SEVEN ON YOUR SIDE- Michael Finney headed this consumer affairs unit that provided consumer information / product recalls during local 5:00pm newscasts, and reviewed investigations / resolutions during 6:00pm newscasts.

Office staff answered letters, e-mail and hotline telephone calls from viewers seeking help with a wide variety of consumer problems. On the average, the unit received over 4000 e-mails/ letters, and over 1500 phone calls per month.

YOUTH

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Tuesday, July 2, 2012

(1:55)

This report profiled a group of ten Bay Area high school juniors who landed internships at Facebook in Silicon Valley. The 10 high school juniors are the first ever to go through the Facebook Academy, an honor they earned through essays and good grades.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Friday, July 6, 2012

(2:40)

Alameda Police investigated an auto crash that seriously injured six teens, one critically, after an alleged "joy ride" ended with the car wrapped around a tree. It happened at about 1:30 a.m. on Island Drive in Alameda, and police were still at the scene Friday afternoon trying to put the pieces together.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Friday, July 13, 2012

(4:14)

Foster a Dream helped foster children with extracurricular and emergency expenses. The non-profit group helped pay for activities like proms, senior portraits, and sudden emergency expenses. One high school senior needed to make a deposit on his college dorm room, but the money from his student loan had not arrived yet.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Tuesday, July 24, 2012

(2:09)

Some of the world's brightest young minds were in the Bay Area competing in an international science competition at Google's Mountain View headquarters. The contest brought finalists to the Google campus from all over the world and the judges hope some of their winning innovations could have a worldwide impact.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6AM - Monday, September 17, 2012

(1:50)

A wireless phone carrier and Oakland's Skyline High teamed up to show students the dangers of texting and driving. Through the use of a driving simulator, new drivers were taught to keep both hands on the wheel, because they often drove with one hand on a cell phone. Officials hoped the demonstrations would be a life-saving lesson for the students.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Thursday, September 20, 2012

(3:01)

The Teen Force program was launched with help from private sector grant money. It followed a business model where employers paid the going rate, generally minimum wage for the workers, and they added a little extra to help sustain the non-profit group. This made it very easy for employers to hire qualified and motivated youth. There were nine employers in Santa Clara County putting foster teens and young adults to work.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM - Monday, September 3, 2012

(2:07)

A Concord neighborhood with vacant homes due to bank foreclosures was being targeted by teens as party houses. There were reports of similar parties in Walnut Creek, Pleasant Hill and Clayton. A watchful neighbor on the previous night kept a vacant home from becoming another illegal house party. After he called police, he said they arrived just as carloads of teens began cruising by the house.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM - Wednesday, August 8, 2012

(2:27)

Four teens were arrested for hate crimes against a Hayward mosque. Members of the mosque had just broken their 16-hour fast for Ramadan, and were conducting a final prayer. That's when they heard the sound of oranges and lemons being thrown against the side of the building. President of the American Muslim Association said mosque members even spoke to the parents of the boys before the incident, but the harassment continued. One teen that seemed genuinely remorseful, went to the mosque and admitted he was one of the four boys arrested.

CRIME & LAW ENFORCEMENT

ABC 7 NEWS AT 4PM - Saturday, September 1, 2012

(2:49)

In response to constant crime plaguing their neighborhoods, fed up Oakland residents, church members, and city leaders marched for peace. During the peace march and rally that ended at 91st Avenue, people prayed and reaffirmed their commitment to make the city a safer place to live. Pastors from several Oakland churches led the march as 100 strong marched down International Boulevard, demanding a change. .

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Wednesday, August 1, 2012

(1:49)

San Francisco police were investigating a series of fatal shootings in the city's Visitacion Valley neighborhood. Three shooting incidents claimed four lives in three days. San Francisco's Police Chief said the recent violence was gang-related, and in one instance, a gang imploding on itself. Police were asking people in the community to step forward and "get these guys."

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM – Tuesday, July 3, 2012

(2:55)

San Francisco Police confiscated a huge supply of illegal and very powerful fireworks in the Mission District. They confiscated 50 M-1000s fireworks, equivalent to 12 sticks of dynamite, also a gun, and arrested a convicted felon. Normally, most of those fireworks would end up on the streets of Chinatown, but this year Chinatown was exceptionally quiet. Fire officials said the sales were ending up on the Internet, mainly Craig's List.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6AM - Thursday, September 20, 2012

(2:24)

Three people were injured in a shooting near the Mills College campus in East Oakland late Wednesday night. Police received reports of gunshots at 11:36 p.m. in the 3600 block of Seminary Avenue. Of the three victims shot, two were transported to the hospital in stable condition while one victim was transported with serious injuries, police said.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM - Tuesday, September 18, 2012

