Health	News Brief	9-Apr	9:30 PM	0:30	The U.S. Food and Drug Administration on Friday approved Shire Plc's stimulant Vyvyan's to treat binge-eating disorder, the first product to be approved for the condition. Vyvyan's, which is currently approved to treat attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, generated sales of more than \$1 billion in the first nine months of last year. Binge-eating disorder, characterized by repeated episodes of uncontrolled eating, accompanied by guilt and shame, affects roughly 2.8 million people in the United States, according to Shire. Vyvyan's is an amphetamine which, like other amphetamines, carries the potential for abuse and addiction. They also have been associated with increase blood pressure and heart rate, sudden death, stroke, heart attack, insomnia and psychiatric side effects such as hallucinations and mania. The drug is not approved for weight loss.

Education	News Brief	6-May	2:20 PM	0:30	The head of the Maricopa County Community College District said he hopes that a ruling allowing in-state tuition for "dreamers" will lead to more young immigrants attending the colleges. A Maricopa County Superior Court judge ruled Tuesday that undocumented students who have work visas under the federal Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program are allowed to pay the lower tuition rate. The deferred-action program, launched by President Barack Obama in 2012, is intended to protect undocumented immigrants brought to the United States as minors from deportation if they meet certain criteria. Those approved can remain in the country for two years and receive federal work permits. The ruling caps a 2-year-old lawsuit filed by then-state Attorney General Tom Horne. He sued the community-college district, arguing the students were not lawfully in the country and that the tuition policy violated a law enacted by voters in 2006 that banned public benefits to undocumented immigrants. A judge ruled the Maricopa Community Colleges can charge in-state tuition to undocumented students who have a federal waiver. Young immigrants who have a work visa under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program can lawfully pay \$84 per credit instead of \$325 per credit. Tom Horne, the attorney general in 2013, had sued the college district, saying the tuition policy violated state law.

If they receive the status, the missions will receive from 44 to 105 million dollars annually in more economic activity and will create between 500 and 1000 new jobs. Moreover, risky sexual behavior such as engaging in unprotected sex and number of sexual encounters increases as a result of over-the-counter access to EC. Analysis estimated that over the counter access increases STI rates by approximately 12% for women aged 15-44 and 9% for teenagers; these numbers are also consistent with the 12-17% increase in gonorrhea rates found in Washington as a result of expanded access. The FDA approved access to emergency contraception, or Plan B, through US pharmacies without a prescription in 2012 nationally. This followed pilot programmers in several states starting with Washington in 1998.</p>

To find this, researchers brought 23 healthy pregnant women into a dark room and had them all practice three different behaviors. The researchers tracked the fetuses' movements with sonography. The first behavior had the most responses from the fetuses.
