So, Melissa began <u>Can</u> <u>Play</u> , an organization that lets kids with health and special needs issues play sports and have lots of fun. Jack suffered six strokes when he was just 8 years old, which left his left him with cognitive delays, partial paralysis and 'limited ability to play.' Can Play gives kids like Jack "a place that they can come, be themselves, learn about their bodies and what their bodies can do." Melissa says families are often told how their kids will not be able to do certain things. But with Can Play, they show kids they 'can do it,' no matter what. Melissa says it has been "awe inspiring" to see Jack work to overcome his challenges. She admits getting her strength from Jack, looking at the confidence and inspiration he conveys despite his physical setbacks. "You can do this, stay strong," says Jack. He reminds others even he had bad days, but to keep working hard at what they do and to "never give up."

Powers added that while demand has increased she is happy to report the Good Samaritan has been able to keep up thanks to strong ties with other non profit organizations in the area.

Merrick says there are certain qualifications to get into the program, but once in, the cost is always less than what home buyers have been paying for rent. Potential home buyers through Habitat have to attend financial and other classes, and also have to put in "sweat equity," helping to build their own homes or working in one of the Restores or in the office. Merrick mentioned it is always an emotional and gratifying experience when they turn over the keys to a new homeowner. She also mentioned there are financial classes available to the public at large, which could help people develop skills for anybody's future.
