## WOUB Radio FM Network Issues/Programs List July to September 2020

This quarter, news and events were dominated by COVID-19 and its effects on daily life, protests and counter-protests around racial justice, and the Presidential primaries and election. WOUB Public Media provided daily coverage of press conferences held by Ohio Governor DeWine, and NPR coverage of the Trump administration's briefings as needed. In addition to our daily news reports and special features, the WOUB FM network broadcast news stories focused on actions of the Ohio state legislature, state news of Kentucky and West Virginia, and energy security. Regional news is also accessed through the Ohio Valley Resource, a network of stations throughout the Ohio River/Appalachian region funded by the stations and CPB.

We continue to provide an international perspective with programming from the BBC from 9-10am on our FM network. Public affairs and news programming from NPR continue to be the prime focus of our weekday FM programming. The daytime format consists of Morning Edition, 1A, Fresh Air, Here and Now, and All Things Considered from NPR; the Takeaway from PRI, and the BBC Newshour. NPR News is used hourly (except midnight to 5am).

This quarter, we continued our series "Spectrum" where Tom Hodson interviewed guests on a wide variety of topics from politics to culture to education. These interviews were featured in half hour programs on our AM service, with five minute features used during Morning Edition and All Things Considered.

We base our programming and production decision on a number of factors, including news stories and events in the region, letters and phone calls from listeners and efforts to find local angles to important national or international stories.

Story: Masking Questions: How Pandemic Health Measures Became Politicized

Description: Health officials and researchers say the science is clear: facemasks <u>can help reduce</u> the spread of the coronavirus. Yet in the Ohio Valley, not all elected officials agree on whether to mandate measures such as the use of facemasks in public places.

In April, Republican Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine initially announced the mandatory use of face masks in retail settings, only to <u>walk back</u> the mandate during the next day's press conference to say it was only a recommendation. West Virginia Republican Gov. Jim Justice recently said that mandatory use of facemasks would be impossible to enforce and would "divide us." Kentucky Gov. Andy Beshear, a Democrat, <u>ordered</u> face mask use in public, but people who don't wear one won't be fined, though businesses that require masks can turn away customers who aren't wearing one.

Story: Ohio Valley Coal Companies Get Tens of Millions in Paycheck Protection Loans Description: More than 50 Ohio Valley coal companies received loans totaling as much as \$119 million through the Paycheck Protection Program meant to keep people employed during the pandemic's economic downturn.

Congress passed the PPP in March to help businesses keep employees on the payroll and out of unemployment lines. The data released by the Small Business Administration does not show specific dollar amounts for the loans, but rather categorizes loans into ranges such as \$150,000 to \$350,000 at the lowest end, and \$5 million to \$10 million at the upper end.

Story: Ohio Valley Coal Groups React To Biden's Clean Energy, Climate Plan Description: Presumptive Democratic presidential nominee Joe Biden's \$2 trillion clean energy plan is drawing praise from organizations that work with coal communities on economic transition, but mixed reactions from union officials and industry groups.

The <u>plan</u>, released Tuesday, would boost investment in clean energy and rebuild infrastructure in order to reach net-zero carbon emissions by 2050. The platform frames decarbonizing the economy as a jobs creator. Of note, the plan calls for a carbon-free power sector by 2035, upgrading 4 million buildings and weather proofing 2 million homes, and boosting investment in zero-emissions transportation.

Story: Power Failure: A Massive Bribery Scheme Could Change Ohio Valley Energy Systems Description: One of the country's largest investor-owned electric utilities, with a large presence in the Ohio Valley, has emerged at the center of a \$60 million bribery and racketeering scheme related to Ohio's controversial energy bill that bailed out several struggling nuclear and coal plants. On Tuesday, federal investigators arrested one of Ohio's top lawmakers, House Speaker Larry Householder and some of his associates, in connection with the scandal. Dave DeVillers, U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of Ohio, said that in exchange for the \$1.5 billion bailout contained in the controversial legislation, known as H.B. 6, utility FirstEnergy Corp., identified as Company A, funneled nearly \$61 million into a dark money group controlled by Householder and his political allies.

Story: Kentucky Homeless Services Systems Can't Handle The Coming "Tsunami of Evictions," Advocates Warn

Description: Nearly 1 million renter households across the Ohio Valley are unable to pay rent and at risk of eviction, according to <u>research firm Stout</u>. That amounts to 42 percent of renter households in Kentucky, 46 percent in Ohio and 47 percent in West Virginia.

"The homeless services system is not designed to handle a tsunami of evictions," said Homeless and Housing Coalition of Kentucky executive director Adrienne Bush in a call with reporters on Thursday. "The capacity doesn't exist in Kentucky as things stand."

Evictions have been on hold since March to protect renters who've seen their income drop because of the pandemic. But a federal ban ends July 31, as does the state eviction ban in Kentucky. Some renters may still be covered by a patchwork of state and local eviction bans.
