3/23/20

Gainesville, Fla. — According to the Alachua County Sheriff's Office, the Chief Judge has approved a request for immediate suspension of the weekend sentence program until further notice. This includes all current weekend sentences. This would be a suspension and not an elimination of the jail sentence. The sentence must be completed after the lifting of the suspension.

The individuals affected would remain on probation during this period. Alachua County Sheriff's Office encourages people to share this information, as they are trying to contact all that are impacted by this decision.

All Alachua County courts are also suspended as of now through Friday.

3/20/20

Gainesville, Fla. — Officials from South Florida are reporting that some people are choosing to take advantage of the coronavirus pandemic by dressing up as health workers and robbing residents.

While these reports are largely coming from South Florida, officials from North Central Florida are warning residents of the potential scam. Putnam County Sheriff's Office says that CDC health workers are not visiting homes door-to-door.

In addition, CDC members will have proper identification on their person. Palatka Police Department says if someone shows up at your door in a white gown and mask, call 911 immediately.

3/20/20

Gainesville, Fla — In the midst of the coronavirus pandemic, advocates are pushing for the rights of what some call an overlooked community.

Former inmate Kevin Scott said he knows first hand the lack of medical care in prison.

"I've been in prison, so I can't imagine what this is like," Scott said. "It's already medieval, so it's no way they are approaching this properly."

Scott said it's already difficult for inmates to get proper healthcare, so with the rapid spread of COVID-19, he's advocating for early release on nonviolent prisoners.

"I had a cyst on my brain and it took long just to get Excedrin," said Scott.

Mayor Poe also has concerns. He sent a letter to the Alachua County Sheriff's Office saying, "if and when [the coronavirus] makes it's way into the jail, incarcerated in dividuals cannot be afforded the social distance necessary to slow the novel coronavirus."

Chair of Alachua County Commission Robert Hutchinson said the police force and sheriff's office have reduced the number of arrests.

"The jail population is actually lower than it normally is; numbers are low," said Hutchinson.

Hutchinson said people are directing their frustrations to the wrong people. Although other places in the U.S. have stated the sheriff's office released prisoners, Hutchinson adds clarification.

"Sheriff's are releasing prisoners only with the consent of the judge or state attorney lowering charges or dropping charges," he said.

The State Attorney released a statement in which he said he doesn't have legal authority to release individuals incarcerated. He believes public safety matters, but people like Kevin said he hopes this terrible situation brings about a common humanity to our society.

Virus mutes happy hours in senior haven, but golf goes on

THE VILLAGES, Fla. (AP) — Up until a few days ago, residents of The Villages retirement community went about their busy lives filled with spirited happy hours and incessant socializing at what some dub "Disney World for adults."

There were the hundreds of clubs to attend — French lessons, Carolina shag dancing, light-saber fencing — pickleball tournaments to play and Pilates classes to take at this Republican stronghold built on former cow pastures in central Florida.

Even as many Americans isolated themselves against the coronavirus threat, residents of one of the largest concentrations of seniors in the U.S. at first blew off concerns, despite data showing the elderly are particularly susceptible to serious symptoms from COVID-19. But their attitude shifted this week as President Donald Trump, who earlier had downplayed the coronavirus threat, gave warnings to avoid crowds of more than 10 people, some residents of The Villages say.

Starting Tuesday, all regularly scheduled indoor activities at The Villages were canceled through the end of the month. Pool activities were called off, and the library and fitness clubs closed their doors. Perhaps most distressing for residents, outside gatherings of more than 50 people were outlawed, putting an end to the nightly happy hour drinking and dancing in the three town squares.

On any given day, Spanish Springs town square would have restaurants bustling with diners at outdoor tables, drivers fighting over parking spots and residents listening to local bands play in the center gazebo. Not on Thursday. The green plastic chairs used for concerts were stacked up around the gazebo, many restaurants were closed and only a handful of shops were open in the Spanish colonial themed square.

