Current local and national news	96.9 KVMV News	07-10-20 6:40AM, 7:40AM & 5:50PM	Varies	<p>Hidalgo County confirmed 20 deaths due to the coronavirus on Thursday, hitting a new milestone and setting a new single-day increase as 1,274 new cases were also confirmed. There are currently 4,375 active cases of COVID-19 in Hidalgo County.</p> <p>Cameron County confirmed 126 new cases of the coronavirus yesterday. Among the new cases, the youngest is a 9-month-old girl from Port Isabel, and the oldest is a 98-year-old man from Brownsville. Additionally, 56 individuals were reported to have recovered from the disease, leaving 905 active cases in the county.</p> <p>The McAllen federal courthouse is one step closer to a much-needed renovation. Congressman Henry Cuellar said that \$1 billion in the 2021 Financial Services and General Government Appropriations Bill was secured for seven courthouse renovations across the nation. If the bill is passed in the Senate, part of that funding will go toward the McAllen federal courthouse, which is currently sixth in line for construction.</p> <p>Worsening coronavirus trends in Texas again set another grim milestone Thursday as the state reported more than 100 deaths in a single day for the first time, making this the deadliest week of the pandemic in what has rapidly become one of America’s virus hot zones. In addition to 105 new deaths, Texas also reported a new high for hospitalizations for the 10th consecutive day and the rolling rate of positive tests inched closer to nearly 16% -- the highest in the pandemic yet.</p> <p>The First Baptist Church in Weslaco is working to help health care workers amid the coronavirus pandemic. The church is putting together hundreds of care packages for health care workers. The care packages include items such as Gatorade, hand sanitizer, Chapstick, lotion and notes of encouragement. If you would like to make a donation, contact First Baptist Church in Weslaco. The care packages will be delivered to health care workers over the weekend.</p> <p>Members of two churches gathered outside McAllen Medical Center this week to pray for those in the hospital and the health care workers. The wife of one of the church pastors said, “We’re calling upon the Lord, that he may make a turnaround and bring his grace and his favor and his mercy upon his nation. Upon the border of Mexico, and the Rio Grande Valley, being hit drastically with the COVID,”</p> <p>Pharr city officials reported a situation regarding a blockade on the Mexican side of the Pharr- Reynosa International Bridge this week. Organized by protesters in response to certain conditions in their industry, according to a CBP official, the blockade blocked access to the Pharr Bridge with agricultural tractors and machinery. The partnership will start with 30 U.S. markets and grow organically over the next five years. The U-S set a new single-day record for new coronavirus cases this week, logging 60,000 cases of the disease in a 24-hour period. At the same time the country marked another grim milestone, with total cases now exceeding 3 million, according to data compiled by Johns Hopkins University.</p> <p>Brooks Brothers, the upscale fashion retailer, has filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection, the latest corporate victim of the pandemic. Not only did the initial shutdown close all of its stores, but people working from home also didn't see the need for business attire. Casual Friday didn't help.</p>

The sixth named storm of the Atlantic hurricane season is expected to bring at least 3 to 5 inches of rain to mid-Atlantic states, southeast New York and southern New England, according to the National Hurricane Center (NHC). Lord we pray for protection for people and property in the path of this storm.</p> <p>Coronavirus is spreading more rapidly throughout the U.S. Sun Belt than anywhere else in the world. Data compiled by the New York Times shows Arizona, Florida and South Carolina as the top three places with the most COVID-19 cases per million residents in the last seven days. Hospitals in some of the hard hit States are filled to capacity and healthcare workers are exhausted from the strain. According to Billboard, Williams, announced that the streaming service ordered his docuseries “Voices of Fire.” The series is said to explore the entertainer’s hometown of Hampton Roads, Virginia, as it “builds one of the world’s most inspiring gospel choirs.” The unscripted project “Voices of Fire” follows gospel leaders and Williams’ uncle, Bishop Ezekiel Williams, the general overseer, pastor and founder of Faith World Ministries, as they embark on a quest to find undiscovered talent in Hampton Roads.</p> <p>The against-all-odds story of former NFL quarterback Kurt Warner will soon be a faith-based movie. American Underdog: The Kurt Warner Story will be directed by Jon and Andrew Erwin and released by Lionsgate. A release date has not been set, although the movie is in pre-production. Warner’s story seemingly was made for a Hollywood film: He was working at a Hy-Vee grocery store in the 1990s when he won a job as quarterback for an Arena Football League team, the Iowa Barnstormers. A full assessment of the damage wrought by the Category 4 system was likely to take days. But despite a trail of demolished buildings, entire neighborhoods left in ruins and more than 875,000 people without power, a sense of relief prevailed that Laura was not the annihilating menace forecasters had feared.</p> <p>Texas Gov. Greg Abbott said Texas appears to have made it through Hurricane Laura with minimal or no loss of life, which he said was a ‘miracle’. In Orange Texas where trees were uprooted and buildings damaged, but those who live there are thankful it was not worse.</p> <p>The Food and Drug Administration is warning that alcohol-based hand sanitizers are being sold in containers that look like food and drink packaging, and may have added flavors. That could increase the chance someone such as a child will accidentally drink it with potentially deadly results.</p> <p>Edinburg Residents have one more chance to qualify for a \$100 gift card from the city at a Census drive-thru effort today. Edinburg officials are inviting the community to fill out the census questionnaire at the Census Self-Response Rally</p>

