- 7. Community Involvement/Development including volunteerism, blood drives, revitalizing neighborhoods, mentoring and fundraising activities.
 - Politics 2022: part of Community Involvement, including discussions of national and local issues and candidates, as well as voter registration and participation issues.
- 8. Employment including job opportunities, downsizing, training and outplacement.
- 9. Environment/Animals including chemical spills, landfills, water quality and smog, and animal protection and conservation.
- 10. Healthy Living including exercise, dieting, disease prevention, and personal safety issues, as well as mental health initiatives and new treatment options.

- Corona Virus: Part of Health, includes updates on issues relating to the Covid-19 outbreak, such as health information, public orders, and other relevant information.

INVESTIGATE TV (30 Minutes, 1 Play per week)

This Gray-produced news program features host Lee Zurik making in depth investigations into news stories and issues affecting the nation. Show's regular time period is Saturday night at 12:00AM. May air later due to sports overruns.

TRAIL OF HOPE (60 Minutes, 3 plays)

This Gray-produced series of specials for Black History month highlighted key points of the Civil Rights movement: The Struggle to Vote; The Struggle for Equality; and The Journey to Equality. The 60 minute specials aired on three successive Sunday nights at 12:30AM, February 6 – February 20, 2022.

SITTING FOR JUSTICE (60 Minutes, 1 play)

This Gray-produced special for Black History month detailed the Montgomery
Bus Boycott and its role in the Civil Rights Movement. The 60 minute special aired on
Sunday, February 27 from 12-1PM.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS (any day, any time)

WXIX broadcasts local and non-local public service announcements of varying lengths throughout its broadcast schedule. Some of the local announcements are produced by WXIX as part of a station campaign. The length ranges from :10 – 1:00.

Crime and Safety

FOX19 Now (Morning)

- 1/20/22 Catalytic Converter Laws: This story reported on new laws enacted locally that would make it more difficult to resell stolen car parts like catalytic converters. (0:27)
- 1/21/22 Northside Break-ins: This story reported on a series of break ins at small business locations in Northside. Police are looking for any information leading to the suspects. (0:36)
- 1/25/22 FBI Raid: This story reported the FBI has raided the Center for Covid Control, which operated testing sites around the country, including in the local area. The agency is investigating claims that the center either provided erroneous test results or none at all. (0:22)
- 2/5/22 Counterfeit Crackdown: This story reported Homeland Security and the NFL are cracking down on counterfeit goods and tickets ahead of the Super Bowl. Counterfeiters can face both civil and criminal charges. (0:34)
- 2/16/22 Auditor Story: This story reported the first court appearance for the Butler County official accused of corruption has had to be postponed. All of the Judges in the Butler County courts have recused themselves. (0:29)
- 2/21/22 Child Abandonment Charges: This story reported the mother of the non-verbal, autistic child found abandoned in Colerain is currently facing one charge of child endangerment. Legal experts expect she will soon be facing more charges. (0:25)
- 2/22/22 Gold Star Enticement: This story alerted viewers that a man tried to entice and eight-year-old girl into his car at a local restaurant. The girl's older sister intervened, and the man drove off. (0:32) A related story showed pictures of the man's car and asked for viewer assistance in identifying him. (1:29)
- 3/3/22 Concealed Carry: This story reported Ohio has passed a bill allowing residents to carry a concealed weapon without any training or a permit. Under the new law, you would not have to inform police you were armed during a traffic stop unless asked directly. (0:27)
- 3/16/22 Crime Victim Rally: This story reported on the Survivors Speak rally at the Ohio State Capitol. More than 200 crime survivors are calling for employment, housing protections and policies to end the cycle of crime. (2:35)
- 3/19/22 Child Porn Arrest: This story reported the mother of a 14-year-old victim in a child pornography case has been arrested. One of the alleged perpetrators was the mother's boyfriend. The County Attorney calls the case one of the worst he has ever seen. (1:30)

3/28/22 – Kaspersky Threat: This story reported the FCC has deemed the Russian company Kaspersky as an acceptable risk to national security. This is the first Russian company to be added to the list. (0:23)

