Segment 2) Federal Emergency Management (FEMA) and Small Business SBA roles in recovery from Hurricane Matthews. (15 mins). Rita Egan of FEMA and Karen Kanepic of the Small Business Administration talked about the need for Hurricane Matthews victims or THOSE WHO THINK THEY MAY BE to INITIATE THEIR OWN contact with FEMA through 1-800-621-3362 OR disasterassistance.gov. A person may decide he/she does not need FEMA help, but without being "in the system" by signing up you lose the right to even ask the question "Can FEMA help me." Being signed up with FEMA is the property owner's obligation. (It was stressed FEMA does not typically send representatives into the field to look for damage. In fact, if what appears to be a field representative should approach a citizen, the citizen should ask for credentials and a reference for contact to verify identity. There are known instances where people fraudulently purporting to be from FEMA obtained sensitive information that has led to identity theft and interception of FEMA grants and benefits.) Karen stressed if one signs up for FEMA help, they may get surveys and applications from the Small Business Administration, so don't ignore these. The SBA IS the US Government institution that distributes low-interest disaster assistance loans that your signing up for FEMA assistance creates eligibility. She said the word "Business" in the name confuses people sometimes, but the SBA interfaces with private property owners as well as businesses in this function. Segment 1 (14:00) The Second Harvest Food Bank is the distribution organization for donated food supplies over a 7-county area (Cumberland, Robeson, Bladen, Hoke, Harnett, Duplin and Sampson Counties), coordinating drops to pantries at churches and other distributors to families throughout the area. One advantage to the single collection point of the Second Harvest Food Bank is they can accept tractor trailer loads of surplus food from manufacturers and commercial distributers that a smaller family destination pantry may not be able to work with. One more advantage is the buying power of donated dollars goes farther with a warehouse-sized facility than smaller pantries.

Keeping an eye on the bigger picture and operating with the philosophy "Starvation is not the problem as much as it is a symptom of a bigger problem," Second Harvest Food Bank also helps subsidize programs aimed at getting families to a state of self-sufficiency: lending a "hand-up" instead of "hand-out".

Segment 2: Second Harvest food bank accepts canned and non-perishable foods but cash is their most preferred donation because of its flexibility and addition to buying power of the United Way agency. Ron Pringle says one of the biggest obstacles to maintaining smooth operations at the Second Harvest food bank is that donations flow in by the ton around disasters and Christmas seasons — but people need help in January, February, March and April too. This can sometimes present problems. Even flow of donations is a goal. The Second Harvest food bank thanks all who donated and all who became partners throughout the year!
