State of Emergency Declaration - March 16, 2020

The County's Emergency Operations Center opened on March 16. Cumberland County Department of Public Health is working with

Emergency Management.

The Health Dept. is conducting contact investigations on the cases and will notify any contacts who fall under the guidelines for additional monitoring and testing. The Centers for Disease Control and prevention (CDC) defines a "close contact" as being within 6 feet for 10 minutes or more.

Testing Guidence updated.

The Public Health Dept. is suspending a drive-thru testing pilot program that ran March 24 and 26. The department is following CDC and NC Dept. of Health and Human Resources guidance that Most people do not need a test.

Based on the guidance, the Health Dept. is prioritizing testing on the Public Health Center grounds for symptomatic patients in high risk settings like nursing homes or long-term care facilities, health care workers and first responders such as EMS, law enforcement and fire fighters on a case by case basis.

A Covid-19 text alert system has been initiated by Cumberland Co. It will provide information regarding Covid-19 that will be sent Directly to your phone. To sign-up, text CCDPHCOVID19 to 888777. Commissioners approved changes to the Emergency Management Ordinance to update the language so that it now covers "public health".

Adults unintentionally make it easy for young children to eat dangerous pills. Each year there are about 400,000 poison center calls and 50,000 ER visits as a result of young children ingesting medications that were left in reach by an adult.

A recent study in the <u>Journal of Pediatrics</u> shows that more than half of the kids poisoned by prescription pills ingested them after an adult removed them from the child-resistant container and left them within reach. The research showed that half the medicines belonged to a grandparent.

<u>Up and Away</u> is an educational program focusing on the importance of safe medicine storage; urging parents and grandparents to put all medicines up and away, out of sight and reach of young children.

Typically these type of cases involve the victims finding a listing on social media or a classified ad website. These listings are not from a property management company, and are usually listed as "for rent by owner". This fraud scheme may even involve a written "lease" to appear legitimate, but the communications and paperwork will not be done in person. The suspect will have the victim, "tenant", send the rent money through a cash application, like "PayPal", or via mail often before the written lease is ever provided.

The Fayetteville Police Department would like to remind citizens to conduct this type of business through a licensed property management company if possible. If renting directly from the homeowner, ask to have personal contact (while abiding by current Covid-19 safety guidelines), and follow up through the Cumberland County Tax Administration to confirm proper ownership.

Here are a few ways to identify a scam:

- 1) They do not want, or are unavailable to meet you in person.
- 2) They want you to move in immediately, without ever seeing the property.
- 3) They ask you to mail, wire, or use a cash sending app to send money.
- 4) The price is too good, or is well below fair market value.
- 5) There is no screening process such as a rental application or credit check.

**New Study Regarding Family Caregivers** 

Discussion:

Caregiving in the U.S. 2020, a new study from the National Alliance for Caregiving (NAC) and AARP, finds that the number of family caregivers in the U.S. increased by 9.5 million from 2015 to 2020 and now encompasses more than one in five Americans. The study also shows that while caregiving spans all generations, more young people are providing care, including 6% who are Gen Z and 23% who are Millennials.

Caregiving is complex, and more than one in four (26%) say it is difficult to coordinate care in 2020, up from 19% in 2015.

The new study also reveals that family caregivers are in worse health compared to five years ago, and that personal finances are a concern for family caregivers as 28% have stopped saving, 23% have taken on more debt and 22% have used up personal short-term savings. The coronavirus pandemic is exacerbating the challenges facing this group.