Marion County, Fla. — The Florida Department of Health in Marion County has issued a rabies alert for the area within the following boundaries:

Northwest Highway 320 to the north

West Highway 326 to the south

Interstate 75 to the east

County Road 335 to the west

The alert comes after a bobcat and raccoon tested positive for rabies.

Residents should avoid contact with free roaming domestic animals or any wild animals.

Officials suggest not leaving pet food outside and securing outside garbage in covered containers to avoid attracting wild animals.

Pet owners should also ensure animals have current rabies vaccinations.

If you or your pet have been bitten or scratched by a wild or domestic animal, seek immediate medical attention.

Starbucks closing all stores, moving to drive-through and delivery service only

Starbucks announced on Friday that the chain would be closing all stores for two weeks and limiting service to drive-thru and delivery only.

These changes apply to all company-operated stores in the United States and Canada.

The chain says that all store partners will be sill paid for the next month, even if employees choose to stay home.

The company has gone the extra mile for their employees by giving them the option to use out-of-network healthcare providers and 20 days of backup child care.

The chain is also offering six free counseling sessions for employees and their household members, citing 'challenging times.'

Gainesville, Fla. — According to the Florida Forest Service, the state of Florida faces high susceptibility to fires due to dry conditions.

According to FFS meteorologist Bryan Williams, drought-like conditions are highly likely to develop in parts of the state by the end of March.

Most of the state has received less than a quarter of the 30-year average for rainfall, and long-term models show no more than 0.4 inches of rain is expected for the remainder of the month.

Less rain means more fires, or at least an elevated risk. Waccasassa Forestry Center is urging citizens to be careful with outdoor activities to held prevent potential forest fires.

Gainesville, Fla. — More than 1,400 grab-and-go lunches will be available to school-aged children every day of spring break starting on Monday.

Gainesville, Fla. — Alachua County Public Schools has announced a collaborative effort to feed schoolchildren during the upcoming week of spring break.

The federal government announced that districts would not be allowed to provide meals for schoolchildren during spring break, as they were not anticipating the need for meals at that time. However, with the developments of the coronavirus, the district believes that many children will still need food.

As a result of the regulations, ACPS is teaming up with various community groups and representatives from local restaurants and other businesses to fill that gap.

Campus USA Credit Union has volunteered to cover the cost of the majority of the student meals for the week. Gator's Dockside, MiApa Latin Café and Gator BTW have volunteered to donate the remainder of the meals, as well as provide delivery for the free grab-and-go lunches each day of spring break for the children of Alachua County.

ACPS is still conferring with the restaurants on where pick-up locations will be located during the break.

The Florida Department of Education announced Tuesday that all public and private K-12 schools in Florida will remain closed through April 15.

"The containment of COVID-19 is essential, and this is not a decision we made lightly. Districts have taken action and have instituted distance learning as a necessary precaution to protect students, educators, families, and Florida's overall public health," Commissioner of Education Richard Corcoran said. "We are working with our local school districts to provide guidance and help children who need access to food during this time. Our number one priority is keeping our families safe and healthy and stopping the spread of this virus. These actions will help mitigate the spread of COVID-19 in Florida. I will continue to work with the Governor, Superintendents, Florida College System and the State University System to do whatever we can to protect our children, our families, and our communities."

According to the Florida Department of Education, for the next 120 days, exam fees for teacher certification-related examinations will be waived, and test-takers who were unable to take an exam due to test site locations closing will be granted an extension to meet these requirements.

All school readiness, voluntary prekindergarten, K-12, career and technical centers and state college programs will "receive their full allocation of funding, and therefore staff and contractors can be paid fully, through June 30 as though there was no disruption in education," the Florida Department of Education said. All public and private university and college campuses are closed for the remainder of the spring semester.

The Florida Department of Education says all colleges and universities should be prepared to extend their educational calendars through June 30 to the extent feasible and necessary.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — The American Hotel and Lodging Association (AHLA) said the Coronavirus is already having a dramatic impact on Florida's tourism industry. The group reports 88,631 direct hotel-related jobs lost and 305,146 supporting positions lost.

"In Florida I have experienced firsthand a 20% cut in my pay through at least June," said hotel worker Ali Collins.

