- 9. Environment/Animals including chemical spills, landfills, water quality and smog, and animal protection and conservation.
- 10. Healthy Living including exercise, dieting, disease prevention, and personal safety issues, as well as mental health initiatives and new treatment options.
 - Corona Virus: Part of Health, includes updates on issues relating to the Covid-19 outbreak, such as health information, public orders, and other relevant information.

Crime and Safety

FOX19 Now (Morning)

10/6/21 – Gun Violence Memorial Project: This story reported the city of Cincinnati is collecting mementos for the national Gun Violence Memorial Project in Washington. Families can donate remembrance items. The memorial will be on display through September of 2022. (0:53)

10/11/21 – Constable in Court: This story reported a Kenton County Constable is in court on Wanton Endangerment and other charges. The constable was charged after allegedly serving a 'writ of possession' in a county where he does not have jurisdiction and threatening the homeowner. (1:12)

10/14/21 – Rape Case DNA: This story followed up on the veteran police office under investigation for accusations of shelving DNA test results for years. The investigation has been underway since June. (0:37)

10/19/21 – Homicide Numbers: This story reported Cincinnati is on track to set a new homicide record. There were 94 total in 2020; there are already 76 for 2021. Police say shootings are down compared to last year. (0:28)

10/25/21 – Pay for Warrant Scam: This story alerted viewers in Fort Mitchell about a new scam. Callers claim to be from the police department and demand gift cards for warrants and bail. Police ask potential victims to report the number to them. (0:30)

10/28/21 – Sentence for Drug Trafficking: This story reported one of 13 defendants in a massive drug trafficking case has been sentenced to nine years. Prosecutors claim he coordinated the distribution of enough fentanyl to kill everyone in Cincinnati. (0:27)

11/4/21 – Mt. Airy Attacker: This story reported police are asking for the public's help to identify a suspect sketch. The man pictured is wanted for questioning in connection with two attacks on women in Mt. Airy Forest. (0:50)

11/5/21 – FAA Unruly Passengers: This story reported on letters the FAA is sending to passengers who cause disturbances on flights. They are issuing fines up to \$37,000 and sending some cases to the DOJ for criminal prosecution. (0:54)

11/10/21 - KSP Cams: This story reported Kentucky's Governor is laying out a proposal to equip state troopers with cruiser and body cameras. The plan also includes a pay raise for troopers and dispatchers to attract and retain qualified people. (0:39)

11/30/21 – Ransomware Payouts: This story reported the US Treasury says payments to ransomware hackers grew massively in the first half of 2021. The report found about \$590 million in payouts. The hackers also trafficked more than \$5 billion in bitcoin over the past three years. (0:27)

12/14/21 – Boy Scout Abuse Settlement: This story reported the Boy Scouts of America have reached a tentative settlement plan to compensate sexual abuse survivors. Insurance companies will pay \$850 Million into a trust. More than 92,000 claims have been filed by former scouts. (1:06)

12/29/21 – Reading Dispatch Changes: This story alerted viewers that the Hamilton County Communications Center will handle all of the emergency dispatch duties for the city of Reading. The county already handles fire and EMS calls and will now handle police calls as well. (0:33)

10/4/21 – Human Trafficking Sting: This story reported 161 people have been arrested as part of a statewide operation in Ohio on human trafficking. The work also helped 51 potential victims and rescued ten missing children. (1:07)

10/13/21 – Cop Hid Rape Kits: This story reported a Cincinnati police officer is under investigation for allegedly hiding the DNA test results in cases going back several years. Prosecutors state hundreds of cases could be impacted. (0:45)

10/14/21 – Move Over Day: This story informed viewers that Saturday is ODOT Move Over Day. It's a reminder of Ohio's law to move over and slow down for emergency vehicles on the side of the road. Nearly 550 crashes have happened this year. (0:24)

10/19/21 – Cold Case: This story reported a van tied to a 2002 Delhi Cold Case has been found in the Ohio River. Human remains have been found and will be tested to confirm they belong to the woman who deliberately drive into the river with her children. (0:31)

10/27/21 – Car Theft Ring: This story alerted viewers to a car theft ring operating throughout the area. Police are reminding people not to leave anything of value in their vehicles. The crimes may all be tied to one gang of teenagers. (0:34)

11/8/21 – Coroner Press Conference: This story reported the coroner's office is looking for assistance in identifying three unknown women. Dr. Sammarco is hoping the public can help give names to the victims and closure to their families. (0:35)

