ECONOMY

4/9/20 Applicants frustrated, Gov. Cooper says he is working to improve unemployment application process (6:00 p.m., 2:34)

Thousands of North Carolinians who have lost their jobs due to COVID-19 say they are becoming even more frustrated trying to get unemployment benefits. Many residents are saying that their online sessions time out and that reaching anyone by phone is impossible.

On Thursday, Gov. Roy Cooper addressed the issue, saying that employers would now be able to file a batch of claims at one time, and noting that \$40.3 million has been paid out.

Asha, from Charlotte, says she's called at least 50 times, and can't get through.

"I don't even mind sitting on the phone and holding for two hours as long as it guarantees me that after that hold, I'm going to talk to someone," Asha said.

"I've gotten to the point where it told me to please hold for the next representative, but then it hung up on me."

Many in North Carolina say they're facing similar issues.

If they get on the state web site and make the application, some say they get a screen saying there is an issue that needs to be resolved, but when they try to call to inquire about the issue, they get a message that says, "We're sorry that we cannot process your call right now. Our call volumes are unusually high at this time."

"Boy I'm telling you, we're getting texts, emails, voicemails," said Senator Carl Ford, (R-Rowan/Stanly).

Ford says lawmakers are telling the governor that more is needed to handle the crisis.

"We asked them to beef up the hours, the days of operation, another call center, servers, and he says he's doing all this but we're still getting the same complaints from folks," Ford said. "We're trying to get the department's attention. Just continue trying into the web site and with the phone calls. I know it's very disturbing, very aggravating, I tell you what, this is the government not at its best, it's a total, total, a total disaster here."

The department handling the claims has gone from 3,200 claims a week to more than 20,000 a day.

State Auditor Beth Wood said once three pending audits are completed, her staff of some 350 people could help by answering coronavirus hotlines or even unemployment calls.

Governor Cooper said the sheer number, almost half a million claims filed since March 15, has been overwhelming.

"Time is critical and precious for those who are out of work," Cooper said. "I, my staff, and the secretary of commerce are pushing the department to move as fast as possible. Every claim is important and represents an unemployed worker on the edge. Their families and our economy need these funds as quickly as possible."

4/13/20 Limited data makes it tough to model coronavirus's spread, experts say (6:00 p.m., 3:50)

The limited testing for COVID-19 has made it difficult for scientists to accurately predict the spread of the virus, two professors at UNC Charlotte told WBTV on Monday.

We asked Dr. Daniel Janies, the Carol Grotnes Belk Professor of Bioinformatics and Genomics and Dr. Colby Ford, an associate professor in UNC Charlotte's data science department who specializes in modeling the spread of communicable disease, to weigh in on how accurate modeling of the virus is as testing remains limited throughout North Carolina and the country.

In a nutshell, both professors said the models are only as good as the data experts have to build them.

"We're having to take educated guesses about the numbers that we put into the model so they can draw the curve for us," Ford said. "One of the parameters that goes into this is the number of people that are currently infected. We don't know that, and we don't know that because we don't have enough tests."

Janies pointed to smaller counties, like Iceland, that have been able to conduct widespread random sample testing of their population to get an accurate picture of the virus.

Doing so, he said, allows public health officials in those countries to better control the spread of the virus by detecting individuals who have had the virus with and without symptoms.

4/17/20 Charlotte Mayor: City still committed to bringing in pro soccer franchise (7:00 p.m., 1:27)

Charlotte Mayor Vi Lyles giving an update on what challenges COVID-19 is having on the city's economy.

Already, the mayor has mentioned the pandemic is leading to a lot of uncertainty for hosting the Republican National Convention, but what about the city's plan to welcome Major League Soccer?

Lyles gave no indication that plans have changed.

The mayor says Charlotte remains committed to continuing their plans to bring professional soccer to the city.

Lyles urged that MLS isn't just important to the city as a whole, but important toward the revitalization of the former Eastland Mall site, where the team would practice.

There is some uncertainty in logistics at the site because MLS is being funded through hospitality industry dollars.

Of course, if there are changes to those plans, WBTV will keep you updated.

4/23/20 Gov. Cooper extends NC Stay at Home order through May 8: 'We need more time' (5:00 p.m., 4:37)

Gov. Roy Cooper extended North Carolina's Stay at Home order through May 8, announcing a gradual three-step phase. Cooper made the announcement during a press conference Thursday, as many residents waited to hear when businesses across the state might be reopening.

"Our state is not ready to lift restrictions yet," Cooper said, "We need more time."

Restrictions will be loosened under the Stay at Home order extension, but mass gatherings will still be limited to 10 people or less.

PHASE 1: Parks can reopen, outdoor exercise is encouraged, and face masks are still recommended when social distancing is not possible.

PHASE 2: "Here, the Stay at Home order will be lifted," Cooper said, but the most vulnerable population will be encouraged to stay home. The mass gathering number of 10 will be increased and bars and restaurants can begin to reopen.

PHASE 3: Restrictions on the most vulnerable population will begin to loosen - and bars, restaurants and churches will begin to see increased capacities. Cooper said the amount of time between the phases could be up to six weeks and until we reach certain benchmarks.

4/29/20 City of Charlotte announces micro business relief fund application (6:00 p.m., 2:58)

The City of Charlotte has announced the opening of the Micro Business Relief Fund (MBRF) application.

Beginning Monday, May 4 at noon, micro businesses with five or fewer employees can apply through the Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) webpage.

As part of a COVID-19 relief partnership with LISC, the fund will support 100 micro businesses located within opportunity corridors by providing \$1 million in grants.

The fund was made available after the Charlotte City Council approved the use of FY 2020 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds.

Each micro business that meets income regulations is eligible for up to \$10,000. The city's Economic Development team, along with LISC's staff, will score each application.

Businesses must be able to provide the most recent two years of documentation establishing income as required by CDBG regulations. Grants may be applied to urgent needs, such as payroll, rent and vendor/debt costs.

"Small business is the lifeblood of our economy and micro businesses are essential to maintain what we have established and cultivated here in Charlotte," said Mayor Vi Lyles. "As we recover from the financial impacts of COVID-19, we need all sectors of our business community to grow and thrive, and this relief fund is one of the ways to make it happen."

5/2/20 Dozens protest to reopen Rowan County (11:00 p.m., 2:26)

Rowan County residents made their voices heard Saturday afternoon.

Dozen gathered outside of the courthouse in Salisbury to protest the government to reopen.

North Carolina Gov. Roy Cooper extended the state's stay-at-home order through May 8 during a press conference held April 23.

The folks in Rowan County are pleading to reopen the county, along with the state.

The protest modeled similar ones held in Raleigh and Charlotte, and was designed to push Cooper to reopen businesses in North Carolina.

Protesters carried signs, including ones saying "church is essential" and asking Cooper "who cuts your hair?"

"They're keeping us prisoners in our own homes," Rowan County resident Elizabeth Hilton said.

Less than three miles from the protest, more than 100 residents and staff have tested positive for COVID-19 at The Citadel at Salisbury nursing home. At least 16 people there have died from the coronavirus.

According to Saturday statistics from the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, 388 Rowan County residents have tested positive for the coronavirus and 24 have died.

Frustration turned to a demonstration in Salisbury when about 30 people showed up to rally in favor of the reopen North Carolina movement.

"We have the right to be free," Hilton said. "That's our God-given right, and they have completely taken that away."

Some passersby saw what was going on and decided to jump in the fray as well.

"I was going down the road, I saw the signs, I felt so strongly about what they were doing that I had to come back," Rowan County resident Mary Sechler said.

5/7/20 Major push in COVID-19 testing as Avery County begins to reopen (5:30 p.m., 2:00)

A day after officials in Avery County ended some of the strictest COVID-19 rules regarding tourists, a major push is underway to test as many residents as possible.

A drive through testing setup was placed outside of the health department on Thursday, and hundreds came out to be tested.

There was no requirement to be feeling ill to be able to get tested.

"We're testing anybody that drives through the line," said Mason Gardner.

As of Thursday afternoon, no one in the county had tested positive for COVID-19 but officials say they are resigned to the fact that eventually, someone will.

"I look for some of them to be positive," County Manager Phillip Barrier said.

Officials want to have as much data as possible as the reopening of the economy begins.

For the past month, short term rentals anywhere in Avery County were not allowed and property owners who spend the night out of county would have to spend 14 days in quarantine when they returned.

Keeping the door closed to visitors may have played a big part in keeping positive cases at zero, according to officials.

However, they also say it's time to open the door.

"(It's) not just the key to our economy, it is our economy," Barrier said.

On Friday, Phase one of the reopening will begin.

Officials say they will monitor the COVID-19 situation and let the data dictate how quickly the county can progress in the reopening.

5/14/20 PGA Championship will return to Charlotte in 2025 (6:00 p.m., 1:29)

Charlotte has landed the second golf major in the city's history, as the PGA of America announced Thursday that Quail Hollow Club will host the 2025 PGA Championship.

Charlotte hosted the same tournament at the same course in 2017. Quail Hollow Club president Johnny Harris has been trying to get the PGA Championship to come back ever since.

"We're really excited about this," Harris, a longtime Charlotte real-estate developer, said in an interview with The Observer. "We need some positive news in the sports world. And for us, this is the kind of thing you dream about."