The AHLA President said this is the single largest decline in travel in modern times.

"The impact to our industry is already more severe than anything we've seen before, including September 11th and the great recession of 2008 combined," stated Rogers. "The White House and Congress can take urgent action to protect countless jobs, provide relief to our dedicated and hardworking employees, and ensure that our small business operators and franchise owners – who represent more than half of hotels in the country – can keep their doors open."

Floridians whose jobs are negatively impacted by COVID-19 could receive compensation

Alachua County, Fla. — According to Mark Sexton, communications and legislative affairs director for Alachua County, Floridians whose jobs have been negatively impacted due to the coronavirus could receive compensation in the form of Reemployment Assistance.

Individuals who may be eligible for Reemployment Assistance may include:

Those who are quarantined by a medical professional or a government agency,

Those who are laid off or sent home without pay for an extended period by their employer due to COVID-19 concerns, or

Those who are caring for an immediate family member who is diagnosed with COVID-19.

Those who are continuing to receive money via paid leave will not be eligible.

Ocala-based company's drug could potentially be a treatment for the coronavirus

3/18/20

An Ocala based company's drug will be tested as possible Coronavirus treatment.

"You don't catch the virus and early onset the rapeutic value we believe we can play a big role in slowing the spread of the disease, according to AIM Immunotech's, CEO Tom Equels.

Equels has been working closely with Japan's National Institute of Infectious disease to control what he calls a plague on our society.

"We've had prior experience with them in our drug Ampligen in testing related to influenza strains", said Equels.

He said they were able to obtain samples of the virus and compare it to SARS and found they were very similar.

That being the case they believe Ampligen could work the same way against COVID-19 as a preventive treatment or used at the earliest onset of symptoms.

He said those most at risk are those who work directly with patients. "If your frontline workers get sick you don't have the ability to treat these patients," he said.

He believes their needs to be a treatment that you apply quickly to keep people out of the hospital and reduce the number of people spreading the disease.

"That discourages people from going for testing now that means you got someone who can be spreading the disease, he said.

Equels said this is a process and everyone is working as fast as they can. Experiments will be conducted at Japan's National Institute of Infectious disease and the University of Tokyo to test Ampligen to see if it has an effect in killing the virus.

In the meantime he encourages everyone to take this very serious.

