Discussion: The Cumberland Community Foundation awarded the Child

Advocacy Center (CAC) a grant in the amount of \$40,000 to help fund the mission of the Child Advocacy Center. The mission of the CAC is to serve the community by alleviating the trauma children experience once a disclosure of sexual abuse or serious physical abuse

occurs by creating a community of collaborating advocates.

According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), "Children are specifically vulnerable to abuse during the COVID-19. Research shows that increased stress levels among parents is often a major predictor of physical abuse and neglect of children. Stressed parents may be more likely to respond to their children's anxious behaviors or demands in aggressive or abusive ways. The support systems that many at-risk parents rely on, such as extended family, child care and schools, religious groups and other community organizations, are no longer available in many areas due to the stay-at-home orders."

Joining hands with 19 community agencies, the CAC offers a safe and child-friendly location to interview, investigate and provide support for abused children. The CAC also provides prevention education for parents, professionals and agencies in our community.

Intake Process

Individuals must arrive between 7:30a and 8:20a, Monday through Friday, and complete an information form with one of our case managers. After completing the information form, the Case Manager provides the individual breakfast schedule information and a list of the services provided by Operation Inasmuch. After that, the family member selects a chair and awaits the arrival of his or her breakfast

meal.

According to the 2019 Cybersecurity & Threat Preparedness Survey, 39% of respondents indicate their company is under-prepared to handle a data breach.

The online survey included responses from 223 cybersecurity & IT executives in the U.S.

The survey brings to light the love-hate relationship between security and IT professionals and technology. The survey's findings also point to the continued criticality of the human element in identifying and addressing cyber threats.

To educate employees on preventing exposure to these types of threats, more than 90% of companies accounted fore in the survey have at least one process in place, including incorporating cyber security training in new employee orientations and annual training sessions. Three-quarters of respondents send e-mail communication and nearly three-fifths conduct regular phishing exercises in order to share common signs signs of phishing scams.
