9. **Environment/Animals including chemical spills, landfills, water quality and smog, and animal protection and conservation.**
10. **Healthy Living including exercise, dieting, disease prevention, and personal safety issues, as well as mental health initiatives and new treatment options.**
 - **Corona Virus: Part of Health, includes updates on issues relating to the Covid-19 outbreak, such as health information, public orders, and other relevant information.**

Crime and Safety

FOX19 Now (Morning)

4/5/22 – Crime Plan: This story reported Cincinnati Police and Mayor Pureval are announcing a plan to crack down on crime in the city. They are focusing on manpower, technology, and community engagement. (0:25)

4/7/22 – Liquor License Vote: This story reported the City of Cincinnati voted to uphold the suspension of the liquor license for the BP station in West Price Hill. Police claim the station is a “hot spot” for crime and a drain on their resources. (0:39)

4/18/22 – Child’s Body Found: This story reported Indiana State police are asking for the public’s help to identify a child’s body. The black male between 5 and 8 years old was found in Washington County. (0:34)

4/19/22 – Child Found Follow Up: This updated report released pictures of the muddied suitcase in which the child’s body was discovered. Police are hoping the photos jog memories and help them identify the victim. (0:37)

4/21/22 – Police Overtime: This story reported Cincinnati City Council has authorized an additional \$250,000 in police overtime for the summer. The Department anticipated it will be necessary for their summer safety plan. (0:18)

4/26/22 – Drug Take Back: This story informed viewers the City of Florence will be holding a drug take back event. Unwanted prescription pills and patches can be dropped off. It helps prevent drug abuse. (0:26)

5/4/22 – New Crisis Team: This story reported Cincinnati is announcing a pilot program for an alternative response team. The team will be part of the 9-1-1 system to respond to behavioral health calls. (0:18)

5/19/22 – P&G Reopens: This story reported that P&G’s downtown offices will reopen following a SWAT situation on Wednesday. A former employee who was texting threats has been taken into custody. (0:38)

5/20/22 – New Vests for First Responders: This story reported a local police officer has worked to make a new illuminated safety vest for officers responded to nighttime crash scenes. The officer noticed that even the hi-visibility green vests were not effective at night. (0:30)

5/25/22 – Graduation Fight: This story reported police and school officials are investigating the fight which broke out at the Colerain graduation ceremony. Those identified could face discipline from the school but also charges from police. (1:02)

5/27/22 – Jones on Guns: This story reported the Butler County Sheriff is offering free gun training classes for teachers and administrators following the deadly Texas shooting. Last year the Ohio Supreme Court upheld a decision prohibiting a person from being armed at work unless they have completed approved training. (0:54)

5/30/22 – Boy in Suitcase Update: This story reported on the autopsy findings for the child found dead in a suitcase in Indiana. The child died of an electrolyte imbalance likely caused by dehydration. He has still not been identified. (0:36)

6/6/22 – Mass Shootings: This series of stories reported on a rash of mass shooting incidents around the country over the weekend. More than ten people were killed and dozens injured in incidents in Philadelphia, Chattanooga, Columbia, and El Paso. (1:47)

6/17/22 – New Fireworks Law: This story reminded viewers about the new Ohio law which allows people to set off fireworks on their own property. Local governments can opt out of this law. (0:22)

6/3/22 – Swim Lesson: This story informed viewers about a free world-wide event offering swim lessons to children and adults. The event, while setting a world record, also prioritizes teaching swim skills. (1:56)

FOX19 Now (Afternoon)

4/1/22 – Motor Bikes Warning: As the weather warms, this story reported Cincinnati Police are warning motorists to be on the lookout for dangerous activity from dirt bikes and quads on the roads. They will be stepping up enforcement each weekend. (0:26)

4/6/22 – Gun Safety Class: This story reported the Delhi Township Police are holding a free informational session on gun safety in conjunction with Oak Hills School district. The session will discuss safety and recent changes in Ohio gun laws. (0:25)

4/11/22 – McGuffey Press Conference: This story reported Hamilton County Sheriff Charmaine McGuffey's press report that a deputy has been fired. The deputy has been accused of smuggling drugs for distribution into the county jail. (0:38)

4/13/22 – ONIC: This story reported on the formation of the Ohio Narcotics Intelligence Center and how it can help local police departments in drug investigations and other cases which have drug components. (0:45)

