The Programs and Issues in this file are “representative” of our news and public affairs efforts – but do not fully demonstrate the breadth of our reporting and our commitment to “live” local and relevant radio. Below is a summary of some of our major regularly scheduled broadcast efforts.

Monday-Friday:

Radio VT News provides extended coverage of local, state and regional news:
6:05am – 7:05am – 8:05am – 12:05pm – 4:05pm – 5:05pm
Each Newscasts is 5 to 10-minutes in length and features a variety of reports.

At 7:30AM Mon-Fri – The Morning Briefing: 10-mins of World & National News

The Morning News Service airs from 7-9am – two full hours of news, weather, sports, travel updates, commentary, interviews, plus studio and phone guests. WDEV employs our own forecaster Roger Hill who details the micro-climate of the region while watching major national weather stories and climate change. The MNS is produced by Radio Vermont News with additional world and national updates from CBS Radio News.

Radio Vermont News has developed reporter relations with WCAX-TV Channel 3 News. Monday-Friday reporter Alexandra Montgomery joins the Morning News Service with a “live” interactive update to explore stories in much greater depth than available from wire service reports.

Vermont Viewpoint: 9-11am

This is our newsmaker public affairs interview program. Rick Cengeri, host a show that provides detailed analysis of the news plus a Vermont perspective on world events. His guests are varied and represent a wide spectrum. During the legislative session, Ric originates his program direct from the Vermont Statehouse in Montpelier (Fridays and during special event days). His program also goes mobile for events such as the Chamber of Commerce Business EXPO, the Tunbridge World’s Fair and other gatherings.

The Midday News Service: Noon-1PM

An hour-long update of the very latest news, business report, sports, weather and a variety of human interest features. This is the most comprehensive lunchtime news hour of any Vermont radio station. With the “Special Assignment” section, Radio VT News often delivers lengthy segments of news conferences or legislative debate. We are committed to providing our listeners with more than a “sound bite” service.

The very latest news developments, sports and weather, perfect for the drive home. Special updated reports on the day’s breaking news stories with Calvin Cutler from WCAX-TV News around 4:05PM and at 5:05PM, VT Digger.org reports – the state’s leading on-line investigative news site.

Re-Broadcast of WCAX-TV News: 11-11:30pm

Since the conversion to all digital over-the-air TV broadcasts, many in our listening area told us that they missed WCAX news – no longer available to them “over the air.”

Through special retransmission agreement with WCAX News, WDEV re-broadcasts the 11pm report as a service to the public. (This is occasionally pre-empted by late-airing sporting events such as when the Red Sox play on the West Coast.)

Saturday Morning:

Similar to weekdays, WDEV is “live and local” with updated news reports including the Morning News Service from 7-8am. This hour also features “For the Birds” a program dedicated to watching and listening to birds; “The Green Mountain Club” report – with opportunities to explore VT outdoors and take advantage of guided and organized hikes around the state.

Sunday Morning:

At 6:00AM, WDEV airs CBS Radio Sunday Morning, and “The Takeout with Majhor Garrett”, a weekly news magazine show. National and International issues are explored in-depth with a variety of reporters and guests.

WDEV airs Red Sox Baseball, Norwich D3 Hockey, NASCAR racing, local stock car racing and high school basketball (boys & girls) regular-season and championship games. WDEV provide “Team Coverage” of every Town Meeting Day (March) plus coverage of Primary and General Election nights.

Two years after the pandemic closed courthouses across Vermont, backlogs persist in many counties, leaving some to wonder when justice will be served.

The courtroom in the Grand Isle Courthouse has caution tape on seating for visitors and jurors alike. Built in 1824, the building does not have a ventilation system that could cleanse the air and prevent the spread of pathogens like COVID. Under the judicial emergency ordered by the Vermont Supreme Court, courthouses need adequate ventilation to reopen.

Even in courthouses that have re-opened, the backlog of cases persists. There are 4,095 pending felony cases statewide, 60% more than there were on the docket in the last year before the pandemic. Of those cases, three-quarters have been pending for more than six months.

Despite most other facets of life returning to normal, the Vermont Judiciary remains in a state of emergency, with strict rules on ventilation, masking, and distancing that hinder in-person hearings and have slowed progress on cases.

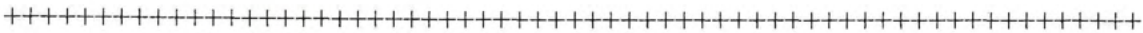

According to the Vermont Department of Health, May was the deadliest month of the Covid-19 BA.2 surge in Vermont, with 30 people dead from the virus.

