Danny Highsmith on Coach Mike Krzyzewski and George G. Beasley. (Encore)

Wednesday, June 2nd was a watershed day in North Carolina AND at Beasley Media Group headquarters in Fayetteville:

- 1) Coach "K" Duke's Mike Krzyzewski the winningest coach in College Basketball announced this would be his last season as head coach at Duke. On the eve of his retirement weekend, Coach K had more wins and more NCAA tournament appearances and wins than any College basketball coach in history!
- 2) The Founder of Beasley Media Group, George Garland Beasley, passed away at the age of 85! A former high school principal who bought his first radio station in Benson, NC in 1961 and remained connected to the company as Chairman to the day of his passing, George Beasley saw the ascension of his company from one station to one of the 5 or 6 largest in the U.S.A. Along the way, he along with his loving wife, Ann raised children who run the company day-to-day today plus a doctor, Bob, to who he was incredibly proud!

There was one person, a near fifty year employee of Beasley Media Group who was also the creator of the original DAILY "Talkback" program in the 1970's, J. Daniel Highsmith (DANNY), who saw up-close the leadership styles, acumen, and relentless pursuit of excellence and detail of BOTH MEN! Danny was already working at WFAI/Fayetteville when George bought the station. Not too long afterward, Danny was elevated to General Manager of WFAI – George's first station in Fayetteville! Danny operated one of Beasley's highest cash-flowing markets for years, giving George Beasley some of the impetus and cushion to invest in and grow his company! The rest, as they, is history!

Danny also had a penchant for sports and sports broadcasting. For ten years, while working his "day job" at Beasley Media Group, he also served as "Color Analyst" on Duke University Radio

broadcasts of Football and Basketball games! In that capacity, he also saw the hiring of a young Head Coach, recruited from West Point (Army) by then Duke Athletic Director Tom Butters! The young man's name was **Mike Krzyzewski**. Danny witnessed Coach K's struggles to recruit in his first season (no time), get frustrated his second season, see the buzzards circling above his third season (to be saved by Tom Butters), before finally reaching a National Championship Game his 4th season! The rest, as they say, is History!

Listening to Danny's recollections of the wisdom, determination, clear-eyed courageous decision-making and leadership in the midst of turbulent times made this one of the most enjoyable Talkback shows I have ever been involved in!

About North Carolina Education Corps North Carolina Education Corps (NCEC) is a response to the impact COVID-19 is having on schools, as students struggle to keep up with learning. We bring together community members to support students and accelerate learning, seeking to provide quality whole child and academic support to young students in the wake of the pandemic. We do this by partnering with public schools to recruit, train, and deploy "corps members." Corps members — including community college and university students, recent graduates, and retirees — are employed by schools to work part-time as tutors. Corps members work directly for a NC public school unit (district or school). Corps members build relationships and connect with young students. They help teachers reach students who need additional academic support. They accelerate COVID learning recovery with students, families, and school personnel. During the 2021-2022 school year, NC Education Corps members will serve as high-impact literacy tutors grounded in the science of reading and reading instruction. As early literacy tutors, corps members will assist K-3 students with building foundational literacy skills. Our call to action is simple: Imagine if every K-3 student had access to a literacy tutor. Step up to serve as a corps member. Join a statewide effort to support students and accelerate learning.

ISSUES:

The online application is available at nceducationcorps.org/application. Applications include recording and uploading a 5-minute video interview, answering prompted questions. Applications cannot be saved in process and must be completed in one session. After being confirmed by the NCEC review team, applicants will advance to the partner school HR department. Applicants will complete the school's HR application and screening steps including reference checks, background check, and drug screening.

Fayetteville History Museum staff members invite the public to visit the historic home of Dr. E.E. Smith for an open house on Friday, Feb. 25 and Friday, Mar. 25, noon - 3 p.m. A room is set up as a gallery with images and information highlighting the life and legacy of Dr. E.E. Smith.

The Dr. E.E. Smith House is located at 135 Blount Street near downtown Fayetteville. Museum staff will be available to meet during the learning and sharing event. Admission to the open house is free.

Regarded as one of the greatest educators in Fayetteville, Dr. E.E. Smith spent much of his life in the classroom as a student or educator. He also served as a diplomat to Liberia and as a soldier, most notably in the Spanish American War.

His faith called him to be a minister and he was active at the local and state level in the Baptist church. An entrepreneurial spirit drove him to be involved in newspapers, insurance and property.

A multi-faceted leader, Smith's impact in the Fayetteville community can still be felt today. His home on Blount Street, now listed on the National Register of Historic Places, was a focal point for Smith where his talents and energies could radiate during his time there. It will serve as a gathering place where Museum staff can share Smith's story with visitors.

Cape Fear Valley Blood Donor Center is extending hours this week due to a critical shortage of type O blood.

The center currently has less than a two-day supply of type O-positive and O-negative blood. A few trauma patients can deplete the center's entire on-hand supply.

Type O-negative blood is the universal blood type and is what emergency rooms use when there is no time to determine patient blood type.

Type O-positive blood can be transfused to any positive blood type patient and is also critical in trauma situations.

Located at 3357 Village Drive, Suite 150, the center's hours this week are:

- Tuesday and Friday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Wednesday and Thursday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

There is a nationwide shortage of type O-positive blood. The Blood Donor Center cannot purchase blood and relies on local blood donors. Donated blood stays in the community and helps saves lives in Cumberland, Bladen, Hoke and Harnett counties.