4/14/22 – OIS Body Cam: This story released body cam footage from the fatal officer involved shooting earlier in the week. The deceased had an active murder warrant, and the officers were part of a fugitive apprehension team. (1:37)

4/21/22 – Schroder Investigation: This story reported prosecutors are actively reviewing more than 800 cases handled for a former member of the Personal Crimes Unit. There are allegations the cases were mishandled, and evidence not reported which could have closed the cases. (0:45)

4/22/22 – Splatter Guns Ban: This story reported Dayton, Kentucky has issued an order banning all splatter guns in city parks. The order came after multiple reports of people using the Orbeez or pellet guns to shoot people in response to a social media challenge. (0:32)

4/25/22 – Raid on Dental Offices: This story reported the FBI and DEA are conducting a joint investigation which led to the raid on two dental offices on Crescent Springs. The search took several hours. (0:30) A follow up story reported the Dentist is accused of illegally prescribing opioids which led to a person's death. (0:37)

5/4/22 – Drug Bust: This story reported on a large regional drug bust by the Appalachian Regional Prescription Strike Force. The list of defendants includes medical professionals at all levels and involves more than five million opioid pills prescribed. (1:05)

5/16/22 – Car and Bike Crashes: This story reported on the increase in collisions between cars and bicycles. 2021 was the deadliest year for cyclists in Ohio. One local expert believes the problem is at crisis level and more drivers are fleeing the scene. (0:47)

5/17/22 – Deters Testimony: This story reported the Hamilton County Prosecutor testified before the Ohio Legislature asking for an amendment to the state constitution. The amendment would allow judges to “consider public safety” when setting bonds. (1:06)

5/24/22 – Mason Methadone Settlement: This story reported the Hope Center North clinic in Mason has agreed to pay \$37,000 to the government related to potential violations in record keeping. The DEA investigated the clinic in 2020 and uncovered the issues. (0:54)

FOX19 Now (Evening)

4/4/22 – Officer Resignation: This story reported on the resignation of a Lebanon police officer. An internal investigation showed the officer would pull over motorists and not give them tickets but would then file internal paperwork claiming he had. (1:28)

4/5/22 – BP License – This story reported a BP station is in danger of losing its liquor license. Police state the location has been the site of seven assaults, a double shooting and underage liquor sales in the past 15 months. (0:40)

4/8/22 – Explosives Found: This story reported a convicted felon has been arrested on multiple drug and weapons charges. The man was found outside a known drug location, with grenades and other explosives devices, as well as suppressed firearms. (1:14)

4/11/22 – Covington OIS: This story reported on a deadly Officer Involved Shooting in Covington. Police were looking for information on a murder suspect when the suspect charged them with a gun. This is the third shooting in Covington in a week. (1:51)

4/13/22 – Dayton Diggers Help: This story reported a local group of history buffs and metal detectorists assisted police in a murder investigation. The group worked for two days to find the victim's phone which had been lost in the field where he died. (1:48)

4/15/22 – Stolen Guns Recovered: This story reported a raid in Over the Rhine led to the discovery of stolen guns, as well as cash, cell phones, and various drugs. More than 21 guns have been stolen from

vehicles in District One just this year. The suspect is now facing more than a dozen felony charges, on top of nine already pending. (0:39)

4/18/22 – Former Police Chief Guilty: This story reported the former Police Chief of Addyston is pleading guilty. The former officer used his position to create a machine gun scheme, purchasing fully automatic weapons for gun dealers. (1:35)

4/19/22 – Liquor License Hearing: This story reported the Dive Bar near the University of Cincinnati could lose its liquor license. The police objected to the renewal due to a number of issues, including a shooting incident. The city's Public Safety Committee is asking for community input before making a decision. (0:28)

4/21/22 – Wrongful Death Bodycam: This story reported on the release of body cam footage related to an officer involved shooting with the Kentucky State troopers. The family of the victim has filed a wrongful death lawsuit. (0:30)

4/21/22 – Former Superintendent Sentenced: This story reported the former Superintendent for Springboro Schools has been sentenced. The former official admitted to falsifying records and receiving fraudulent reimbursements. (1:02)

4/25/22 – School Board Resignation: This story reported the President of the Goshen School Board in Indiana has resigned. The move came following accusations from a child predator sting group. (1:47)

5/6/22 – OSU Drug Incident: This story reported Ohio State University is warning parents and students after two students die in drug related incidents. Columbus Police have received reports of Adderall pills laced with Fentanyl. (0:31)

