KJAA MIAMI, AZ PROGRAM LISTS AND REPORTS 1st QUARTER 2022

In addition to its unique blend of music, comprised primarily obscure soul and R&B from the 1950s and 1960s mixed with sambas, pop standards, instrumentals and early rock and roll chosen for its local appeal without regard to national popularity; KJAA airs public service announcements around the clock along with hourly weather, news items and immediate updates when dangerous conditions exist, as well as at least one full length morning drive local newscast each weekday morning including local job openings. KJAA does not attempt to compete with national news sources. Using a need-to-know approach, KJAA focuses exclusively on local events and concerns. KJAA is heard on 1240 AM, and on 106.1 FM via translator K291CU.

The first quarter of 2022 was one of relative calm with no defining issues for Globe-Miamians, much like the fourth quarter of 2021. Public attention focused on future planning—from the redevelopment of Globe's pool, to how best to mitigate the coming fires, which are a way of life here.

As is always the case, **Mining** is crucially important to the well-being of the local community. Though diversification efforts have been made over the decades, nothing displaces the impact of the fate and fortune of mining here. While mining has undeniably declined since its high point many decades ago, the last few quarters have brought uplifting news, and the first quarter of 2022 continues that trend.

Highlights included glowing financial reports from Freeport McMoRan, Capstone Mining, Rio Tinto and Grupo Mexico, with record yields and earnings, and low production costs. (Grupo Mexico's boast of the lowest costs of production in the industry at 84 cents a pound would be of great concern to local workers, if it were not the case that local costs of production are \$2.00 a pound. Grupo Mexico's Hayden smelter remains immobile since the unresolved union strike two years ago.)

The big mining story was the announcement of a merger between Vancouver BC based Capstone Mining, owner of the Pinto Valley mine west of Miami, and Bermuda based Mantos Copper, which received full approval from all necessary authorities as the quarter came to a close. While the news appears rosy for the new giant Capstone Copper, which still trades on the Toronto exchange, there is a lingering Chile question. Mantos' contribution to the merger is two mines in Chile, close to the Santa Domingo mine there owned by Capstone. But February news from Chile announced a vote in that country to nationalize all copper. Chile is the world's leading copper producer and a bill to nationalize copper mining passed an assembly committee. It goes on to the full assembly and then a national referendum vote later this year.

Uneasiness closer to home continues over the fate of the Resolution Copper project in nearby Superior. This continues to be as much a story about the local **Economy**, as it is about mining. The issue highlights how mining and the economy have always been intertwined here, as great hope continues that the opening of what will be the world's largest underground mine, will be the event that turns the economic tide for the Town of Superior and the Copper Corridor including Globe, Miami and San Carlos. But it is San Carlos that continues to attempt to put the breaks on the project, which was on the brink of final approval until the changes in the federal government after the 2020 election. The issue is whether the necessary land swap endangers Oak Flat, an area the Apaches claim is a sacred religious site, though there is much evidence disputing it. The problem for the Apaches is the land is federal property and congress previously approved its swap for private land to facilitate the Res Copper project. The problem for proponents is that the current administration is leaning towards nullifying its passage. How that would be possible is still a question, but this quarter found a top Washington DC official coming to the region to meet with the Apaches in what was termed 'government to government' talks. Though Arizona Representative Raul Grijalva is resolute in his desire to undo the swap, the guarter ended without evidence of how those talks progressed.

Encouraging mining **Employment** news came from multiple sources including BHP, which issued a community notice of their intent to install air quality monitors and a weather station in April at its Solitude tailings site, a large flat swarth of ground near Miami, which shall remain in place until the end of 2024 in order to collect data to support ongoing engineering, operations and maintenance plans.

Non-mining employment also got a boost this quarter with the announcement that Casa Grande will be getting another factory. In addition to the huge electric car plant, plumbing manufacturer Kohler Company has inked a deal for a new multi million-dollar 250-acre site with a one million square foot building set to employ over 400 workers.

Good news also came from continually declining unemployment figures in the state. February 2022's 3.6% rate is almost half of what it was a year ago when unemployment figures topped 6%. January registered 3.7%, with December, November and October 2021, all at 3.9%.

Like the rest of the country, Arizona residents, including those in Southern Gila County, have experienced challenging gas prices. Prices in Globe-Miami hovered around \$4.24 this quarter. That compares to one service station in Scottsdale, which in February topped \$6.50 a gallon. The lowest recorded price was \$3.99 in Tucson. However, the undeniable effect of high inflation on economically challenged regions like Globe-Miami did not overtly manifest this quarter. **Transportation** issues continued through the vital Hwy 60 corridor to Phoenix this quarter, due solely to the after effects of the Pinto Creek Bridge replacement project. Travel was reduced to one lane repeatedly with pilot cars as cleanup from the project including new guardrails, painting and striping continued. Hwy 77 to Tucson was also adversely affected as travel was restricted to one lane in alternating directions facilitated by automatic flagging operations for over a month this quarter as crews continued to mitigate last year's flood damage near Winkelman.

Infrastructure and **Blight** issues were addressed on multiple fronts this quarter. The news from the long-beleaguered Tri-City Sanitary District sewer project continued to be encouraging as it appears that the project is moving forward appropriately. Work on rehabbing the Globe Pool in time for swimming season continues. The Madeira Peak television translator location here received upgrades and is operational with local residents able to pick up Channels 3, 5, 8, 10 and 12 from Phoenix using outdoor antennas. And addressing a well-known housing shortage, were two public hearings. One in January rezoned the blighted Hill Street School so the building could be transformed into 70 residential units. Another in March granted a conditional use permit for 90 age-restricted, multifamily units on a vacant site adjacent to the TraveLodge on Hwy 60.