The 2025 PGA Championship will be one of the largest sporting events that Charlotte has ever hosted. It is expected to draw close to a quarter-million fans over a week of tournament play and practice rounds, and those fans will inject millions into the local economy.

The PGA Championship ranks as one of golf's four major championships. Its return to Charlotte — in mid-May 2025 — will be a welcome one for the city, as well as for the club that saw its annual pro tournament on this year's golf calendar get wiped out due to COVID-19. The coronavirus canceled the 2020 Wells Fargo Championship, which had been scheduled at Quail Hollow for April 27-May 3.

"That was disappointing, but totally understandable," Harris said. "There was no real way to consider moving or rescheduling the 2020 tournament. Just inopportune timing."

The PGA Championship's return to Charlotte means that Quail Hollow Club will host a top golf event in each of the next five years.

5/20/20 Gov. McMaster lifting restrictions on public attractions, youth and adult sports in SC (5:30 p.m., :54)

Governor Henry McMaster announced that attraction facilities will be allowed to open in South Carolina on Friday, May 22. Youth and adult sports leagues will be allowed to begin practicing on May 30.

McMaster said attractions large and small may reopen on Friday, in time for Memorial Day weekend.

Attractions that may reopen include the following:

The governor's announcement comes after AccelerateSC has been meeting for nearly a month to determine the safest ways to reinvigorate the state's economy. The "Response" component of AccelerateSC has established exhaustive safety guidelines for businesses that have been allowed to reopen. Guidelines for attraction facilities can be found here and on the AccelerateSC website, along with guidelines for all recently re-opened businesses.

Governor McMaster also announced that youth and adult sports leagues will be allowed to begin practicing on May 30, with competitive play resuming on June 15. Specific guidelines, created by the "Response" component of AccelerateSC, can be found here.

While Governor McMaster never took any action prohibiting day camps, which are popular for children during the summer months, the Department of Social Services and the Department of Health and Environmental Control have established guidelines for those planning to hold camps this summer.

5/25/20 South End restaurants successfully start to reopen dining rooms at half capacity (6:00 p.m., 2:18)

Right now, restaurant owners in South End are feeling a little bit of relief after a busy first weekend in Phase Two of the North Carolina reopening process.

"Historically, Memorial Day weekend, you're not that busy, but we were busy," Suffolk Punch general manager Shan Sheheane said. "We had a great weekend." Indoors and outdoors, the demand for Suffolk Punch continued into Monday. "We received our PPP loan, so we were able to bring back all the fulltime staff," Sheheane said.

Every other table is closed off and the bar stools are gone.

The employees also learned some lessons from handling the unexpected.

"When it started raining, we had to stop serving because everybody tried to come inside," Sheheane said. "We had to move guests into other buildings to get out of the rain, still maintaining social distancing."

Across South Boulevard, Mac's Speed Shop is also bouncing back.

"We did about 70 percent of what we did last year which was very encouraging. It was more than we thought we were going to get," marketing director Callie Murray said.

The restaurant is set up for social distancing and everyone is adapting to the changes.

"The biggest thing is changing out gloves in between every guest interaction because you don't want to pass on somebody else's germs to the next guest," Murray said.

Employees say guests are willing to comply with changes.

Customer Johnny Corcoran is already looking to the next phase.

"I think we should all reopen North Carolina as soon as possible, the economy needs us," Corcoran said.

5/26/20 NC Gov. Cooper responds to Trump RNC Tweet: Pandemic response can not be political (5:00 p.m., 4:02)

North Carolina Governor Roy Cooper has responded to tweets from President Donald Trump threatening to pull the Republican National Convention (RNC) from Charlotte if the state cannot guarantee full attendance at the convention.

"I'm not surprised by anything that I see on Twitter," Gov. Cooper said. "I will say that it's okay for political conventions to be political, but pandemic response cannot be."

President Trump's tweets came in a series Monday morning.

"I love the Great State of North Carolina, so much so that I insisted on having the Republican National Convention in Charlotte at the end of August.

Unfortunately, Democrat Governor, @RoyCooperNC is still in Shutdown mood & unable to guarantee that by August we will be allowed..." Trump tweeted.

5/28/20 House passes bill to all NC bars to reopen despite executive order, bill now headed to Gov. Cooper (4:00 p.m., 1:18)

North Carolina legislators are wading into Gov. Roy Cooper's business reopening decisions.

The state Senate voted overwhelmingly on Thursday to let bars serve customers outdoors, despite his recent executive order keeping them closed due to COVID-19.

The state House joined with the Senate and approved legislation to allow "safe" outdoor seating for dining and beverage service in North Carolina at half of each bar's total maximum occupancy.

Gov. Cooper says his decision shuttering bars until at least late June is based on data and science.

Republicans and some business owners have questioned his orders, calling them uneven and devastating to the state economy. But most Senate Democrats joined GOP counterparts in sending the measure to the House.

House Bill 536 Temp Outdoor Restaurants for Outdoor Seating allows bars to operate at 50 percent of total capacity.

"We join our colleagues across the General Assembly urging Governor Cooper to sign this legislation immediately to offer a lifeline to thousands of businesses across North Carolina through a safe, commonsense policy that is supported by science and data," state House Speaker Tim Moore (R-Cleveland) said Thursday. The bill now goes to Governor Roy Cooper, who responded to the legislation during a press conference Thursday afternoon.

"We're six days into Phase 2 and on a day when we're seeing some of our highest numbers of hospitalizations and death, the senate wants to open bars," Gov. Cooper said. "These decisions are difficult, but they are made with daily briefings from doctors and healthcare experts."

State health officials say the number of positive virus cases exceed 25,000.

On Thursday, North Carolina continued to see hospitalizations due to COVID-19 rise again on Thursday, according to the N.C. Department of Health and Human Services.

There are 708 people currently hospitalized, which is the highest number reported yet by the state.

"I know that it is a tough time for business, and I believe that there will be a time when we can open bars, but that time is not now and I hope that the House will look at this carefully and senators will reconsider their choice about this," Gov. Cooper said.

6/5/20 Governor Cooper vetoes bill that would have allowed NC bars to reopen (7:00 p.m., 1:21)

North Carolina Governor Roy Cooper has vetoed a bill state legislators passed to allow bars to reopen in the state during the coronavirus pandemic.

The state Senate voted overwhelmingly last Thursday to let bars serve customers outdoors, despite the governor's recent executive order keeping them closed due to COVID-19.

The state House joined with the Senate and approved legislation to allow "safe" outdoor seating for dining and beverage service in North Carolina at half of each bar's total maximum occupancy.

Gov. Cooper says his decision shuttering bars until at least late June is based on data and science.

"State and local government leaders must be able to act quickly during the COVID-19 emergency to prevent a surge in cases that could overwhelm hospitals and harm the public," Cooper said after signing the bill. "House Bill 536 would limit the ability of leaders to respond quickly to COVID-19 and hamper the health and safety of every North Carolinian."

Republicans and some business owners have questioned his orders, calling them uneven and devastating to the state economy. But most Senate Democrats joined GOP counterparts in sending the measure to the House.

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State health officials said there are more than 33,200 positive virus cases as of Friday, June 5, with 659 people currently hospitalized.

State leaders called the higher number of hospitalization cases concerning in a press conference on May 28 and said they were continuing to watch the number closely.

"I know that it is a tough time for business, and I believe that there will be a time when we can open bars," Gov. Cooper said, "but that time is not now and I hope that the House will look at this carefully and senators will reconsider their choice about this."

It's time to listen, show our humanity and compassion and then act to bring about real and lasting change.

Rowan County has a rich history of collaborating, finding hope, and coming together during difficult and stressful times. We've witnessed it recently with the COVID-19 health crisis and the Rowan Economic Recovery Task Force in conjunction with our community partners. These partnerships are the

cornerstone of our success. We are a community that supports our neighbors in good times and in bad. While we watch what is happening across the country and in our own backyard, we need to show true humanity for our fellow citizens and work together to be part of the solution.

6/18/20 COVID-19 Effect on Local Economy (7:30 p.m., 10:37)

Britt Gooding's mobile boutique business CLT Boutique is expanding.

"Through the course of a day, you feel so many emotions and excitement, and nervousness, and yeah, a little bit of fear," she says.

Fear tends to come with new ventures, but COVID-19 is magnifying that for new retailers. Gooding is expanding from that mobile boutique in a renovated trailer, to brick-and-mortar.

"[The mobile boutique] didn't seem like a big scary risk because it happened over time," she says. "Where as this is like, it's here, it's happening."

Local retailers that are expanding like Gooding are experiencing unique challenges keeping the business they have going, while trying to physically grow their business during COVID-19 restrictions.

"One thing is being a mother and not having childcare," she says. "And honestly, that was the biggest part, trying to figure out how to, even though I didn't have a storefront open at the time, still trying to grow my business while being at home with a toddler...so I would stay up to 3:00 or 4:00 a.m., and it would be fine, and I'd just get my work done then."

CLT Boutique is one in a line of new retail spaces on South End's Winnifred Street.

"It was just kind of the most perfect opportunity," Gooding says. "Every retailer in here, it's kind of an incubator for small business, where there's low entry to get started, they're small spaces, the rent is relatively low, they deliver you a vanilla shell space, so basically in theory you can walk in with your Square reader and products and you can open your store."