48 HOURS: "Death by Text" (9:00 – 10:00p) – an updated rebroadcast on the death of Conrad Roy III and the case against Michelle Carter, who is scheduled to be released from jail next week. Prosecutors say she influenced Roy, via text messages, to kill himself. On July 12, 2014, Conrad Roy died of carbon monoxide poisoning after sitting in his truck with a gas-powered water pump running in the backseat. Prosecutors say Roy was driven to kill himself through hundreds of incessant messages from Carter, who was more than 30 minutes away at the time he died. Carter was later charged with involuntary manslaughter. Her defense team maintains Roy decided to kill himself on his own. As seen through his own videos, Conrad Roy talked about his own struggles with social anxiety, depression and thoughts of suicide. His mother Lynn Roy, also talks about the death of her son and the pain she lives with. Though they lived an hour apart in Massachusetts, the couple communicated almost exclusively via texts, online and by phone. The prosecution maintained Carter could have done something to stop Roy. The heart of the case is the question of whether Carter's texts and messages pushed Roy to take his life, or would he have done it anyway. Prosecutors argued Carter played on Roy's mental health and her actions were reckless; she knew what she was doing and just wanted attention. The defense maintains Carter had her own psychological problems and was involuntarily intoxicated by the antidepressant drug Celexa: she was enmeshed in the delusion that it was a good thing to help him die. The prosecution hoped the judge paid attention to the text Carter sent to her friend a week after his death, in which she admitted she could possibly go to jail. After three days of deliberation, the judge rendered his verdict, completely rejecting Carter's defense and finding her guilty. At sentencing, Michelle Carter could receive twenty years behind bars. The Roy family knows words have power, and they can forever change lives. UPDATE for the 08/05/17 updated rebroadcast: Nearly seven weeks after being convicted, Michelle Carter, arrives for sentencing. The prosecution asked that Carter serve 7-12 years in prison. Her attorney requests probation. Judge Lawrence Moniz sentences Michelle Carter to fifteen months behind bars – a sentence that does not please the defense, who will appeal the conviction. Her attorneys request to stay the jail sentence. The judge grants the stay, meaning Michelle will be out on probation until the appeal makes its way through the Massachusetts court system. Neither Michelle nor her family, have reached out to the Roy family. UPDATE for the 01/18/20 updated rebroadcast: In February of 2019, Michelle Carter's conviction was upheld and she began serving her 15-month sentence. Her lawyers appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court. This week, the court declined to hear her appeal. Lynn Roy's focus now is on changing laws. Chacey told police she called her husband for help after her Jeep got stuck in the mud and when Robert got in to help move her vehicle, he was shot by an unknown man. Investigators were skeptical of her story. When questioned by the police, Chacey admitted to multiple affairs and ongoing marital problems, including abuse. She eventually confessed to knowing the identity of the man who killed her husband --Michael Garza, one of her lovers. Chacey claimed it was Michael who set the trap, so he could confront Robert and demand he leave her alone. On September 10, 2016, Chacey was arrested and charged with conspiracy to commit murder. Michael turned himself in and was charged with murder. The shotgun used to murder Robert belonged to Michael's brother and was recovered by a farmer near where Robert was shot. Recovered digital evidence proved Chacey had groomed Michael. On July 10, 2018, Michael went on trial and testified that he believed Robert was abusing Chacey and implicated her as the shooter. On July 20th, Michael was found guilty and sentenced to 99-years in prison. At Chacey's trial, prosecutors maintained she was the mastermind and her motive was to collect Robert's life insurance policy; she was found guilty of murder and sentenced to life in prison, with the possibility of parole in 30-years. 48 HOURS: LIVE TO TELL: "Murder on Prom Night" - On Sunday, April 30, 1989, police responded to a crime scene at the Lakeville, Indiana home of the Pelley family. Reverend Bob Pelley was found in an upstairs hallway; wife Dawn and young daughters Janel and Jolene were in the basement -- all shot at close range with a shotgun. Nine-year-old Jessica Pelley - now known as Jessi Toronjo - returned from a sleepover at a friend's house to the news that her mother, stepfather, and sisters were murdered. Police questioned Bob's 17-year-old son Jeff and later learned Bob had grounded him over the prom; police believed they had a clear motive, but no forensic evidence to prosecute. Thirteen years after the crime, a new prosecutor believed there was enough evidence and Jeff was arrested and charged with four counts of murder. In 2006, he was found guilty and sentenced to a hundred and sixty years in prison. Jeff's defense lawyer filed an appeal and his convictions were set aside on a number of procedural grounds. He remained in custody and in February 2009, the Indiana State Supreme Court upheld the conviction. Currently, Jeff's new defense team is working on his release by filing a motion for post-conviction relief. Jessi changed her name and appearance as a way to cope with the tragedy. After she tried to kill herself, Jessi was diagnosed with DID, dissociative identity disorder. On April 29, 2019 -- the thirty year anniversary of the murders --I am Jessica was published. 