Environmental concerns were also tackled this quarter with prescribed burns in various areas to thin the Tonto National Forest in preparation for fire season, and specifically with the announcement from Tonto management that 115,000 acres of land in the Globe Ranger District would be handled as part of the Tribal Forest Protection Act. From the eastern boundary of the forest to the edge of the San Carlos Apache reservation, restoration of watersheds, reducing forest density, returning the area to a more natural and historical vegetative state, and landscaping to improve forest health and prevent burns, are part of the plans that will also reduce fire danger on the reservation.

Education in the area continues to be a disappointment. Though various efforts are made, the lack of results is evidenced by this quarter's announcement: The Gila County Science Fair was cancelled due to lack of entries. The issue is much deeper than the distance learning blamed by school administrators.

Healthcare here was no different than the rest of the state and country this quarter. An eye continued on Covid infection and vaccination stats, but overall the pandemic was palpably winding down. Hope from all corners is that this will continue. Sad news was had when life-long Globe resident Lilly Machado passed away. After the community raised funds for an off shore procedure when this otherwise health middle age woman was denied surgery in Arizona due to insufficient finances, she traveled to Mexico. High hopes were dashed last quarter when her donor was disqualified and she began the long wait for a suitable liver.

Hopes again rose this quarter when a donor was found and she was deemed healthy enough to undergo the surgery. She came through the procedure and initial indications showed success. However, weakened by unrelated infections, she did not survive.

Once again this quarter, **Election** news was dominated by redistricting plans. It was determined that the final 2020 census figures mandate redistricting, but by the quarter's end, new district boundaries had not been finalized.

January 2022 voter stats showed that Arizona now has 4,703,880 registered voters with 1,605,575 independents; 1,594,602 republicans; and 1,464,303 democrats. Registered libertarians accounted for 39,970.

Creating interest and participation in community meetings is the often-elusive goal of local community leaders everywhere. To facilitate wider-reach and easieraccess, the Chairman of the Gila County Board of Supervisors, Tim Humphrey uses KQSS as the origination point of his monthly meeting. Listeners and residents are invited to participate, but for those who miss the live meeting, it is replayed the following weekend on KJAA, and is available as a download on KQSS.net. Here's a review of this quarter's meetings heard on KJAA:

Tim Humphrey Community Meeting

January 16, 2022 8:00-8:30 AM

There's no avoiding it, redistricting is required in Gila County for the three supervisor districts. Tim Humphrey explained that District One is over-populated due to the growth of Payson, and District Two is under populated. Suggestions and maps from the public were solicited. Humphrey expects that to even out the three districts, part of District One will be moved to District Three, and a portion of District Three will be moved to District Two. The reasons for these seemingly complicated solution is that District One Supervisor Woody Cline lives in Young, and therefore Young can not be removed from the district as the supervisor of it must reside within it. Further districts must be contiguous. Firm decisions will be made before the next monthly meeting.

Tim Humphrey Community Meeting

February 20, 2022 8-8:30 AM

It's possible there is no more beleaguered group in the history of Globe Miami than the Tri-City Regional Sanitary District. The TRSD has been at it for over a dozen years, creating a sewer system for the unincorporated land between Globe and Miami, with until recently over nothing to show for it. With a history of taxing owners they'll never serve, to taxing properties in another district, few positive thoughts are on any resident's mind about this group. Adding to the consternation is the undeniable fact that the properties covered by the district are in imminent danger of condemnation. Most are served by cesspools, which by law can not be repaired should they fail, and almost all are on lots too small to accommodate a septic system under USDA requirements. While no one likes the prospect of higher taxes for government services, it's even less desirable to have no usable property at all. Finally, the tide appears to be turning. With a new board, and more impactful, a new lawyer for the district, plans have been made and dates have been set. Board chairman Robert Jacques joined Tim Humphrey for this meeting to review the current situation and the expectations for upcoming events, including potential dates for long awaited services.

Tim Humphrey Community Meeting

March 20, 2022 8-8:30 AM

This meeting was primarily an update of programs, events, and involvements of the Gila County Board of Supervisors including the current status of redistricting, which is mandated due to population shifts; plans to rehab the Globe Pool— competing plans for a regional aquatic center are now off the table and all

stakeholders are in agreement that enhancing the existing pool is the way to go; preparation for the upcoming wildfire season (to be discussed in full at a future meeting); and a variety of topics of interest such as Gila County's abandoned cemetery. Though burials continue to this day on the Central Heights grounds, the cemetery is claimed by no entity. Segments of the cemetery such as the Serbian section are maintained by interest groups, but the cemetery itself has no known owner.

In addition to extensive reporting on the foregoing, KJAA enhances its public service presence with three long form nationally produced shows chosen for their coverage of issues impacting the local area. Unlike stations that choose to bury required public interest programs, KJAA is proud to offer an hour and a half long block of this information in morning drive on Saturdays.

Health Care is an issue of critical importance to all Americans. Not only is cost a factor for most people, in rural areas like Globe-Miami in particular, availability is an issue, from where to find care to what treatment options exist. **Radio Health Journal** is a weekly half hour program dealing with all facets of health care from scientific to sociological.
