Detailed Description: Safety is a concern for people across North Mississippi, and the second quarter of 2016 has had its share of violent crime. Below are some of the more high-profile cases we have covered on air and online:

- 4/4 Trial begins for one of three men charged with capital murder in killing of Ole Miss student Zacharias McClendon.
- 4/7 Defendant in McClendon homicide pleads guilty.
- 4/27 Triple homicide in Montgomery County and arrest made of suspect.
- 5/11 Suspect in 4/27 triple homicide pleads guilty to the murders and is sentenced to life in prison.
- 5/14 Tupelo cab driver found dead outside the city limits from a shooting.
- 5/16 Suspect in 5/14 cab driver homicide, Leonta Gates, is arrested.

- 5/17 Court appearance for suspect in 5/14 cab driver homicide.
- 5/17 Testimony in murder trial of Derrick Nelson, who fatally shot someone in 2011 in Columbus.
- 5/18 Nelson found guilty of murder in the trial previously mentioned.
- 5/20 Child found dead in car parked at Grenada restaurant. Father charged with second degree murder.
- 5/24 Father charged in 5/20 hot car death is released from jail after a brief court hearing.
- 6/11 Fatal shooting in Baldwyn leads to a police chase into Tupelo where the suspect was shot and killed by law enforcement.
- 6/12 A follow up to the fatal shooting/chase initially reported 6/11, which included a focus on the Baldwyn murder victim, who was the girlfriend of the shooting suspect.
- 6/13 Man, Carl King, is found dead after a shooting at a Tupelo home.
- 6/14 Suspect arrested in King homicide and charged with murder.
- 6/14 Suspect in 6/11 Baldwyn shooting claimed before death he carried out the cab driver killing on 5/14. Police discount the claim.

Detailed Description: Some high profile cases have led to increased scrutiny of local police and how officers perform. Coverage of the examples cited may carry over from the previous quarter:

- 5/6 Police chief in Mathiston is suspended while being investigated by the state for alleged wrongdoing.
- 5/25 Police chief in Mathiston resigns while under state investigation for alleged wrongdoing.
- 5/31 Mathiston aldermen formally accept resignation of town's police chief.
- 6/1 The Mississippi Bureau of Investigation turns over final report on Columbus police shooting of Ricky Ball in 12/2015. District attorney to decide how to proceed.
- 6/3 Former Mathiston Police Chief Shane Box is arrested on embezzlement charges.
- 6/19 A Tupelo police officer kills a man being pursued and found under a house in Lee Acres. Police say the fatal shot was fired during a physical confrontation with the officer and his K-9.
- 6/20 Tupelo city and community leaders ask for calm as the state investigates whether the officer's shooting reported on 6/19 is justified.
- 6/21 The attorney for the man's family holds a news conference saying there are questions that need to be answered.
- 6/22 The head of the Tupelo/Lee County NAACP announced the FBI is monitoring the investigation.
- 6/27 The attorney for the man's family reveals the name of the officer who shot the man and calls on him to be fired and charged with murder and threatens the city with a federal civil rights lawsuit.

- 4/19 Judge issues ruling in challenge of Democratic primary last August for Clay County supervisor District 5.

- 4/21 Look at/response to allegation that Columbus Councilman Marty Turner was drunk at a recent council meeting.
- 5/2 Results from municipal election in Grenada.

- 5/31 Legislature passes bill that forbids tax money to be used for superintendents' training with the state superintendents association, which some see as political backlash for supporting Initiative 42, which was aimed to enforce full funding of K-12 education.
- 6/29 Longtime state Rep. Steve Holland tells reporters he is 85 percent sure he is leaving the Legislature.
- 6/30 Rep. Holland announces he will stay in office.

Supporters say the new law prevents Christians from going against their religious faith by serving same-sex couples in a variety of ways.
