Branson Alderman Meeting Ends Suddenly After Walkout	News	11/27/19	Daily Newscasts	:30	A Branson Board of Alderman meeting came to a sudden stop on Tuesday when three Branson Alderman walked out of the meeting in response to a ruling by the city's mayor, Edd Akers. The walkout came shortly after the board's passing of a measure on first reading that would provide funding for the installation of underground power lines along a section of Highway 76. The measure passed with three "Yes" votes, two "No" votes and one alderman abstaining from the vote. The three aldermen say they left out of frustration with Akers' decision to consider abstaining votes a "No." "The question I asked is, 'If our abstention doesn't mean anything, then why don't we take it off the voting mechanism?'," Alderman Kevin McConnel told Ozarks First. "We're able to vote yes, no or abstain and the mayor kind of finding a loophole with decorum was, I think, in poor taste."

					"I read an entire statement talking about 'If you abstain, then [the mayor has] the option to be able to change it.' So, they knew before they ever voted, that if they did that, then I had the option to be able to do it," Akers said Wednesday. Alderman McConnell clarified he's all for the installation of underground powerlines on 76. He just wants the city to acquire the total cost of the project before the installation begins. The issue will be taken up again on December 10th, 2019 at the aldermen's next scheduled meeting.

New Bridge over Buffalo National River	News	12/30/2019	Daily Newscasts	:30	Construction has begun on a new bridge over the Buffalo National River at Pruitt Landing. The new bridge will replace an 88-year-old structure scheduled for demolition. But the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette reports some people aren't happy about these plans. The state has offered to give it to the county, but the consensus seems to be the county can't afford the upkeep. Ralph Wilcox, National Register and survey coordinator for the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program, says the Pruitt structure may be the last Pennsylvania through-truss bridge remaining in Arkansas. Steve Lawrence, district engineer for the Arkansas Department of Transportation's office near Harrison, says "There are some people over there who are passionate about that bridge. We understand that. When we build a new bridge, the federal requirements are that the old structure be removed or somebody else has to take possession of it."
