Barry Bowden, Accelerate Counseling and Consulting, former Army Chaplain and trained Counselor – working primarily (but not exclusively) with Veterans – a sizable population in Fayetteville.

In Fayetteville, like many military communities, many veterans who have retired here found themselves in a "mission-focused" status during their active-duty careers. In the prevalent "Suck up your gut and go" atmosphere of military duty, it is common that many profound, traumatizing life experiences were left deferred and unprocessed! This, and a stigma equating mental health problems and the counseling vital to easing them with weakness, have led to a multiplicity of problems: higher than normal rates of suicide, domestic violence, stress and other mental health issues. Barry reassured our listeners help is non-stigmatizing, readily available and easy to reach out for!

Cumberland Healthnet Sandhills Vax program

Representatives of Cumberland Healthnet, the local regional agency designated to be the Catch-Basket for working poor and low-income workers and families who do not qualify for Medicaid but who also cannot afford insured healthcare, described their latest program for delivering needed healthcare (free Covid-19 Vaccinations) to the medically underserved and marginalized populations in the area. Executive Director Tasha Smith, Project Manager Shelly Hudson and Nathan Church, Project Director outlined the program initiative and the May, 2022 schedule and vaccination locations.

AmyNevahas, Executive Director and CEO of Cumberland County United Way, emphasized there is still lots of pandemic need in our community and dialing 2-1-1 is still the best connection to resources across North Carolina. Amy also spoke about the need for organizing those who care into co-worker and/or friend/family groups to continue to support United Way fund-raising. She outlined special volunteer opportunities for teens, as well as group fund-raising opportunities like the upcoming Fayetteville Woodpeckers United Way night. He also updated our listeners on the current state of his health (holding his own) and efforts to inform and educate fellow victims and supporters.

'Ranger' Rick Murillo, Veterans Honor Ambassador and Military Suicide
Prevention Advocate, discussed the upcoming Military Suicide Awareness run on Saturday,
June 21st near the Raeford Airport Parachute Drop Zone. Anyone is welcome to participate
because everyone needs to spread the realization that suicide occurs in the military-connected
population at 1.5 x the rate of occurrence in the general population. Some estimate as many as 2
victims take their own lives every day! But even ONE is too many! Help and counselling are
available. Friends knowing the warning signs and knowing how to follow up, intervene and get
the potential victim to available help are the greatest needs and means to reduce or eliminate the

Carolyn Justice-Hinson, Communication and Community Outreach Officer for Fayetteville's Hometown Utility – PWC (Public Works Commission). Carolyn revealed a ground-breaking renewable energy project (a bio-waste fuel-cell burner generating 1.5 megawatts of electric power from 1) swine waste (a big excess waste problem in N.C.) 2) methane gas created by PWC's waste-water treatment efforts and ordinarily "flared" - or burned off – creating no useful energy) and 3) methane landfill gas. This fuel-cell renewable energy burner project is being developed by PWC and a third- party vendor, Bloom Industries, which has built about 600 fuel-cell plants around the world. It will be located near PWC's P.O. Hoffer Water Treatment Plant, where it will double as a backup power source in times of hurricanes and debilitating storms. Carolyn reported the total plan as a Win-Win-Win-Win-Win!

Mark Kline, Methodist University Chair, Psychology Department

General Shelton was a Tarboro, North Carolina native and graduated from with his first degree from North Carolina State. His distinguished military career culminated with assignment as the 14th Commander of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff at the Pentagon from 1997-2001 under President Bill Clinton. General Shelton founded the General Hugh Shelton Leadership Center at North Carolina State University. The center was created to "inspire, educate, and develop values-based leaders, both locally and globally, committed to personal integrity, professional ethics, and selfless service." Among other objectives, the center created Leadership Camps for high school students at various college and universities.

Dr. Drew Zieglar, PhD oversees the renowned **General Hugh Shelton Leadership Camp** at Methodist University. Dr. Mark Kline and a staff following his direction operates it for six-days and 5 nights each summer for about 30 high school students.

The vision for the Shelton leadership camp is to focus on leadership "basics" as General Shelton calls them. He says he felt fortunate to have been taught them by his parents but has observed that many young people have missed being exposed to them. That is what inspired him to develop his week-long camp and make it available to high-school students.

