H. Healthcare

Our guest is Dr. Michael Roizen, co-author of "The What to Eat When Cookbook." In this book, Dr. Roizen points out that WHEN we eat (i.e., what time of day) is actually crucial to the link between a healthy diet and healthy living. It's also crucial to disease prevention, better overall mental/physical performance, and a longer life.