48 HOURS: "The Death of Todd Stermer" - Linda Stermer, a Michigan woman accused of setting fire to her family home and murdering her husband, Todd Stermer, speaks out for the first time. On January 7, 2007, the Stermers's house caught fire. Linda got out safely and went to the family's van to get help. Todd made it out of the house but was horribly burned. After escaping the fire, Todd was run over by Linda. Though Linda maintains it was an accident, investigators were suspicious of her account. After the death of Todd Stermer, allegations of domestic abuse, battles over money, and accusations Linda was having an affair surfaced. In June 2009, Linda was charged with arson and murder. On January 5, 2010, Linda went on trial and maintained she doesn't know how the fire started, and the running over of her husband was an accident. Prosecutors built their case on circumstantial evidence focusing on Linda's actions before and after the fire. Her sons testified that on the day of the murder she pushed them out of the house and believe she drugged their father. A former friend of Linda's testified she was having an affair with a co-worker. Linda was convicted of arson and murder and sentenced to life without parole. After serving 5 years, her appeal was denied in the Michigan Supreme Court. In 2016, her new attorney submitted her amended petition to the Federal Courts, blaming her conviction on her trial attorney's decision to not hire a fire expert. In 2018, a Federal Judge Tarnow held Linda's evidentiary hearing and two months later issued his ruling; after serving almost nine years in prison, Linda was released and her conviction overturned. The Michigan State Attorney General is appealing the Federal Court decision. Linda attended her hearing on December 3, 2019 and is currently awaiting the Federal Court's decision. Police later learned he stopped less than 100 miles away from the crime scene before he flew to California, after helping his daughter Karrie move into an apartment in Rochester, NY. Police began listening in to their conversations, which led to the father and daughter being charged with murder months later. Michele had accused Lloyd of trying to turn Karrie against her. Police believed Karrie was manipulated and brainwashed. Karrie pleaded guilty to second-degree murder charges. Weeks before the trial, Lloyd plead guilty and was sentenced to life without parole. The District Attorney had Karrie's charges reduced to second-degree manslaughter and she was sentenced to 1-3 years in prison. At the trial, Ezra took the stand in her own defense and tried to portray herself as a meek and timid young woman incapable of murder. Prosecutors believed Ezra committed the crime to attract the attention of her former boyfriend, Jason Mengel. Ezra is found guilty of first-degree intentional homicide and sentenced to life in prison. Ezra must serve a minimum of 50-years before she is eligible for release. Police initially suspected her husband Mark Sievers, but he had an airtight alibi. A tip led police on a 1,100-mile trek that took the case in an unexpected direction. Mark Sievers believed there might be a tie to other suspicious deaths of doctors around the country. Eventually, Mark Sievers became a person of interest. Two months after the murder, police arrested two men in Missouri and charged them with Dr. Sievers's murder: Curtis Wayne Wright and Jimmy Ray Rogers traveled from Missouri to Florida and murdered Dr. Sievers. Wright, a close friend of Mark Sievers, told police that Mark had taken out five life insurance policies on Dr. Sievers, had an open marriage, money problems, and other serious issues. Eight months after the murder, Wright admitted to killing Dr. Sievers and accused Mark Sievers of being the mastermind behind the crime. Mark Sievers was then charged with the murder of his wife. Curtis Wayne Wright plead guilty to the second-degree murder of Teresa Sievers and testified that it was Mark's idea to kill Teresa. In exchange for his testimony, he will serve 25-years in prison. In October 2019, Rodgers went on trial and was convicted of second-degree murder and sentenced to life in prison. A month later while still maintain his innocence, Mark Sievers went on trial and was convicted of first-degree murder in the death of his wife. In addition to the guilty verdict, the jury asked the judge to sentence Sievers to death. On January 3, 2020, Mark Sievers was sentenced to death. The prosecution said it was murder. They were both convicted of second-degree murder in 2017, but have maintained their innocence. Lynch and the children went back to Ireland. He could face a minimum sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole, and possibly the death penalty. He has not yet entered a plea. The death of Harwick, who was once romantically linked to THE PRICE IS RIGHT host Drew Carey, has put a spotlight on domestic abuse. After meeting, Alexis felt Adrian was controlling; after two years of dating the relationship ended. After finding out Alexis had a new boyfriend, he sent threating messages. 