But do your children understand why wearing it is so important? Dr. Stephen Predebon, a family medicine physician with Mercy Health, says it is crucial that parents teach their kids the importance of sunscreen early on to prevent larger issues down the line. But in the short term, not wearing it could result in sunburn. And then there is the long-term effects. “We know that UV radiation can harm your skin cells, in the future can lead to much more dangerous things like skin cancer,” said Predebon.