(2:34)

Protecting the people of San Jose from crime was the focus of two separate public forums Tuesday night. With violent crime rising, police response times doing the same, and the chief suddenly resigning, there was a lot to talk about. City leaders discussed the problems at one gathering, while the police union held another.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM – Wednesday, September 12, 2012

(1:37)

A wild turkey shot with an arrow was healthy and back with its family after a careful rescue effort. A resident in a Hollister neighborhood called the rescue group after seeing the turkey with the arrow lodged in its right side. But the Bay Area group that saved its life was not satisfied. Wild Rescue offered a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of the people responsible.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM - Tuesday, September 11, 2012

(2:37)

A Berkeley warehouse that had been vacant for ten years was sold, but while it was vacant, graffiti artists used the walls as their canvas for a long time. So before the new owner started renovations, he offered about a dozen artists a chance to come in and use the walls one last time, but things quickly got out of hand. About 4,000 people showed up flooding the streets and pouring into the neighborhood. Graffiti vandals spray-painted their way through the neighborhood damaging at least 13 buildings.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Tuesday, August 28, 2012

(2:08)

San Jose police were fighting back against a spike in gang violence. Weekend gang sweeps netted more than a dozen suspects and police said they were not done applying pressure on gang members. They authorized an additional \$800,000 to pay for more overtime so they could continue the sweeps, and that would be enough money to continue the operations until the end of the year.

ECONOMY

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Thursday, September 27, 2012

(2:41)

A celebration was underway in San Jose to mark the 10th anniversary of Santana Row, an upscale shopping area near the 880-280 interchange. It had survived a massive fire, the dot-com bust and the great recession. The mayor and other dignitaries were celebrating along with the 70 tenants. In a region known for innovation, Silicon Valley had never seen anything like Santana Row. It immediately resonated with shoppers and with shop owners.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 4PM - Tuesday, July 31, 2012

(2:45)

The very non-profits that helped the needy found themselves struggling to stay afloat during tough financial times. This was the topic at a summit meeting of community organizations who first made their voices heard at an ABC7 Listens meeting that KGO-TV hosted in Concord earlier in the month. Contra Costa County first saw the crisis coming a few years before so they formed a task force. Now they're hoping to produce real change, not just in meeting need, but in ending the crisis altogether.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM – Thursday, July 12, 2012

(3:04)

A new economic study found that nearly 4 million Californians couldn't afford to buy enough to eat. While the Bay Area continued to recover, the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano counties served 46 percent more people than it did in 2006, before the recession began. Those in need included people with financial emergencies, others who needed sporadic help and still more who came in monthly; many never imagined they'd someday stand in line at a food pantry. .

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM – Tuesday, July 17, 2012

(2:51)

The Sentiment Index of homebuilders had risen from 29 to 35, and although anything under 50 was weak, it was the highest number in five years and the biggest increase in almost a decade. This was viewed as a sign that the Bay Area could be on the verge of a building boom. Economists often said the housing market was the last to fall going into a recession and the last to dig back out. So the index was a welcome sign of optimism.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Friday, August 3, 2012

(2:58)

A jobs surge occurred in July across the nation and the Bay Area was leading the way. The numbers of Americans returning to work soared as employers added 163,000 jobs in July, the most since February, and many more than expected. A lot of the credit went to Silicon Valley, where hiring was higher than any other place in the country. The technology sector was surging and social media, cloud computing and mobile devices were helping to make Silicon Valley the hottest job market in the nation.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM – Tuesday, September 25, 2012

(2:30)

At least 1,000 employees at Comcast call centers in Livermore, Morgan Hill, and Sacramento were told they would be laid off. Comcast said they were consolidating call centers, with many of the positions shifting out of state. They decided to close the centers because of the high cost of doing business in California.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Friday, September 7, 2012

(2:29)

Only 96,000 new jobs were created in the prior month, and that was 35,000 fewer than expected. The jobless rate fell to 8.1 percent, but only because a lot of people gave up looking. In fact, the U.S. work force has fallen to its lowest level in 31 years. People were finding jobs, but not fast enough. The latest figures indicated job creation continued to fall short of new people entering the work force. Job creation was too weak to make a positive impact on the jobless rate.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 4PM - Tuesday, September 11, 2012

(2:39)

Oakland Mayor Jean Quan was trying to do all she could to keep professional sports teams in town, and on Tuesday morning she targeted local businesses. She spent the day going from business to business fanning the flames of sports passion and reminding owners why it was so important all three teams stayed in the city of Oakland.

