Synopsis:

Mary McGriff, a U.S. Airman on deployment to Iraq in 2004 first suffered the trauma leading to her battle with PTSD when a member of the unit she deployed with was badly injured by an exploded IED while on patrol. Like soldiers are trained to do (and self-encouraged by the soldier's "code"), she "sucked it up" and kept working at her job. To mask her feelings of depression, she volunteered during her off-duty time at the Military hospital serving her forward-area station in Iraq. She did not recognize her action as compulsive - even as she developed back trouble from heavy lifting she was doing during volunteer stints. It was only as she left IRAQ to return to then-Pope AFB that she allowed herself to feel her pain. But, even then, she kept it to herself. After all she was only 12 years into her career and was staunchly determined to make retirement at 20 years of service in 2011. For the next 6 years (approximately 2005 through 2010) she continued to suppress her dark feelings, depressions, moments of severe trauma, flashbacks and more, burying herself in her work while shielding the truth of her PTSD from even her husband and children. She neglected her condition and needs - meeting only occasionally with a military counsellor. At 18 ½ years of service, even as the headroom for promotion in her own career was narrowing, she continued to work as though she was working for more of them. Her superiors loved her work, but wondered why. Her workaholic ways became her way of coping with PTSD. Coincidentally, in these years, the military as a whole was becoming concerned about the dramatic rise in incidence of suicide by soldiers and former soldiers. One day, about a year and one-half from retirement, It was during a unit briefing on by her commanding officer about signs of PTSD and suicide prevention that she confessed to her supervisor. Compassionately, and with Mary's approval, he worked out a plan with Mary's Air Force counsellor, that accomplished two things: 1) Getting Mary the intense help she needed to deal with her PTSD in a constructive, head-on way – and 2) allowed her the structure to finish out her 20-year Air Force career, and more importantly, the means to a quality life as veteran, wife, mother and business owner (see http://courageinservice.com).

Mary's dramatic story illustrates the positive track for coping with PTSD and raises hope for others who may have yet to seek help for their own PTSD. Mary McGriff says she hopes telling her story would help other find help.

Areas of Community Need Adressed:

Social Needs Community-building in the form of coming to the aid of our friends and neighbors who have returned from war with needs arising from injuries sustained in military conflict or operations, sometimes completely invisible, as in PTSD.)

Education Creating an awareness of the services for PTSD victims near Fort Bragg-Pope Army Airfield and services available to members of our community who suffer from PTSD. How help is available and the ease and lack of stigma attached to seeking counselling. How interested citizen can help and support these efforts.