48 HOURS searched for Adrian in London. With the help of Lisa, a dark web intelligence analyst, 48 HOURS continues its search. Last November, Alexis received a letter from the FBI, stating that her case was closed because the "United States Attorney's Office has declined to prosecute." In September 2019, Sandra's trial began. In court, prosecutor Lindy Beaty mocked Sandra's story, but privately she and co-prosecutor Ricky Sipes, were unsure of the strength of their cases based on errors in the police's investigation: police took too long to respond to Sandra's call and secure the crime scene, they failed to fingerprint Sandra's car, and a series of crime scene photos Officer Norton took disappeared from his phone. Prosecutors also lacked a motive for Sandra, but could ascribe a financial motive to Wes, whose alibi also turned out to not be valid and proved much of the information against Sandra. After three hours of deliberation, the jury returned a not guilty verdict. Sandra was released, but much of her family still believes she is Jon's killer. Gene Weingarten, a writer for The Washington Post, had the idea that reporting on any single day could encapsulate the entire human experience. He and Editor Tom Shroder, placed twenty years of dates into a hat and randomly chose December 28, 1986. This led Weingarten to Detective Tommy Lee, who had been holding onto the file for Karen Ermert's case for decades. In Fairfax County, Virginia in the 1980s, Karen was in a relationship with Mark Willey. According to Mark's friend Rich Lieb, Mark was very possessive and jealous; he stalked Karen and committed acts of physical violence against her. In 1986, Karen broke up with Mark. On the evening of December 26th, an intoxicated Mark climbed a tree and entered Karen's apartment in an attempt to reconcile; she refused. Mark retrieved a rifle from his car and killed her and then himself. Elsewhere in the county, Eva Baisey -- a 20 year old nursing student at Fairfax Hospital -- needed a heart transplant. At the time, it was illegal to perform the surgery at any Washington D.C. area hospitals. Dr. Ed Lefrak, chief of cardiac surgery at Fairfax Hospital, recruited celebrated surgeon Dr. Christiaan Barnard to lobby the state health commissioner on Lefrak's behalf. Barnard was successful -- all that was left was to wait for a donor. On December 27, 1986, a viable heart became available from Mark Willey, whose suicide had left him braindead, but his heart was still beating. The next day, Dr. Lefrak replaced Eva's heart. Though her procedure was successful, Eva was told she would never be allowed to work in healthcare due to fears over her susceptibility to disease. However, as Eva's life expectancy projection climbed, that restriction was removed and she was able to begin a career in nursing. Eva continues to have a celebratory anniversary call with her transplant team every December 28th. She finally learned the source of her heart when Gene Weingarten published his book in 2019; Eva expressed remorse and gratitude toward Mark's family. 48 HOURS: "The Troubling Case Against Kevin Cooper" (10:00 - 11:00p) – an update to a 2019 report on the controversial murder case against California death row inmate Kevin Cooper, who was convicted of the 1983 murder of Doug and Penny Ryen, their daughter Jessica, and friend Christopher Hughes in Chino Hills, California. Eight-year-old Josh Ryen, though seriously wounded, survived the attack. 48 HOURS has been investigating Kevin Cooper's case ever since he wrote to Erin Moriarty two decades ago, proclaiming his innocence. After the June 4, 1983 murders, Josh indicated to police three white people were responsible. Police eventually decided Josh was wrong with his identification and recent prison escapee Kevin Cooper seemed to fit the bill because he had hidden near the Ryen home. Cooper was paraded before cameras and the trial became racially charged because Cooper is black. Blood evidence, but none of Cooper's fingerprints, were found at the scene. The trial was moved to San Diego and Josh testified by video, but his memory was hazy and he no longer remembered the attackers. Cooper, who always denied the murders, was convicted and sentenced to death. Dr. Mary Howell, Josh's grandmother, was not convinced that Cooper was guilty. By 2000, Cooper was still on death row. Questions remained and Josh, then eighteen-years-old, was still unsure Cooper was there. Private investigator Paul Ingels felt the case deserved a second look; his investigation led to a number of new leads, including potential suspect Lee Furrow, who the police initially discounted. Furrow denied