Financially, she says, it has been an interesting time, and a time to make critical choices about her business spending.

"Do I really need this?" she asks herself. "It's going to be, probably, bare necessities for a while. I have all these grand ideas, but it might be something that has to happen over time."

Many small businesses including local retailers entered the loan process early into COVID-19 restrictions. Many have not heard anything back.

"I applied for several, I didn't get any of them," Gooding says. "I applied for the EIDL and never heard anything back. I tried for the PPP with Wells Fargo and another local company that was doing it, and I didn't get either of those either...I don't personally know anyone who got any of those loans. I feel bad, but it does make me feel a little better, but then it's so confusing when you read articles on Forbes about these big chain restaurants and Ruth's Chris and all these other people getting tons of funding, and you're like, 'Well what about me, what about the little guy?'"

Gooding, like so many others, has been focusing more on online sales, without as many pop-up events to bring her mobile store to. Her new South End neighbors have been helping.

"Charlotte is such a great community for supporting small business, and I think it's a huge focus around here," she says. "April was my best month of sales, but then May and June have kind of trickled down some, so I feel, I don't know, I'm trying to figure out what it is, have people just kind of lost steam with the small business type thing, or is it more people unfortunately losing their jobs? There's so many variables it might be, but I think the local economy in Charlotte is definitely going to bounce back quickly, I hope so anyway."

6/26/20 COVID-19 continues to rapidly spread in the Latinx Community in Charlotte and statewide (5:30 p.m., 2:21)

The COVID-19 pandemic is disproportionately affecting the Latinx community in North Carolina.

Hispanic people make up about 10 percent of North Carolina's population.

However, about 46 percent of COVID-19 cases in North Carolina have been found in Hispanics.

Atrium Health has also noticed disproportionate numbers locally.

According to Atrium Health's Levine Children's Hospital Epidemiologist Dr. Amina Ahmed, she estimates about 25 percent of Hispanics who are tested for COVID-19 at Atrium Health, are positive.

In comparison, Atrium Health reports a 9.5 percent positivity rate for everyone who is tested at its facilities.

"And of all the children coming forward for hospital care, two-thirds are Hispanic," Dr. Ahmed said.

Although the Black community and Hispanic community are more likely to have severe complications from COVID-19 due to higher rates of diabetes and heart disease, health leaders say they should not have higher case numbers than any other race or ethnicity.

Atrium Health's pediatrician Dr. Debbie Chavez-Mitchell says there may be a few reasons why the virus is spreading rapidly through the Hispanic community.

One reason may be that many people from the Latinx community work in essential jobs where social distancing may be difficult, such as construction or food processing plants.

"So, then those parents are bringing it into the homes and spreading it there," Dr. Chavez-Mitchell said.

Many Hispanic homes are multi-generational, meaning grandparents, parents and children are living under one roof.

6/30/20 Major healthcare company bringing thousands of jobs to Charlotte (12:00 p.m., :31)

City leaders and N.C. Governor Roy Cooper announced Wednesday healthcare giant Centene will be bringing thousands of jobs to Charlotte.

According to Gov. Cooper, the company choosing Charlotte marks the largest job creating opportunity in the state's current incentives program, bringing at least 3,200 jobs to the University City area. The company hopes to eventually open up 6,000 jobs total.

"With the option to choose anywhere to expand their company, Centene chose to invest more than \$1 billion in Charlotte," Cooper said.

The virtual announcement was made at 11:30 a.m. by Cooper, Charlotte Mayor Vi Lyles and Centene CEO Michael Neidorff on the GovChannel and on the city's YouTube and Facebook pages.

Experts have said that over the next 39 years, the project will lift NC's overall economy by \$29.5 billion, increase revenues to the state treasury, and have high-paying jobs - expecting to average about \$100,000 a year.

"We intend to be a strong partner in this community," Neidorff said. "This is not a point in time, it's a process that's just beginning."

Centene will be investing \$1.3 billion to bring the jobs to Charlotte. The move will include a 1 million square foot, six-building in a single business park. They are hoping to break ground in August.

PUBLIC SAFETY

4/6/20 Five-shot, one killed in apparent drive-by shooting in Lancaster County (5:30 p.m., 1:41)

Five people were shot, and one of them died, in an apparent drive-by shooting outside of a home in Lancaster Sunday night.

Lancaster County Sheriff's deputies said the shooting happened around 10:15 p.m. on Memorial Drive.

A man killed in the shooting was identified by the coroner as 27-year-old Shonquill Medley of Lancaster.

Emergency responders say they received multiple calls that gunshots were fired.

At the scene, two people with gunshot wounds were located and taken to the hospital. Two others were taken to a hospital in private cars.

A fifth person who was shot drove herself to a relative's home, medical personnel was called, and she was taken to a local hospital.

Two other people were airlifted to another medical facility for treatment. The surviving victims are expected to recover from their injuries. Deputies said one victim is 19 years old and the others are in their 20s. Four are male and one is female.

Witnesses were interviewed and several automobiles were processed.

Investigators say there appeared to be a gathering at the home on Memorial Drive. People were outside and inside of the home, including several children. Deputies said the shooting victims were outside of the home when they were shot, and one of the victims was in a car with children.

Deputies believe the shot was fired from an automobile on nearby Mahaffey Line Drive.

No children were injured, and no arrests have been made.

"We have received very little useful information from those present when the shooting occurred," said Lancaster County Sheriff Barry Faile. "Although we have developed some leads on our own and are pursuing them, we need those present and anyone else with information to come forward and share it with us. This was a brazen, violent incident with multiple shots fired, multiple people injured, and one killed. The person or persons responsible need to be identified, located, and jailed as soon as possible."

4/26/20 Man killed in east Charlotte shooting (6:00 p.m., 1:48)

A person has died following a shooting Sunday morning in east Charlotte. The incident was called into police around 10:15 a.m. on the 3800 block of Audrey Street. Officers found a man lying in the parking lot of an apartment complex.

Medic pronounced him dead at the scene.

Police are calling it a homicide, but say they aren't looking for any suspects at this time.

5/12/20 Man says he believes he was a victim of racial profiling at Walmart (6:00 p.m., 3:09)

A local couple believes they were the victims of racial profiling after they say they were stopped leaving a Walmart and police were called. And it was all, they say, for wearing masks per CDC guidelines.

Roger Jones says it started out as a normal Saturday run to the Walmart near Mountain Island Lake to purchase mulch.

"My wife and I were doing a home improvement project like most other folks suffering through the quarantine," Jones said.

Jones showed WBTV the receipts showing he paid for 25 bags of mulch. He then began loading the mulch into their vehicle.

"I looked up and we could see, the both of us could see, the store manager come running in our direction, running so fast she was dropping items... as well as two sheriff's deputies running in our direction."

Concerned, Jones took a picture of the deputies on his phone.

He thought the deputies and the store manager were aggressive, but he calmly showed the receipt to a manager. That's when, he says, the deputies escalated the situation.

"A third deputy comes running out and then also another area manager came running out to continue to question us in regard to something we had already shown that we had paid for," he said.

He said it appeared that one of the deputies even lowered his hand towards his weapon.

Concerned, he started recording the conversation on his phone.

"Once I hit record on the phone, to record the interaction, the third deputy on the scene, once my wife started to ask questions, told my wife to shut up, get over it, and get on with her day," Jones said.

In the video recording, Roger Jones' wife is heard saying, "Three police officers with guns running out here because we paid for mulch?"

Roger Jones said, "Everything's paid for. You go your way, we'll go ours.

Everything's paid for, but don't talk to my wife that way though."

A Walmart Employee said, "Well, like she was saying, we apologize if it seemed like that."

The store manager allegedly told Jones they had been having trouble with people in masks stealing from the store and Jones was wearing a mask.

"With 80 percent of the people in your store because of COVID-19 wearing masks, why me? Why did you choose me to stop in that particular point in time?" Jones asked.

A Walmart spokesperson wouldn't answer that question, but replied with this statement:

"One of Walmart's founding principles was respect for the individual, and that belief is equally important today.

"After speaking with those related to the alleged incident you've asked about, we've determined it was a routine receipt check following a purchase in the store's Garden Center."

WBTV also reached out to the Mecklenburg County Sheriff's Office. A spokeswoman said the incident was under investigation but did confirm that "three MCSCO deputies walked over to Roger Jones and his wife at the request of a Walmart clerk."

"Of all the people in the store, of all the people here at this particular location, why did you choose me?" Jones continues to ask.

Walmart claims the incident was captured on a security camera. However, when WBTV asked for a copy of the tape, they refused.

Jones says he still wants to know why three sheriff's deputies were called to confront him.

5/13/20 Board chairman of volunteer fire department in Gaston County accused of stealing money (5:30 p.m., 1:20)

The board chairman of a volunteer fire department in Gaston County is being accused of stealing money from the department.

The Gaston County Police Department has charged Jeffrey Scott Beasley with felony larceny. The charge stems from an investigation into cash withdrawals from an account belonging to the Spencer Mountain Volunteer Fire Department over a six-month period between 2019 and 2020.

Beasley was serving as the Chairman of the Board of Directors on the Spencer Mountain Volunteer Fire Department when the allegations were reported at the beginning of May 2020.

