**10/1/23: Out of the Darkness Community Walk – Guest: Stacey Green, Walk Chair - Stacey Green is the Walk Chair. Stacey discussed being personally driven by her personal connection to suicide after losing a loved one to suicide. She spoke about The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention Out Of The Darkness Walk coming up on Saturday, October 7th at Long Branch Park in Liverpool. The walk is to help raise money for educational programs that teach about prevention, warning signs and the psychiatric illnesses that can lead to suicide. Also, it is a journey of remembrance, hope, and support to unite our communities and provide an opportunity to acknowledge the ways in which suicide and mental health conditions have affected our lives and the lives of those we love and care about. The walk route**

is a total of four miles with options to turn around at several points. It is up to participants to decide how far to walk. The route is also wheelchair and stroller accessible. **10/8/23: Francis House – Guest: Peggy Northrup, Development Director - Peggy talked about the major fundraiser that Francis House benefits from every year. It will be their annual “There’s No Place Like Home” Fundraiser at the Expo Center of the New York State Fairgrounds on Wednesday, October 11th from 5:30 to 8:30 pm. Tickets can be purchased for the event at [FrancisHouseNY.org](http://FrancisHouseNY.org). Peggy mentioned the history where on January 28th, 1991, Francis House welcomed its first resident. Francis House was the dream of Sister Kathleen Osbelt. Serving as a hospital chaplain in the 1980s, she realized there were few, if any, places outside of a hospital setting where individuals could spend their final days. Sister also realized there were many in our community who, due to lack of family or resources, did not have the choice to die at home. The Sisters of Saint Francis dedicated a two-family home on Syracuse’s North Side to the vision for Francis House. Community volunteers renovated the house and prepared it to welcome its first residents. There are many ways to help Francis House, one of which is by donating online on their website. **10/22/23: The Food Bank of Central New York – Guest: Kynn Hy, Chief Development Officer – Lynn discussed that The Food Bank is a leading organization in the effort to eliminate hunger in our region by partnership with others in the Central New York area through education, advocacy, and distribution of nutritious food. Lynn told us how serious the hunger problem is in the United States today. The “Together Against Hunger Campaign” will launch on October 25<sup>th</sup> at all Central New York Wegmans stores and will continue through November 29<sup>th</sup>. Stores will be collecting donations at the register to be evenly divided between The Food Bank of CNY, The Salvation Army, and The Rescue Mission. Anyone can drop by area Wegmans stores through November 29th to donate. Trunfio, Executive Director –** Beth explained The Ronald McDonald House in Central New York had its first guest family of in 1982, CNY Ronald McDonald House. Since then, the location has changed and the home has gotten bigger, but the mission has remained the same. The Ronald McDonald House continues to provide housing for families of those whose children are being treated at area hospitals. Beth stated a much-needed expansion is on the way, and continued support helps ensure families are always kept exactly where they belong which is together. The new expansion will build out the fourth floor with new suites designed for large and multigenerational families. It will include six new family suites providing a total of 14 beds to accommodate the additional space to keep families even more comfortable and together when it matters most. **11/5/23: Hope for Heather – Guest: Frieda Weeks, President/Founder -** Frieda told the sorrow of losing her daughter Heather to cancer in 2008. Ovarian Cancer is the leading cause of death from gynecological cancers in the United States and the fifth leading cause of cancer death among American women. Each year, approximately 20,000 American women are diagnosed with ovarian cancer, and about 15,000 women die of the disease. Hope for Heather's mission is to raise funds to support ovarian cancer research, to promote education and awareness, and to help to provide comfort to women and their families devastated by cancer. **11/12/23: Road to Emmaus Ministry of Syracuse, Inc. – Guest: Sheila Austin, President and Executive Director –** Sheila spoke about how it all began with a sandwich. In February 2008, Father John Manno challenged St. James Church to reach beyond its walls and bring the presence of Christ to individuals and families impacted by poverty, drugs, crime, and homelessness on the south side of Syracuse. As an answer to this challenge, the parishioners made peanut butter and jelly sandwiches to bring the love of Christ and the Catholic Church to those in need. On February 23, 2009, Emmaus Ministry brought their first hot meal to the Catholic Charities Men's Shelter. By providing food, drink, clothing, visiting the sick, and burying the dead, as disciples, Sheila says we demonstrate unconditional love and hope to those in need. Safe Space provides a respite, a safe peaceful place to breathe for individuals, and to educate and empower those individuals on how to self-manage their mental health through creative outlets and traditional means by connecting them to community resources and other community members. Tracy says they are working to become a community hub of services that partners with other local medical facilities, treatment centers, not-for-profits and businesses to provide the best options for community members.
