Discussion:

As part of the McCourt School of Public Policy, Georgetown CCF provides research and offers solutions to improve the health of America's children and families, particularly those with low and moderate incomes.

The number of uninsured children in the U.S. increased by about 726,000 children between 2016 and 2019. The total is now over four Million.

The largest increase occurred between 2018 and 2019. Despite a continued strong economy, the number of uninsured children increased by 320,000. This was the largest annual jump in more than a decade.

The number of uninsured children is likely considerably higher in 2020, as families lost their jobs and employer-sponsored insurance, though it is impossible to know by precisely how much.

5.8% of children in NC were uninsured as of the 2019 report.

Discussion:

The Cumberland Community Foundation awarded the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) a grant in the amount of \$40,000 to help fund the mission of the Child Advocacy Center. The mission of the CAC is to serve the community by alleviating the trauma children experience once a disclosure of sexual abuse or serious physical abuse occurs by creating a community of collaborating advocates.

According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), "Children are specifically vulnerable to abuse during the COVID-19. Research shows that increased stress levels among parents is often a major predictor of physical abuse and neglect of children. Stressed parents may be more likely to respond to their children's anxious behaviors or demands in aggressive or abusive ways. The support systems that many at-risk parents rely on, such as extended family, child care and schools, religious groups and other community organizations, are no longer available in many areas due to the stay-at-home orders."

Joining hands with 19 community agencies, the CAC offers a safe and child-friendly location to interview, investigate and provide support for abused children. The CAC also provides prevention education for parents, professionals and agencies in our community.