11/9/21 – Jane Doe Identified: This follow up story reported that one of the three women profiled by the Hamilton County Coroner has been identified. The woman's cause of death is still being investigated. (0:32)

11/22/21 – Parade Latest: This story reported the suspect in Waukesha parade incident was running from a domestic dispute. Police have confirmed it was not a chase or an act of terrorism. (0:35)

11/24/21 – OVI Checkpoint: This story reported the Butler County OVI task force will have a checkpoint on Route 4 looking for impaired drivers. The Thanksgiving holiday has become one of the deadliest on the roads for OVI crashes. (0:40)

11/29/21 – Thanksgiving Safety Report: This story reported 13 people were killed in crashes on Ohio roads over the holiday weekend. That is an increase from 2020. Troopers also arrested 300 people for impaired driving. (0:29)

12/2/21 – Father Drew Plea: This story reported the priest accused of rape has pleaded guilty and will spend seven years behind bars. The charges stem for events before he became a priest. (0:57)

12/3/21 – Milford Student Arrested: This story reported a Milford Junior High School student has been arrested after it was reported he made a "kill list" of other students. The school and police are investigating. (0:53)

FOX19 Now (Evening)

10/1/21 – Collin's Law: This story reported on a new law going into effect. Collin's law makes hazing a felony. It also increases penalties for those who are aware of hazing and do not report it. (0:25)

10/11/21 – Highway Patrol Fighting Lasers: This story reported the Ohio Highway Patrol is working to locating and arresting people shining lasers at aircraft. The lasers can cause the cockpit to go black. Those caught are charged with felonies. (2:16)

10/18/21 – Community Meeting: This story reported the Neighborhoods Committee of Cincinnati City Council will hold a community meeting in Evanston. Council members want to hear from residents about stopping the gun violence and other challenges the neighborhood is facing. (0:27)

10/21/21 – Sycamore School Board Issue: This story reported a member of the Sycamore School Board is being investigated by the Ohio Education Association for suspected unethical and illegal behavior. The board member is alleged to have the school's engineering program making products for his private company. (2:42)

10/29/21 – Car Crash Record: This story reported the US has reached a 15-year high for highway crashes and fatalities. More than 20,000 people died from January -June of 2021, and 18% increase over 2020. Speeding and not wearing seatbelts are primary factors. (0:45)

11/3/21 – After Hours Crackdown: This story reported on a new ordinance in Mount Healthy which cracks down on after-hours clubs and other businesses with late night access. Police say they have been called to too many of these that have gotten out of hand. (1:41)

11/23/21 – Bates Lawsuit: This story reported the Ohio Supreme Court has ruled a lawsuit against Hamilton County caseworkers can move forward. The suit was filed by the grandmother of a toddler who died and alleges the caseworkers ignored the mother's history of abuse leading to the death. (0:41)

11/23/21 – Opioid Case Update: This story reported a federal jury is holding three retail pharmacy chains liable for their role in distributing pain pills and contributing to the opioid crisis in two Ohio counties. (0:46)

11/30/21 – Use of Force Database: This story informed viewers the Office of Criminal Justice is unveiling a new "use of force" database that is searchable by citizens. The goal is to improve police-community relations. (0:18)

12/3/21 – Traffic Violations Review: This story reported on proposed legislation in Ohio what would ban police from pulling over drivers for minor violations like broken taillights. The goal is to repair relations between police and communities. (0:29)

12/15/21 – Massage Parlor Trafficking: This story reported two locations in Butler and Ross counties have been bust for prostitution and human trafficking. The bust was the result of multiple sting operations by several agencies. Authorities are working to help the women rescued from these businesses. (1:40)

12/21/21 – Body Cam Rollout: This story reported on the rollout of new Body Camera technology in all Ohio State Patrol cruisers. The upgraded equipment should eliminate situation where officers forget to turn on their cameras. (1:35)

FOX19 Now (Late)

10/6/21 - Mt. Airy Attack: This story alerted viewers to a daytime assault on a jogger in Mt. Airy Forest. The woman was running alone when the man attacked her. She was able to scream and get away from him but wanted others to be aware of the potential dangers. (1:57)

10/12/21 – Unsolved Anniversary: This story reported on the 11-year anniversary of the double murder of a father and son. The two men were shot in their car and the crime is still unsolved. (2:11)

