Burgoyne, who pled guilty to voluntary manslaughter, received a twenty year sentence. Woodcoff pled guilty to concealing a death and was sentenced to five years of probation. On December 26, 2003, Leeds police apprehended a stolen car; the driver was Bieber. In the process of being handcuffed, he opened fire on the three unarmed arresting officers and escaped. One officer died of his wounds and a nationwide manhunt was launched. Bieber was finally caught, was tried for the murder of the police officer, and sentenced to life in prison. Danielle LaBelle divorced Bieber in 2003. There are no plans to try him for the murder of Markus Mueller. Bush's statement about Mr. Ford; (2) (December 29) the arrival of the cortege at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church, Palm Desert, California for a private family prayer service; (3) (December 30) the departure of the cortege from St. Margaret's Church for the flight to Washington, D.C.; (4) (December 30) the journey of the motorcade en route to the Capitol; the arrival at the Capitol Rotunda; the prayer and commemoration service in the Rotunda.