3/30/22 – Mailbox Theft: This story reported the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office is encouraging residents not to use postal mailboxes to deposit mail. Thieves have gotten hold of a master key and are stealing mail, leading to thefts. (0:38)

2/22/22 – 20k Reward: This story informed viewers a \$20 thousand reward is being offered in a murder case from October 2021. Information that leads to an arrest will be eligible for the reward. (0:23)

FOX19 Now (Afternoon)

1/24/22 – Ohio Body Cams: This story reported 109 agencies in Ohio have received grants to purchase body worn cameras. The Clermont County Sheriff's Office received the third largest grant in the state. (0:50)

1/25/22 – Fake Pills: This story reported on a shipment of Fake prescription opioid pills that were seized by the DEA. The pills contain illicit drugs, mainly fentanyl, in doses high enough to kill. (0:34)

1/25/22 – Distracted Driving: This story reported on the increase of distracted driving offenses in Ohio. Officers wrote over 11,000 tickets in 2021, up 2,000 from 2020. The majority of offenders are 16-24 years old. (0:36)

1/26/22 – Coach Indicted: This story reported a former coach and teacher's aide in the New Miami School District has been indicted on eight counts of sexual battery with a 17-year-old student. (0:38)

2/9/22 – Drunk Driving Warning: This story reported the Ohio State Highway Patrol is preparing to crack down on impaired drivers. Last year there were 178 crashes and 59 OVI arrests on Super Bowl Sunday. The department is preparing for an increase with the local team playing. (0:46)

2/16/22 – Gun Recoveries: This story reported in 2021 the Cincinnati Police Department recovered more than 1,500 illegal guns. The department formed a Gun Violence Task Force in 2020 to help prevent violent crime. (0:20)

2/17/22 – Gun Raid: This story reported the ATF and Homeland Security raided a Blue Ash gun shop. No reason for the action has yet been released. (0:34)

2/18/22 – Child Found: This story reported on a young child found wandering alone in Colerain. The story interviewed the resident who found the child and called police. (1:19)

2/18/22 – 75 Crackdown: This story informed viewers law enforcement agencies in Ohio and Kentucky will be cracking down on safety violations on I-75 through the weekend. Highway Patrol and other agencies will be enforcing speed, seat belts and sober driving. (1:03)

- 3/10/22 Police Gun Scheme: This story reported the former Addyston Police chief has pleaded guilty to 3 of the 17 federal charges. The former officer was accused of making false statements on ATF forms and then selling the weapons to gun dealers. (0:33)
- 3/16/22 Chase Policy Change: This story reported Cincinnati City leaders have announced changes to the policy for police chases in the city. Police will no longer initiate chases for those suspected of committing misdemeanors, only those suspected of felonies. (0:34)
- 3/18/22 Orbeez Challenge: This story reported Mason City school officials are warning families about the social media "Orbeez Challenge" that appears to encourage teens to conduct drive-by shootings with toy pellet guns. They reminded students anyone bringing such a gun to school will face consequences. (0:36)
- 3/29/22 Bail Reform Presser: This story reported on a press conference with Ohio's Attorney General and the Hamilton County District Attorney pushing a constitutional amendment for bail reform. The effort is a direct response to the Ohio Supreme Court's decision that public safety should not be considered when determining the level of cash bond. (0:30)
- 3/31/22 NIBIN: This story reported the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) is expanding into Ohio thanks to funding from the American Rescue Plan. Both the Attorney General's Office and the State Highway Patrol are receiving funds. (0:31)