At the same time, the latest data in a weekly report from the health department showed that Covid cases dropped for the second week in a row.

It's a pattern that's been reflected in other waves of the pandemic. Even as cases drop, hospitalizations and deaths lag behind, taking weeks or even months to reveal the full toll of a surge.

And despite the drop in cases, the health department still rates statewide Covid community levels as "high," based on the case rate, hospital admissions, and the share of hospital beds occupied by Covid patients.

A 14-year-old Grand Isle County girl collapsed during gym class at school Thursday and died.

Vermont health officials say that with COVID cases once again on the decline, the state will close its testing centers next week.

Governor Phil Scott Tuesday said the days of remote learning, isolation, and deferred health care have taken a toll on Vermonters' social, emotional, and physical wellbeing.

Officials say the current viral spread is low, and the state has recorded just one death so far in June.

Officials say priorities are shifting, including increased attention to mental health issues, substance use, and eating disorders. They are also putting increased resources toward housing and suicide prevention.

Vermont Education Secretary Dan French says the state will spend \$200 million in federal funds to create new afterschool and wellness programs for students and staff and create new statewide curriculums to counter learning loss.

Vermont Health Commissioner Dr. Mark Levine says they have their eyes open toward the fall when cases will likely tick back up again, much like the seasonal flu.

At-home tests are widely available, and some might be covered by insurance providers.

Before June 25th, people can make an appointment to go to a state testing site and pick up free at-home test kits.

After that, people can order three rounds of free kits from COVID.gov or by going to a pharmacy or health care provider.

Burlington police are investigating another shooting incident.

Just after midnight Friday morning, police were informed a gunshot wound victim was at the UVM Medical Center.

Officers say the victim was uncooperative and wouldn't provide a statement.

On further investigation, the unidentified victim was reportedly visiting a family member in an apartment near Pearl and Winooski Avenue, when he was shot in the leg outside the apartment.

Officers say they've recovered ballistic evidence and are holding the victim on a previous arrest warrant for the alleged sale of cocaine.

A shooting at Burlington's Roosevelt Park on Sunday evening injured a former city councilor, who said he was struck by shrapnel while sitting in his backyard.

David Berezniak (burr-REZ-nee-ak) told VTDigger that he was hit in the head just before 7 p.m. The former Democratic councilor's home sits across St. Mary's Street from the park, a popular greenspace in the city's Old North End that hosts facilities for the local Boys and Girls Club as well as recreational sport leagues.

Police said that Sunday's shooting was this year's 12th gunfire incident. A gunfire incident is one when a gun is discharged but not necessarily when someone is struck by gunfire. There were 14 recorded gunfire incidents in Burlington last year. Police said Sunday's incident was also classified as a shooting, since the shrapnel that hit Berezniak was believed to be a direct result of the gunfire.

Police have captured a man wanted in connection with a shooting in Johnson.

64-year-old George Goins of Johnson, was arrested at a South Burlington hotel on Wednesday.

Investigators say Goins shot a 26-year-old man at the apartment complex where they both live on Railroad Street in Johnson.

The victim, whose name the Lamoille County Sheriff's Department did not release, was shot in the neck. He's hospitalized in Burlington and is expected to survive.

It's still not clear why Goins allegedly fired the shots but investigators said there was an altercation between the men.

Goins is being charged with attempted murder. He's expected in Lamoille County court on ~~Thursday~~ ^{today} after invoking the 24-hour rule.

The sheriff's department says Miranda Wells, 25, whose last-known address was in Fairfax, was cited into court for harboring a fugitive in connection with the case.

A Montpelier High School student allegedly involved in a “potential threat” against the school has agreed to surrender his guns for six months.

Two weeks ago, police said they were investigating a “potential threat” at the school involving an 18-year-old student.

Police said they had “no indication or information that there was or is an imminent threat to the school, staff, students or the public relating to this incident.”

Police said they seized two rifles, magazines and ammunition, from the student’s home using a temporary extreme risk protection order issued by a court. The order is part of the state’s so-called red flag law adopted in 2018, which allows courts to order the seizure of guns from those believed to be a threat to themselves or others.

Police said there is no evidence that the student’s guns were ever on school grounds.

The Times-Argus reports School officials have said the student will not return to school this year and is cooperating with officials.

Police will hold a online town hall on Zoom on June 9 at 5 p.m. Chief Brian Peete will be available to answer questions from the community about the incident or any other concerns about policing in the Capital City.

