Today is Sunday April 23rd, 2023. Just like so many of our places and institutions of social meeting, including workplaces and others, Churches across America and the world say they have been challenged by recovering from a pandemic that, for several years, discouraged meetings and getting together as groups of like-minded people. Peoples' social habits were disrupted. Church attendance was among the regular gatherings with which they were interfered. For the faithful of any religion, always wanting - even yearning - to share belief, faith and hope with the "two or more gathered in God's name" it's been especially harsh. The loneliness, lack of community and isolation felt even through the gradual build-back of congregations has been a concern for many, including the congregations of at least five Christian churches in the 250-plus year-old city of Fayetteville – who have felt the need to share and boost faith within their communities as a whole. But like the creative solutions that attempted to keep the faithful bound together during the Covid period, challenging times have spurred bold action. The congregations of at least FIVE churches in Fayetteville (and, as you'll hear - there's plenty of room for more), including (in no particular order) First Presbyterian, Covenant Fellowship, St. Luke AME Church, Hay Street United Methodist Church and the First Baptist Church on Anderson Street in Historic Downtown Fayetteville, are coming together in the 8 days between and including the Sundays of May 14th and May 21st for a Revival. They're calling it a Revive-ALL. Starting 3 weeks from today. To tell us all about it, we'll be joined by two of the Pastors leading congregations joining the Revive-All in just a few moments.!

Good Morning....I'm Paul Johnson. Today is Sunday, April 30th.

We begin today with a question...and a notion! First, the question...What fuels our dreams - the things we want to have happen in our lives! To most of us, the goal OF our lives is probably salvation...an assurance of eternal togetherness with our God, maker, Supreme Being. But what I'm asking today is what do we want IN our lives! And the answer there probably rooted in a better - or quality life - for the people we care about and love. Even the preamble to the Declaration of Independence refers to what it called Creator-given inalienable rights to all people - of "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness."

So Today on Talkback we look for ways to help inspire those we SHOULD care about to achieve a better, higher quality life....and we'll meet four people on our way!

The first two are from Methodist University, where they play a key role in a one-week experiential camp designed to bring out the best in concsious leadership development in rising 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th graders. The idea was inspired by a General in the U.S. Army who grew up in Tarboro, North Carolina and later graduated from NC State University in Raleigh. In the 38 years that followed, General Hugh Shelton built a distinguished military career..... He always attributed his success to what he called the basics he learned from his mom and dad! and Concieved a weeklong camp where young leaders could learn or reinforce the basics in their lives!

Talkback for May 28, 2023 (Memorial Day Weekend) - Colonel John Wilcox and Command Sergeant Major Gregory Seymour discuss the renaming of Fort Bragg to Fort Liberty and how and why the tradition of the largest military post (by population) in the U.S. will carry on from the past and present into the future.

It's Sunday of Memorial Day Weekend, America's most solemn holiday, dedicated to the memory of those veterans who died in service of our nation. On Friday, June 2nd, Fort Bragg will become Fort Liberty - the only U.S. Army post in the country named for an ideal instead of a remembered famous soldier.

Colonel John Wilcox and Command Sergeant Major Gregory Seymour discuss the renaming of Fort Bragg to Fort Liberty and how and why the new name is perhaps the most fitting way to pay tribute to the pride, valor and sacrifice of the soldiers that have served there since 1918. Also how and why the tradition of the largest military post (by population) in the U.S. will be represented from the past and present to carry on into the future.

Colonel Wilcox and Command Sergeant Major Seymour also explained the special significance of the Sunset Liberty March - to be held in perpetuity very night at sunset - inspired by a similar ceremonial march over a bridge in Nijmegen, Holland honoring a World War II battle fought by 82nd Airborne Troops over the Waal River nearly 80 years ago. 48 members of the 82nd Airborne lost their lives. The Dutch have never forgotten the valiance and persistence of our troops in this costly but ultimately victorious effort!

Colonel Wilcox and Command Sergeant Major Seymour also spoke of the importance of our individual troops and squads as the backbone of the U.S. Army. They offered the response, relocation and reconstruction of the Fort's Smoke Bomb Hill barracks and residence facilities as proof of Fort Liberty's and the Army's commitment to their well-being.

In closing, we offered all our prayers and hope for all our listeners a safe and meaningful Memorial Day weekend!

Meanwhile, the past few days have been eventful at the U.S Army's newly renamed Fort Liberty. The Army was tasked with renaming nine post facilities across our country...and in turn gave the actual job of deciding on the post names going forward to the communities that served, supported and depended on the continuity of the posts themselves now and into the future....as you'll hear in this address to the group of marchers who came out to the inagural Sunset Liberty March on the post, held this past Thursday Night...by the Commanding General of Fort Liberty and the 18th Airborne Corp, Lt. General Christopher Donahue.

