According to officials, you may be owed back pay if you changed jobs addresses or names within the past 3 years. The tool will also tell you how to receive the funds.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that the clips holding the trim that covers the roof supports by the windshield can come loose. If that happens, the trim can fly off. Dealers will inspect the trim pieces to make sure the clips are engaged and add adhesive to hold them in place. Owners will be notified starting March 13, 2024.

No action was taken at the hearing.

If you have either of these items, the CDC suggests throwing them away and wash surfaces the items may have touched with hot, soapy water. CDC claims at least 47 people have been sick in 22 states including MO 10 people had to be hospitalized.

The recall covers certain Models Y, S and X from the 2023 model year. All are equipped with "Full Self-Driving" computer 4.0. The company says in documents posted by the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration that software instability may prevent the camera image from showing while the Teslas are in reverse. The safety agency says the lack of an image can increase the risk of a crash. Tesla says it's not aware of any crashes or injuries. Documents say the problem has been fixed with an online software update. Owners will be notified by letter starting March 22. Even with a "Full Self-Driving" system, Teslas cannot drive themselves.

The recalled products were Honey CF Max Day Adult and Robitussin Honey CF Max Nighttime Adult cough syrups with expiration dates through 2025 and 2026. The FDA suggests that you contact your Doctor if you have taken any of these medications.

Discharging a firearm in celebration is punishable by jail time and a fine. The Missouri legislature is looking at a plan to create stiffer penalties for shooting guns in the air.

The deal announced Monday has not yet been finalized and will have to be approved by a U.S. court. Philips would continue servicing existing machines in the U.S., but would not be able to sell new ones until meeting several corrective actions laid out by the FDA.

Description: During the Morning News, it was announced that Think twice about a tropical getaway to the Caribbean this winter. The U.S. embassy in the Bahamas has released a security warning and travel advisory that the island nation is currently unsafe for tourists amidst 18 murders — "primarily" motivated by gang violence — in January alone. Safety concerns have reached a point of severity where U.S. officials say people shouldn't even try to "physically resist" being robbed. The embassy also says that Americans should be especially vigilant at nighttime and "keep a low profile" always. The U.S. State Department, which on Friday put the Bahamas on an "exercise increased caution" warning, noted that the danger persists in tourist and non-tourist areas. Just last week, the State Department also put nearby Jamaica on a Level 3 of 4 "Reconsider Travel" Advisory — the only higher threat being a "Do Not Travel" Warning.

The recall, issued Wed, says that one lot of Zenzedi 30mg tablets is being recalled after an incident in which a pharmacist found tablets of carbinoxamine maleate, an antihistamine, in a bottle labeled as Zenzedi. The recall comes amidst a national shortage of ADHD drugs that has been ongoing since October 2022, creating further confusion and unpredictability for people with ADHD who have struggled to find medications.

January 31, 2024 - During the Morning News, it was announced that Missouri lawmakers have taken up a bill that would block cities from passing rules that ban so-called income discrimination. Kansas City landlords are now required to accept renters who want to pay with Section 8 vouchers. The ordinance takes effect in 6 months. Landlords who are found in violation can face fines of \$1,000. No action was taken yesterday on the opposing bill in Jefferson City.

The warning covers certain Corolla compact cars and Matrix hatchbacks from the 2003 and 2004 model years, as well as the RAV4 small SUV from 2004 and 2005. Also covered are about 11,000 Pontiac Vibes from 2003 and 2004, which are essentially the same as the Matrix and were made at the same California factory.

Missouri considering legislation that would ban child marriage. Under current Missouri law, 16- and 17-year olds are able to get married with parental consent. Marriage between a minor and anyone 21 or older is prohibited. According to the Missouri Independent, a bipartisan bill was discussed at a Missouri Senate committee meeting Monday. It would prohibit issuing marriage licenses to anyone under the age of 18 under any circumstances. In 2018, Missouri raised its minimum marriage age to 16, however activists argued at the time the change still left 16 and 17-year olds vulnerable to coercion. If the new legislation passes, Missouri would join 10 other states to ban child marriage.

