MILTON CHANGES COURSE, ENTERS MAYORS RACE

The final day of sign-ups for the Branson April Municipal Election saw a major change in the final half hour before the sign-up period ended as Ward II Alderman Larry Milton withdrew from that race and entered the Mayor's race now giving voters a choice of five candidates running for that position including current Mayor Edd Akers.

Earlier in the day, Cody Fenton signed up for Milton's Ward II Position and is the only candidate in that race.

One person who will not be on the ballot is current Ward I Alderman Bob Simmons, who did not sign-up for reelection to the seat he has held since 2009.

STATE AUDIT: FORSYTH MISSING MONEY

A report released Tuesday by Missouri State Auditor Nicole Galloway gives the City of Forsyth a "Poor" Rating after an audit discovered over \$3400 of City Funds missing in addition to delays in depositing Utility Funds.

According to a release issued with the report, the investigation began in October of 2019 when Forsyth officials reported a burglary from the City's Vault to the Taney County Sheriff's Office. That investigation led to a request from then Sheriff Jimmie Russell to the State Auditor's Office to assist with investigation which eventually led to the Forsyth Board of Alderman to request a full audit. That audit found discrepancies in the Utility Department under then Utility Clerk Carla Combs as well as other details surrounding the theft of city funds.

BRANSON SETS TIMETABLE FOR ENDING COVID-19 LAW

The Branson Board of Alderman Tuesday night pass into Law an Ordinance that will end the Mask Mandate in the City on May 24.

The proposed Bill was amended during discussion to extend the date ending the mandate from the 9th to the 24th in order to get more of the vaccines administered to the public plus give businesses the time to prepare for the new law.

The City issued a press release after passage of the Bill saying the process to end the mandate was presented by Mayor Edd Akers based on several factors including the numbers of people getting vaccinated, revised CDC Guidelines for people that have vaccinated, and Missouri's announcement that Phase 3 of the Vaccination Plan will begin in April.

The Final Reading of the Bill was opposed by two members of the board for different reasons. Ward II Alderman Larry Milton opposed it stating the mask mandate should end immediately while Ward III Alderman Julia King stated her opposition saying the board should hold off ending the mandate until more data is in on vaccination numbers.
