

And, one woman in particular is making a difference around the globe as she leads an effort with her foundation to deliver medical supplies and humanitarian provisions to areas around the world that have been hard hit by natural disasters. LAS VEGAS SHOOTING ANNIVERSARY

TEENS OUT OF RIKERS STARTING TODAY

A new state law removes most 16-year-olds from the adult criminal justice system. Starting today, the "Raise the Age Law" requires 16 year-olds to be housed in detention centers and not at Rikers Jail where they can receive age-appropriate services. 16-year-olds who are arrested for non-violent offenses will have the same opportunities for diversion and community-based services as those 15 years old and under. The law will be extended again to 17-year-olds a year from today.

MANHATTAN PARKING METERS RATE HIKE

Street parking in high-demand areas in midtown and lower Manhattan saw an increase starting today to \$4.50 for the first hour, \$7.50 for the second hour. Between 96th Street and 110th Street, it'll cost \$2.50 an hour more to park. Neighborhoods south of 96th Street will see a 50-cent jump to \$4 per hour. Commercial parking rates in Manhattan's high-traffic areas are also going up. Rates in Brooklyn increased last month. Queens, Staten Island and the Bronx will follow.
