Issues Statement

5. Search for peaceful solutions to the challenging issues of the day

There are three ways that the programming on WLGI strives to address the issues outlined above: music, public service and community announcements, and informational interview programs.

Music - every song with lyrics that is aired on WLGI is selected for the message in the music.