Description: During the Morning News, it was announced that the Missouri Veteran Commission will receive nearly \$20-Million Dollars from marijuana revenue this year. The Missouri Veterans Commission is responsible for assisting veterans with their benefits and helping to maintain veterans' homes and cemeteries. According to the Missouri Independent, the Missouri Veterans Commission will receive about \$19-Million dollars from marijuana revenue by the end of the current fiscal year. Missouri uses marijuana sales revenue to pay for any marijuana operating expenses, such as salaries or professional services. Once those expenses are paid, revenue from marijuana sales goes to the Missouri Veterans Commission, as well as drug addiction treatment programs and the Missouri Public Defender's budget. The Missouri Veterans Commission should receive \$22 million next year if Governor Parson's budget recommendations are approved. So far the state has collected 150 million dollars in revenue from taxes and fees since marijuana sales began in 2019.

The recall covers certain Chevrolet Silverado and GMC Sierra 2500 and 3500 trucks from the 2020 through 2024 model years. The NTSA says that water can get into the switches and cause the tailgates to open when in park gear that can result in unsecured cargo falling out of the beds, creating a road hazard and increasing the risk of a crash. GM Dealers will replace an exterior touchpad switch. Owners are to be notified by letter starting March 18, 2024.

Description: During the Morning News, it was announced that Toyota is recalling about 280,000 pickup trucks and SUVs in the U.S. The recall is to fix a transmission problem that can let the vehicles creep forward while in neutral. It covers certain Toyota Tundra pickups and Lexus LX 600 SUVs from the 2022 and 2023 model years. Also included are 2023 and 2024 Toyota Sequoia SUVs. Toyota says certain parts of the automatic transmissions may not immediately disengage when shifted into neutral. That can transfer some engine power to the wheels. The vehicles could creep forward at low speeds on flat surfaces if the brakes aren't applied, increasing the risk of a crash. Dealers will update the transmission software to fix the problem.

All the recalled cars have front-wheel drive. VW says the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration that a problem with a pump seal can let fuel leak from a charcoal canister in the emissions control system. The agency says leaking fuel increases the risk of a fire. Dealers will replace the pump, which is inside the fuel tank, at no cost to owners.

Under current federal law, states are allowed to opt out of daylight savings time and return strictly to standard time, making the "fall back" portion of the year the permanent year-round time. This means if Missouri passes the bill, it would act as a trigger law that would only go into effect if Congress allows it. 19 other states have passed similar trigger laws. Similar versions of the bill have made progress in past sessions, however members that attended the hearing Wednesday are doubtful any progress will be made this session.

The bill was pre-filed in December for the 7th and final time, as she will be leaving the Missouri House due to term limits. The one-page proposal would require cursive be taught in all Missouri public schools and charter schools by 5th grade, and ensure students can pass a cursive competency test. The bill would have no fiscal impact on the education department. Currently, Missouri does not require cursive to be taught in schools.

The lawsuit argues the hospital violated its own privacy policy by waiting five months to inform patients, even though it promises patients a shorter time frame. The lawsuit was originally filed in Clay County Circuit Court but moved to federal court. It points to other lawsuits across the nation involving Perry Johnson and Associates. That's the 3rd party vendor for health information used by NKCH and Meritas.

The department put a warning out on social media more than a week ago about a "zero tolerance enforcement campaign" during the last week in February. Other area law enforcement agencies in Missouri have stepped up enforcement recently including Kansas City and Gladstone. In just an 8-hour time frame in KCMO, officers confiscated 63 temporary tags, 23 expired license plates, and issued 271 citations. The state of Missouri announced in December it is owed more than \$78 million in fees related to expired tag.

Any damaged components will be repaired or replaced. Customers will be notified by mail in late April.