10/12/21 – Shooting Vigil: This story reported on a vigil for the woman killed in a West End Shooting. Two other people were injured. Eleven people have been shot in that neighborhood in the past three weeks, making it one of the city's most violent neighborhoods. (1:19)

10/20/21 – Schroder Case Follow Up: This story reported on statements from the county prosecutor about the intensive investigations into cases handled by the accused police officer. Prosecutors will be checking any rape or sexual assault cases handled by the officer to make sure any DNA results were followed. (0:30)

10/23/21 – Rally for Cold Case Cards: This story reported the non-profit group U Can Speak for Me is rallying to get the cold case playing cards back into the county jail. The sheriff stated prisoners have been using the cards to compromise locks and has removed them from the jail. (2:06)

10/29/21 – Car Title Fraud: This story reported on a local man who allegedly used a fake identity to buy cars from dealerships. He is accused of then changing the vin numbers and then retitling the cars in Ohio. (1:20)

11/1/21 – Wrong Way Crashes: This story reported on a fatal wrong-way crash on I-71 north of the city. While technology exists to prevent wrong way drivers, ODOT states that it would not be financially feasible to install at the more than 5,200 interchanges statewide. (1:19)

11/2/21 – Threat at Poll: This story reported police are investigating after a woman was reportedly threatened at a polling place. The woman states an unknown man shouted obscenities and pointed a gun at her outside the poll. (0:37)

11/4/21 – Money Stolen from City: This story reported the City of Cincinnati has lost \$137,000 due to a scam. Someone impersonating a contractor called the city to update the contractor's electronic fund transfer information. Additional safeguards are being added to prevent a recurrence. (0:41)

11/10/21 – Witness Fight: This story reported attorneys representing the defendant in a quadruple murder case have asked for public money for expert witnesses. The County Prosecutor is protesting because he thinks using public money for someone who has private representation would set a bad precedent. (2:08)

11/16/21 – Dress of Death: This story featured a local woman who has lost multiple family members to gun violence. She has had a dress specially made featuring their faces and the faces of victims from other unsolved shootings. (1:44)

11/17/21 - CPS Employee Charged: This story informed viewers a Cincinnati Public Schools employee has been charged with two counts for allegedly stealing from the district. The exact amount has not been released. (0:44)

11/19/21 – Hebrew Union College Report: this story discussed a newly released report alleging details of decades of sexual harassment at Hebrew Union College. The report states many students did not report the harassment for fear of retaliation. (1:08)

11/25/21 – Stolen License Plates: This story alerted viewers to a rash of stolen license plate incidents across the area. The timeline to these is similar to a regional car theft ring, and police are investigating whether the two are connected. (1:01)

11/29/21 – Cold Case Cards: this story reported the non-profit "U Can Speak for Me" says it is no longer selling their cold case playing cards in the Hamilton County Justice Center due to a security risk. They will sell in other centers while that risk is addressed. (0:55)

12/1/21 – Drug Arrests: This story informed viewers more than a dozen people have been arrested in one of the largest drug busts in Cincinnati history The group trafficked heroin and fentanyl throughout the area. (0:54)

12/6/21 – Delphi Murder Update: This story reported police in Delphi Indiana are looking for the owner of a fake social media profile. The profile is being researched in connection with the murder of two teenage girls in 2017. (1:11)

12/6/21 – Police Funding Proposal: This story reported Ohio's Governor has proposed that millions of dollars in Covid-19 stimulus grants would go to support first responders and fight violent crime. (0:50)

12/7/21 – Galla Park in Trouble Again: This story reported the bar and restaurant which had reached an agreement with the city to prevent a shutdown over perpetuating a nuisance is in trouble again. A new lawsuit alleges the business has not made any of the required changes, violating their agreement with the city. (0:38)

12/15/21 – McGuffey Interview: This segment interviewed Hamilton County Sheriff McGuffey about a plea deal from an excessive force case. The Sheriff stated she was very concerned about these types of incidents when she oversaw the county jail and is working as Sheriff to eradicate them. (1:32)

10/1/21 - 12/31/21 -- Various *PSAs*: WXIX aired public service announcements regarding crime prevention, safety, and anti-violence during the fourth quarter of 2021. The PSAs aired at various times and ranged in length from ten seconds to one minute.