Beasley was acting as the Treasurer for the board during the time the cash withdrawals were made in late 2019 through 2020.

There is no further information available at this time.

5/29/20 Police looking for man accused of shooting 17-year-old girl in Burger King parking lot (5:30 p.m., 2:18)

Police are looking for the man who is accused of shooting a 17-year-old girl in the parking lot of a Burger King in Gaston County.

Charges have been filed against 19-year-old Michael Edward Bolch III in connection to the shooting of 17-year-old Nasani Raley.

The incident happened in the parking lot of the Burger King on Market Street in Cramerton on May 26.

Bolch is charged with attempted first-degree murder, first-degree kidnapping, assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill inflicting serious injury and robbery with a dangerous weapon.

Amur Bey, a Charlotte resident, said his 17-year-old daughter, Nasani Raley, was the victim of a shooting in Cramerton Tuesday night.

The incident happened outside of a Burger King restaurant on Market Street, according to police.

Cramerton Police Chief Brad Adams spoke to reporters near the crime scene Tuesday night.

"Our officers received a call of a subject shot in the parking lot of Burger King. Upon arrival, officers responded and were able to be on scene very quick within 60 seconds and provide aid to the victim," said Adams.

Bey said he was riding his dirt bike Tuesday night when he got word his daughter had been shot.

"I was devastated. I didn't know how to respond. I was leaving here going down I-85 to see my daughter," explained Bey.

He said Raley is now at Levine Children's Hospital in Charlotte and underwent surgery Wednesday. He said his daughter is set to graduate from Stuart Cramer High School in Cramerton and is an employee at the Burger King where the shooting happened.

6/5/20 Three brothers arrested, accused of human trafficking involving teen girl in Lancaster County (5:00 p.m., 1:39)

Three brothers were arrested and accused of human trafficking involving a teenage girl in Lancaster County

The Lancaster County Sheriff's Office opened an investigation in mid-March 2020 after a 15-year-old girl from Lancaster County was found in neighboring Chesterfield County.

She was returned to Lancaster by a police officer and gave him information which led to the sheriff's office investigation.

Officials say the victim reported she ran away on March 14 and was walking along a road east of Lancaster when she was picked up by a man later identified as 50-year-old David Louis Hayden.

She was reportedly taken to an apparently unoccupied house before being taken to a mobile home on Logging Road where she stayed for two days and nights. During this time, officials say the victim reported she was given alcohol and drugs, engaged in sex acts with several men and was given cash. The victim left the location and was later found in Chesterfield County.

Investigators with the sheriff's office requested the assistance of the State Law Enforcement Division (SLED), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), and the South Carolina Attorney General's Office.

6/19/20 Police looking for suspects from separate crimes at the same east Charlotte shopping center (11:00 p.m., 2:25)

Detectives from the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department are asking for the public's help identifying suspects involved two different incidents that took place within a week's time at the same Charlotte shopping center.

The incidents took place at the Wallace Crossing Shopping Center off of Independence Blvd. in east Charlotte.

One of the situations involves a car theft at an auto lot and the other incident was an armed robbery at a convenience store.

According to police, the car theft happened June 8.

Surveillance footage from the business, SB Automotive, shows a man in a bright orange shirt checking out a 2009 Land Rover Sport in the car lot.

"We had a white male enter the parking lot, ask to see a particular vehicle. He was going to test drive the vehicle and happened to have the keys. When somebody walked off, he went to that vehicle and he stole that vehicle," explained Detective Adrian Johnson from the CMPD Crime Stoppers.

The surveillance footage shows the man snapping pics of the car before casually walking up to it, getting inside, and driving it off the lot. Johnson said test-drive thefts aren't unheard of.

"We want people to pay attention in this certain case and we want small business owners that own car lots to be more cautious in how they carry out there business," said Johnson.

The 2009 Land Rover Sport is dark blue. Police said no tag was on the vehicle at the time of the theft, and the key fob was stolen with the vehicle.

Just days after the car lot theft, police were called back to the same shopping center for an armed robbery.

Police said the incident happened at the L&G Mart around 10 p.m. on June 14. Surveillance footage from the store shows three people walk into the store. Two of them approached the store's front counter. A third person stays at the door as a lookout.

"They demanded cash. The victim opened the register and the second suspect took all the money out of the register while the first suspect inside the store held the gun," Johnson said.

The detective said the robbery appeared to be planned.

"It was well-organized, well-thought-out. We believe these suspects may have committed other crimes in Charlotte similar to this one and we need to find these suspects as soon as possible," Johnson said.

One of the suspects was wearing a blue hooded jacket with white lettering down the right sleeve and black pants. Another one of the suspects was wearing a black hoodie, a black and white mask, and pants that are grey in the front and black on the back.

Anyone with information about the incidents at the shopping center is asked to call Crime Stoppers at 704-334-1600. Tipsters can remain anonymous and they can receive a cash reward if they have information that leads to an arrest.

6/23/20 Reducing Crime while Defunding Police (6:00 p.m., 2:34)

What does defunding the police department look like? Community leaders weight in. Some say defunding the police could produce less crime; others say crime rates will increase. Paige Pauroso spoke to community leaders in Charlotte for their opinions on this topic.

6/30/20 Top lawmaker says NCGA will 'revisit and correct' bill that would limit access to death investigation records (6:00 p.m., 2:18)

Days after the North Carolina legislature's passage of a bill that includes a measure to further restrict death investigation records from public access, some lawmakers say they plan to walk back the provision.

Senate Bill 168, which passed the House and Senate nearly unanimously after midnight in the final hours of the short session, includes language that the state Department of Health and Human Services requested to make technical revisions to department-related laws.

The bill includes a public records provision that mandates certain records remain confidential when used as part of a death investigation. The language, if signed

into law, would close a loophole that makes law enforcement records public if they are in the possession of the medical examiner.

But the language of the bill potentially could make other records that are currently public confidential if they include information derived from law enforcement or other confidential records, public records advocates say.

Following reporting on the bill over the weekend by a multi-newsroom collaborative, House Majority Leader John Bell said a fix is in the works.

"The General Assembly acted in good faith to fulfill their request, and that's why it was included in the bill," Bell, R-Wayne, said of the request from DHHS. "After further conversations and discussions about its unintended consequences, I am confident this will be revisited and corrected once the legislature reconvenes."

Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper's press office said Monday the governor would "review the legislation," but did not say whether he would sign the bill.

6/30/20 Black community leaders are calling on more men to be mentors after back-to-back killings (11:00 p.m., 4:49)

Community leaders are calling on some people to help find solutions to stop the shootings and killings in Charlotte.

The focus starts with the youth, specifically in Black neighborhoods because a lot of the times, it's boys and young men who are either dying or doing the killings in the community.

Those in Tuesday's group meeting in Northwest Charlotte say it boils down to the "Each one, teach one" mentality.

"We have everything in this room to accomplish what we want to accomplish," said Charlotte radio host No Limit Larry.

Usually, women outnumber men in these meetings, but that changed Tuesday night when No Limit Larry – who leads these weekly conversations – called last week on the women in the group to bring the men in their lives this week. He said it was about finding good mentors for young people in areas where the streets can be mean.

"For me personally, I think it's going to take door-to-door, block by block, family by family to make something like this work," said another man in the group.

The women delivered, and the men showed up. Barbers, bankers, teachers, entrepreneurs and more. Michael Norman was one of them. He's the founder of a training center that teaches men and women who have had hard lives, to become electricians. Norman said he built his program from the ground up because he wanted to see the people in his community do better, and be better.

"Me as an African-American male, to spend my money, my resources, my energy in my own community first," said Norman.

He wasn't the only one. Others here said they're ready to stop talking and start bringing action for solutions.

"Let's learn how to speak about life. Let's speak what we want to see, and when we start speaking what we want to see, that's when we start putting our generation in a place to grow," said another man in Tuesday's meeting.

This group is ready. They say they can't wait for Charlotte city council members to make a move and help them because people continue to be killed. In the last 24-hours, two more people have lost their lives. Facts like that are pushing these guys to apply for grant money and do fundraisers so, they say, they can invest in more positive programs for young people.

4/9/20 Parade of Lights: Parade for Healthcare workers in Charlotte (5:00 p.m., 1:33)

First responders showed their unity with and support for healthcare workers in uptown Charlotte Thursday as the city continues to fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

Starting at 2 p.m., a procession of first responder vehicles passed by the uptown-area hospitals - Atrium Health's Carolina's Medical Center, Atrium Health Mercy and Novant Health Presbyterian Medical Center - with lights flashing and sirens on.

Parade of Lights: First responders show unity, support for healthcare workers in Charlotte

"Charlotte and Mecklenburg County first responders want our healthcare partners to know we appreciate and admire their relentless dedication to the community during this unprecedented time," Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police said prior to the procession.

Healthcare workers stood outside the hospitals and cheered as the first responders went by.

4/22/20 Former WBTV Good News Reports raising thousands for the hungry (9:00 a.m., 4:52)

Former WBTV Good News reporter Kristen Hampton is continuing to have a positive influence on the community while making people laugh - and now she's doing it instead of celebrating a major milestone.

Hampton will be turning 40 years old on May 1. But, she of course can't celebrate the big 4-0 while keeping a safe distance from those she cares about.

"I want to just wait - pretend it didn't happen - and wait until I can be around my friends and family and hug them," Hampton said.

