Stories include:</p> <p>Suspicious Activity Reporting – investigator Matt Grant looks at how a program utilizing fusion centers in Texas aims to help prevent future tragedies. But is it making us safer?</p> <p>Teacher Survey – We asked educators across Texas what they think needs to be done to make campuses safer. Their responses highlight problems and potential solutions.</p> <p>Texas Gun Laws – Investigator Avery Travis compares our gun laws to other states. Do more restrictions equal greater safety?</p>

14.1	Government (Local)	12:30 AM	07/10/2022	1800	State of Texas	<p>School Shooting Timeline – ALERRT releases its version of the timeline of events regarding the response to the Uvalde school shooting. While there is some overlap, there are a few details that we had not heard before – in particular, a missed opportunity for an officer to potentially shoot the gunman before he entered the school. But that key detail is already being challenged. Jala Washington gives us an overview of the big points, and Kelly Wiley joins us on set for a deeper dive into the report and why it matters.</p> <p>Monkeypox in Texas – The state reported a notable increase in the number of monkeypox cases confirmed in Texas. Will DuPree interviews Dr. Jennifer Shuford, the Chief Epidemiologist for the Texas Department of State Health Services. She details how serious the outbreak is, in comparison to COVID, who should be concerned, and how the state’s responding.</p> <p>Clinics Closing – Whole Woman’s Health is closing clinics in Texas, all due to state laws taking effect after the Supreme Court ruling to overturn Roe vs. Wade. Maggie Glynn looks closer at the closings, but also at new polling that shows many Texas voters do not support the state’s ban on abortion.</p> <p>After the Filibuster – Nine years ago, the halls of the State Capitol were packed with protestors as then State Sen. Wendy Davis led a filibuster to block anti-abortion legislation. It helped shape the debate in Texas politics for the decade to come. Josh interviews Davis to get her perspective on the current state of women’s health in Texas.</p>

Monica Madden reports on the response from lawmakers and others in the community to leaked video from inside the school and what comes next.</p> <p>A Father’s Story – Amerie Garza died in the Robb Elementary shooting. Her father has mixed feelings about seeing the video from inside the school. Jala Washington shares his story.</p> <p>Columbine Lessons – To fully understand the failure in Uvalde, we have to look to the past. Matt Grant explains how lessons learned in 1999 still guide law enforcement today.</p> <p>From Uvalde to DC – Families of the mass shooting victims as well as community members from Uvalde are playing significant roles in the fight for new gun regulations. How they’re taking different paths to send a message to lawmakers about the need for steps to address gun violence.</p> <p>Power Pressure – the record Texas heat puts record pressure on the state’s electricity supply. Now, one state lawmaker is calling it a state of emergency. Mike Rush reports on the effort to change state law to help Texas tenants.</p> <p>Chips Act – Few of the microchips that power phones, computers, cars, and other essentials are made in the USA. Some warn that’s a threat to our national security – as well as our economy. Now, legislation to boost US computer chip production, led by Texans, is close to passing in Congress. Josh Hinkle interviews bill author Rep. Michael McCaul about what’s next now that the Chips and Science Act has passed.</p> <p>Offshore Abortions – The Texas trigger law, banning almost all abortions is set to take effect in less than a month. Now, there’s a new approach to help women seeking abortions – a floating clinic in international waters. Monica Madden speaks to a doctor, ahem, floating this idea and the potential legal issues the clinic at sea could face along with obstacles for patients.</p> <p>Warning Sign Missed – Police video reveals a red flag about the Uvalde mass shooter. How a family member’s words are highlighting a warning sign that may have been overlooked.</p> <p>Closing the Gap – Polls in the race for Lt. Governor are getting closer. Monica speaks with Democrat Mike Collier, and looks closer at the factors helping to close the gap in a race once expected to be a GOP landslide victory.</p>

Avery Travis reports on the trial – and how the events in the courtroom could have a larger impact beyond the jury’s ruling in this particular case.</p> <p>Uvalde Evidence Hearing – State Sen. Roland Gutierrez has a hearing for his lawsuit calling for the Texas DPS to release body camera footage, emergency communications, and other information regarding the response to the Uvalde school shooting. Gutierrez says that DPS has released some information, but not details that could put the action, or inaction, of DPS in a negative light. The judge says she has several questions and set a 5pm Monday deadline for briefs to be submitted. Monica reports on the hearing, and speaks with Gutierrez about the next steps.</p> <p>Monkeypox on Campus – As the number of monkeypox cases grows, there’s new concern about the potential for spread on college campuses. Jala Washington looks at the steps colleges and universities are taking to prevent outbreaks as students return to campus.</p> <p>Budget Surplus Tax Cut – Governor Abbott voices support for using the state’s unprecedented budget surplus to fund property tax relief.</p> <p>Juvenile Justice Crisis – Extreme staffing shortages in juvenile detention facilities in Texas are leading to conditions advocates call appalling. Teens are spending up to 23 hours in their cells – some using water bottles as bathrooms. Jala looks closer at how the problems got so bad. Plus, we hear from State Rep. James Talarico (D-Round Rock), who serves on the Juvenile Justice Committee and is urging Gov. Abbott to call a special session to address the problems.</p> <p>Driving with a Disability – An Austin mother speaks out after her local tax office tells her it would take months before she could register her son as a driver with a communication impediment. She said the delay could have put her son in harm’s way. Reporter Samuel Stark digs deeper – how his questions are leading to changes.</p>