- 1/91/22 Missing Child Alert: This story alerted viewers to a missing teenager. The girl was last seen with her biological mother, who does not have custody of the child. (0:28)
- 1/19/22 Catalytic Converter Thefts: This segment alerted viewers to an increase in the theft of catalytic converters from buses. The rhodium inside the converters can fetch a good price. (0:47)
- 1/20/22 Gun Theft Video: This story displayed surveillance video from a gun store robbery and asked for the public's assistance in identifying the suspects who stole 30 firearms. The ATF is offering a reward for information. (0:41)
- 1/26/22 Mt. Airy Arrests: This story reported offenders in a police operation targeting people having sex in parks are being sent to court. Police are responding to allegations that they are not addressing the problem by stating they are focusing resources on violent crime prevention. (0:48)
- 2/9/22 Sign Vandals: This story reported Covington Police are looking for information about vandals defacing and stealing signs designed to improve literacy in young children. Read Ready Covington says more than a dozen signs have been damaged or stolen in the past two months. (0:32)
- 2/10/22 Road Closures: This story informed viewers of which downtown streets would be closed for Super Bowl watch parties. (1:02)
- 2/16/22 Traffic Camera Lawsuit: This story reported the Ohio Supreme Court has dismissed the lawsuit filed by residents against the village of New Miami over traffic cameras. Residents claimed the cameras violated their right to due process. Judges disagreed. (0:34)

- 3/1/22 Teen Charged with Murder: This story reported on a press conference with County Prosecutor Joe Deters announcing a teen charged with murder. The prosecutor called out a Juvenile Court Judge whom he feels has been too lenient with teen offenders. (1:22)
- 3/4/22 Boone County OD Arrest: This story reported a local woman has been arrested on multiple charges after a teen almost dies from a drug overdose. The woman trafficked the drugs involved in the overdose.(0:28)
- 3/8/22 Hutchinson Officers Honored: This story reported the Middletown Police officers who investigated and solved the James Hutchinson murder case were honored by the County Prosecutor's office.
- 3/10/22 Street Safety Report: This story reported on a report showing rampant speeding on city streets in Cincinnati. In one week, 681 cars were clocked going 55-100 miles per hour in a 25-mph zone on Hamilton Avenue. Pedestrians and cyclists are being hit and killed. (2:41)
- 3/21/22 Gun Range Permit: This story reported the city of West Chester has filed a motion to object to the Premier Shooting and Training Center gun range having a liquor license. The license will have to be approved by the state. (0:43)
- 3/28/22 Disabled Adults Theft: This story reported the former director of Open Options, an organization that manages group homes, has been summoned to court. She is charged with theft for using funds designated for client living expenses for personal gain. (0:31)

FOX19 Now (Late)

- 1/21/22 Dating Site Fraud: This story reported a woman accused of scamming hundreds of thousands of dollars using fake dating site profiles is being returned to the Cincinnati area to stand trial. (1:24)
- 1/28/22 Local Schools Receive Threats: This story reported two Butler County schools were placed on lockdown following threats. The School Secretary received emails threatening the start shooting at the schools. Police remained on scene through the day. (0:29)
- 1/28/22 Kidnapping Victim: This segment interviewed a woman who was allegedly kidnapped after her ex-boyfriend hid in the trunk of her car. The suspect allegedly threatened her with a gun and to shoot her up with heroin. (1:19)
- 2/1/22 Princeton Coach Plea: This story informed viewers the former wrestling coach and security monitor from Princeton Middle School has accepted a plea deal on his sexual abuse charges. He pled guilty to four counts and will be required to register as a sex offender. (0:27)
- 2/9/22 Business Safety Preps: This story reported on the way local businesses are preparing for the Super Bowl and any subsequent celebrations. Some businesses will be open during and after the game and making sure they are ready for any craziness. (1:37)
- 2/10/22 Delphi Anniversary: This story reported on the five-year anniversary of the murder of two fourteen-year-old girls in Delphi, Indiana. The crime is still unsolved. The families are marking the anniversary hoping for more leads. (0:30)