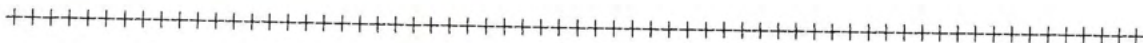

Prior to 2020, Burlington used to average two gunfire incidents per year.

Burlington Mayor Miro Weinberger says the City has had 38 incidents since the start of 2020, twelve of them have taken place already this year.

Local 22 News reports The mayor joined Burlington Police Acting Chief Jon Murad and Chittenden County State's Attorney Sarah George at a joint news conference Thursday afternoon to discuss the gunfire incidents and ways to combat them.

Murad said the department has identified the shooter in 19 of the 38 incidents and made arrests in 18 of them. George said many factors have led to the spike in gun violence, including economic hardship, increases in gun purchases and reductions in police staffing.

Weinberger noted the Burlington Police cannot do what it's historically done to curb violence -- or the possibility of violence -- with the effective staffing level of 60 officers that it has now. The mayor urged the city to do everything it can to rebuild the department's ranks.

Vermont Governor Phil Scott sent a letter last week to the U.S. Senate, urging them to work together to address gun violence.

Scott supported changes to the state's gun laws after what he felt was a narrowly averted school shooting in Vermont in 2018.

The letter is dated June 14th, as the Senate worked to finalize the details of a gun violence compromise.

The Democrats' lead negotiator said Tuesday that senators are on the brink of an agreement on a bipartisan gun violence bill.

A Spokesperson for the Governor said his office received various answers from many of the 100 senators, ranging from "extreme gratitude" to an acknowledgement of having received the letter.

In the letter, Scott highlighted a 2018 case in which he learned of a plan by an 18-year-old Vermont man who had outlined plans for a school shooting.

In response, the Vermont Legislature passed the state's first significant gun restrictions, which included raising the age to buy firearms from 18 to 21, requiring universal background checks, and passing the Vermont version of a "red flag" law. He also highlighted Vermont's efforts to focus on mental health and school safety measures.

Almost two months later, Scott signed the new laws on the Statehouse steps in Montpelier.

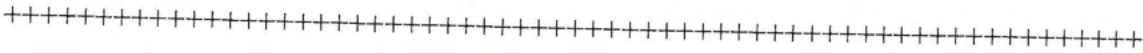

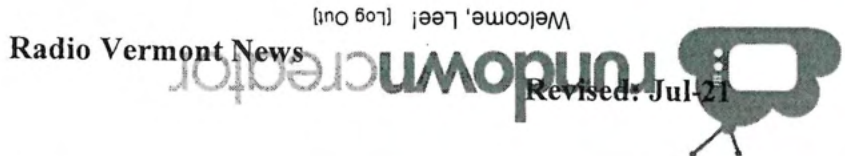

A legislative committee has approved a bill that would provide free school meals to Vermont students for the upcoming school year.

V-T Digger reports The House Committee on Education voted 9-2 on Thursday to approve S.100, known as the Universal School Meals Act.

The legislation would use \$29 million in surplus funds to pay for breakfast and lunch for every public school student in the state.

For the past two years, federal Covid relief dollars have paid for breakfast and lunch for all public school students. But it's unclear if that money will be renewed for upcoming school years.

Some anti-hunger advocates have been urging Vermont lawmakers to find public money to continue to pay for breakfast and lunch for the state's schoolchildren.

Lawmakers initially considered adding taxes on sweetened beverages, candy, and computer software to implement a permanent universal meals program, but Governor Phil Scott's administration has opposed that idea.

The committee also expanded the program to include Vermont students who receive public tuition money to attend private schools within the state.

The proposed legislation includes provisions aimed at finding a more permanent funding source in the future.

UVM Medical Center nurses are calling on the hospital to do more after rising reports of violence in the emergency department.

Amanda Young, a registered nurse in the emergency department at the UVM Medical Center tells WCAX News ER Nurses have been assaulted both verbally and physically while providing care to patients.

On Thursday, Young and other nurses from the hospital expressed concern over a rise in violence in their department.

The nurses say aggressors are oftentimes repeat offenders under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

A poll from the Vermont Federation of Nurses and Health Professionals says 98% of nurses at the UVM Medical Center reported being verbally assaulted, and 78% said they've been physically assaulted in the last year.

According to Burlington Police, 17 incidents were reported in 2018. Last year the number of incidents grew to 32, and ten incidents have been reported so far this year.