Dr. Mark Kline heads up operation of the camp on the Methodist campus! They invited parents and grandparents to submit the names of nominees for the camp experience. He says their universal experience is campers who attend once want to stay involved in the future. Kline pointed out there is specific role for past attendees to play in future camps! Gift Card Payment Scams

25% of people targeted by this type of scam bought a gift card and shared the numbers off the back, believing they were taking care of an obligation such as paying a fee to claim a large prize, sweepstakes or lottery; paying an upfront fee for a service or product; or doing a favor for a friend or someone at work.

About one fourth of these consumers were warned by a store clerk or manager that their gift card purchase could be part of a scam. This is important because AARP has found that more than half the time a third-party intervenes in attempted financial exploitation, the potential victims are able to avoid losing money (AARP/Virginia Tech, 2019 & DeLiema, et al., 2019).

While a third of consumers have been targeted by a gift card payment scams, younger adults are being targeted more often than older adults.

Zero Value Gift Cards

More than a third of consumers who discovered 'no funds' on their gift card called the number or visited the website on the back of the card.

More than half of consumers who tried were not able to obtain a credit or refund for the missing balance.

ISSUES:

The latest *Gift Card Scams* report from the AARP Fraud Watch Network reveals that slightly more than one in three U.S. adults say they or someone they know have been targeted by scams seeking payment by gift card. The report also sheds light on a second emerging trend: Nearly a quarter of consumers are receiving or have given gift cards that had no funds on them. Unfortunately, a majority of victims to both tactics are not able to get a refund or reconcile their losses.

- The micro-grant program will operate for 24 months consisting of four grant cycles of six months each.
- The first grant cycle will begin on May 2, 2022
- Applications due May 29 at 11:59 PM
- The fourth and final grant cycle is anticipated to be completed by fall of 2023, if not funded further.
- Two pre-application workshops will be offered to provide instructions on how to use the applicant portal
 - Micro-grants to community-based organizations to fund, inspire, and boost community crime reduction activities
 - Designed to support community groups' efforts to prevent crime and violence in Fayetteville
 - Awards are limited to the areas of the City that have high or recent spikes in violent crime
 - Non-profit status is not required but for-profit enterprises will not be considered
 - This program will hold grantee organizations accountable for their budget, program actions, and measurable outcomes

ISSUES:

The City of Fayetteville has allocated \$50,000 for each of four grant cycles. Organizations must have an annual operating budget of less than \$100,000. Projects must be connected to reducing violent crime in communities. As part of this program, the City will offer support and capacity-building training to ensure that the efforts seeded by these grants may be sustained into the future.

A driver looks away from the road for an average of five seconds to look at their phone. At 55 miles per hour, that's like driving the length of a football field blindfolded.

A 2021 survey by AAA found that more than half of drivers (51%) admitted they text and/or email on their phone while alone in their vehicle.

Research shows that the risk of a crash while interacting with a handheld cell phone is 3.6 times higher than attentive driving with no distractions.

The Adult Literacy Education Center of Fayetteville Urban Ministry Inc. established in 1976, is a non-profit tutoring program accredited by ProLiteracy designed to address the needs of adults who are interested in empowering themselves in the areas of reading, writing, math, general academics (GED), English as a Second Language, Career Readiness, Financial Literacy and Computer Literacy.

Emergency Assistance grew into an effective grass roots operation that touches thousands of lives. Now the program houses a food pantry, clothing closet, and a financial assistance service for families and individuals in crisis. All of this is made possible by community partners who donate non-perishable food items, new & lightly used clothing, hygiene items, household goods, and money. In fiscal year 2019-20, Fayetteville Urban Ministry has served more than 11,000 people, over 500 homeless, and 632 military-affiliated lives.

The Find-A-Friend (FAF) program was named a "Champion for Children" in 2009 by the Child Advocacy Center. Serving over 200 at-risk and court-involved youth per year, with a 96% success rate at keeping kids out of trouble and successful in school, this program truly makes an impact. It costs tax payers over \$125,000 per year to house 1 juvenile in confinement. It takes less than \$1,500 to sponsor a youth for 1 full year of preventive services with FAF.

The Nehemiah Project partners with the Re-Store Warehouse, local contractors, agencies and numerous churches to serve our clients' needs and has become a vital resource for this community's elderly and low-income population. With the help of licensed and fully insured contractors the project/program ensures that our low-income home owners are housed in safe and comfortable living conditions with each repair executed. Each year, the program will assist approximately 50-100 home owners.