- 2/14/22 AG on Reynolds: This story reported Ohio's Attorney General has asked the state supreme court to suspend a Butler County official facing corruption charges. The court will appoint three retired judges to review the case. (0:54)
- 2/21/22 Jail Death: This story reported the Campbell County Jail is being sued by the family of a woman who died while in custody. The woman was arrested for public intoxication. She was allegedly placed in a restraint chair for 16 hours before her death. (0:47)
- 2/22/22 Hamilton Anti-Violence: This story reported on an anti-gun violence group in Hamilton. Street Rescue works to get guns out of the wrong hands and find those that are hidden around the community for criminals to use. (0:32)
- 2/24/22 Teens Charged: This story reported two teenagers who are indicted in the shooting death of a bystander and felony assault in a second shooting will be tried as adults. A dozen or more shots were fired in the gun battle. (0:45)
- 2/25/22 Gun Takeback Event: This story reported the group "Street Rescue" is hosting a gun takeback event, trying to get guns and ammunition off the streets in response to a recent surge of violent crime. The event is a no questions asked offer. (0:46)
- 3/15/22 Museums Hacked: This story reported the Cincinnati Museum Center, and the Underground Railroad Freedom Center were hit by a virus attack targeting tickets software and exhibit lighting. The museums don't think they were specifically targeted. (1:51)
- 3/24/22 Esther's Law in Effect: This story reported Esther's Law has gone into effect in Ohio. People in assisted living or their families can install cameras in their rooms to make sure they are being cared for appropriately. (0:38)
- 3/25/22 Forensic Nurses: This story profiled a special team of nurses at St. Elizabeth Hospital. The nurses administer rape kits and help collect evidence in assault, trafficking, and domestic violence cases. (1:10)
- 3/29/22 Stalking Victim: This story anonymously profiled a stalking victim whose attacker received only four years in prison. She stated she felt he should have gotten a longer sentence and fears he will come after her again when he is paroled. (2:47)

Keeping You Safe

FOX19 Now (Morning)

- 1/20/22 QR Code Scams: This story reported the FBI is warning people about fake QR codes for apps. The codes are easy for hackers to make and use to steal personal information. The FBI recommends using app stores to download apps. (0:21)
- 1/26/22 Propane Leak: This story alerted residents in Saint Bernard that Police and Duke Energy has been investigating reports of natural gas odors in the area. The situation was traced to a propane leak at a Construction site and has been resolved. (0:22)
- 2/2/22 Car Prep: This story gave viewers tips from Triple A on how drivers can be best prepared for the coming winter weather. They also encouraged those who do not have to be on the roads to stay home. (0:34)
- 2/28/22 Most Common Leaked Passwords: This story warned viewers about the most commonly cracked passwords for online sites. Reminded them not to use things like "password" or strings of consecutive numbers. (0:24)
- 3/14/22 Fuel Thieves: This story alerted viewers to warnings from Ross Township Police about thieves siphoning gas from cars or cutting fuel lines to get at the gasoline. (0:28)
- 3/15/22 Check Theft and Tampering: This story alerted viewers to a rash of mail theft and check forgery incidents around the area. They suggest people mailing checks take those pieces into the post office rather than placing in outside mailboxes. (0:29)
- 3/24/22 Ford Recalls: This story reported Ford is recalling close to 200,000 vehicles due to break fluid leaks. At least four low speed accidents have already occurred. (0:29)

Special Coverage

2/3/22 – WXIX aired extended news coverage to keep viewers informed about the ongoing winter weather event. Coverage included sleet and snow totals, road conditions and business and school closings. Extended coverage aired from 4:00-4:30AM and from 11:00AM-3:00PM.

FOX19 News Morning Xtra

- 2/9/22 Valentine's Scams: This story alerted viewers to popular ways to scam Valentine's shoppers. They story warned viewers about fake websites and other red flags to be aware of when shopping. (1:28)
- 2/23/22 Fakes Tests/Sites: This story alerted viewers that scammers have been trying to capitalize on the backlog of home tests and long waits at testing sites. Warned viewers to be careful where they order at home tests. (2:07)

FOX19 Now (Afternoon)

2/1/22 – Kia Recall: This story alerted viewers to recall on a number of Kia models. The recall involves the airbag computer covers, which could damage the vehicle's electrical circuits. (0:25)

