The social media giant on Tuesday announced a new plan to post Amber Alerts for missing children on the news feed of people who may be nearby. Facebook has already been used to help find missing children and the formal collaboration with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children - which runs the Amber Alert program - will only build on those organic actions, company officials said. Under the new program, Amber Alerts distributed by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children will appear near the top of a Facebook user's news feed, with an option for them to learn more information - such as what number to call if they have information about the case - and share it with others. The alert will only go to people within a certain geographic area of where the child is believed to be, based on where users set their Facebook location as well as analysis of their check-ins, Internet protocol (IP) addresses and any other location information that they already share with the company</p>
CHILDREN	UNIMAS NEWS BRIEFS	January 22, 2015	3:30 PM	:30	<p>DISNEY PARKS-LINKED MEASLES OUTBREAK GROWS TO 70 CASES</p> <p>Seventy people have been infected in a measles outbreak that led California public health officials to urge those who haven't been vaccinated against the disease, including children too young to be immunized, should avoid Disney parks where the spread originated. New infections linked to the theme parks emerged Wednesday in the outbreak that has spread to five U.S. states and Mexico, though the vast majority, 62, occurred in California. Because measles is highly contagious, people who have not received the measles-mumps-rubella, or MMR, vaccine are susceptible and should avoid visiting Disney for the time being. The people who have been infected range in age from 7 months to 70 years old. The vast majority was not vaccinated, and a quarter had to be hospitalized. Among those sickened were five Disney employees. Three have since returned to work. The company previously said park employees who may have been in contact with those infected were asked to show proof of vaccination or have a blood test to show immunity against measles. Those with pending results were put on paid leave. Vaccinations are also being offered to all employees. Measles has hit California hard recently. The state typically sees four to 60 measles cases a year.</p>

A mother who took her son to Dr. Miranda noticed something unusual behind a floral arrangement in a bathroom; it was a small camera. The concerned woman took pictures with her cell phone and alerted police. Authorities served a warrant to search the premises and found a computer which contained child pornography related to the camera in the bathroom. Dr. Teran (a Bolivian national) practiced in New York State for some time and had been working for 3 years at the California Health Center. Dr. Teran is married and is a parent. Authorities are concerned as Dr. Teran practiced medicine for the past 10 years and do not know for how long he had been recording patients with cameras.</p>
CHILDREN	UNIMAS NEWS BRIEFS	February 12, 2015	4:30 PM	:30	<p>Topic: FLORIDA SCHOOLS STILL USE THE MEDIEVAL PRACTICE OF PADDLING</p> <p>Most Florida public school kids will never be whacked with a paddle for misbehaving. The number of students subjected to corporal punishment statewide has dropped dramatically in recent years, from 65,050 in 1988-89 to 4,274 in 2008-09 and 2,966 in 2011-12. But Florida is still one of 19 states that nonetheless allow schoolchildren to be spanked, and now there's a new push to end what critics call a form of institutionalized violence. A recent study by two University of Florida College of Education professors - and funded by the Southern Poverty Law Center - recommends that the entire state retire the paddle once and for all. Twenty-eight of the state's 67 school districts avail themselves of this disciplinary option, most of them in rural and conservative regions, including Clay and Nassau counties in Northeast Florida. The school district in Suwannee County, about an hour's drive west of Jacksonville, with a student population of about 6,000, paddled the most - 359 times in 2012-13. Duval County, once the state's paddling leader, abolished corporal punishment in 2005. At the time nearly 80 percent of paddled students just so happened to be black.</p>
CHILDREN	UNIMAS NEWS BRIEFS	February 13, 2015	8:40 PM	:30	<p>ACLU ACCUSES DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL SECURITY OF IGNORING COMPLAINTS ON ABUSES OF MINOR</p> <p>American Civil Liberties Union affiliates in Arizona and San Diego, along with the law firm Cooley LLP, filed a lawsuit in federal court against the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) for its failure to produce records related to the abuse and mistreatment of children in the custody of U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and its sub-agency, the U.S. Border Patrol. DHS oversight has ignored scores of administrative complaints documenting CBP's mistreatment of children. For years, media accounts, human rights reports, and child advocates have described the same abuse and neglect of children in Border Patrol custody. On June 11, 2014, the ACLU and partner organizations submitted a complaint to DHS oversight agencies on behalf of 116 unaccompanied children alleging abuse and mistreatment in Border Patrol custody-including harsh temperatures, severe overcrowding, and denial of adequate hygiene supplies, bedding, food, water, and medical care.</p>

Peanut allergies are rising and affect more than 2 percent of children in the United States alone. They are the top cause of food allergy related severe reactions and deaths. Food allergies often are inherited, but also can develop during life, and age of exposure may matter. In recent years, doctors have wondered whether avoiding certain foods in infancy does harm or good. Food guidelines may change. The American Academy of Pediatrics used to recommend against giving children peanut-based foods before age 3 but dropped that advice in 2008 because there was no evidence it prevented allergies. The government filed this week an advisory that notified judge Andrew Hanen in Texas that it has already implemented significant parts of the Expanded DACA program, by granting protections and work permits to "approximately 100,000" people.</p>