5/27/22 – Crime Stoppers Rewards: This story reported on the effectiveness of the Crime Stoppers program in generating lead in cases, while concealing the identities of tipsters. In 2021, the organization paid out \$83,000 in reward money and authorities were able to close 186 cases in the Cincinnati area. (2:33)

6/2/22 – School Gun Presser: This story reported Ohio's Governor is expected to sign the new bill allowing teachers to be armed. Staff would be required to take initial training as well as yearly refresher training and pass a background check. (2:05)

6/10/22 -Permitless Carry: This story reported Ohio's new law no longer requiring a license to carry a concealed weapon will go into effect on the 13th. Anyone currently qualified to obtain a CHL or concealed carry permit will be able to carry a weapon without one. (1:27)

6/13/22 – School Safety Newser: This story reported the Governor has signed the bill allowing school districts to get a permit for staff members to carry weapons with only 24 hours of training. The Governor said this puts the decision back at the local level. Opponents say the level of training is too low. (0:56)

6/30/22 – Amnesty Ends: This story reminded viewers June 30 is the final day for parking ticket amnesty in Covington. Starting in July, drivers will be charged additional fees for unpaid tickets and those with more than three will be towed. (0:21)

FOX19 Now (Late)

4/4/22 – Judge to Testify: This story reported a Hamilton County Judge will testify in front of the Ohio House Criminal Justice Committee. The testimony is part of an effort to change the state's constitution, following a state supreme court ruling that Judge's cannot take public safety into account when considering bail. (0:26)

4/19/22 – Greyhound SWAT: This story reported on a SWAT situation at the Greyhound bus terminal. The manager called after a man armed with a knife threatened employees and patrons. (0:27)

4/20/22 – Ohio River Bombs: This story reported an Ohio man has been found guilty of throwing pipe bombs onto Ohio River tugboats. The bombs were found in October of 2021. (0:32)

4/22/22 – Warren County 9-1-1: This story reported the Warren County Communication Center is having to make changes to their protocols due to a rash of hang-up and silent 9-1-1 calls from Kings Island. Going forward people who hang up on 9-1-1 will receive a text asking if they require services. (0:51)

4/28/22 – Judge Suspended: This story reported a former Northern Kentucky Judge has been suspended by the Kentucky Bar Association for four years. She was removed from the bench and found guilty of ten misconduct charges. (0:42)

5/5/22 – Mail Carrier Indicted. This story reported a US Postal worker has been indicted for theft. She is charged with stealing credit cards from at least 14 people rather than delivering them. (1:22)

5/6/22 – More Daycare Allegations: This story reported more allegations have been made against the day care center that closed following an alleged assault incident. The center asked for a hearing to reopen and other infractions against the facility were brought up. (0:51)

5/13/22 – Data Breach: This story reported current and former city of Cincinnati employees could be impacted by a "data incident". A request for proposal for insurance services posted on one of the city's websites included names, home addresses and other identifying information of employees. (0:43)

5/16/22 – Mail Theft Arrest: This story reported five people have been arrested in connection with a mail theft and fraud ring in Blue Ash. All suspects are from out of state and were arrested at a hotel. (0:47)

5/25/22 – Local John Doe: This segment featured a local case where the victim has been unidentified since 1992. Death investigators for the Hamilton County Coroners office discussed the challenge of finding information when the victim is a transient and their families don't know they are missing. (1:59)

5/31/22 – Private Security: This story reported on an increase in demand for private security officers. A rise in violent crime and a shortage of police officers is driving up demand. (0:27)

6/15/22 – Gun Crime Presser: This story reported police, prosecutors and the ATF are teaming up to discuss the methods they are using to combat gun crime in the city. The gun crime intelligence center is making resources available to take guns and criminals off the streets. (0:42)

6/17/22 – I-71 Speed: This story warned viewers about an increase in speeding on interstate 71. Police recently stopped a driver going 120 mph in a 55 zone, but routinely stop drivers going 20-40 miles over the limit. (0:45)

6/21/22 – Uvalde Latest: This story updated viewers on the investigation into the police response at Robb Elementary. New evidence has been released that appears to show police not trying to enter the barricaded classroom for an hour. (0:41)

6/30/22 – Kids Padlocked in Apartment: This story reported a Norwood mother has been arrested after case workers from Child and Family services found her children alone and padlocked in their apartment with no way to get out. (0:27)

4/1/22 –6/30/22 -- Various *PSAs*: WXIX aired public service announcements regarding crime prevention, safety, and anti-violence during the second quarter of 2022. The PSAs aired at various times and ranged in length from ten seconds to one minute.

