Description: Yakima County investigators are looking for a suspect in a shooting in Parker today. Deputies say a 37-year-old man was shot in the back in a driveway on Parker Street. He was taken to a Yakima hospital for treatment. Witnesses told authorities the victim and suspect were involved in an argument before the shooting. The suspect drove off in an unknown vehicle.

Description: A 23-year-old man is facing assault charges related to a shooting this weekend in Parker. Austin Howard appeared in court today where he was charged with first-degree assault. Sheriff's deputies say he shot a man in the back during an argument in Parker, but it's not clear whether they knew each other. Deputies say it doesn't appear to be gang-related and so far ... they haven't yet found an weapons.  
The victim is recovering.

Description: A 21-year-old man is facing child rape charges after police say he raped his neighbor, a 14-year-old girl. Police reports say Christian Canfield was a sex offender before moving to the neighborhood. The minor lived in the house next door. His bail was set at 100-thousand dollars.

Description: A Yakima man is behind bars tonight after police say he robbed a house while the victim was home. Court papers say 28-year-old Jose Yopez Arredondo kicked the door to get in the house. Police say he saw a woman in the bedroom, left for a minute, and came back to rob her. The woman hid under the covers of her bed while the man stole items from her house. Yopez Arredondo is charged with burglary and indecent liberties.

Description: A Yakima man is facing vehicular homicide charges in connection with a crash that killed a Richland couple in October. Court records say 39-year-old Brent Owens had methamphetamine in his system along with prescription pain killers when he crashed into the couple's parked car. Troopers say

they're not sure why the couple was parked along a shoulder of interstate-82.Charges were filed against Owens last month. He is also facing "commercial abuse of a child" from a different incident. Owens is not currently in custody.

Description: A 20-year-old man is in critical condition after police found him in the middle of a street with gunshot wounds this morning. Charles Montes(montez)--Ulloa (oo-YO-uh) was found lying in the street on 16th Avenue between Valley Mall Boulevard and Ahtanum around 6 a-m. There were no vehicles in the area when police arrived. ((( "He was either shot and dumped there or something happened there and he was dropped off or dumped. We don't really have a lot to go on until we are able to talk to the victim." )))

Detectives say the victim is out of surgery They have no motive so far.

Description: Yakima Police are warning the public against suspected criminal activity. Police say there are multiple reports in Yakima of men knocking on doors, telling residents that they are there to check on pipes in the home. Police don't know the motives, but they're reminding the public to never let anyone inside your home, unless you're sure they're there for legitimate reasons.((( "Any situation where they just feel like there's something wrong, we want them to call us. Many times people have the gut feeling and many times they're right." ))) Check for identification and if you ever suspect any suspicious activity, police say you should \*always call 9-1-1- for assistance.

Description: Yakima County deputies are asking for your help finding a jail inmate who escaped this morning while on a work crew. Authorities say 24-year-old Terry Penuel ran out through an open gate while officers were bringing a group of inmates back into the jail. He wasn't wearing restraints because corrections leaders had cleared him as a low-risk inmate. Penuel was being held in connection with the violation of a court order. If you have any information about where he is, you're asked to call the Yakima County Sheriff's Office or Crime Stoppers.

Description Yakima Police are still trying to track down the person responsible for the city's first homicide of 20-16. Autopsy results show 24-year-old Enrique Ramirez-Briggs died from two gunshot

wounds -- one to his chest and the other to his shoulder. Briggs was found in his apartment Monday morning on Cherry Avenue. So far ... police haven't identified any suspects.

Description: The search is over tonight for an inmate who escaped from the Yakima County Department of Corrections on Monday. Action News was the \*only local TV station on scene as inmate Terry Penuel was escorted \*back to the jail after getting caught today. 53-hours after inmate Terry Penuel escaped from D-O-C- custody, he was arrested by the violent offenders taskforce in Selah without incident According to records at the Yakima County Sheriff's Office, there have been \*at least six inmate escapes in the past four years. These are escapes law enforcement have to work hard to find. (((("Well, crime in general is frustrating. What frustrates me is there are people who will not seem to learn from their mistakes, who seem to want to dig that proverbial hole for themselves, deeper and deeper.")))

