8/1 – Part 2 of a two-part interview with Rocky Boy Celebration organizer Dustin Whitford. He talks about some of the special wrinkles that have been added for the 50th Annual Celebration. He also encourages any visitors from the surrounding area to come to the Pow-Wow, and to not be afraid to ask questions.

8/2-8/3 – Part 1 of a two-part interview with Havre PD Senior Patrolman Ryan Pearson. Pearson talks about some of the fundraisers that will be taking place in conjunction with the National Night Out and what the funds will go towards.

8/4 – Part 2 of a two-part interview with Havre PD Senior Patrolman Ryan Pearson. Pearson tells us about the 3rd annual National Night Out in Havre, including which law enforcement agencies will be there and what time it begins.

8/5 – A workshop titled “Bridges of Poverty” is coming to Havre. Hill County Public Nurse Bridget Kallenberger and Tina Thomas with Quality Life Concepts talk about the special guest speaker/author Terie Druisi-Smith and the presentations she will be giving.

8/6 – Part 1 of a two-part interview with CHS Environmental Coordinator Joey Phillips. Phillips and the Northern Montana Oil Spill Cooperative recently conducted a training exercise on Lake Elwell in Liberty County. They simulated an oil leak from the Marias River, and demonstrated how they would work together to clean up the spill.

8/7 – Part 2 of a two-part interview with CHS Environmental Coordinator Joey Phillips. He outlines what the Northern Montana Oil Spill Cooperative does throughout the year, and the importance of maintaining strong communication between all of the entities involved.

8/8 – Havre’s 2014 Relay for Life is set for 6:00 PM at the Havre High School track. Relay organizers Reba Domire and Kyndra Moore preview this year’s Relay, and talk about the various activities that will take place throughout the night.

8/9-8/10 – For the first time ever, SafetyFestMT is bringing their event to Havre. Montana’s premier safety event features three days of workshops covering a wide range of safety topics. Coordinator Casey Kyler-West helps preview the action.

8/11 – Part 1 of a three-part interview with Havre City Court Judge Virginia Seigel. Judge Seigel talks about the recent efforts to reconcile unpaid fines and fees, and says that 7 boxes of uncollected monies were discovered by her Clerk.

8/12 – Part 2 of a three-part interview with Havre City Court Judge Virginia Seigel. Judge Seigel continues the discussion about uncollected fines and fees, and mentions how on average, the Court has been collecting almost \$2,000 in untapped revenues for the City.

8/13 – Part 3 of a three-part interview with Havre City Court Judge Virginia Seigel. Judge Seigel wraps up the conversation about untapped and uncollected revenues by asking the Havre City Council for a part-time, 20 hour a week, employee to help continue to collect these unpaid fees and to help the Court maintain an increasing caseload.

8/14 – Havre High School Craig Mueller discusses the new Licensed Addiction Counselor that will be at the High School this fall. The Counselor is employed by Bullhook Community Health Center, and his salary will be paid through a state grant.

Known as the “The Girls”, these young ladies have been working on various community art projects with local artist Vince Woodwick. The girls talk about their latest project, a mural that they painted on one of Hill County’s sprinkler covers.

The complex will allow low-income families to be able to have affordable housing. She adds that the complex will be right by the Buffalo Court housing district for low-income senior citizens.

8/22 – Part 1 of a two-part interview with Great Northern Fair Board Chair Bert Corcoran. He outlines some of the key scheduling changes that will take place for 2015's Fair, specifically, the moving of the Demolition Derby to Saturday night.

She does mention that a few teachers are switching from smart boards to smart TV's to teach lessons in the classroom.

8/29 – Highland Park Primary School Principal Maureen Odegard previews the 2014-15 school year. She talks about the staggered system that kindergartners are on initially, and how that helps them adjust to the school setting. She also says the Kindergarten Prep class is completely full once again.

She explains what the money will go towards, and the high amount of community interest and excitement towards the changes.

7/2 – Havre Acting Police Chief Gabe Matosich goes over some of the laws and regulations related to shooting off fireworks for the 4th of July. He also notes that due to the 4th being on a Friday, there will be increased patrols for the long holiday weekend.

7/3 – Havre City Councilman Allen “Woody” Woodwick previews the annual 4th of July community picnic and music festival. He mentions all of the musical acts scheduled to perform, and the growth that’s been made in 13 years of existence.

7/4 – Havre Fire Captain Mel Paulson gives us some tips to have a safe and enjoyable 4th of July holiday. He covers how old children should be before handling fireworks, what to do if you firework doesn’t ignite, and how to safely dispose of the remains when you are finished.

7/5-7/6 – Havre Acting Police Chief Gabe Matosich discusses the recent power outage that caused all of the city’s traffic lights to stop working. He refreshes listeners on what the correct protocol and procedure is in a situation like that, for both vehicles and pedestrians.

7/7 – Interim Director of Montana State University’s College of Agriculture gives us his impressions of the latest Northern Ag Research Center Field Day. He says he is continually impressed by not only the impressive work done in Havre, but the outstanding support from the Havre community.

7/8 – A change to the Nuisance Weed Ordinance has sparked a debate among members of the Havre City Council. Ward 1 Councilperson Terry Lilletvedt is in favor; Ward 3 Councilman Jay Pyette is against. They both give us their reasons in this edition of Insight.

7/9 – Part 1 of a two-part interview with Havre Superintendent of Schools Andy Carlson. He talks about the Alternative School that is available for at-risk high-schoolers, and notes that the School will be moving from the High School to the Robins Admin. Building.

7/10 – Part 2 of a two-part interview with Havre Superintendent of Schools Andy Carlson. Carlson continues discussing the Alternative School, and mentions how the smaller, more one-on-one friendly atmosphere is crucial for those at-risk students.

7/11 – Havre Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Debbie Vandenberg previews the upcoming S.A.T.U.R.D.A.Y. Market. The Market runs from mid-July to mid-September, and allows local growers and artisans the chance to sell their products on the Town Square.

7/12-7/13 – Rocky Boy Food Distribution Program Director Michelle Billy talks about the recent donation from a member of the community that allows kids to receive a healthy lunch on Saturday afternoons throughout Rocky Boy. Billy says her staff drives around the various villages and hands out a free lunch to any children that are outside playing.

7/14 – Hill County Commissioner Mark Peterson discusses the proposed paved trail in Beaver Creek Park. He notes how three MSU-Northern students put the entire design and schematics together, and saved the County about \$15,000 in doing so. He also notes that we are still far away from putting the trail in.

7/15 – Fort Belknap Diabetes Coordinator Ruth Burleigh previews the 1st annual Tour de Cure in Lodgepole. The Tour is a major fundraiser for the American Diabetes Association. Burleigh explains the hard work it took in organizing the ride, and how excited the Fort Belknap community is to take part in the ride.

7/16 – Part 1 of our 5-part series on the 2014 Great Northern Fair. Fair Manager Tim Solomon previews the schedule of events and mentions the new carnival rides that were brought it for this year, including a Zipper.

7/17 – Part 2 of our 5-part series on the 2014 Great Northern Fair. The 2nd annual Pig Wrestling Competition took place, and we caught up with Rachel Bartlett and Sheridan O'Neil, who competed in the wrestling event. Bartlett and O'Neil are also running for the title of Rodeo Queen, and we get their thoughts on the competition.