responsibility. In 2001, an agreement was made for additional DNA testing, but the 2002 post-conviction DNA test results did not exonerate Cooper, and significant issues were raised regarding the process. In 2008, Dr. Mary Howell died. After the state of California agreed to DNA testing, the lab results all pointed to Cooper, but many maintain the evidence was tampered with. After nineteen years on death row, the 9th Circuit federal appellate court stayed Cooper's execution. New York Times journalist Nicholas Kristof wrote an Op-Ed article about the case and former FBI agent Tom Parker was hired by Norman Hile, Cooper's defense attorney, to re-investigate. New attention was given to Lee Furrow, following information from witnesses that three white men splattered with blood, were seen in a nearby bar on the night of the crime. At the end of 2018, Governor Jerry Brown ordered new DNA testing and a retired judge was appointed to make sure the tests are done properly. 03/21/20 UPDATE: In March 2019, new California Governor Gavin Newsom ordered additional DNA testing, including a vial that contained Cooper's blood; he also suspended all state executions. The tests were carried out, however the DNA on the items -- except for on an orange towel -- was too degraded to provide conclusive results. The results from the towel did not match Cooper, Lee Furrow, or anyone in the CODIS national database. Defense attorney and DNS specialist Bicka Barlow discovered the vial containing Cooper's 1983 blood sample was empty. Investigator Tom Parker found two new witnesses who claim Furrow confessed to the crime. Cooper's defense team has asked Governor Newsom to look into their claims of evidence tampering. 48 HOURS: "Lizzie Borden Took an Axe..." – a report detailing the 1892 murder accusations against Lizzie Borden and a mock trial with modern forensics experts, attorneys, and jurors. The Borden family lived in Fall River, Massachusetts. Despite his wealth, Andrew Borden was known to be very frugal. He lived in a house that lacked indoor plumbing and gas lighting, with daughters Emma and Lizzie, and second wife Abby. On August 4th, 1892, Lizzie alerted her neighbor that her father had been killed. The neighbor noted that there was no blood on her. When police arrived, they found Andrew in the sitting room and Abby in an upstairs room - both had been hacked to death. Emma had been away visiting friends and was not at the house. Five days later, Lizzie was able to give her version of events during the police inquest. Police were able to construct a timeline for the murders and when looking for a motive, focused on how Lizzie and Emma begrudged their father for his frugality and for buying a house for his wife's sister, rather than the two of them. Other than around the bodies, the only blood found in the house was a spot on one of Lizzie's undergarments and the bloody rags in the basement. Lizzie explained both were the result of her menstruating, and the primitiveness of forensics at the time did not allow for further testing. Police were also suspicious that the day after her father's funeral, Lizzie burned a dress in the stove and claimed it was ruined from paint. Initially lacking a murder weapon, police later found a hatchet head covered with ash in the basement; the handle appeared to have been freshly broken off. Witnesses claimed to have seen Lizzie's failed attempt to buy prussic acid, a powerful poison. Lizzie was arrested for murder at the close of the inquest On June 5, 1893, Lizzie's trial began in New Bedford, MA. Over the course of a week, the prosecution laid out their case with expert witnesses and medical testimony, but the judge did not allow them to mention Lizzie's attempt to buy poison. The defense teams spent two days attempting to raise reasonable doubt. After two hours of deliberation, the all-male jury returned with a not guilty verdict. Following her acquittal, Lizzie and Emma used their inheritance to buy a large house in the rich part of town, however, Lizzie was shunned from the church that had brought her solace and Emma too eventually left her. She lived as a recluse until her death in June of 1927. Emma would pass away nine days later. Both were laid to rest near Andrew and Abby. Nevertheless, popular culture has cast Lizzie Borden as one of America's most notorious killers. Los Angeles author Cara Robertson first became interested in Lizzie Borden when searching a subject for her college thesis; thirty years later, Simon & Schuster published her book, "The Trial of Lizzie Borden." Using a jury recruiting firm and paid jurors, a modern Lizzie Borden trial is staged with Anna-Sigga Niccolazzi as prosecutor; Matthew Troiano for the defense; and Erin Rubas and Andrew Schweighardt as expert witnesses. Both attorneys would only be able to use evidence presented at the original trial. The eight jurors deliberated, with attorneys allowed to listen in. After one hour, a vote was taken: on the first count, the murder of Abby Borden, it was a hung jury with only one juror voting not guilty; on the second count, the murder of Andrew Borden, it was again a hung jury, with two not guilty votes.