Penuel now faces a second-degree escape charge -- which has a maximum penalty of five years in prison and/or a ten-thousand dollar fine. Court records say Penuel was being held at the Yakima County jail for felony violation of a court order when he escaped. He had been cleared by the DOC as a low risk inmate and was not previously considered an escape risk.

Description: Every nine seconds someone experiences domestic abuse. The number, too close to home... after domestic violence killed a Yakima woman. Police say Marcelina Briones was killed by a man she already had a restraining order against. "You just heard her scream and scream for help." The suspect, out on bail after being charged with assault It was for an altercation court documents say he had with Marcelina in October. "Police say if it wasn't for a quick thinking neighbor who called for help as soon as he heard screams in this block, they may have never been able to identify and arrest the suspect." Scott ran over, banging on the door -- which caused Mendoza to run.. Police say he used a metal bat to kill Briones. "I don't know how to feel. I'm kind of grateful that I did what I did. But at the same time, I just wish I could have done it sooner."Yakima Police also sympathetic... of all the calls for service in Yakima, Domestic Violence is the one they respond to the most. "Our hearts go out to the family. This is a beautiful young woman, who had two beautiful young children. Just a tragic, tragic, tragic incident that doesn't need to happen. "But it does happen. Every nine seconds. And in Yakima, each day, the YWCA helps nearly 250 individuals experiencing domestic violence. Each day in Yakima, at least 30 crisis calls come to the center. "It rocks us to our core. I actually spoke with a client earlier this morning who heard the news and kind of teared up about it and said that 'it could have been any of us.'"So how can the community prevent others {tick tick tick} from becoming a number? "Through education, intervention, and through having faith in the judicial system and law enforcement... all of these things should come together to help reduce the number. "Combine that with a little action... See something happen? Speak up. Stand up. Don't let it slide... because... look what happened..."To look out for others ... your neighbors, your family, your friends...and help bring justice for those lost to senseless violence. "It happens all to much."

Description: A man convicted of trying to rob a Yakima drugstore is headed to prison for the rest of his life. Edward Nelson was sentenced today as a result of Washington's three-strikes law. He was convicted of trying to rob a Yakima drugstore in 20-14, which was his third strike. His first two strikes were another attempted robbery and promoting prostitution. Nelson had drug charges in recent years which kept all the strikes valid. Today a judge told Nelson he had no choice but to hand down the sentence. ((( "you've been given a number of opportunities to change your life and you haven't.)))  
Nelson's attorney says he plans on appealing the most recent conviction. The last time we reported on someone getting a life-sentence from the three strikes law in our area was about ten years ago.

Saturday the second victim was in critical condition... There is no word on her condition now.. and she is only being identified by police as a 42-year-old woman. Police do not believe the shooting was random. YPD says they're looking for a male suspect. An autopsy will be done on Hargett tomorrow morning.

THE TOWN OF BLACKSBURG WAS IN MOURNING SUNDAY, LEARNING THAT 13-YEAR-OLD NICOLE LOVELL IS DEAD AND TWO ASPIRING STUDENTS AT VIRGINIA TECH MAY BE RESPONSIBLE. 18-YEAR-OLD DAVID EISENHAEUER IS CHARGED WITH LOVELL'S ABDUCTION AND MURDER, NOW, POLICE SAY HE HAD AN ACCOMPLICE. (Lt. Mike Albert, Blacksburg Police): "19-year-old Natalie Marie Keepers has been charged by Blacksburg police with felony count of improper disposal of a body and one misdemeanor count of accessory after the fact in the commission of a felony. "BUT EVEN MORE DISTURBING, POLICE SAY EISENHAEUER KNEW LOVELL BEFOREHAND AND PLANNED HER DEATH. (Lt. Mike Albert, Blacksburg Police): "Based on evidence collected today, we have determined that Eisenhauer and Nicole were acquainted prior to her disappearance. Eisenhauer used this relationship to his advantage to abduct and then kill her. WSP laid down spike strips which the driver hit but continued on, even hitting another vehicle. Officers say the driver eventually hit the patrol car and came to a stop. Charges are pending and only minor injuries to the driver were reported.

faces assault, hit and run, eluding, \*and reckless driving charges. Troopers say speeds reached over 120 miles per hour and they used spike strips and a spin-out technique to disable Vinueza's car. Troopers aren't sure if drugs or alcohol were involved.

