Friday, his mother talked about the tragedy and the family’s search for answers. Police are investigating Lockhart’s death as a homicide. He had been missing for 53 days. “Jolly. Laughing. Always did things,” said Lajena Solomon, Lockhart’s mother. Solomon remembers her son as a happy teen. His family nickname is “Boogie” because he loved to dance.</p>

Five years ago, Honeya started her organization she calls SWAG: Sisters welcoming all generations of women. Price welcomes some three dozen girls through the doors of the program. They range in age from 12 to 60. They are taught self-confidence to the point of teaching them etiquette, for example, how to set a place for tea.</p>

Jane was murdered. 20 years later, no one has been arrested for the crime.</p>
