial, the District Attorney’s office asked Renee to take a polygraph test; results were inconclusive. The test would haunt prosecutors at trial when the jury was allowed to hear the results when she testified. Santiago was found not guilty. Family members still believe both Ron Santiago and Renee Olchmacher were involved in the crime. **On-screen text graphic:** Renee is working as a dog walker. Both girls had been talking to a man who called himself “Johnny”; a frantic search failed to locate Maria. The FBI took over the case but when her body was found five months later, the Illinois State Police took over the case, but it went cold. Almost fifty years later, Jeanne Tessier’s mother, a Sycamore neighbor, made a shocking deathbed confession: her son, John Tessier, was Maria’s killer and she urged her daughter to contact the authorities. Jeanne Tessier contacted the FBI and the Sycamore Police. Her brother appeared to have had an alibi and had passed a polygraph test. Both agencies chose not to investigate. Ten years later, Jeanne contacted the Illinois State Police. During the course of the investigation, long buried sexual secrets of the Tessier family came to light. Maria’s playmate, now a 61-year-old grandmother, identified a photo of John Tessier as “Johnny”, who is now a 72-year-old former policeman from Seattle, Washington, and now known as Jack McCullough. He was arrested and charged with murder. There was little or no physical evidence in the crime; prosecutors chose to charge McCullough with a different crime: the rape of his sister, fifty-five years ago. They felt they had a better chance of conviction. But the prosecutor had promised Jeanne Tessier that he would never pursue a rape trial without her consent. With no physical evidence to back up her story, Jeanne Tessier felt betrayed by prosecutor Clay Campbell and feared her word would not be enough for a conviction. McCullough was found not guilty. Five months later, the murder trial commenced. Jack McCullough felt confident he would be acquitted in this mostly circumstantial case too. When both sides rested, the judge delivered his decision: guilty. McCullough was sentenced to life in prison. **On-screen text graphic:** Clay Campbell won the case, but in November 2012, he lost his bid for re-election. **On-screen text graphic for the 05/24/14 rebroadcast:** Jack McCullough is appealing his conviction. 48 HOURS PRESENTS: “Redemption Song” (10:00-11:00p) - a report on the 1985 death of Natalie Antonetti, a woman who was part of the Austin, Texas music community. She was found beaten at home by her son, Johnny Goodie, and remained in a coma for two weeks before she died. The police investigation at the time focused on Marty Odem, a restaurant manager and sometime male stripper, who had a track record of violence. Police just did not have enough to go on, and he was never charged. He was later convicted of an unrelated rape and sent to prison; police then considered the case closed. In 2007, Austin Police Detective Tom Walsh reopened the cold case when an anonymous call came in naming Dennis Davis, a well-known name in the Austin music scene, as a suspect. Davis had dated Antonetti, and at the time had what seemed like a solid alibi. But now, his wife, Becki Davis, was the one who called the police. Detective Walsh has found several women who have become key players in the investigation: Davis’ then-girlfriend Ampour Garcia-Crow is certain he was not with her on the night in question; Linda Bless, who has seen his anger; and an ex-girlfriend Gelinda, who says that Dennis Davis confessed the murder to her. In 2009, 24 years after the murder, Davis was arrested. In April 2011, the case went to trial. Though the prosecution’s case was largely circumstantial, they had the phone call that started it all. Dennis Davis was found guilty of the murder. At the sentencing hearing there was another shock: Becki and Dennis Davis had reconciled. He was sentenced to 36 years behind bars. The defense team still insisted they had a solid rebuttal but were unable to present their case. On screen graphic: Dennis Davis will be eligible for parole in 2028. He will be 78. He is appealing the verdict. The 06/09/12 v/o epilogue: A year after the verdict, the DA’s office decided to take another look at the physical evidence in this case, and compare it to two similar crimes in Austin from the 1980s. They will search for DNA to see if it matches that of a suspect in those cases. ADA Mark Pryor says he’s “happy to have a look” but, he says, he’s confident the jury convicted the right man for murdering Natalie Antonetti. Police investigation revealed a man who was a serial philanderer, who was struggling with a heavy financial burden, and had a toxic relationship with his ex-wife. Police arrested DeMocker, saying that they had a strong circumstantial case, but legal maneuvers, court delays and the death of a judge