Description: A Denver jury finds this former Yakima man guilty of conspiracy, theft, forgery and tax evasion. "to have them come back with guilty verdicts on almost all of the charges, it was reassuring for the prosecution team that took this case to trial." 59-year-old Alan DeAtley was accused of taking advantage of Colorado's conservation easement program. It allows people to set aside undeveloped land in exchange for a tax break. "I think the DeAtley case has been used as an example of why there was change that was needed for that program." DeAtley bought a large chunk of land in Colorado and divided it into multiple parcels for conservation easements. Denver's district attorney's office says he forged signatures on the land to inflate the value..which in turn inflated the value of conservation tax credits he received. "he tried to sell those, buyers would use those tax credits on their taxes and the state department of revenue here did not honor those. About 20 victims were named in the case who not only didn't get those tax breaks after paying DeAtley for them, but also owed tax penalties. A loss totaling \$3.5 million. DeAtley was indicted by a grand jury on the charges back in 2010. "to not come back until 2016 with results of the trial is, that's a long time, that's a long time for victims to wait to see if there is justice."

Justice which doesn't include victims getting their money back. But does have DeAtley facing more than 100 years in prison when he's sentenced in April. "at least maybe there is a sense that there is some accountability for what he did here."

Description: Traffic deaths, overdoses and homicides are all up in Yakima County according to the latest Coroner's Report. There were 21 homicides in 2015, which is five more than the year before..But six fewer than 20-13. The coroner says gangs and drugs contribute to the majority of the homicides. Drugs are also behind most accidental deaths. ((( "it's so unpredictable because of it's different strengths in the meth, homemade meth they're making and stuff, you just don't know what you're getting."))) Drugs, along with alcohol were also linked to 15 traffic deaths last year. There were 38 total traffic deaths last year, which has consistently climbed.

Court documents say the bullet went through Hargett and hit another woman in the neck... She is recovering. Dimas is being held in the Yakima County Jail.

As police took cover, they say they heard a shot from the inside of the car. The 33-year-old man was pronounced dead at the scene. Authorities say no officers fired any shots and no one else was injured.

Description: The leaders of Yakima County's Pretrial program are working to better educate the public about it. The League of Women Voters hosted a public forum Monday night to not only provide information on the pretrial program ... but also to let the public ask questions. The program allows some defendants to be out of custody as they await trial. A risk-assessment tool is used that determines how likely a defendant is to commit a new crime or not show up to court. Pretrial defendants are put on different levels of supervision while they're out. The committee says correctional officers and law enforcement are encouraged to weigh in on what defendant's fates should be. (((("regardless of whether an individual likes the program or feels that it is inappropriate for the county, what we've got now is more information before the court that we did not have before."))) A member of comprehensive mental health will also join the committee in June to give input on defendants.

Description: The feeling of being lost, you know. That's the hardest part. It's a feeling the McCoy's have felt for a long time. Waiting for any answers regarding the death of 10 year old Nathaniel Reedy McCoy.

Nathaniel's mother wants justice for a son she lost too soon. ((Krista)) It's just frustrating because it's been a year and I just want answers. I want to know who did it and for that person to get what he deserves and what he gets coming to him so that, because he took the life of my 10 year old son. Nathaniel was outside of a Union Gap home when he was shot and killed last March. Union Gap police say they've identified a person of interest ... and right now ... Yakima County Prosecutor Joe Brusica is reviewing the evidence against the person to decide on charges. Nathaniel's grandfather says the person who killed his outgoing and loving grandson already suffers from a lifelong burden. ((Ron)) The person that does it, did it, they know who did it. They have to live with that their whole life. Krista says having this case solved sooner would have helped her in finding peace. ((Krista)) Maybe I would have been able, be easier, or I would have had lighter feelings towards that person. For the family, working towards a resolution is something owed to Nathaniel. ((Ron)) Something inside of me, in my heart that I have to figure out why we can't play with him no more. You know, why did they do this, why? And I'm determined to do that. I am going to give it my all until I go up and visit him in heaven.