HEALTH

ABC 7 NEWS AT 4PM - Wednesday, September 26, 2012

(1:40)

For the first time in seven years, San Francisco health officials confirmed that a resident of the city had contracted the West Nile virus. They believed that he caught it locally because he hadn't traveled outside of the Bay Area. The health officer for the city and county of San Francisco said it was no reason to panic, that there are many people who come into contact with the disease and do not actually become sick. Only one out of 150 actually develop the severe neurologic stage of the disease.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Thursday, September 13, 2012

(2:40)

A Bay Area research group was about to begin testing on a new energy bar that could make the difference in helping obese teens fight off debilitating diseases. The CHORI-Bar, a super vitamin pill in a bar, combined minerals, vitamins, and fibers in dozens of variations. In clinical trials they noticed that different combinations had different effects, such as balancing the factors that help the body control various types of cholesterol.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Tuesday, August 21, 2012

(2:25)

The Susan G. Komen breast cancer charity was really struggling to get people to sign up for its upcoming Race for the Cure fundraiser in the Bay Area. It was also in a crisis over donations because of a controversial decision it made involving Planned Parenthood. Organizers said they normally had as many as 2,000 participants registered at this point, but this year there were only 1,000.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM - Wednesday, August 15, 2012

(5:04)

The ABC7 News I-Team checked out hospitals that were not on track to make important seismic upgrades. One expert said even if they make an upcoming deadline, it might not be enough. The United States Geological Survey said there was a 63 percent chance of a major earthquake in the Bay Area by 2036. State law mandated that by 2030 all hospitals had to be capable of taking in patients immediately following a quake.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Tuesday, August 7, 2012

(1:57)

This report profiled a new state of the art virtual training facility for medical professionals. The Center for Advanced Medical Learning and Simulation was a \$30 million complex that enabled doctors, nurses and medical students to train with simulation technology. The goal was to get the simulators as close to real life as possible so that the participants would forget that they were on a simulator.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Wednesday, August 1, 2012

(1:59)

World Breastfeeding Week started this day and three Bay Area hospitals joined a nationwide push to eliminate formula whenever possible. Kaiser Permanente was aggressively trying to achieve a baby friendly designation at all of its hospitals. The policy strongly favored breastfeeding. Health professionals said the medical benefits were overwhelming and the industry-wide push was not so much a move to ban formula as it was to educate woman.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Thursday, July 12, 2012

(2:44)

Medical marijuana advocates were promising to fight a federal crackdown on Oakland's largest pot provider. The complaint, filed by the U.S. Attorney for Northern California, targeted the owner of the building that housed the marijuana dispensaries or health centers in Oakland and in San Jose. The founder of health center was defiant, saying they had nothing to hide and nothing to be ashamed of, and had no intention of closing their doors.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Tuesday, July 3, 2012

(2:06)

Health workers in California were facing the prospect of wearing a mask at work, if they refused to get a flu shot. Some medical workers didn't want to get vaccinated and there was concern for patient safety. It was a surprising statistic, only 63 percent of healthcare workers nationwide ever got a flu vaccine. The California Nurses Association opposed the mask mandate. Most hospitals in the U.S. required vaccines for measles, mumps, rubella and Hepatitis B prior to employment. But more people died from the flu than all those diseases combined.

EDUCATION

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Thursday, August 30, 2012

(2:50)

While most California school districts were struggling because of budget cuts, the San Leandro Unified School District found a way to thrive. They put their trust in the ballot box and educators there did it by putting their trust in the voters. "Measure M" and "Measure B" were part of grassroots efforts to raise funds to repair aging facilities or build new ones, and it was a strategy that paid off.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Tuesday, September 25, 2012

(2:09)

A South Bay school district was being praised for sharp increases in student test scores and one school received a visit from Congresswoman Zoe Lofgren. Students of Cesar Chavez Elementary in San Jose had never had a U.S. congresswoman visit before. It was the school and the district test scores which brought Zoe Lofgren to the school. 14 of the 20 schools in the district had a score of 800 or higher on the API that measured proficiency in math and English. 800 is the goal set by the Department of Education for all California schools.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM – Wednesday, August 29, 2012

(2:03)

California hadn't changed the way it evaluated teachers in four decades, but state lawmakers were looking at allowing student test scores to be part of a teacher's evaluation for the first time in state history. Among the controversial parts is allowing school districts to get input from parents and teachers on how much weight the scores and other factors are given. But local school boards and education reformers lined up against it saying the measure actually would give teachers' unions even more power.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Thursday, July 19, 2012

(2:01)

Results of California's STAR test would be delayed because of a security breach after students posted cellphone pictures of test questions online. Two of the students allegedly involved were from the San Jose Unified School District. More than 400 images were posted online. Most showed just the test booklet, but 36 had the actual questions that were on the standardized test. State officials worked with social networking websites to remove them immediately.

**ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM - Tuesday, July 17, 2012
(2:07)**

While many school kids were spending their summer hanging out, a group of 12 and 13-year-olds from San Jose and Santa Clara were learning how to create computers. It was part of the Silicon Valley Education Foundation's summer program to boost math skills. Math Power was a summer program designed for 6th and 7th graders in Santa Clara County who needed to sharpen their math skills.

**ABC 7 NEWS AT 4PM - Wednesday, August 8, 2012
(3:08)**

This report profiled Dr. Penny Norman, the mastermind behind ScienceWiz, a company that taught science through kits and games. Penny's hands-on kits that showed kids how to use batteries to power electric motors, or drop pumice into water to see one kind of rock that can float, or they drop alka seltzer tablets into oil and water to simulate the forces that move Earth's tectonic plates.

**ABC 7 NEWS AT 11AM - Monday, August 20, 2012
(2:41)**

Some of the major Bay Area school districts started a new school year, and the youngest of the students were entering a new grade, the first new level in California primary education in over a century -- called transitional kindergarten. The first of its kind transitional kindergarten class was a concept many educators had been craving. It was a two year program for students who didn't turn five until after September 1.

**ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Wednesday, July 25, 2012
(2:18)**

The Department of Education said 10 percent of California schools were over 70 years old and 30 percent were over 50. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction was outlining a plan to create 21st century learning environments. He said it was time to invest in brick and mortar even in these continuing hard times. The key was to find creative ways to fund projects. UC Berkeley's Center for Cities and Schools was asked to make recommendations.

SPECIAL NEWS REPORTS

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Wednesday, September 5, 2012

(5:09)

Details were starting to emerge about man that killed California Highway Patrol Officer Kenyon Youngstrom who was declared dead Wednesday evening after being shot by 38-year-old Christopher Lacy during a traffic stop on Interstate 680 Tuesday morning. Lacy was then shot and killed by another CHP officer. Lacy, a former Sausalito resident lived in Corning, about two hours north of Sacramento, was a freelance computer programmer who used the Internet to look for work and for dates.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 5PM - Thursday, September 27, 2012

(2:16)

The Bay Area was an epicenter for stem cell research, drawing scientists from around the world. Some of the most advanced labs in the Bay Area are opening their doors to the scientists of tomorrow -- local high school students who are getting the opportunity of a lifetime. When Irene Medina returned to school in the fall, she had plenty of stories to tell about her summer job, "I did my first surgery on the rat, and it was very interesting and exciting for me." Instead of flipping burgers, the 16-year-old was helping researchers at UCSF better understand brain function.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Friday, September 28, 2012

(6:07)

The streets of San Francisco were overrun by people on two wheels Friday night. A huge group of cyclists gathered for the 20th anniversary of Critical Mass. The ride started at Justin Herman Plaza along the Embarcadero. One of the people who participated in the event's very first ride said he expected it to be one big peaceful pedal around the city. But incidents had come up, and one veteran rider blamed the news media for focusing on negative images from 1997 when police arrested a little over a hundred Critical Massers. None of the people arrested were ever charged.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Thursday, September 27, 2012

(6:19)

The owner of a small historic airport in Sonoma County was battling with a neighbor over what he could build next door and whether it put pilots, and the public, at risk. The Sonoma Valley Airport was located off Highway 121 in an area surrounded by vineyards.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 11PM - Wednesday, September 12, 2012

(2:49)

The ABC7 News I-Team went to the Santa Rosa School Board meeting Wednesday to ask a simple question -- is it ever appropriate for a teacher to strike a student? The school district investigated a teacher and found that he had, in fact, slapped at least two special education students in the head at Santa Rosa High School. Since first hearing about the story, the I-Team had been trying to find out how he still had a job.

ABC 7 NEWS AT 6PM - Friday, July 27, 2012

(4:36)

Activists asked a federal court judge for an injunction to prevent the San Francisco Police Department from enforcing old, obscure laws that limited where they could protest. This report gave a fascinating look at some old laws that both sides admitted were outdated.

Two members of Congress are calling on Chrysler the maker of a popular SUV to educate owners about a potentially dangerous condition. Many Jeep owners called it the "death wobble," a shaking in the front end of the vehicle that makes the car shimmy violently. There were more than 600 complaints to federal highway safety officials about the condition, mostly on Jeep Wranglers. Chrysler responded by saying its "vehicles met or exceeded every applicable government safety standard and had excellent safety records." They didn't say if they would contact customers.