Nurses want more security measures, including a working metal detector in the department, 24/7 security, and better lighting outside.

UVM Medical Center President Stephen Leffler says they're working toward better security but they're running into roadblocks.

Mike Del Trecco, the interim president and CEO of the Vermont Association of Hospitals and Health Systems says the issue extends beyond the walls of the Hospital.

Nurses at UVMMC say they are required to take training in dealing with aggressive behavior, as well as verbal de-escalation training.

More operating rooms are open again after a pipe burst at the UVM Medical Center, flooding ORs and forcing the hospital to cancel surgeries.

The pipe burst at the UVM Medical Center on Saturday, forcing the Burlington hospital to shut down 21 of its 23 operating rooms.

Some 49 surgeries had been postponed as of Monday. The hospital said there would be more postponements throughout the week.

Now, 15 operating rooms are available again.

The hospital says all five operating rooms at the Fanny Allen campus are back open, helping to take some pressure off that surgery backlog created by the flooding.

The University of Vermont Medical Center delayed almost 50 surgeries Monday after a burst pipe flooded most of its operating rooms over the weekend.

In a press release, representatives from the state's largest hospital said there will be more delays "until additional ORs are brought back online."

Saturday night's malfunction affected all but two surgical suites at the University of Vermont Medical Center main campus. As of Monday, roughly half of the 22 operating rooms in the Burlington complex were back online. The remaining operating rooms in Burlington would be out of commission for about a week.

Emergency and inpatient surgeries are expected to continue in the building, according to the hospital, but outpatient elective surgeries would be rescheduled on a case-by-case basis. When possible, hospital staff also plan to divert patients with major vascular conditions to other hospitals for the next week.

Rutland Regional Medical Center is short \$7.6 million this year, and its request for higher service charges has been rejected. What happens now?

The hospital requested a 9% increase in charges in the middle of this fiscal year to cover inflation and ballooning staffing costs. But the Green Mountain Care Board denied the request last week, citing the impact it would have on small businesses.

Over the course of three hearings in recent weeks, Rutland executives warned that denying the price increase could lead to painful cuts in necessary services. They argued that dipping into the hospital's \$261 million reserve puts the hospital's long-term financial stability at risk.

This rate hike request comes just one week after the Green Mountain Care Board denied a similar request from the Rutland Regional Medical Center for a 9% mid-year increase.

Jeff Tieman, the president and CEO of the Vermont Association of Hospitals and Health Systems, tells WCAX News these are cost pressures that facilities did not foresee when they thought the pandemic was winding down.

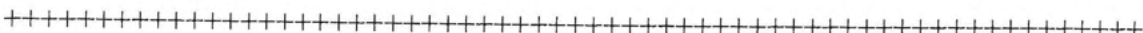

Vermont has the 2nd most small businesses facing hiring struggles, according to a new report from HelpAdvisor.com.

The study found that nearly 45% of small businesses in Vermont had trouble hiring new employees in April. Only Missouri had a higher percentage.

Nationwide, almost 1 out of every 3 small businesses reported having difficulty hiring new employees in the month of April, according to analysis of data from the U.S. Census Bureau Small Business Pulse Survey.

In Vermont, 41% of small businesses believe it will take at least 6 months until operations are back to normal, if at all.

The accommodation and food services industry has had the most trouble finding new workers, with more than 60% of such businesses nationwide reporting hiring difficulties in April.

The state with the lowest percentage of business having hiring struggles is Mississippi, according to the survey.

The Vermont State Police say severe staffing shortages are curtailing their ability to assist local police departments.

Last year, the director said the state police lost three officers for every one it hired. Staffing has diminished so much that state police are asking local departments to exhaust all other possibilities before turning to them for help.

Police departments in Shelburne, Springfield and Hardwick have received notices this year after asking for help because of staffing shortages of their own. State police are advising departments to focus on emergency responses, even if they have to eliminate detective divisions and specialized units.

Severe staffing shortages are changing Vermont's approach to law enforcement, both with the Vermont State Police and most local police departments across the state.

Vermont State Police have about 48 vacancies out of 333 total sworn positions. Across the state, 51 of 70 other law enforcement agencies said they are also trying to fill positions.

The two Vermont State Police dispatch centers are also having trouble managing call volumes, and things are expected to get worse in the coming months.

To help solve the staffing shortage, the state police have hired their first civilian recruiter. And, to ensure the emergency dispatch centers can do their jobs, the Department of Public Safety is rethinking its system for call management and communications.