- 3/21/22 Fire Investment: This story reported the city of Cincinnati is investing \$1.1 million in new equipment for the fire department. They will buy a new pumper truck and two new medic units. The oldest current vehicle is older than some of the firefighters. (0:30)
- 3/24/22 Pedestrian Safety Systems: This story reported the City of Cincinnati is investing \$1 million in pedestrian safety for the city. In 2021, more than 300 people were hit by cars, seven of whom died. The investment allows neighborhoods to install speed cushions on high-risk roads. (1:15)
- 3/25/22 Zelle Warning: This story reported 5/3 Bank customers who use the Zelle mobile payment app are being targeted by scammers. The story alerted viewers to be on the lookout for suspicious text messages. (1:04)
- 3/28/22 Google Update: This story reported Google Chrome users are being urged to update their browser version immediately. The update is to fix a single vulnerability problem. (1:54)

FOX19 Now (Evening)

- 1/19/22 Weather Advisory: This segment alert viewers throughout the area of the winter weather potential and the threat of roads re-freezing due to the very low temperatures. (1:22)
- 1/19/22 PNC Scam Warning: This story alerted PNC customers to a scam. The company is aware that customers are receiving fraudulent texts, calls and emails with a "transfer PIN" and a website link. (0:26)
- 2/1/22 Local Companies Hacked: This story alerted viewers that hackers have gotten into the email systems of local companies and are sending out scam emails. The emails say "Invitation to Bid" followed by the name of the hacked company. (1:43)
- 2/4/22 Smartphone Hacked: This story warned viewers about the prevalence of hacking regarding smartphones. It also gave them warning signs to look for that their phone and data could be compromised. (1:29)
- 2/9/22 IRS Scam: This story alerted viewers to a scam claiming to be from the IRS. Viewers who receive a text message claiming to be from the Agency with a Covid-19 subject line should delete it. The agency will hardly ever send texts to contact filers. (1:30)
- 2/14/22 Kettering Police Scam: This story warned viewers about scammers claiming to be Kettering Police Detectives. The story gave the correct callback number and encouraged anyone contacted to call that number to verify. (0:24)
- 2/17/22 Sim Card Scam: This story alerted viewers to a scam where hackers are getting access to cell data to transfer to another sim card, allowing them to access and steal the user's data. (0:31)
- 2/18/22 Improving Privacy: This story reported on ways users can better protect the information on their phones and computers. (1:24)

3/11/22 – Suicide and Police Officers: This story reported on the increasing suicide rates among first responders. A new law requires the FBI to anonymously gather data on suicides and attempted suicides from law enforcement agencies. The goal is to find common trends the trigger the events and try to prevent them. (0:31)

1/1/22 - 3/31/22 -- Various *PSAs*: WXIX aired public service announcements regarding health and personal safety issues during the first quarter of 2022. The PSAs aired at various times and ranged in length from ten seconds to one minute.

- 1/20/22 Drive-Thru Site: This story alerted viewers to a new drive-thru Covid testing site in Montgomery. The site will be staffed by the National Guard and open weekdays 8-4. (0:22)
- 1/20/22 Positivity Rates: This story reported Kentucky is seeing record positivity rates at nearly a third. Rural medical facilities are overwhelmed. (0:24)
- 1/25/22 Yearly Booster: This story reported the CEO of Pfizer is predicting the Covid-19 vaccine could become a yearly shot, like a flu shot, rather than getting a booster every few months. The company is working on a vaccine that covers current variants. (0:18)
- 1/31/22 New Testing Sites: This story reported two local corona virus testing sites are expanding their hours. The city is offering a total of six sites to expand urban access to testing. The Ohio Department of Health is staffing the sites. (0:45)
- 2/1/22 Xavier Vaccine Policy: This story reported Xavier University is modifying their vaccination for the Cintas Center. The school says cases have dropped enough to no longer require proof of vaccination, but masks are still required in the center. (0:27)
- 2/9/22 Vaccine Plant Pause: This story reported a Dutch plant making the Johnson and Johnson vaccine has ceased production for a time. The plant will resume making the doses on a few months and it is not clear what impact his will have on global supply. (0:26)
- 2/21/22 Covid Pill: This story reported Merck's Covid-19 anti-viral pill appears to work. A study shows the treatment reduced the risk of hospitalization by 65%. (0:26)
- 3/4/22 Indiana Rescinds Emergency: This story reported Indiana has rescinded the statewide Covid-19 Public Emergency order. A few of the associated policies remain in effect, including enhanced Medicaid and food assistance. (0:26)
- 3/11/22 Ohio Ending Daily Reports: This story reported the Ohio Department of Health is shifting from daily to weekly covid reporting. This change brings the state more inline with current CDC benchmarks and focuses on severity versus spread. (0:30)
- 3/14/22 Music Hall Rules: This story reported Cincinnati Music Hall and the Aronoff Center are dropping their vaccine/negative test requirements to attend. Mask mandates will drop on the 28th. (0:15)
- 3/17/22 Canada Lifting Restrictions: This story reported Canada is lifting their pre-entry testing requirement for all fully vaccinated travelers. Officials may still select visitors for random testing and could reinstate restrictions if cases go up again. (0:23)