It was the deadliest fire in the city since 2007, fire officials said, taking roughly 110 firefighters about an hour to extinguish the blaze. Fire officials said a preliminary investigation found that a pot that had been left on a hot plate overnight had overheated, setting off the blaze. Orthodox customs prohibit turning electrical appliances on or off, or lighting flames, during the Sabbath.</p>

You might find mysterious charges on your credit card. Or a thief could file a tax return in your name, getting a bogus refund before you even know it. None of this is a surprise. The shots were fired as police were confronting protesters who had gathered outside the police station...The shots rang out as the protests appeared to be dwindling. San Diego has turned into one of the U.S.' principal sex trade hubs. According to the FBI, in the past 4 years the number of sex procurers taken to court has tripled. In 2009 only 9 such cases reached court, the number rose to 41 in 2013.</p>

They were found on the officers' personal phones and are now being thoroughly examined. San Francisco Attorney Tony Brass is representing Michael Robison and Michael Celis, which are two of the four officers now being investigated for sending racist and homophobic text messages.</p>

Mesa Detective Esteban Flores says victims were injured Wednesday morning in shootings at three locations, including a restaurant and a hotel. Flores says police searched for a bald, white man in his 40s with a large tattoo on his neck. He was seen wearing a gray shirt and either black pants or black shorts. Mesa police closed off an area around the East Valley Institute of Technology on Wednesday morning. Giroux was found in a vacant condo before 1 p.m. local time, and was taken into custody after being hit with a stun gun. The Arizona Department of Corrections said that Giroux had been sent to prison three times on charges that that included burglary, theft, attempted aggravated assault and a marijuana violation.</p>

The baby died, but the victim is recovering in the hospital. Longmont Police Commander Jeff Satur said the suspect - later identified as Dynel Catrece Lane - showed up at an area hospital with the deceased baby, claiming she had a miscarriage. Satur said Lane's husband drove her to the emergency room, thinking the child was alive. He said the husband is not considered a suspect. Satur said Lane and the 26-year-old victim did not know each other prior to this incident.</p>

The capture of one of the founding leaders of the self-named Cartel of the Gentlemen (Caballeros) Templarios. Not few in Mexico ask if this arrest will bring peace and an end to violence in Michoacan. Before his visit to Great Britain and during his visit in Gander, Canada, the president of MEXico, Enrique Peña Nieto, said the capture of Servando Gomez, alias "La Tuta," which occurred on Friday in Morelia Michoacan, certifies the attempts and efforts of his government in matters of security. Since the first of December 2012, when he took his position as president, the government of Peña Nieto has captured dozens of cartel leaders, among them Joaquin El Chapo Guzman from the Cartel of Sinaloa, who was detained on February 22 of 2014, Miguel Angel Treviño Morales, alias the Z40 in July of 2013, Vicente Carrillo Fuentes, of the same cartel and Hector Beltran Leyva, Fernando Sanchez Arellano of the Cartel of Tijuana and Enrique Kike Plancarte y Nazario Moreno Gonzalez, both leaders of the Cartel of the Caballeros Templarios, who died in two confrontations with authorities. A persistence in organized crime is said to be explained by a weak institutional endemic. And that is where some assure, is the challenge. A challenge not easy and will take many years to reach.</p>