				<p>from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. today at the UTRGV Soccer and Track &amp; Field Complex on West University Drive and North Jackson Road. The city will have free giveaways, along with a food distribution while residents fill out the Census form with assistance from city staff.</p> <p>Forty Border Patrol agents from Texas' Rio Grande Valley Sector along with four Black Hawk helicopters, a P-3 aircraft and 14 boats have been deployed to the Texas-Louisiana border to help with Hurricane Laura rescue efforts, and the sector chief is the agency's lead field coordinator.</p> <p>Starting Sept. 8, Texas education officials will require all school districts to fill out forms weekly reporting new cases of COVID-19, including whether the infections occurred on or off campus and if the campus closed as a result.</p> <p>The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission announced the approved Local Parks Grants for the cities of Edinburg and Palmview. The commission's press release said funding for this grant program comes from a portion of the state sales tax attributable to sporting goods and from the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund Stateside Assistance Program.</p> <p>One of the biggest Rio Grande Valley school districts has tentatively picked its return date to resume on-campus practices and extracurricular activities. Multiple sources with direct knowledge of the situation told The Monitor that Edinburg CISD officials representing the district's four high schools have agreed to resume on-campus practices for fall sports at all four campuses Sept. 28.</p>

Harrison wasted no time in leaping off the pier navigating small fishing boats in order to rescue the child.</p> <p>‘We were at the middle pier and we started walking towards the smaller one because you get cut off by the tide’, Harrison told Sky News. ‘And then when we got on to the little pier - my dad shouted ‘there’s a kid drowning’ so I jumped in and saved him and swam back to the beach.’</p> <p>Harrison’s mother Kaleigh said that her husband, Ian, was still in the process of taking off his bag - ready to rescue the baby himself - when Eli had already jumped into action.</p> <p>‘As he swam back he had one arm round his tummy and you could see water coming out the boy’s mouth, it was bad’ Kaleigh said. The toddler had apparently been holding onto a small fishing net, but had made his way into the water without his parents noticing.</p> <p>‘They were packing up, they’d turned their back for just a split second but that’s all it takes’ Kayleigh said.</p> <p>Thankfully, the toddler appeared to make a full recovery and 11-year old Eli Harrison is being called a hero.</p>

In the suit, Jose Luengo, who was demoted to the rank of lieutenant on July 2, alleges interim City Manager Ed Wylie’s decision to remove him as chief was retaliation for Luengo alleging to the Texas Rangers that Wylie violated a law regarding misuse of official information.</p> <p>Texans receiving unemployment benefits who qualified for an extra \$300 in weekly jobless payments issued by the Trump administration will no longer receive the additional funds after claims from last week are paid, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The agency, which processes unemployment claims, said it had been notified of the news by FEMA, which provided the funds. Roughly 1.8 million Texans currently receive the \$300 payment, according to the workforce commission.</p> <p>Pharr City Officials joined with International Bridge officials for a groundbreaking ceremony yesterday for a long-awaited port infrastructure project designed to improve the flow of crossings at the international bridge. The project includes additional commercial entry lanes and booths as well as two more commercial exit lanes and booths — all aimed at alleviating traffic at the Pharr-Reynosa International Bridge.</p> <p>Gov. Greg Abbott proposed to yank future ability to annex — and let residents who’ve been recently annexed depart —</p>