1/12/22 – WXIX aired live coverage of the Mayor of Cincinnati's Press Conference. Speech addressed Covid protocols in city buildings and the current state of the pandemic. Address ran from 10:36-10:44AM.

1/13/22 – WXIX aired live coverage of the President's Address. The speech focused on national response to the Omicron variant of the pandemic. Address ran from 10:41-10:41AM.

1/19/22 — WXIX aired live coverage of the President's Address. The speech addressed his first year in office and announced the government would release 400 million N95 Masks from their Strategic National Stockpiles. Address aired from 4:02-5:55PM.

FOX19 Now (Afternoon)

1/19/22 – Testing Priorities: With increased demand for Covid-19 tests, the Ohio Department of Health states it is prioritizing the tests they have for schools and universities. The majority of testing now is for athletes who want to return to play. (0:12)

2/11/22 – Vaccine Delay: This story reported the FDA has delayed their meeting to discuss approval for the Pfizer vaccine for children under 5. The FDA wants to see more data before making a decision. (0:24)

2/21/22 – Indiana School Policies: This story reported Indiana is loosening its Covid restrictions for schools. Contact tracing and quarantine will no longer be required, but those who do test positive will be encouraged to isolate. (0:31)

2/25/22 – Hospital Visits: This story reported that due to the dramatic drop in Covid hospitalizations, Premier Health is returning to normal visitor guidelines. The guidelines are also updated for patients who test positive for covid. (0:26)

3/10/22 – Change in Reporting: This story reported the Ohio Department of Health will shift to weekly reporting of Covid-19 data effective the week of March 14. The change comes as Ohio's statewide averages dropped below 100,000 for the first time since last August. (0:25)

FOX19 Now (Evening)

1/19/22 – Hamilton County Cases: This story reported on the alarming rise in Covid-19 cases in Hamilton County. There are more than 40,000 active cases, up 8,000 from the prior week. Current positivity rate is 30%. (0:22)

1/19/22 – Oxford Mask Mandate: This story reported the Oxford City Council voted 6-1 to implement an emergency city-wide indoor mas mandate. The move was in response to concern over the Omicron variant. (1:34)

1/22/22 – Surge and Vaccines: This story reported on new studies showing that three shots of either the Moderna or Pfizer vaccines offer strong protection against the Omicron variant. Adults with booster shots who still got sick were able to avoid hospitalization and intensive care at a high rate. (1:35)

1/27/22 – Drop in Vaccines: This story reported Ohio is seeing a drop in vaccination rates again. There was an increase when the Omicron variant was spreading, but not interest is waning. Ohio has relatively low vaccination rates. (0:40)

2/10/22 – Ohio Cases Dropping: This story reported that while cases are dropping in Ohio, officials state it is too early to declare victory. The National Guard is still deployed to help in hospitals, though the number serving has also declined. (0:14)

3/8/22 — Cincinnati Drops Restrictions: This story reported the city of Cincinnati and local arts organizations are dropping their Covid protocols. The positivity rate in the area is around 1%, the best situation since June of 2021. (0:29)