FOX19 Now (Morning)

10/4/21 – Pedestrian Safety Buckets: This story informed viewers of a safety initiative in Mt. Washington. Buckets with pedestrian safety flags will be at major intersections. Pedestrians can grab one as they cross the road to make sure driver see them. (0:52)

10/6/21 – Volvo Recall: This story informed viewers that Volvo is recalling nearly 260,000 older vehicles. Front driver airbags in S-80 and S-60 sedans can explode and will need to have the faulty inflater replaced. (0:34)

10/13/21 – Jury Duty Scam: This story alerted viewers to a scam in Butler County. Callers are being told they missed jury duty and a warrant will be issued unless they send Target gift cards. (0:30)

10/19/21 – Northside Pedestrian Safety: This story reported police, community leaders and residents in Northside are working to improve pedestrian safety. Police are beefing up enforcement after a person was hit while crossing the street. City planners are looking at ways to slow traffic to the posted limit. (0:58)

10/25/21 – Shootings Follow Up: This story reported on a meeting with the Cincinnati Black United Front and Community members in response to recent shootings. The group met with city officials for more than two hours to discuss plans to curtail the violence. (2:34)

11/1/21 – Pedestrian Safety Rally: This story reported the families of four people killed or injured while crossing the street will hold a "Just Slow Down" rally for pedestrian safety. The rally starts in Avondale at 5PM. (0:22)

11/1/21 – Neighborhood Watch Meetings: This story informed viewers City Councilmember Betsy Sunderman held public meetings to show community members how to form neighborhood watch groups. Meetings showed residents how to protect their homes and report crimes anonymously. (0:26)

11/9/21 – Stop Signs Motion: This story reported the Law and Public Safety Committee is reviewing a proposal to add more stop signs to certain neighborhoods to increase safety. If it passes, the motion will go before the full council. (0:22)

11/11/21 – Fake Money Alert: This story alerted viewers that a woman received fake bills as change at a local store. Advised them to be on the lookout. Deputies state it is not uncommon to come across fake bills ((0:41)

11/15/21 – Veterans Scammed More: This story reported on an AARP report showing veterans get more fraudulent robocalls than other citizens. The scammers are trying to get vets to pay for services the government offers free. (0:23)

12/2/21 – Headphone Recall: this story alerted viewers to a safety recall on DeWalt Wireless headphones because of a burn risk. Eleven different models are involved. (0:44)

12/10/21 – Guns Removed: This story reported more illegal guns have been taken off of Cincinnati streets as part of a drug trafficking bust. One of the weapons had been reported missing from Georgetown, Kentucky. (0:25)

12/15/21 – Pork Recall: This story informed viewers about the recall of processed pork products from Alexander and Hornung. The products are being recalled for a potential Listeria contamination. A list is available from the USDA. (0:47)

12/20/21 – P&G Recall: This story alerted viewers Procter & Gamble is recalling 30 aerosol spray products. The recall is due to concerns over the levels of benzene in the products. (0:25)

12/22/21 – Amazon Scam: This story alerted viewers to a scam where the caller pretends to be from Amazon. The claim the customer has been locked out of their account and the caller can help them access it through a bogus support site. (0:34)

12/27/21 – Emergency Contractor Program: This story reported on a program in Kentucky to make sure victims are not taken advantage of. The Emergency Contractor Registration program requires contractors to register with the state before working in the disaster zone. It also provides scam and fraud prevention information to those needing services. (0:32)

12/17/21 – Mall Curfew: This story informed viewers Kenwood Mall is putting a curfew on those 17 and younger through the end of the Christmas shopping season. (0:23)

FOX19 Now (Afternoon)

10/20/21 – Safety Enforcement Campaign: This story reported Cincinnati Police are conducting a traffic safety enforcement campaign in District 5. Motorists in Northside and College Hill are asked to pay extra attention to all traffic laws. Hamilton Avenue has been a hotspot for pedestrians getting struck by vehicles. (0:24)

10/26/21 – Drugs Look Like Snacks: This story warned parents about edible THC products in packaging that looks like popular snack and candy brands. Encouraged parents to be on the alert on Halloween and report any products they find. (0:42)

11/29/21 – Keep the Wreath Red: This story informed viewers about the annual safety campaign from the Colerain Fire Department. Each fire station has a wreath lit with red bulbs; one will be changed to white for each structure fire during the holiday season. (0:29)

10/8/21 – Computer Security Risks: This story reported on the increased difficulty of keeping computers safe when working from home. If remote workers are using their own computers and those machines are used by others in the household, company data could be at risk. (1:24)

10/18/21 – Domestic Violence Clinics: This story reported the YWCA is partnering with Kroger's Little Clinic to address domestic violence.