Yesterday, the governor said 35,000 people have signed his “Texas Back the Blue Pledge,” which highlights a few cities” rethinking of their police budgets.</p> <p>Mall owners Simon Property Group and Brookfield Property Group, both of which are real estate investments trusts, have announced a deal to buy J.C. Penney and bring the troubled retailer out of bankruptcy for \$1.75 billion. The deal has not been finalized yet but if it is, it will save the store at some malls such as Valle Vista and save thousands of jobs. Simon Property Group is the biggest mall owner in the U.S. with 77 retail properties, 21 of them in Texas, including La Plaza Mall in McAllen and Rio Grande Valley Premium Outlets in Mercedes.</p> <p>With the coronavirus pandemic causing major changes to the retail landscape, Home Depot says its ditching traditional Black Friday deals for 2020. Instead, the company announced that its “reinventing” the day after Thanksgiving shopping holiday by offering Black Friday prices starting in early November and lasting through December, both in-store and online.</p> <p>An estimated 15% of Texas’ restaurants have closed their doors for good since the start of the pandemic, according to the Texas Restaurant Association. Association president and CEO Emily Williams Knight said pre-pandemic, Texas’ restaurant industry was 50,000 strong and employed about 1.3 million people in foodservice. The 15% loss is in line with the national average. Knight says the TRA is urging Congress to pass another business stimulus bill to help out the struggling restaurants.</p> <p>A three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled Thursday that Texas can keep its strict eligibility rules for voting by mail. Siding with the state’s Republican leadership, the appellate judges rejected the Texas Democratic Party’s effort to expand eligibility for voting by mail to all registered voters.</p>

In its latest credit card debt study, WalletHub reports Americans began the year owing more than 1 trillion dollars in credit card debt but paid off 60 billion dollars in the first quarter. They paid 58 billion dollars more in the second quarter.</p> <p>The I-R-S is sitting on nine million unclaimed Economic Impact Payment checks and wants to get rid of them. Beginning September 24, the agency will start mailing letters to taxpayers who usually don’t file federal income tax returns but who may be eligible for the checks, asking them to step up and claim theirs.</p> <p>Kroger Health is expanding its flu shot program to make it available to more people in more places. The company says it will use drive-thru coronavirus testing sites to administer the shots, taking the pressure off other health care facilities.</p>

Harnessing the power of the sun, Zero Mass Water's Source hydropanels do just that. Through a grant provided by the Unreasonable Group and Barclays Bank, an initial demonstration project is bringing this pioneering air-to-water technology to 15 Navajo households. This project is being managed by Navajo Power, Public Benefit Corporation, and Arizona-based Zero Mass Water.</p> <p>Already, the demonstration project is proving to be a hit. "We are so happy to see these systems come to our communities who have not had basic access to water for all of these years," said Mae Franklin of the Cameron and Coalmine communities.</p> <p>Hydropanels—powered by off-grid solar energy—have fans that draw air in the atmosphere and push it through what's called a hygroscopic. From there, the trapped water vapor is extracted and gets condensed into liquid that's collected in the reservoir of the hydropanel. So that it has the ideal taste and composition, that collected water is then mineralized. Now it can be run through the faucet and is ready to drink.</p> <p>"We are excited to help shine a light on the potential of Hydropanels to help solve the clean water access challenge our communities have been facing for decades," said Clara Pratte, President of Navajo Power. She said, "There are thousands of homes without water and this is a more cost-effective approach to getting clean water to these families. While our focus as a company is the development of large clean energy projects, our commitment to the well-being of Navajo communities is our north star, and we want to do everything we can to help the Nation mitigate the threats brought by the pandemic."</p>

				<p>will consist of 13 tracks spanning just under 45 minutes and will include their now-iconic rendition of Little Drummer Boy as well as several other Christmas standards and originals.</p> <p>In ongoing efforts to halt indoor worship services at Grace Community Church, Los Angeles County has reportedly handed Pastor John MacArthur’s church a \$1,000 fine for violating a signage ordinance. Grace Church posted attention-getting signs outside its sanctuary that read in part: “Please do not enter if you have an elevated temperature, a cough, or any flu-like symptoms” But according to county inspectors, the signs were not properly placed at both the front and back entrances to the building, nor did they instruct congregants to wash their hands, sanitize, wear face coverings and social distance.</p> <p>Two-thirds of Americans say they believe the Bible’s account about Jesus’ bodily resurrection, although most also deny Scripture’s teaching that He was God, according to a new LifeWay Research survey that shows adults in the U.S. holding conflicting views on Christianity and theology. The State of Theology survey, conducted by LifeWay Research and sponsored by Ligonier Ministries, shows that 66 percent of U.S. adults say they believe the “biblical accounts of the physical (bodily) resurrection of Jesus are completely accurate” and that the event “actually occurred.” Another 62 percent believe Jesus will return in the future to “judge all the people who have lived.” But while Americans affirm several major teachings of historic Christianity, they also deny some of its core doctrines. For example, 55 percent say they believe “Jesus is the first and greatest being created by God,” and 52 percent believe “Jesus was a great teacher, but he was not God.”</p>
