4th QUARTER 2022

Like the quarter before it, the fourth quarter of 2022 was relatively calm and uneventful. Gila County is largely insulated from doubt about election security in that only paper ballots are used on election day, and mail-in balloting, the primary method of voting here for many years, is considered reliable; thus the election brought no noticeable issues. Unlike the majority of the state, Gila County voters overwhelmingly supported republican candidates. Though final statewide results showed democratic victories in the races for Arizona governor, secretary of state, and attorney general, some so close that recounts were ordered, reaction was muted.

In addition to its unique blend of music, comprised primarily obscure soul and R&B from the 1950s and 1960s mixed with sambas, pop standards, instrumentals and early rock and roll chosen for its local appeal without regard to national popularity; KJAA airs public service announcements around the clock along with hourly weather, news items and immediate updates when dangerous conditions exist, as well as at least one full length morning drive local newscast each weekday morning including local job openings. KJAA does not attempt to compete with national news sources. Using a need-to-know approach, KJAA focuses exclusively on local events and concerns. KJAA is heard on 1240 AM, and on 106.1 FM via translator K291CU.

Mining, forever the economic driver in the Globe-Miami Community despite sporadic efforts to broaden the area's commercial base, continues to dominate the local financial landscape. Third quarter results showed healthy balance sheets though declines continued across the board. The reasons were simple and anticipated— inflation drove the cost of production higher, and lower realized copper prices drove income down.

In October, Freeport McMoRan (FMM) reported a total profit of \$404 million for the third quarter, down from over a billion dollars for each quarter last year. 1.1 billion pounds of copper, 480,000 ounces of gold and 17 million pounds of molybdenum were sold. Copper cost \$1.75 a pound to manufacture, and brought a price of \$3.50 per pound. This quarter, the ADEQ took public comments on their proposal to renew the air quality control permit for FMM's smelter here, and FMM announced a cash dividend of 15 cents per share of common stock payable February 1st.

Vancouver BC based Capstone Mining which employs 600 local workers showed a net profit at \$37.5 million in the third quarter, with cash flow at \$13.5 million compared to 67.1 million a year ago.

The big Grupo Mexico news for Arizonans this year is that the majority of hourly employees at its Mission mine have signed a petition requesting they no longer be represented by unions. The long-standing union issues at its Asarco properties near Globe are still not resolved. Grupo Mexico's third quarter report showed 84,130 tons of copper processed at Asarco. That's down 11.45% from a year ago due to lower grades of copper from the underground Mission Mine south of Tucson. The average net cost of producing copper at Asarco was up 43.25% from a year ago, at \$2.89 a pound. From all of its copper mines worldwide, production costs were \$1.28 per pound, up 66.9% from a year ago, but still the lowest cost in the industry. Consolidated revenue for Grupo Mexico from all

of its holdings was \$10.8 billion, which is down 8.3% from last year at this time. The company blames decreasing sales in its mining division for the decline.

A partnership between mining giants BHP and Rio Tinto was formed this quarter to accelerate the development of tailings technology that would significantly increase water recovery, and reduce safety problems and environmental footprints from storage. The first testing is expected to begin in Chile.

Undeniably copper prices dropped this year. The high price of 2022 came in March at \$4.87 a pound. The year's low price was \$3.20 in August. But while copper prices are major indicators of what's happening with our local **Economy**, the news was not all bad. Copper is still in healthy demand globally and only expected to rise substantially. Analysts from Goldman Sachs and Bank of America anticipate copper prices soaring next year. Though the global outlook is uncertain, analysts see short-term supply and long-term energy changes that demand more copper combining to push prices higher.

Statewide the jobless rate this quarter was the inverse of national figures. In Arizona, seasonally adjusted unemployment increased to 3.7% from 3.5%, while the US rate fell to 3.5% from 3.7%. For 2022, Arizona unemployment remained in the 3% range, with 100,000 new non-farm jobs created this year.

Like copper, gas prices were lower this quarter and that was good news for the inflation affected local population dependent on driving long distances for services. Regular unleaded gas was generally in the \$3 range everywhere in state this quarter. Phoenix recorded the highest price: \$4.25 a gallon in November. Tucson had the lowest: \$2.87 in December.

Transportation was relatively trouble free this quarter. While there were a few road projects on US 70 minimally delaying travel to Tucson; the most used highway, US 60 to Phoenix, was for the first time in a very long time without construction delays. However, two major accidents in the Top-of-the-World area caused hours long tie-ups this quarter.

Blight, a huge problem with the number of abandoned homes here due in large part to the lack sewer options, saw no relief this quarter. However, the future for our local **Infrastructure** continues to look better with work ongoing on the Tri-City Sanitary Board's project, and a modification to Globe's wastewater treatment plant in the Pinal Creek area. Public comments were taken by the ADEQ on a permit for the that.

Education was status quo this quarter, with low or no-cost local college options being the bright spot, and public K-12 schools continuing to be disappointing. Boyce Thompson Arboretum in conjunction with Arizona State University announced a \$300,000 donation, which will be used for research and educational purposes over a three-year period.

Local school board **Elections** were held this quarter, but despite the need for changes in public schools, interest was minimal. In fact, interest in the election seemed minimal overall. Few local offices were on the ballot, and as was the case with the state elections for governor, secretary of state and attorney general, voters here chose republican Blake Masters over victorious democrat incumbent Mark Kelly for US Senate. Partially due to redistricting, republican Eli Crane defeated Tom O'Halleran for the US House of Representatives in District 2, which now includes Gila County.

Creating interest and participation in **community meetings** is the often-elusive goal of local community leaders everywhere. To facilitate wider-reach and easier-access, the Chairman of the Gila County Board of Supervisors, Tim Humphrey uses KQSS as the origination point of his monthly meeting. Listeners and residents are

invited to participate, but for those who miss the live meeting, it is replayed the following weekend on KJAA, and is available as a download on KQSS.net. Here's a review of this quarter's meetings as replayed on KJAA:

Much is being done to rehab and revitalize the site, including the opening of the new Animal Care and Control facility. Not only is there sufficient room for dogs, cats, and other critters awaiting adoption or reunification in a large, clean, fully suitable building, but its location, next to a state prison, is ideal for the animals and the inmates, who are learning and thriving together. Animal Control Officer Anthony Puskaric joined Supervisor Humphrey to discuss the details.