But many of those local officers did not actually go through that training. Investigator Dalton Huey looked into the records to find out who did, and who did not have active shooter training.</p> <p>Transparency Denied – A legal challenge to let the public learn more information about the response to the Uvalde school shooting has failed. Monica Madden digs into a judge’s decision to deny a state senator’s request to order DPS to release records related to the Robb Elementary shooting.</p> <p>Beto Drops the F-bomb – Viral campaign moment as Beto O’Rourke calls a heckler a motherf-er on camera. The guy was laughing as Beto spoke about the destructive power of an AR-15, and the need for more regulations on the weapon used in the Uvalde school shooting. Grace Reader spoke to a political science professor about the exchange, more specifically the response to the exchange, and what this could mean for the course of the campaign moving forward.</p> <p>MPP Ends – A program which forced asylum seekers to remain in Mexico has been ended by the federal government. So what happens now for Texas communities along the border? Sandra Sanchez explores the next steps, as Governor Abbott expands his plan to bus more migrants out of Texas to DC and NYC.</p> <p>Fleeing Texas – Growing concern over a seeming rise in anti-LGBTQ sentiment is pushing families to think about packing up and leaving Texas. Will DuPree explores how a new business is helping people get out, and joins us on set for a deeper dive.</p> <p>Water Project Funding – Federal funding from the bipartisan infrastructure act could help Texas brace for future droughts. Right now, the Texas Water Development board is looking at how to spend \$3-billion from the</p>

While leaders and districts look for solutions, there are concerns that schools will not have enough qualified educators to meet the needs of students. Our special edition looks into what’s really behind the shortage. Our investigators obtained thousands of exit surveys detailing why teachers left and the impact that has on students.</p>

We look closer at the impact on Texas farmers and ranchers, and the effort by state lawmakers to control large leaks that waste millions of gallons of Texas water.</p> <p>Abortion and the Campaign – As the Texas trigger law officially takes effect, Texas Democrats look to emphasize abortion rights in their campaigns. How the issue is looming large in the races for Governor and Texas Attorney General.</p> <p>Teacher Task Force – The state’s Teacher Vacancy Task Force meets as school districts begin to see the impact of the shortage of teachers. Investigator Kelly Wiley looks closer at the problem and the search for solutions to address the staffing concerns.</p> <p>Unclaimed Property – The state is holding more than 6-billion dollars – and some of that could be yours. But one Texas family found it’s not always easy to get the money that belongs to you. Investigator Mike Rush looks into frustration over the state’s unclaimed property program.</p>

Investigator Kelly Wiley looks at the problems now reaching the local level, keeping some kids waiting months for counseling and treatment.</p> <p>Monkeypox Response – A death in Texas leads to new questions about the health response to monkeypox. Maggie Glynn interviews Dr. Gerald Parker, who heads up the Pandemic and Biosecurity program at the Bush School at Texas A&M. We dig into what’s worked, what needs to improve, and what comes next.</p> <p>Winning Texas Women – We’re seeing a battle on the airwaves to win support from Texas women in the race for governor. Will DuPree interviews the head of Mothers Against Greg Abbott, a group that’s launching ads against the Governor, as well as Renae Eze, communications director for Texans for Greg Abbott. Monica interviews Beto one-on-one about his message to voters and why he believes his tour of Texas will deliver a win in November.</p> <p>The Investigation - New documents show some DPS officers are being investigated for their response to the Uvalde shooting. Investigator Kelly Wiley looks at how the internal review is leading to a policy change that could affect how the DPS responds to future mass shooter incidents.</p> <p>Risking Death on the Rio Grande - The rain-swollen river poses new risks for migrants crossing. Josh interviews Sandra Sanchez from Border Report about what she saw in Eagle Pass, as migrants face the deadly dangers – and how it’s taking a toll on deputies in one Texas county.</p> <p>Waiting for Food Benefits – Arezow Doost updates her investigation into delays with SNAP food benefits. She found that workers at the state agency in charge of benefits are also facing challenges when it comes to putting food on the table.</p>

There’s the usual stuff – numbers show the top statewide races are a little tighter, still the GOP incumbents hold significant leads. Also, how shifting opinions on issues like migrant busing, abortion and same-sex marriage could foreshadow future policy fights in Texas.</p> <p>Medical Debt Lawsuits – We’re devoting two segments to our investigation into a rising number of medical debt lawsuits. We look at the impact on individual Texans, and why state leaders may soon take a closer look at the state’s debt collection system.</p>