Instead of sending cards in the mail, she's asking people to throw in a few dollars to help feed people in need. She started a GoFundMe campaign to do just that.

"I firmly believe food is love. It's a gift that no one should go without," she wrote. "Ever since childhood, one of my favorite hobbies has been cooking and providing good meals for my friends and family. Sadly, so many people are without right now. This is where we can help."

After posting the campaign, Hampton raised more than \$20,000 in about 30 minutes, easily breaking her original goal of \$5,000. Between Tuesday and Wednesday, the total went from below \$50,000 to above \$60,000. Hampton's goal now is to raise \$100,000.

The money raised will go to four specific charities:

- Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina
- Watchmen of the Streets (an organization that supports homeless neighbors in North and South Carolina)
- Meals on Wheels America
- Feeding America

Hampton, who is widely known for her hilarious 'product testing,' also let donors vote on whether her next test would be something fans have urged her to do - and not do - for years: the Flowbee hair cutting system. While the votes may be over - and the long hair gone - the fundraiser is still going.

"I certainly understand many people reading this will not be able to help, or may choose other charities," Hampton wrote. "I understand, and pray you find the resources you need, or find it in your heart to help in whatever way possible."

5/8/20 Couple creates fundraiser to help families facing homelessness (5:30 p.m., 2:32)

A Charlotte couple is taking action to help their community after they heard several reports of families getting evicted from hotels and apartments.

Although North Carolina told landlords that evictions aren't allowed during the COVID-19 pandemic, many families say the threat and fear of eviction are still very real.

The "Give. Buy. Hi." campaign is also trying to spread positivity and hope throughout the community.

"Hi everyone, we just wanted to get on here and thank everyone," said Tanise Love on a recent Instagram video.

Tanise Love and her husband Derrick have raised thousands of dollars already and have helped dozens of people to stay off the streets.

"Our donors are awesome, you all are awesome," Tanise Love said.

The couple met through volunteering, and after COVID19 shut things down and left thousands without jobs, they knew they had to do something.

"So many people were affected," Derrick Love said. "There are people in hotels. There are people trying to hang on to their apartments. People are looking for work and people looking for food."

The "give" part of the campaign focuses on families facing homelessness because of COVID-19. Donations are helping families pay for rooms in motels, rent, and get them other help they might need.

5/13/20 Salisbury Nursing Home celebrates "Sunshine Day" (5:30 p.m., 2:48)

Morning clouds and rain departed just in time for families and residents of Accordius Health on Statesville Boulevard in Salisbury to celebrate "Sunshine Day."

The facility organized a drive-by parade so that family members could see their relatives who are living at the facility.

The parade was also held in conjunction with National Skilled Nursing Care Week.

Residents and family members have not been able to visit with each other in weeks since the COVID-19 restrictions were put in place.

Nearly two dozen families were represented as cars pulled through the parking lot and then stopped briefly for a time to talk.

Many residents, family members, and staff held signs saying things like "We Miss You!" and "We Love You."

Family members expressed gratitude to the staff at Accordius.

5/14/20 Free Concerts during Coronavirus (6:00 a.m., 3:44)

If you've been missing concerts, there's one local musician here in Charlotte who may have a fix for you.

Since restrictions began in North Carolina due to the coronavirus pandemic, one home in Plaza Midwood has hosted a concert played for free with social distancing enforced.

Local musician Josh Daniel puts on the shows and says they stay safe and socially distant because people gather on their porches, on bikes throughout the neighborhood.

Every one of his shows each day for the past two months has also been live-streamed online.

It started as a way to try and make ends meet for his family and ended up being something much more.

"We had tons and tons of gigs scheduled for the spring and summer. And of which all got canceled," said Daniel.

Concerts are how Josh supports his family, including young son Sonny who has a rare genetic brain syndrome. So, Daniel got creative.

"I said, You know, I think I can, I think I can go live every day and get some tips and we can keep, you know, keep paying our bills like that," said Daniel.

He started strumming a serenade for his Plaza Midwood neighbors to feel some normalcy.

"Sit in the street and drink a beer and watch him at his house," said Joe Fortier, a neighbor and COVID-concert attendee. "There's something to look forward to every day instead of your four walls."

Nearly 60 days of shows later Josh is still playing, now reaching thousands of people he doesn't know stuck at home during the pandemic.

Spirit Leatherwood is from Oregon and has tuned in to almost every single daily concert.

"He's made feel just a little bit more hopeful and you wouldn't think that you would have the same connection, you know, with this distance. But what I'm finding is that we do still feel connected," said Leatherwood. "I don't think we should underestimate somebody playing for that many days in a row, like being vulnerable."

That vulnerability hit hard when Sonny had to have mandatory brain operation right in the middle of the pandemic.

"I think on the 14th day, my little boy had a major surgery, that, um, he was in the hospital for seven days," said Daniel.

Josh then decided his concerts would give back so other kids like Sonny could get the surgeries they need.

"What we're doing is we're raising money to, to help with the hardware that goes in, in the skull for these and to pay for that. So some children overseas can get this operation," said Daniel.

Thankfully Sonny made it out of the NICU and Josh is still sharing his music every single day.

"His passion for the foundation that he is earning donations for, and he's just a humble genuine man," said Leatherwood.

Daniel is still offering up free concerts and auctioning off a personalized concert for individual people. The money you donate goes to help other kids like Sonny get life-saving help.

5/26/20 Family surprises Iredell County first responders (11:00 p.m., 2:18)

First responders help those in trouble. They get called to a scene, handle that call, and then it's off to the next one.

Rarely do those calls come full circle. Rarely do rescuers get to know how things ultimately turn out.

A recent surprise visit by the Graham family bucks that trend and allowed one fire department in Iredell County to look back on a recent call and see how they saved lives.

Thank yous don't come often for firefighters, EMTs, or any other person part of a rescue squad. So, it was quite the surprise for the Cool Springs Fire department when the Graham family showed up to hand-deliver a plaque in honor of the work crews did to save the lives of four people.

All four were relatives, found in a mangled truck on Mocksville Highway two weeks ago.

"Big shout out to the Cool Springs Fire Department," said Jahri Hairston, who was in the accident.

It's not clear what caused the accident, but the truck rolled over and was trapped underneath a tree. It took saws and nearly 50 minutes for crews to get all 4 men out.

"It's no way any of us should have walked out of there," said Quen Turner, who was also in the accident.

The first responders say being able to see any crash victim alive and walking is all the satisfaction they need.

"It is our job and we don't take it lightly, but we are very appreciative when a family comes and lets us know that they're thankful that we helped save their family," said Michael Eckmann, a paramedic for Iredell County EMS.

"They spent 50 minutes cutting us out honestly. The fact that they cared enough to take that time and make sure that we were okay...we had to come back and at least show a little effort. They put 50 minutes in, we took 5 minutes," added Only one of the men from the accident is still in the hospital -- he was just moved from critical ICU to intermediate care.

"I will be even more grateful when he gets out of the hospital...you don't often get to see that with trauma like that," Eckmann added.

The accident will never be forgotten, but in this case, at least this time, a crumpled car gets overshadowed by a beautiful ending, and with first responders seeing why they make such a difference.