Keeping You Safe

FOX19 Now (Morning)

4/11/22 – Gallatin County 911: This story informed viewers in Gallatin County of a problem with Verizon and 9-1-1 service. The problem is supposed to be fixed overnight, but the county has provided an alternate number for service in the interim. (0:19)

5/30/22 – Judy Duty Scam: This story alerted viewers of a scam involving Jury duty. Scammer pretending to work for the sheriff's office tell people they have missed jury duty and have to pay fines over the phone. Anyone contacted should report it to the Hamilton County Sheriff's office. (0:26)

6/8/22 – Tire Recall: This story informed viewers about a recall on Goodyear tires. The G-159 tires used on RV's and trucks have a high failure rate and should be replaced. (0:28)

6/16/22 – Ford Recall: This story alerted viewers to the recall of nearly three million Ford cars and SUV's due to transmission issues. Vehicles can roll even in park. (0:30)

6/21/22 – Teachers and Guns: This story interviewed people on both sides of the debate about whether arming teachers is a good idea. One said her focus should be on calming and guiding the children during an emergency, while the other thought teachers could fight back. (1:09)

FOX19 News Morning Xtra

4/8/22 – Credit Card Scams: This story alerted viewers to the five most common credit card scams used by hackers and how best to detect and avoid them. (1:30)

4/22/22 – Elder Abuse Task Force: This story reported two Boone County Commissioners are working to create an elderly abuse prevention task force. The mission would be to detect and prevent financial crimes against seniors. (0:25)

FOX19 Now (Afternoon)

4/5/22 – New ECC System: This story reported on improvements to the city's Emergency Communications Center. This in response to the settlement in the Kyle Plush case from 2021. (1:05)

4/20/22 – Synthetic Opioid Warning: This story reported Ohio's Attorney General is warning residents about a synthetic opioid. There has been an increased prevalence of Nitazenes, a group of synthetic drugs 40 times more potent than fentanyl. Cases are up significantly from 2021. (0:28)

5/11/22 – Tax Scam: This story alerted Kenton County residents to a scam. Letters from the "tax resolution unit of Kenton County" try to scare people into paying the tax and interest. There is no such agency. (0:31)

5/12/22 – Nurse Scam Calls: This story warned nurses in Ohio of fraudulent calls. Scammers claim to be from the Board of Nursing, claiming the victim is under investigation. The Board of Nursing confirms it would never ask for personal information over the phone. (0:37)

5/13/22 – Fake Pills Press Conference: This story reported on a new DEA campaign “One Pill Can Kill” aimed at educating the younger generation about the dangers of fake prescription medicines. The majority of the 400 million fake pills seized last year contained fentanyl. (0:56)

5/16/22 – Click It or Ticket: This story reported the Ohio State Highway Patrol is starting their Click It or Ticket seat belt enforcement drive. With the start of summer, more cars are on the road, which increases the possibility for crashes. (1:17)

FOX19 Now (Evening)

4/12/22 – Easter Dangers: This story warned parents about the dangers that button style batteries in toys can pose to children if not handled correctly. Ingestion incidents featuring these batteries have gone up 60-fold. (0:48)

4/12/22 – Air Tags Tracking: This story alerted viewers of rising incidences of stalkers using air tag devices, meant to help locate property, to track their victims. At least 50 women have reported getting notifications on their phones that they were being tracked by devices they did not own. (1:59)

4/13/22 – Wrong Way Sensors: This story reported ODOT is adding sensors on I-71 from Downtown to Fields-Ertel. The sensors will alert authorities if someone enters the highway the wrong way. While wrong way drivers are a low percentage of crashes, they are more likely to be severe. (1:23)

4/18/22 – Kentucky Traffic Deaths: This story reported Kentucky officials are reminding motorists to buckle up. Traffic deaths in the state were up in 2021. Of the 806 fatalities, more than 54% were not wearing seatbelts. (0:22)

4/27/22 – Fentanyl Testing Strips: This story reported the Coalition for Community Safety is offering fentanyl test strips so people can test drugs before using them. They are offering the strips as a way to proactively prevent overdoses, as well as offering training on NARCAN use. (1:37)