Well spoken. Thank you, General Christopher Donahue.

Believe it or not, this past Thursday was the first day of Hurricane Season, which runs through the 30th of November. In our area, September and October are generally the peak of the season. But in a year we can expect 12 to 17 named storms (winds > 39 mph), 5 to 9 hurricanes (winds 75 mph or greater) and 1 to 4 major hurricanes (winds 135 MPH or more), we already seen a named storm (Arlene) in the Gulf of Mexico. The key is being ready...and the time to start planning is now. As you listen to our conversation with Cumberland County Emergency Services planner Gary Crumpler, feel free to bring up Ready.gov or ReadyNC.gov on your computer. These are websites full of good information to know and plan with — also equipment and supplies you'll NEED TO HAVE ON HAND as we plan for the 2023 hurricane season. We welcome Gary Crumpler of Cumberland Emergency Services.

For all the Good News we've been talking about, there are the harsh realities of communication in a pandemic and post-pandemic isolated world. It's been trying and hard enough for adults to get by in a world driven by too much social contact and too little real or face-to-face contact. But the advantage of adulthood is life experience. We're less likely to comply with an unusual, uncomfortable or unfair request – mostly because of the once-a-baby-burned sensibility and boundaries of behavior we've built into our own character. Children don't have that. Their experiences and character are still forming – some with parental guidance we provide.

So what happens when predator (mostly older adults masquerading as a child peer to an unseeing, unsuspecting child on a social network) persuades the child looking for a friend to "just take a picture and send it to me. I'll send you one of mine". The exchanges continue until the friend asks for a slightly naughtier picture. And believing in having started a so called "friendship", the child complies. Only now the friend says, "Now I want you to send me this...and this....And if you don't, I'll show what you've sent me to everyone you know!" At that point, "Sextortion" has taken place. This model prevents the unnecessary duplication of services and provides a "one-stop shop" approach for women and children who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. In July of 2014, we opened our doors to women and children and began improving lives.

Mission: To collaborate with all community resources to empower women and children who are homeless or at-risk of homelessness to become self-reliant.

Vision: A community that collaborates to implement sustainable programs that provide homeless women and children with the opportunity to develop independence and self-reliance.

Guiding Principles: Every child needs a safe and nurturing environment to grow to be a responsible, self-reliant adult. Every homeless mother needs shelter to improve her life and the lives of her children.

It is the community's moral obligation to take action and make a positive difference in the lives of homeless children, who rely solely on adults in their lives to nurture and guide them into adulthood.

The best time to prepare is before hurricane season begins. Avoid having to rush through potentially life-saving preparations by waiting until it's too late. Get your disaster supplies while the shelves are still stocked, and get that insurance checkup early, as flood insurance requires a 30-day waiting period.

Develop An Evacuation Plan

If you are at risk from hurricane impacts, you need an evacuation plan. Now is the time to begin planning where you would go and how you would get there. You do not need to travel hundreds of miles. Your destination could be a friend or relative who lives in a well built home outside flood prone areas. Plan several routes. Be sure to account for your pets. If you don't have a vehicle, check with local officials to see what transportation options they may have available.

Assemble Disaster Supplies

Whether you're evacuating or sheltering-in-place, you're going to need supplies not just to get through the storm but for the potentially lengthy and unpleasant aftermath. Have enough non-perishable food, water and medicine to last each person in your family a minimum of 3 days (store a longer than 3-day supply of water, if possible). Electricity and water could be out for weeks. You'll need extra cash, a battery-powered radio and flashlights. You may need a portable crank or solar-powered USB charger for your cell phones. And lastly, don't forget your pets!

The Child Advocacy Center Purpose is to alleviate the trauma children experience once a disclosure of sexual abuse or serious physical abuse occurs by creating a community of collaborating advocates. The Child Advocacy Center Vision is a community where children live in a safe and nurturing environment free from sexual and physical abuse. The Child Advocacy Center mission is to collaborate with community partners to respond to and prevent child abuse.

When using digital means to connect and communicate we must know how to present ourselves in a safe and healthy way. Helping children learn to navigate on the internet is very important. Here are some dos and don'ts for when on devices:

- Don't give out personal information such as home address, school name or phone number
- Keep your location private
- Never send pics to strangers
- Keep passwords private except for parents or a trusted adult
- Do not download anything without permission. It may contain a virus that could contaminate your device.
- Tell an adult if you receive a mean or strange message.
- Limit your friends to people you actually know.
- Important numbers need to be kept private —such as bank cards, social security numbers, etc.
- Help your children to set up strong passwords without any identifying information. The longer the password the harder to crack.
- For the parent or caregiver, continue to monitor your child's online activity, frequent the online sites they visit and continue to have conversations about internet safety.
