The most notable part of the project will move the eastbound Highway 191 exit ramp further west. Ramp “reversals” are also called for in three locations as part of the project. The ramp “reversals” will occur on westbound Highway 191 between West Loop 250 and Highway 158 as well as on both service roads of West Loop 250 between Wadley Avenue and Andrews Highway. The project is expected to be completed in mid-2023. There was no winner in the first Powerball drawing of 2022, and now the jackpot has rolled over to an estimated \$522 million, with a cash value of \$371.5 million for tonight’s drawing. The odds of winning the jackpot are 1 in 292.2 million, according to Powerball, but you can’t win if you don’t play, so if that’s your thing... tickets are \$2. It said testing by the Food and Drug Administration found that the formula did not meet specific nutrition and labeling requirements for infant formula, even though it is marketed as such. Testing found that iron, sodium, and potassium in the formula were well over the maximum allowed, Moor Herbs said, adding that could lead to potential iron overload or electrolyte imbalances. The recall is being made at the request of the FDA. The United States Mint has begun shipping quarters featuring the image of poet Maya Angelou, the first coins in its American Women Quarters Program. The quarter design depicts Angelou with outstretched arms. Behind her are a bird in flight and a rising sun, images inspired by her poetry. The mint's program will issue 20 quarters over the next four years honoring women and their achievements in shaping the nation's history. Due to the recent rise in Covid cases, Howard College campuses will be moving most of their courses to remote learning for the first two weeks of the semester. The playa lake water level at Memorial Gardens Park has been low due to evaporation and no rain, which is typical this time of year. The basin will not be filled to capacity levels quite yet due to a construction project on one of the pedestrian bridges. Once the construction is finished, the city will begin to add water. The project will take around 30 days to complete. Senate Bill No. 5, also known as the Safe Outdoor Dogs Act, is officially a law as of today, to bring inhumane treatment toward pets to an end. Pet owners are no longer allowed to use chains for tethering outside dogs, but will have to use humane tethers like trolley systems that can be properly fitted to the animal. Owners are also now required to provide the basic necessities of shelter, shade, and clean water for their pe During a meeting on Monday, ERCOT, the state's grid operator, released results of winter weather inspections conducted at electric plants across the state. Any senator can use the procedure to fast-track passage of a bill without a vote, but it only takes one senator to object and block it. The University of Texas Permian Basin announced details of a program called Promise Plus that will cover the tuition for students. The new Promise Plus endowment, which will make distributions to institutions annually, is expected to generate about \$1 million for UTPB this year, making it comparable to a \$22 million endowment that will distribute tuition-relief funds in perpetuity. It also means the new Falcon Free program can raise its family income threshold to \$100,000 and make it possible for 700 additional students to have their entire tuition covered starting in Fall of 2022.