04/04/20 **48 HOURS: “Reuschel vs. Reuschel”** - a report on the trial of Mike Reuschel for the attempted murder of his wife, Sue Reuschel. On February 3, 2018, police in Gainesville, Florida responded to a home invasion at the home of Mike and Sue Reuschel. According to Mike, an intruder entered the home and stabbed Sue, though Detective David Visconti did not find evidence consistent with that. After waking up from emergency surgery, Sue revealed there was no intruder and claimed Mike was the assailant; he was arrested for attempted murder. Mike’s daughter, Caroline, asserted Sue fabricated her story and recalled Sue being a heavy drinker, who exerted control over Mike’s behavior and was jealous of her. Surprisingly, Sue took an active role in planning Caroline’s wedding and paid for an expensive wedding dress. At her wedding, Caroline noticed a scar on Mike’s face and he revealed that Sue had been physically abusive for years. Sue was arrested for domestic battery in November 2017, a fact that only came out during Mike’s trial. According to Sue, Mike revealed that Caroline’s wedding went over budget by \$150,000, which led to an argument that became physical. Afterwards, Sue agreed to move to a condo they owned and get counseling for anger and drinking problems. In February 2018, Sue returned to Gainesville to attempt a reconciliation. At dinner, a text from Caroline led to a fight. Mike and Sue drove home separately, with Sue sending Mike angry texts the whole way, including ones asking for a divorce. Sue stated that she was in the guest room when Mike came in, got on top on her and stabbed her in the stomach, cut her fingers, and slashed her wrists. He then laid in the bed next to her until she agreed to the story about an intruder. In Mike’s version of events, he entered the guest room to find Sue holding a knife and in an ensuing struggle, the knife entered her stomach without him realizing; they then laid in bed and discussed future vacation plans. Mike further claimed Sue cut her own wrists and came up with the intruder story for fear she would be arrested. Defense expert Michael Berkand testified the blood splatter around the bed was consistent with Mike’s statements. Prosecutors contested Berkland’s testimony and his credibility; they pointed to his fear of losing half of his fortune in a divorce as motive. After a four hours of deliberation, the jury returned with a guilty verdict on all counts. Mike received additional charges after a jailhouse informant claimed he tried to hire a hitman to kill Sue. After family and colleagues testified at his hearing, Mike was sentenced to 30 years in prison. **On-screen text graphic:** The murder-for-hire charges against Mike Reuschel were dropped. 48 HOURS: LIVE TO TELL: “Surviving Ted Bundy” – Karen Kleiner, Karen Chandler, and Cheryl Thomas, all attacked by serial killer Ted Bundy, tell their stories and their subsequent road to recovery. In the early morning hours of January 15th, 1978, Karen Kleiner was awakened by the slamming of her bedroom door, just before a man struck her with an object. He attacked her roommate Karen Chandler, after he noticed her stirring. Alarmed by the return of a Chi Omega sorority sister to the house on the Florida State University (FSU) campus, the man fled. The two women were taken to the emergency room and when they awoke, learned that the man had murdered and sexually assaulted two of their sorority sisters. Sheriff Ken Katsaris found bite marks on the deceased victims and was informed of another attack six blocks away, this time on Cheryl Thomas. He also received word from Colorado authorities about an escaped criminal in the area, Ted Bundy. Weeks later, another possible victim came to light, 12-year-old Kimberly Leach. On February 15th, Ted Bundy was arrested in a stolen car and immediately became a suspect. While none of the victims could positively identify Bundy, a Chi Omega sister saw his profile the night of the attacks and positively identified him from a lineup. Sheriff Katsaris obtained a warrant for a mold of Bundy’s teeth, which experts matched to the bite marks. During the trial, Bundy took an active role in his defense, deposing witnesses and serving on his own defense team for the FSU trial. On July 24th, after seven hours of deliberation, Bundy was found guilty on all counts and sentenced to death. He would subsequently be found guilty for Kimberly Leach’s death and given a second death sentence. Bundy appealed through the 1980s and after exhausting all appeals, offered information on more victims, in exchange for his sentence to be changed. 48 HOURS: “Crosley Green’s Hard Time” – an update to “Last Chance for Freedom” (OAD: 05/30/15; updated 08/19/17), which was a follow-up to both “Reasonable Doubt” (OAD: 11/01/99); and its retitled rebroadcast, which included an update: “Impossible Mission” (OAD: 07/10/00). This update continues the report on Crosley Green, who remains in a Florida prison. Despite his claims of innocence, Green was convicted and sentenced to death in 1990 for the April 1989 murder of Charles “Chip” Flynn in a Titusville, Florida orange grove. Green, along with the help of lawyers and private investigators, has spent decades trying to prove his innocence. At the time of the murder, Green was a small-time drug dealer who said he was two miles away when Flynn was killed. Green was arrested after Flynn’s former girlfriend, Kim Hallock, told police that she and Flynn had been carjacked by a black man with a gun and driven to a remote orange grove. Flynn was killed, but Hallock escaped. She identified Green from a photo lineup. Green’s nine state appeals are exhausted, but his current attorneys Keith Harrison, Bob Rhoad and Jeane Thomas, along with an original private investigator Joe Moura (now a 48 HOURS consultant) have one last hope, federal court. They believe they have enough evidence to prove that the conviction is part of a distinct pattern and practice of government misconduct in Brevard County. Three other men, Bill Dillion, Juan Ramos, and Wilton Dedge have had their convictions overturned; two of them were also prosecuted by Christopher White. Green’s attorneys believe that what makes this case different is a mountain of evidence that demonstrates Crosley Green is actually innocent. At the heart of their case are notes from Assistant State’s Attorney Christopher White’s meeting with officers Mark Rixey and Diane Clarke (who spoke to 48 HOURS for the first time for the 05/30/15 broadcast). Green’s lawyer says that their notes say they think the girl (former girlfriend Kim Hallock) killed Flynn. In June 2017, the 11th Circuit Federal Court of Appeals said it would allow Green’s attorneys to argue in person why his case should not have been dismissed. The Florida Attorney General’s Office continues to fight to uphold Crosley Green’s conviction, claiming Green failed to meet a filing deadline for his appeal. **UPDATE:** In July 2018, a federal judge ruled that withholding prosecutor notes from Green’s defense violated his right to a fair trial. His conviction was overturned and a new trial was ordered. The state of Florida appealed. 48 HOURS: “The Murder of Haley Anderson” – a report on the murder of Binghamton University nursing student Haley Anderson by fellow nursing student Orlando Tercero. In early March 2018, Haley Anderson’s friends were concerned after she didn’t show up to a friend’s poetry reading. They tracked her iPhone to Tercero’s apartment, where her friend Josie Artin climbed through the window and found her body in Tercero’s bedroom. Footage from surveillance cameras around the home showed Anderson entering with Tercero on March 8th, but never leaving. Investigators believed Tercero attempted suicide, based on a tie hung in a doorway and a note he left, in which they believed Tercero admitted to killing Anderson. Tercero was seen leaving the home one last time before driving to New York’s JFK airport, where he boarded a flight to Nicaragua. Four days later, his mother drove him to a hospital after another failed suicide attempt, where he was arrested by Nicaraguan authorities. Because of Tercero’s dual citizenship, he was not extradited to the United States. In October 2019, he was tried for the crime of “femicide”; the Broome County District Attorney’s office aided the prosecution. Tercero’s attorney presented a temporary insanity defense, with a court appointed psychologist as his only witness. After a 90-minute recess, the judge declared Tercero guilty. Two weeks later, he was sentenced to 30 years in prison. On February 4, 2020, Tercero appeared in appeals court, where his attorney argued for a new psychological evaluation, to be conducted by a forensic psychologist. Magistrates quickly denied the request. Additionally, the defense argued that because Tercero was indicted in the U.S. for second-degree murder, the court was obligated to adhere to the lighter sentencing guidelines associated with it. In 2002, Sherrie Calgaro filed a police report about her sister Mary Day, who went missing in 1981 at the age of 13. Sherrie had been adopted by a foster family, while Mary and their middle sister Kathy, returned to their mother Charlotte and her new husband, William Houle. Mary was last seen at the Houle home in Seaside, California. William accused Mary of poisoning his dog, which led to a physical altercation. Charlotte and William claimed that Mary ran away, but they never filed a police report -- allegedly so they could continue claiming the Social Security checks Mary was receiving because of her deceased father. In March 2003, authorities canvassed the former home of the Houles with cadaver dogs, all of which focused on one spot in the backyard. After digging, police found the decaying sneaker of a young girl, but no body. A month later, Detective Joe Bertaina interviewed Charlotte and William after locating them in Kansas. William recalled the altercation with Mary and admitted to striking her. He claimed he could not have killed her, but admitted to feeling “possessed” at the time and that the “demon” inside him could have. Detective Bertaina and Police Chief Steve Cercone took this as a confession, but the district attorney was not ready to bring charges. In November of that year, a routine traffic stop in Phoenix, Arizona, turned up a woman claiming to be Mary Day. Authorities performed a DNA test on “Phoenix Mary” and confirmed she was Charlotte Houle’s daughter. The police closed the case and Sherrie invited Mary to move in with her, but she soon began to question if this woman was her sister. Sherrie noticed Mary often went by the name “Monica Devereaux” and had a peculiar accent. Mary also sent an email to Detective Bertaina saying she had been lying about who she was. Despite this, the case remained closed. However, in 2008 Chief Cercone was informed that an unrelated investigation at Fort Ord had resulted in cadaver dogs focusing on a second home the Houles had lived in. Once again, police were unable to find a body. Chief Cercone hired private investigator Mark Clark to look into the case. Clark’s theory was that the Houles murdered Mary in 1981 and that “Phoenix Mary” was a previously unknown daughter of Charlotte’s that they enticed to impersonate Mary with the promise of money. In 2017, acting Police Chief Judy Veloz had further testing conducted that showed “Phoenix Mary’s” DNA matched Charlotte as well as the birth father. She further concluded that that gaps in Mary’s memory were due to a traumatic life and alcoholism. 