The Journal report shines a light on audit findings that a city worker whose relatives owned a company profiting from bond money had authority to decide who would be awarded contracts for parks work. The total of those contracts over several years, according to the Journal's investigation, was more than \$115-thousand. The money was awarded to Ulibarri Landscaping, and the employee - Ben Gurule - is married to the daughter of the late Alfonso Ulibarri, the owner of the company. The Journal found Gurule was directly involved in executing the bond. The city's spokesman says City Councilors will be looking at tightening the purchasing manual so as to avoid potential conflicts of interest in the future.

Hate crime legislation has been on the books in New Mexico since 2003, in the form of an additional penalty at sentencing of up to a year in prison, if prosecutors can present convincing evidence that a crime was motivated by hate.
