They are looking for clinical and

non-clinical volunteers to help with services. Their budget is over 1.6 million dollars and needs more funding. They started a fundraising campaign for monthly donations and a fundraiser this year.

Senior feeding programs, mobile food pantries for Veterans, and people who can’t travel to the food bank. They are looking for more resources, such as volunteers, monetary donations, and food. Second Harvest holds drives for Junior league and postal carrier food donations. They also receive food from local grocery stores, but monetary donations are needed as they have several fundraisers throughout the year.
