According to a release from the city, a total of six lodging establishments have been closed due to either failure to address significant life and safety violations, not having a valid business license, and/or substantially delinquent payment of city water bills.

This initiative is the result of a comprehensive review of the City's adopted codes, along with input from various business and non-profit stakeholders which called for enforcement of existing codes.

A program designed to help a child's early years reaches a milestone.

The Women, Infants, and Children Program, known as WIC, began in 1974 in Kentucky and has expanded across the country, including 115 in Missouri. According to the USDA, nearly half of the infants in the U.S. are served by a WIC Program.

Tammy Drake, who helps coordinate the WIC Program for the Taney County Health Department, says during a recent interview on the "At Your Service" Podcast that the program has existed in Taney County since 1993. Drake says WIC services are currently available at the Health Department offices in Branson and Forsyth as well as at Jordan Valley Clinic in Hollister and their new mobile unit that makes stops at the White River Mountain Apartments in Hollister, at the Penleigh in Branson, and at Bridge of Faith Church in Rockaway Beach.

Ron Houseman/Taney County Republican Caucus

March 2nd is an important day for Republicans across Missouri interested in having a say in who the state will support as the party's Presidential Nominee.

After years of holding a primary, the state of Missouri did not authorize a Statewide Presidential Preference Primary but instead left it up to the Republican and Democratic Parties to determine how to select their choice for Presidential Nominee.

Ron Houseman, Chairman of the Taney County Republican Central Committee, says during an interview on KRZK's "Ozarks Now" program that the State Party decided to return to the Caucus Form of deciding who will be the State's Presidential Nominee. On Saturday March 2nd, Registered Voters in Taney County can take part in the Caucus Meeting at Forsyth High School beginning at 10:00 that morning. Houseman explained the process of deciding which one of the party's candidates will be supported by the county's Republicans and also have input on the Party's Platform going forward.

Branson Mayor Larry Milton Gives State of the City Address

Branson Mayor Larry Milton declared the accomplishment's the city has enjoyed along with a hopeful future during his State of the City address last week.

Milton talked about Branson's past year and set expectations for the current year. The city had success overall and is expected to repeat success.

He pointed to cumulative sales revenue, which he stated is up 9.4% over this time last year. They are over an "all time high" of last year.

Branson's mayor also highlighted the collection of sales revenues already coming in for the year. They are 31.3% higher than that of 2019 before the COVID-19 pandemic. Tourism revenue in Branson trends positively.

Milton said the start of this year has close to a 5% increase over 2023 and that of 10% over projections for the 2024 budget.

Carter said the idea for the scholarship was a spin-off of the support offered to families of first responders from the Taney County 100 Club, an organization that Carter is also involved in that gives financial support in case of serious injury or death.

The Forsyth School District is asking the voters to allow them to make additions and expansion of school facilities plus begin the process of adding a new program.