KC PIVOTS TO CRITICAL COVERAGE IN CRISIS



When a shooting rocked the Kansas City Chiefs' championship parade last Wednesday, our KC and central teams provided critical reporting, and the local radio community rallied.

THE BIG PICTURE:

 Audacy's KC stations were covering and celebrating with thousands of Chiefs fans at the Super Bowl parade when shots rang out wounding 22 and killing one, local Tejano DJ Lisa Lopez-Galvan.

STRONGER TOGETHER:

- Audacy stations in Buffalo, Dallas, and St. Louis picked up live coverage from 98.1 KMBZ.
- Local content from the KC teams combined with the timely action and response of the central team created unparalleled news coverage in real-time.
- 23 KC radio stations joined in promoting the GoFundMe for Lopez-Galvan, which
 received donations from members of the Chiefs organization and Taylor Swift.

Kansas City Pivots from Celebration to Critical Coverage

After the parade shooting, the market joined with other radio groups to promote funds for local DJ killed.

On February 14, Audacy's 99.7 The Point and 106.5 The Wolf were watching the Kansas City Chiefs celebrate their Super Bowl victory. Their perch, high above Union Station, at the Westin Hotel gave them a great view of the parade and the reviewing stand. 610 Sports Radio was broadcasting on the ground from the parade route, and Audacy team members Kramer Sansone and Cam Smith were taking pictures of the event on the ground.

It was a big day for Kansas City - and our stations were broadcasting live, reporting, and generally celebrating with the million or so people who flooded into town for the event.

"Those of us back at the station were monitoring the parade coverage but generally going about our normal day. We were all so excited for the win and talking about how we ride the wave of success in the coming weeks," said Roxanne Marati, SVP and Market Manager for Kansas City.

"But then, it all flipped. We had afternoon shows in the middle of show prep and others planning interviews - but as soon as we started to get reports, within 15 minutes or so, our stations started delivering constant news and updates."

By 2:15 PM, suspects had been detained, but 22 people had been injured, and one person, a local DJ Lisa Lopez-Galvan from Mid-Coast Radio Project Inc's KKFI, had been killed.

"Lisa's cousin called into one of our shows from Florida. He said she had been shot. He was listening online, and about an hour later, he called in again to update that Lisa's injuries were fatal. To have him call us from Florida speaks to how important our updates were."

Audacy's teams worked together to keep listeners following the shooting. Within hours, Audacy stations in Buffalo, Dallas, and St. Louis picked up live coverage from 98.1 KMBZ's Dana and Parks. Coverage from 610 Sports Radio and 98.1 KMBZ was elevated nationally across Audacy platforms, with curated content and push notifications directing listeners to where they could find the latest updates as the events unfolded.

Kansas City Pivots from Celebration to Critical Coverage

The content from the local market combined with the timely action and response of the central team created unparalleled news coverage in real-time.



"Our on-air talent just jumped into action. No one needed to tell them what to do. They just immediately started working together to get the best information and relay it to the community."



"Internally, we had a lot of our team at the event. All the schools had been closed, and we knew there were a lot of Audacy families at the parade. We made sure everyone was accounted for and safe, but then we got the news about Lisa."

Lisa Lopez-Galvan has a Tejano show on KKFI, and the KC radio community is a tight knit group, Roxanne said, "We knew it was the right thing to do to help her family during this time. Most of the Kansas City radio groups agreed, and we decided that, in one voice, we would support one of our own."

Cumulus, Steel City, Carter Broadcast, and others have started a one-week media campaign to promote the GoFundMe account to help Lopez-Galvan's family.

"We're using the tagline 'Stronger Together' because we are. We compete for dollars and ratings, but we can put all that aside to help someone in the industry who is leaving behind a son and family."

Taylor Swift and several Kansas City Chiefs organization members have donated to the fund.

It's going to take time for our team to process what happened, but we're really grateful our KC Audacy family was safe. I received calls from every level of Audacy offering support and resources. It made me thankful to work with this team and organization."
