ISSUE: EDUCATION

Broadcast Date: Oct. 11/ 10 p.m.

Description: An Oklahoma senator sits down with state school leaders in an effort to get classrooms under control. The senator wants to give teachers and schools immunity when it comes to corporal punishment.