EDUCATION	UNIMAS NEWS BRIEFS	January 8, 2015	3:30 PM	:30	REACTIONS TOWARDS OBAMA'S INITIATIVES President Barack Obama called for higher taxes on wealthy Americans and new initiatives to boost the middle class as he urged Americans to turn the page on years of economic woes and hard-fought wars in his sixth State of the Union address before Congress. Some highlights from Obama's proposals: TAX HIKES: Raise the top capital gains rate on couples with incomes above \$500,000 to 28 percent, the rate under President Ronald Reagan. Impose a fee on roughly 100 massive financial firms with assets exceeding \$50 billion. Eliminate a tax break on inheritances. The administration estimates these changes would generate \$320 billion over a decade. TAX BREAKS: Create a \$500 tax credit for families where both spouses work and have an annual income up to \$210,000. Expand the child care credit to up to \$3,000 per child under age 5. Offer the Earned Income Tax Credit to childless workers and noncustodial parents. Consolidate six overlapping education tax breaks into two. EDUCATION: Offer two years of free community or technical college. Students would need to go to school at least half-time, maintain a 2.5 grade point average and make progress toward a degree. The White House estimates that would cost \$60 billion over a decade. PAID LEAVE: Call for federal and local laws allowing workers to earn up to a week of paid sick time a year. Urge Congress to give federal workers an additional six weeks of paid parental leave. Call for more than \$2 billion from Congress for paid family and medical leave programs. HOME OWNERSHIP: Cut insurance premiums for government-backed mortgages by half a percentage point to .85 percent. The White House says the reduction would save new home buyers and those who refinance \$900 a year compared to current rates. RETIREMENT SAVINGS: Boost retirement savings by automatically enrolling people without access to a workplace retirement plan in an Individual Retirement Account. Expand access to employer plans for certain part-time workers. MIDDLE EAST: Urge Congress to pass a new authorization for use of military force against the Islamic State group and militant extremists in the Mideast. Until now, Obama has been relying on 9/11-era war powers. CUBA: Seek support for normalizing diplomatic relations with Cuba. Obama wants Congress to lift the economic embargo on Cuba, though the White House doesn't expect Congress to take that step quickly. IRAN: Vow to veto new sanctions on Iran while world powers pursue nuclear talks. TRADE: Ask Congress for so-called "fast track" trade promotion authority to allow an up-or-down vote on trade pacts. Obama wants to secure two major trade agreements -- one with the EU, and one with Asia-Pacific nations. CYBERSECURITY: Call for legislation enabling information-sharing between the private sector and U.S. agencies like the Homeland Security Department. Companies would qualify for targeted liability protection if they comply with certain privacy restrictions. NO GOING BACK: Threaten to veto congressional attempts to roll back Obama's executive actions on climate change and immigration and existing laws on health care and financial reform.
EDUCATION	UNIMAS NEWS BRIEFS	March 10, 2015	11:30 PM	:30	OBAMA ANNOUNCES CHANGES FOR STUDENT LOAN REPAYMENT President Barack Obama told students at Georgia Tech on Tuesday he wants to make the process of repaying student loans easier to understand and manage. Obama signed a "student aid bill of rights" and spelled out an assortment of policy tweaks and projects to try to make it easier for people with student loans to pay back their debt. Obama has asked the Treasury and Education departments and the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau to report by Oct. 1 on whether bankruptcy laws or other laws or regulations should be changed for student loans. The lending industry has resisted loosening bankruptcy standards for student loans, but advocates have argued students burdened by heavy debt should be able to more easily use that as a way to discharge their obligations. The review will focus on private student loans that do not carry protections given to federal student loan borrowers, such as the ability for borrowers with permanent disabilities to discharge loans, an administration official said. The White House said 40 million Americans have student loans. More than 70 percent of U.S. students who graduate with a bachelor's degree leave with debt, which averages \$28,400. The White House said it will require clearer disclosures from companies to make sure borrowers understand who is servicing their loan and how to set monthly payments and change repayment plans. Obama will direct his Education Department to create a system by July 1, 2016, to better oversee and address complaints from borrowers about lenders, servicers and collection agencies, the White House said.

An extra \$141 million has been budgeted to handle the influx of applications, with the DMV opening four new offices and hiring an additional 900 employees. Appointments to obtain driver's licenses can now be made 90 days in advance instead of 45 days, the department said. Agents also have been told to review government files to identify any jailed immigrants they might be able to release under the program. The directives from the Homeland Security Department mark an unusual change for U.S. immigration enforcement, placing the obligation on the government for identifying immigrants who might qualify for lenient treatment. Previously, it was the responsibility of immigrants or their lawyers to assert that they might qualify under rules that could keep them out of jail and inside the United States. One training document includes scenarios describing encounters between agents and immigrants with guidance about how agents should proceed, with a checklist of questions to determine whether immigrants might qualify under the president's plans. ICE officials earlier began releasing immigrants who qualified for leniency from federal immigration jails. Obama in November announced a program to allow roughly 4 million parents of U.S. citizens and legal permanent residents to apply for permission to stay in the country for up to three years and get a work permit. The program mirrors one announced in 2012 that provides protection from deportation for young immigrants brought to the country as children.</p>

TSA agents discovered 2,212 firearms - or a little more than six a day - in carry-on bags; 83 percent of them were loaded, the department said. The number was a 22 percent increase from 2013, when 1,813 firearms were discovered. The number of firearms discovered at TSA checkpoints has risen nearly every year since 2005. Also last year, the department said, more than 1,400 "firearm components, replica firearms, stun guns, and other similar dangerous objects were discovered" in carry-on luggage.</p>

House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, outlined the dwindling options for his deeply divided GOP caucus on Tuesday morning after the Senate left the House with little choice. Boehner pointed out that the issue is now in the hands of the courts. Conservatives had demanded that the funding bill roll back Obama's immigration directives from last fall. He signed orders sparing millions of immigrants from deportation. Democrats had insisted on legislation to fund the department, which shares responsibility for anti-terrorism operations, without any conditions. Passage of the stand-alone spending bill would seal the failure of a Republican strategy designed to make Homeland Security funding contingent on concessions from Obama. The department, which has major anti-terrorism responsibilities, is also responsible for border control. Whatever the final result of the struggle, controversy over the legislation has produced partisan gridlock in the first several weeks of the new Congress, though Republicans gained control of the Senate last fall and won more seats in the House than at any time in 70 years.

Just last year, a few dozen people in the Sunshine State were infected with these formerly exotic illness as they made their way up the Gulf Coast. The solution? A private company has genetically modified the Aedes aegypti, creating a mosquito that fights for the good guys and, pending Food and Drug Administration approval, will be unleashed in the Keys ASAP. Dengue and chikungunya - also charmingly called "break-bone" fever - are no joke. About 50 million people contract dengue each year - more than 2 percent die.