prolonged the case for five years. DeMocker’s girlfriend, Renee Girard, then revealed critical information about DeMocker’s activities after Kennedy’s death: he lived in fear of being arrested for a crime and revealed information about an insurance policy. His large family, including his two daughters Charlotte and Katherine, believe he is innocent. Prosecutors believe he killed Kennedy to avoid paying alimony and to gain access to an estimated \$750,000 life insurance payout. After five years, and nearly \$2 million in taxpayer money, the trial commences. Steven DeMocker is found guilty of first-degree murder; he is sentenced to life in prison without parole. **On-screen text graphic:** Charlotte graduated from college this month with a degree in finance. Katherine will finish law

school next year. She hopes to pursue a career as a federal prosecutor. Five years later, the trial commenced. While authorities thought the case was a slam dunk, the defense, with the help of jury consultant, Lee Meihls, presented a bold argument of DNA transference. Police came to the realization that Dan DeWild and his identical twin brother David were most likely responsible for her murder, but the case grew cold due to lack of evidence. In 2009, Russ Boatright was assigned full-time to the circumstantial case. Investigation led to a sex tape, and Dan’s fascination with bondage and rope. Heather was found bound in a similar manner. In 2011, Dan DeWild, David DeWild and his wife Roseanne were arrested and charged with murder. David DeWild broke down and admitted that his brother Dan had killed Heather and that he had participated in the crime. Prosecutors then learned that the brothers had been watching television crime dramas and forensic shows. They believed that Heather had gone to the house to retrieve the sex tape and then was killed. David DeWild took investigators to the crime scene and re-enacted what happened. David had to pass a polygraph test in order to secure a plea deal. Roseanne’s charges were dropped due to lack of evidence. Dan DeWild’s trial hinged almost entirely on his brother’s testimony and with the lack of physical evidence, prosecutors hoped it was enough. In the end, it wasn’t. Jurors deadlocked on the first degree murder charge, but agreed on the lesser charges. Plans were started for a retrial, but a month after the conviction, Dan DeWild pled guilty to second degree murder in a plea deal. 48 HOURS: “The Perfect Family” (9:00-10:00p) - Bernie Pyne returned home one day in May 2011 with his young daughter to find his wife Ruth in the garage, brutally beaten and stabbed to death. To outsiders, the Pyne’s appeared to be an all-American family. Bernie Pyne was a successful auto engineer who, with his wife, had raised a seemingly happy family in Highland Township, a suburb of Detroit, Michigan. They had two children, the oldest, Jeffrey, was his high school’s valedictorian and on his way to college. After Ruth was murdered, police learned the Pyne’s were not as perfect as portrayed. The investigation immediately turned to those who lived with Ruth, and they learned Ruth had some psychiatric issues, including arguments and confrontations about taking her medications. Investigators also learned Ruth and Bernie’s marriage was fractured, and Bernie had had an affair. They also found Ruth’s relationship with their son, Jeffrey, was strained. Ruth’s sister Linda Jarvie thought Bernie was responsible for the murder, and given his affair, Bernie understood the suspicions, but he had an ironclad alibi backed by his boss and four witnesses, ruling him out as a suspect. Five months into the investigation, Jeffrey Pyne was charged with his mother’s murder. Police had circumstantial evidence against Jeffrey -- blisters on his hands, lies about gardening at his neighbor’s home and his detached demeanor when authorities told him what had happened to his mother. In addition, there was no sign of Ruth being sexually assaulted and no sign of a break-in. Before the case went to the jury, Prosecutor John Skrzynski asked the judge for another option for the jurors; a charge of second-degree murder, rather than the original charge of first-degree murder. Skrzynski believed it would make it easier for the jury to convict him. Jeffrey’s defense attorney, James Champion, argued against it, but the judge granted the motion. After three days of jury deliberations the verdict was announced, and Jeffrey Pyne was found guilty of second-degree murder. On Screen Text Graphics: Jeffrey Pyne will be sentenced on January 29th. Eventually, two new detectives pieced together enough evidence to arrest David Pietz for murder. They were convinced David strangled her. He was charged with second-degree murder. Eventually, Donna was arrested and charged with first-degree murder. At the trial, the defense ultimately blamed her son, Radley. The jury made a quick decision: Donna was guilty.