05/09/20 **48 HOURS: “Tracking the Murders of Israel Keyes”** – a report on the capture and interrogation of a confessed serial killer and the search for more of his victims. On the evening of February 1, 2012 in Anchorage, Alaska, Samantha Koenig went missing from her job at a roadside coffee stand. Security footage showed what appeared to be an individual with a gun leading her away. Three weeks later, her boyfriend would receive text messages, which led to law enforcement finding a picture of Samantha and a ransom demand attached to a bulletin board at a local park. Samantha’s father deposited some of the ransom money in her account. A masked man was caught on camera making a withdrawal with Samantha’s ATM card, but police were unable to reach him in time. Subsequent withdrawals would occur a week later in New Mexico and Arizona; on March 13, a Texas state trooper would spot the car seen in ATM surveillance footage. A search of it would produce Samantha’s ID, ATM card, a gun, and the disguise seen in the Anchorage ATM footage. The driver was Israel Keyes; he was arrested and extradited to Alaska. Keyes was willing to give law enforcement information on his crimes, but asked for the promise of the death penalty and certain “treats,” such as a cigar, candy or Starbucks coffee, over the course of the investigation. Keyes confessed to chaining Samantha up in his shed, sexually assaulting her, and eventually killing her and dumping her body in a lake. Over seven months of interviews, U.S. attorneys would eventually get him to reveal his part in the deaths of Bill and Lorraine Currier of Vermont in 2011, a woman in Bend, Oregon in the late 1990s, and an individual in Washington State in 2005 or 2006. He also revealed the existence of “kill caches” of guns and ammunition he buried around the country. Though he did not take responsibility, he is also suspected in the death of Deborah Feldman in Upstate New York. Keyes committed suicide December 1, 2012. 05/16/20 **48 HOURS: “The Disappearance of Kelly Dwyer”** (9:00 - 10:00p) – In October 2013, Kelly Dwyer vanished after a night out in Milwaukee. After failing to report for work on October 12th, concerned co-workers attempted to call and check her social media accounts. Investigators learned Dwyer’s phone was dead, her social media accounts down, and debit card unused. Dwyer was last seen on October 10th, entering her boyfriend Kris Zocco’s apartment. Zocco told investigators he and Dwyer engaged in drug use, sex, and then both passed out. Zocco says Dwyer left his apartment the next morning around 9am, though security footage shows otherwise. After finding drugs in his apartment, Zocco was arrested for drug possession. While in custody, the police obtained a warrant for his cell phone and found disturbing pictures of Dwyer and video of Zocco engaged in a sex act where Dwyer appears to be in distress. Although considered a person of interest, Zocco could still only be charged with drug possession. On a second search of his apartment, a police cadaver dog alerted them to odor of decomposing human remains. In a spare bedroom, the police found a hard drive containing child pornography and were able to arrest him again. Zocco was convicted of possession of child pornography, plead guilty to additional drug charges, and was sentenced 19 years. A year and a half after Dwyer vanished, her remains were discovered by a local man on a deserted road about 45 miles west of Milwaukee. Five years after Dwyer vanished, Zocco went on trial and was charged with first-degree reckless homicide, hiding a corpse, and strangulation and suffocation. After nine days of testimony, Zocco was found guilty on all charges and sentenced to thirty-one years in addition to his 19 year sentence. In 2015, Lori Vallow met Charles Vallow, who would become her fourth husband. The two quickly fell in love and married, creating a family with Tylee Ryan, Lori’s daughter from a previous marriage, and the recently adopted JJ Vallow, Charles’ sister’s grandson. After living in Hawaii, the family moved to Arizona in 2017, where Lori began paying less attention to the children, leading to a rift in the family. In early 2019, Lori left for two months to see author and podcaster Chad Daybell in Rexburg, Idaho. Charles filed for divorce, citing murder threats from Lori and her becoming involved in extreme religious beliefs, which included her leading a small group of survivors following the apocalypse. On July 11, 2019, Charles arrived at Lori’s home to take JJ to school. An hour later, he was shot and killed by Lori’s brother Alex Cox, who claimed self-defense. Two months later, Lori moved her and the children to Rexburg. In early October 2019, Lori reportedly began preparation to marry Chad, however he was still married. Weeks later, Chad’s wife Tammy unexpectedly died; no autopsy was performed. Two weeks later, Lori and Chad married in Hawaii. In November 2019, Rexburg police performed a welfare check at the prompting of JJ’s grandparents, Kay and Larry Woodcock. Lori claimed the children were with a friend in Arizona, however when Arizona authorities followed up on this, they found out it was a lie. Rexburg police returned to execute a search warrant and discovered Lori and Chad had left town. It was eventually discovered they were on an extended honeymoon in Hawaii. On January 25, 2020, Lori was ordered to produce Tylee and JJ to Idaho authorities. She did not and was arrested. On March 5, 2020, she was extradited back to Idaho and charged with child abandonment. In April 2020, authorities began looking into Lori and Chad’s possible involvement in Tammy Daybell’s death. In May 2020, Lori asked a judge to reduce her million-dollar bond. Her request was denied. Then, on May 7, 2017, less than 48 hours after her high school prom, she gave birth to a daughter in her home, still telling no one. In July 2017, she visited an OB-GYN, told the doctors her baby was stillborn, and that she buried the body in the backyard of the family home. The doctors notified authorities and Richardson was interrogated by police without a lawyer. She was charged with a number of counts, including aggravated murder, which carries a mandatory life sentence. Richardson’s parents open up about their daughter, the lasting impact of the incredible attention the case generated, and they address her eating disorder and the impact that may have had on how she hid the pregnancy. The Richardson’s maintain a false statement was coerced by police. While on trial, no one expected a quick verdict; but after just four hours of deliberation, Richardson was sentenced. She was found not guilty on almost all charges, excepting gross abuse of a corpse. The family feels not taking the plea was the right decision. Though she initially faced life in prison, the judge sentenced Richardson to three years of probation. Gargiulo lived near all of his victims. Blood evidence and DNA, which had been filed in the National Database by Cook County, Illinois authorities, led investigators to Gargiulo and he was arrested and charged for his California crimes. After the 2011 broadcast of 48 HOURS MYSTERY: “The Boy Next Door”, two key witnesses, Temer Leary and Anthony DiLorenzo, came forward with evidence which when coupled with the DNA evidence, allowed authorities to charge Gargiulo for the Pacaccio murder in Illinois. (2) **“The Hollywood Ripper on Trial”** – it has taken Michael Gargiulo longer to go to trial than any other inmate in the history of the L.A. County Jail, nearly eleven years. The trial began on May 2, 2019 and included testimony from survivor Michelle Murphy, actor Ashton Kutcher, Gargiulo’s former best friend Mirko Hoffman, Anthony DiLorenzo, and Pacaccio family members. After three months, he was found guilty on all counts. It is now up to Illinois officials in Cook County to try Gargiulo for the murder of Tricia Pacaccio. 48 HOURS: “good cop / bad cop” - On April 9, 2015, 28-year-old single mother Heather Bogle was last seen leaving the parking lot after working the night shift at the Whirlpool Corporation in Clyde, Ohio. The day after her disappearance, Heather’s car was located with her body inside the trunk. The cause of death was two shots to the back, penetrating her vital organs. Heather’s hair and fingernails were cut to prevent DNA detection. Sean O’Connell, the lead investigator into Heather’s murder, pursued three innocent people of color: single mother Keyona Bor, Omar Satchel, and Kayree Jeffery – all while the real killer walked free. For over two months, O’Connell tried to push his theory that Keyona, Omar, and Kayree worked together in killing Heather, but DNA found under Heather’s cuticle didn’t match. O’Connell omitted all DNA findings in his reports in seeking an indictment. The Bogle file was turned over to the State Bureau of Investigations and it was discovered O’Connell was attempting to indict innocent people for murder. The Sandusky County Prosecutor opened a criminal investigation which led to O’Connell being charged with misleading a public official and destroying, concealing, and tampering with evidence. The new sheriff of Sandusky County, Chris Hilton, took over the Bogle investigation. After using GPS technology, investigators found an electronic trail of coordinates showing Heather’s exact movement after leaving work. The phone GPS placed Heather in the trailer home of fellow Whirlpool employee, Daniel Myers. Investigators questioned Daniel, who claimed he didn’t know Heather well and declined to provide a DNA sample. The authorities returned with a warrant to collect Myer’s DNA and received confirmation it was a match for DNA found under Heather’s cuticle. Myer’s was arrested and charged with the murder of Heather Bogle. Upon searching his trailer, the police realized they were dealing with a violent sexual predator. Six years prior to Bogle’s murder, Leigh Ann Sluder, Daniels’ ex-girlfriend and mother of his son was found dead by a single gunshot to her chest; authorities in that case ruled it a suicide. Leigh Ann’s sister, Loriann, believes Daniel murdered her sister and is hoping for justice through another victim’s case. Before prosecutors could begin Myer’s trial, they had to publicly discredit the original investigator’s findings. The day before his trial was to start, Sean O’Connell finally admitted to a mistake and plead guilty to one felony count of tampering with evidence by omitting the DNA results which excluded his three suspects and was sentenced to two years in state prison. After failed suicide attempts to delay the start of his trial, Daniel Myer’s plead guilty to Heather Bogle’s murder and was sent to prison for life with no chance of parole. Epilogue: It’s still not over in Sandusky County. After we finished reporting on this story, Prosecutor Tim Braun was accused of sexual harassment by at least four women who worked with him. A special prosecutor has been assigned to investigate. No conclusions have been reached. No charges have been filed. (Epilogue not included in the 06/06/20 rebroadcast.) 