The Chatham County Safety Net Planning Council is a non-profit organization that serves uninsured and underinsured adults and children with help enrolling in health insurance and accessing healthcare. With Affordable Care Act and Health Insurance Marketplace (aka Obamacare) deadlines approaching they are offering local enrollment help for adults ages 19-64 and families who want to purchase health insurance coverage from the Marketplace. Everyone in the US is now required to have health insurance coverage — or more precisely, "minimum essential coverage" — or else pay a tax penalty, unless they qualify for an exemption. The Marketplace offers plans to individuals who do not have coverage through a job or Medicare or for employed individuals whose health care plans are considered unaffordable (More than 9.66% of their gross income.) Licensed Navigators are available to assist everyday Monday through Saturday morning at J.C. Lewis Primary Health Care Center and at Curtis V. Cooper Primary Health Care. There are also some upcoming Enrollment Events; Tuesday, December 8th at the Bull Street Public Library and Thursday, December 10th at the Savannah Civic Center.

Unexploded ordnance (UXO) are explosive weapons (bombs, bullets, shells, grenades, land mines, naval mines, etc.) that did not explode when they were employed and still pose a risk of detonation, potentially many decades after they were used or discarded. It's a problem across the globe as people try to live in area that have historically been war sites including in the US where there are still live UXO found from the Revolutionary and Civil Wars, and in places where the military has trained on US land during many wars up until recently. Jack Imber is a Humanitarian Deminer who lectures on the dangers of finding these items in your backyard as well as the cleanup he does around the world and the US to make areas livable again. He has written a novel about the about deminers and the lesser-known impacts of war.

The Arrhythmia Alliance and Bluffton Police Department have achieved their goal of placing Automated External Defibrillators (AED's) into every police car in Bluffton – 31 of them! – to increase the chance of someone surviving sudden cardiac arrest if a police car arrives at the scene before the Emergency Medical Services do. This was prompted by the death of a young Bluffton boy who drowned and the first on the scene was a policeman who did not have access to an AED which statistic show might have saved the boy's life. Now the Arrhythmia Alliance's local mission is to make Bluffton/Hilton Head and the Low Country the first HEARTSafe community in South Carolina by partnering with the Bluffton Town Fire Department, Police Department, EMS and Town Officials to teach CPR and AED in combination to the community at large and to make AED's as common place as fire extinguishers.

The shooting deaths of nine people during a prayer meeting at a historic black church in Charleston last week by a young man with self-styled racist tendencies has already begun a startling change in the landscape of South Carolina and the Deep South: all across the region calls are coming for the removal of the Confederate Battle Flag from state government locations. But among those killed was someone whose concern for the Low County stretched beyond issues of race and who will leave a legacy of growth and hope for the region: State Senator Clementa Pinckney, who was also Pastor of the Emanuel AME Church where the shootings took place, was cut down at the age of 41 with already nearly 20 years of public service at the state level. We'll talk with someone who knew him very well: the Jasper County Delegation Officer who met him when he was a Statehouse page, saw him elected state Representative and then state Senator, and knew his goals, his priorities and his victories, including the USCB Campus, education and health issues, and one that he did not get to see through: the Jasper Port.
