- Identify how local authorities will notify you during a disaster and how you will get information, whether through local radio, TV or NOAA Weather Radio stations or channels.
- Know the difference between different weather alerts such as watches and warnings and what actions to take in each.
- Know what actions to take to protect you during disasters that may occur in areas
 where you travel or have moved recently. For example, if you travel to a place
 where earthquakes are common and you are not familiar with them, make sure
 you know what to do to protect yourself should one occur.
- When a major disaster occurs, your community can change in an instant. Loved
 ones may be hurt and emergency response is likely to be delayed. Make sure that
 at least one member of your household is trained in first aid and CPR and knows
 how to use an automated external defibrillator (AED). This training is useful in
 many emergency situations.

Emergency Direct Aid: This program provides assistance for emergency prescription assistance, dental extractions, vision assistance (eye exams and eyewear) and travel up to Duke or Chapel Hill for medical appointments. Individuals must qualify financially for assistance. Medical Equipment Loan: This program takes in donated items such as wheelchairs, bedside commodes, walkers, etc. and loans them out to individuals in need for 3-6 month periods. All Cumberland County residents are eligible, even if they are having a knee surgery and only need the equipment for a short while. Diabetes Management: This program hosts three diabetes clinics per week, where clients see a nurse for one on one consultation, monitor their blood sugar and blood pressure, and receive a weekly class on topics relevant to diabetes. Also, glucometers, test strips and supplies are given to those in need. A seven week rotating class, Take Charge of Diabetes, is also taught, which includes classes by a podiatrist, dental hygienist, and medication consultations with pharmacists. 	Type O-negative blood is the universal blood type and is what emergency rooms use when there is no time to determine patient blood type.
	Type O-positive blood can be transfused to any positive blood type patient and is also critical in trauma situations.