48 HOURS: “Defending DJ” (9:00 – 10:00p) - a report about Danroy “DJ” Henry and the dedication and struggles his family endured trying to restore their son’s reputation after he was shot dead in Pleasantville, New York, by police officer Aaron Hess in 2010. This event triggered a seven-year journey for the family as they searched for answers about what really happened. During a night out with his teammates, a fight broke out among other restaurant patrons and police were called to the scene. DJ and his friends decided to leave. They were waiting in his car in a fire lane prior to their departure. Police approached the vehicle and told DJ he should move; his friends said DJ started to slowly move away. The police claim that DJ tried to mow officers down with his car when Officer Hess approached and that was how Officer Hess ended up on the hood of the car, shooting his weapon and fatally injuring DJ as he sat behind the wheel. The police claimed Officer Hess shot because he feared for his life. DJ’s friends painted a far different version of the incident. Witnesses agreed, also saying that medical attention was slow to respond. The Henry family vowed to learn the truth – even if it was bad. They wanted to know what happened to their son and filed a lawsuit. Four years after the shooting, the family was still hopeful. In 2016, the Henry family accepted the decision in a wrongful death suit against the Village of Pleasantville and Aaron Hess and were awarded \$6 million. In 2017, they settled a wrongful death suit with the town of Mount Pleasant for an undisclosed amount and something more valuable to them: a public apology. Seven years after DJ’s death, they cleared his name. No criminal charges were brought in the case. Today, Aaron Hess works in private security. The Henry family has founded the DJ Henry Dream Foundation to honor their son’s memory. **On-screen text graphic:** Chief Louis Alagno retired in 2013. In 2015, New York State law changed. 48 HOURS: “Who Wanted Howard Pilmar Dead?” (10:00 – 11:00p) – In March 1996, Howard Pilmar, a successful businessman, was found murdered in the headquarters of his office supply and coffee shop in New York City. Howard’s body was found in a large pool of blood on the fourth floor offices of King Office Supply; he was stabbed over forty times. There was no sign of a forced entry and nothing was taken from his wallet. Investigators couldn’t figure out who would have a motive. During the early stages of the investigation, police questioned Evan Wald, Howards’ brother-in-law; they noticed cuts on his left hand and that he was asking questions about the security system at King Office Supply. Police then looked at Roslyn, Howard’s wife, who inherited more than \$1 million in life insurance, real estate holdings, plus the family business that was started by Howard’s father. Roslyn worked as a dental assistant and bookkeeper for sixteen years; police discovered she embezzled hundreds of thousands of dollars from her former employer, Dr. Stanley Weinstock. Roslyn was under pressure to pay back the stolen money, and almost fifteen thousand dollars to New York State in back taxes. The police continued to investigate without cooperation from Roslyn. The NYPD put posters up asking the public for help in solving this case. The posters kept disappearing and through surveillance footage it was discovered that Evan and his sister Janna were tearing down the posters. A year after the murder, Roslyn was arrested for embezzlement and plead guilty; she was given probation after paying back the money. In 1999, Evan Wald was ordered to submit a blood sample. Evan Wald’s blood was a match to a blood drop found near Howard’s body. This was still not enough for prosecutors, so the case remained unsolved. Manhattan prosecutors spent four years reviewing evidence and searching for new witnesses. On August 15, 2017, Roslyn Pilmar and Evan Wald were arrested for the murder of Howard Pilmar. Twenty-three years later, Roslyn and Evan were found guilty of second-degree murder; in July 2019, they were both sentenced to twenty-five years to life. **On-screen text graphic:** Roslyn Pilmar and Evan Wald are appealing the verdicts. 48 HOURS: “Cold-Blooded Killer” (9:00 – 10:00p) – an updated rebroadcast about Mike Williams, a missing Florida man who was believed to have been eaten by alligators in December 2000, and his mother’s belief that something sinister happened. Williams, a successful real estate appraiser, left home to go duck hunting on Lake Seminole on his sixth wedding anniversary. When he did not return home, his wife Denise started looking for him. A massive search ensued. It ended after 44 days with Williams listed as “still missing.” People wondered if he had run off. After six months, his waders, hunting license and a flashlight were discovered at the lake and another explanation was offered: he was eaten by alligators. Mike’s mother, Cheryl Williams, always believed there was more to the story. For nine years, she wrote to the governor of Florida urging him to re-open the case. She even contacted wildlife experts, who told her that alligators do not feed in cold winter months. In the meantime, Denise Williams moved on with her life, cashed in life insurance policies and completely cut off contact with Mike’s mother. She eventually married Mike’s best friend Brian Winchester. Seven years later, the re-opened investigation led to suspicions that both Cheryl and Brian were involved, but police could do nothing because they were married to each other. Soon after, their marriage disintegrated. Police saw an opportunity when Brian cracked after assaulting and kidnapping Denise, to which he pleaded guilty and cut a deal with prosecutors: he finally admitted to killing Mike Williams. Brian revealed the location of the body, with the understanding he that would not be charged with murder. He said it was all Denise’s idea -- she was not willing to be divorced, but wanted to be with Brian. She was arrested and charged with murder. Original on-screen text graphic: Denise Williams is scheduled to stand trial for the murder of her husband on December 10, 2018. Mike and Denise’s daughter is nineteen and in college. She is said to be close with Denise’s sisters. 12/22/18 Update: The trial began in December 2018. The prosecution’s star witness, Brian Winchester, admitted he killed Mike Williams. Defense attorney Ethan Way was so confident the state had no hard evidence that he did not want the jury to consider any charges less than murder one. The jury took eight hours to reach a verdict: Denise Williams was guilty on all counts. Mike Williams’ mother can now lay her son to rest. 48 HOURS: “Maria Spencer’s Vow to Kill” (10:00 – 11:00p) – The story of Frank Spencer, a beloved businessman who was shot twice and found in his Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania home, in July 2012. After not hearing from Frank, Joe Yodock became concerned and decided to check on his friend. Once Yodock arrived at the home, he found his friend’s body. Due to their tumultuous relationship, friends of Frank immediately suspected his ex-wife Maria Spencer. Frank had filed for divorce in 2006 and tried unsuccessfully to co-parent with Maria. In 2008, after a fight with Frank’s mother at her daughter’s school, Maria was arrested and charged with disorderly conduct, harassment, and child endangerment. After pleading guilty, Maria repeatedly made open threats to kill Frank. Frank documented the threats but didn’t pursue them with authorities. In 2009, while going through divorce proceedings, Frank began a relationship with Julie Dent. Maria continued and shifted her harassment towards Julie. The situation became more alarming after Maria’s father, Rocco Franklin, was released from prison. After a break-in at Frank’s junkyard, many believed Maria and Rocco were to blame. Both were interviewed, but ultimately the district attorney felt there was not enough evidence to prosecute. Maria continued to harass Frank and Julie and, suspiciously, Frank’s mother’s house was set on fire. Friends couldn’t locate Frank and feared he was inside the home. Though it was rumored Maria was seen by friends smiling at the scene, but the fire was ruled undetermined. Months later, another incident involving fire took place; this time, it was ruled an arson. In 2012, Frank and Maria Spencer’s divorce was published in the local paper. The next day he was dead. Authorities investigated the murder scene, finding DNA evidence belonging to Maria and other clues they thought may implicate Rocco. After checking security cameras, police found footage of his truck driving away moments after his murder. Frank’s truck was found in 27 miles away from his house – just five miles from where Maria was currently living. Two months after the murder, authorities spoke with Maria and Rocco. While Maria refused and Rocco agreed, but Rocco tried to sell a ridiculous story in an attempt to seem inculpable. In 2013, the district attorney convened a grand jury and questioned both suspects. Maria was charged with Frank’s murder, 12 counts of perjury, and dozens of other crimes. A warrant was issued and in July 2014 and she was arrested. A warrant was issued for Rocco Franklin, but he fled to South America before he could be arrested. After a nine-day trial in the fall of 2015, Maria Spencer was found guilty on all counts: for murdering Frank Spencer and for the two arsons, the burglary, 12 counts of perjury, conspiracy, and terroristic threats. She was sentenced to life without parole plus 50 years. In 2017, after fighting extradition from South America for a year-and-a-half, Rocco finally returned to the United States to stand trial. In 2018, he was convicted of Frank’s murder, the burglary, and the arson at Frank’s mother’s house. He was sentenced to life plus 45 years. **On-screen text graphic:** After Maria’s arrest, Frankie and Cyrus Spencer were raised by Maria’s sister. Frank’s dog Mutley is alive and well. 06/27/20 **48 HOURS: “The Twisted Case of Angie Dodge”** - an updated and retitled rebroadcast on the 1996 death of Angie Dodge; the unusual circumstances in which Michael Usry, Jr., a filmmaker and producer of a short film about a brutal death, became a suspect in the case; and the approach police took to try to find a DNA match through the Ancestry.com database. In 1996, Idaho Falls teenager Angie Dodge was brutally murdered. The killer left behind semen, which police tested against the DNA of men she knew. While Christopher Tapp’s DNA did not match, after 28 hours of interrogation over 23 days, Tapp confessed to being present when she was killed and stated one of the participants was a man named Mike. Tapp was convicted of killing Dodge, but the case remained open because his DNA was not a match. In 2014, police searched a public database which had been bought by Ancestry.com, hoping to find a match through familial searching; though unorthodox, the same method had been used to capture the Golden State Killer in California. The partial match first led to the anonymous donor, Michael Usry, Sr. and secondly to his son, Michael Usry, Jr. Despite the close DNA match and the matching first name, Usry Jr. had nothing to do with the death and was officially cleared. Usry Jr. decided to make a documentary and was joined by Angie’s mother, Carol Dodge. They believed Tapp was innocent and their work led to an eventual review of the case, which resulted in Tapp being able to accept a plea deal; he was released from prison after twenty years. **UPDATE:** On May 16, 2019, Chief Bryce Johnson announced the arrest of Brian Dripps, who had lived across the street from Angie Dodge at the time of her murder. Christopher Tapp has been fully exonerated. Original on-screen text graphic: Carol Dodge met with detectives this week and continues to push them to find her daughter’s killer. Chris Tapp says he has many job offers since his release last month and is happy to be weighing his options.
